ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 CHAMBERS STREET,
TUESDAY, March 28, 1882—2.30 o'clock P. M.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880 to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of March 27 and 28, 1882, showing due publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting held on March 24, 1882, were read and approved.

On motion of Mr. James A. Deering, attorney, the Counsel to the Corporation consenting, the petition of George W. Douglas (No. 1914), for relief in matter of assessment for Seventh avenue paving, etc., from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, was amended so as to include the lots belonging to the petitioner, known as Ward Nos. 2, 4, 62, and 63, in Block No. 722.

The Calendar was called, and action taken as follows:

No. 1296. Matter of Mary G. Pinkney; assessment for One Hundred and Eighth street regulating, grading, etc., from Fifth avenue to East river; confirmed February 3, 1876.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, presented a portion of the evidence on behalf of the petitioner, after which the further hearing of the case was adjourned to the next meeting.

On motion of Commissioner Lord, the seventh rule, relating to meetings of the Commission, was suspended, and, on his motion, it was

Commissioner Andrews presented the following decision:

In matter of the application of A. Simis (No. 36) for the vacation or reduction of the assessment for Church street paving, from Fulton to Morris street; confirmed October 30, 1873.

It does not appear that any substantial injustice has been done the petitioner by the assessment in question. The case of Mott, decided March 22, 1881, which has been cited in his interest, differed in several essential particulars from that of the petitioner; and the Commission find no sufficient ground for disturbing the assessment.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision as presented shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Kelly, Campbell, and Andrews—4.

Negative—Commissioner Lord—1.

(Commissioner Lord, in explanation of his vote, said: "I think the case of Mott is controlling on us, and see no reason in the present case for disturbing the rule we then made. I am of the opinion that the petitioner is entitled to relief, and while in ordinary cases I am opposed to interfering with the discretion exercised by the Assessors, I do not think, in the present case, that the benefits derived from the improvement are properly represented by the amount assessed.")

Bell (No. 1413).

That all other avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards having a generally northerly and southerly direction be given the same number at the cross streets nearest their southern terminus as that on Willis, Melrose, and Webster avenues at the intersection of said cross street, and then numbered accordingly.

That cross streets at their easterly intersection with said Willis, Melrose, and Webster avenues, be given a specific number, and that all cross streets be numbered therefrom, diminishing toward the west and increasing toward the east, according to their distance from said Willis, Melrose, and Webster avenues.

That the numbering of avenues and streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be done (as nearly as practicable) on the basis of 500 numbers to a mile in distance.

That all resolutions or ordinances, or part thereof, conflicting with these resolutions be and hereby are repealed.

The dimensions above referred to shall include the height, width, and extent of projection outwardly from the building; and no resolution shall be passed by this Board granting any such permission to encroach upon any of the public streets, unless the foregoing provisions have been complied with, and the consent of adjoining owners, mentioned in section 31, article 4 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, be first verified by affidavit of the person or persons desiring such consent, that the persons so consenting did so voluntarily and without compensation.

Whereas, It has been further certified to me that while a portion of the Fire Department is engaged in responding to unnecessary and malicious alarms, which unnecessarily call into requisition the force of the Department, thus seriously weakening such force for actual duty in case of alarms for actual fires, the efficiency of the Department is seriously affected and the welfare of the city endangered.

Now, therefore, I, William R. Grace, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of two hundred and fifty dollars to any person or persons who shall give information resulting in the apprehension and conviction of the party or parties guilty of any one of the aforesaid misdemeanors. No claim for this reward to be considered unless presented to the Mayor within twenty days after he arrest of any such party or parties.
