-to the appropriation for surveys, maps and plans for the current year, which is insufficient. The sum of \$5,700 from the appropriation, "Labor, Maintenance, Supplies, Construction and Repairs—General Maintenance," for the year 1888, to the appropriation, "Zoological Department"

The sum of \$1,200 from the appropriation for Riverside Park and avenue for the current year to the appropriation for "Labor, Maintenance, Supplies, Construction and Repairs, Arranging Small Parks" for the same year. The plan of the Riverside avenue has been changed by continuing the roadway between Eighty-eighth and Eighty-sixth streets, at a uniform width of forty-five feet. Under chapter 407 of the Laws of 1888, an act providing for the construction of railways through the Central Park Transverse roads, proposals were invited for the construction and operation of such railways. In response to an advertisement published in the CTTV RECORD, two proposals were received, i. e. from the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and the Second Avenue Railroad Company for constructing railways in and through Transverse Road No. 3, at Eighty-fifth street. The matter is still under consideration. Provision having been made for the lighting of Stuyvesant Square at night, the square or park which it has been the custom for many years to close at sundown is now allowed to remain open to the public throughout the evening. Music has been given in the Central and several of the city parks during the summer concert season.

Season. The purchasers of several buildings standing within the lines of Railroad avenue, East, which were sold at auction by the Department, having failed to comply with repeated notices to remove the buildings, the Commissioner of Public Works was requested to cause the removal of the same through his Bureau of Incumbrances. The Departmental Estimate for the year 1889, has been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Board of Aldermen.

## CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

Gardening Work. The force has been employed in cutting out dead, diseased and overcrowded trees and shrubs, and grubbing out poison ivy, cat briars and other weeds, preparatory to planting out during the

autumn. 1,571 trees were removed from the Central Park, also 3 large trees at Mount Morris Park and 3 at Riverside Park. 8 laborers have been engaged around the green-houses in cutting out trees and grubbing preparatory to future planting. These 8 men have taken out 420 trees since August 4, 1888, besides a large quantity of poison ivy. The nursery stock at Morningside Park has been regularly watered and cared for, also the bedding plants on the city parks and elsewhere. The force at the green-houses has been engaged in the propagation of stock for the coming season. autumn.

### General Maintenance of Parks.

By this term is meant the routine work of the laborers in the employ of the Department, in addition to which are added a few special items of work, deserving of special mention as peculiar to the season.

The maintenance work consists of the almost daily watering, rolling, scraping and cleaning of nearly 20 miles of drives and bridle-roads, the daily sweeping and cleaning of 28 miles of walks and the cleaning of 400 acres of lawns on the Central Park, as well as the walks and lawns of the various

city parks. The cleaning, on an average of once a month, of the hundreds of basins along the drives, bridle-roads and walks of the various parks has been an important item of work. The surface and shores of the different bodies of water throughout the Central Park have been when been and surface and some removed

regularly cleaned and scum removed. This work of cleaning drives, bridle-paths, walks, basins and shores of lakes has involved con-siderable labor both in the collection of the refuse and the hauling of same to the dump. The ladies' and gentlemen's cottages have been kept open on an average of 12 hours per day

in charge of attendants. The lawns of the Central Park have been open for games and picnics, and large numbers of

The lawns of the Central Park have been open for games and picnics, and large numbers of people availed themselves of these privileges. Concerts were given on an average of twice a week on the Mall, Central Park, and once a week-at each of the following places : Mount Morris Park, Tompkins Square and Battery Park. This use of the lawns by the public and the large attendance at the concerts involved consider-able labor. The lawns had to be kept clean, frequently mowed, and tennis courts marked out. The matter of music caused considerable labor in the way of the preparation and decoration of music-stands, attendance at concerts and games, providing water, and properly caring for and preserving Department property. 380 cubic yards of manure were received at the Sheepfold Yard during the past quarter from the following sources :

Considerable work has been done in the matter of repairing, improving and erecting wire fences different points throughout the Department. 50,000 square feet of grass-sod were laid at different points throughout the Central and city arks. This involved considerable work in the preparation of the ground and grading sunken

1,163 cubic yards of garden mould were received at the Sheepfold Yard and stored for future u

The lawns of the Park have been mowed, from time to time, as required. The long grass has either been carted to the Menagerie for the use of the animals or sold. The short grass was carted to the dump.

### Special Items of Work.

Considerable work was done in excavating and removing the earth and stone filling preparatory to the repairs of Bridge 6, on West Drive, near Sheepfold, by the masons. The excavation made was 56 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 13 feet deep. When the repairs were made to the stone work of the arch of the bridge the earth and stone filling and foundation of drive were replaced. Tar-walks were laid on the First and Second Division, as follows :

The small parks above Fifty-ninth street, such as Triangle, junction of Ninth avenue ; Boule-vard and Sixty-third street, Manhattan Square, Fourth Avenue Park and Mount Morris Park have been regularly maintained and cared for. The force at the Stables has been engaged in properly grooming and feeding 85 horses, as

follows: 66 at the Eighty-fifth Street Stables. 19 at the Police Stables. The constant use of the light wagons and express wagons required the daily washing and cleaning of same, and also of the harness, to which the necessary repairs were made from time to time in order to replace wear and tear.

Fifth avenue, from Ninetieth to One Hnndred and Tenth street, was repaired by the applica-tion of two boat-loads of broken stone and regraded. One Hundred and Tenth and West Seventy-second streets were also improved and cared for. One Hundred and Tenth street was repaired by the application of about 60 yards of broken stone ; West Seventy-second street by the application of gravel. Both these streets, as well as Fifth avenue, were regularly sprinkled. The care of the city parks below the line of Fifty-ninth street has involved considerable work, particularly at Jackson Square, where the work was pushed to completion and the park opened for the use of the public on August 23. This work of opening other small city parks has been carried on, and at present the walks are well under way in Abingdon Square and Christopher Street Parks, and work is about to commence at Duane Street Park. At Washington Square the walks have been repaired by the application of about 50,000 square

at Duane Street Park. At Washington Square the walks have been repaired by the application of about 50,000 square feet of asphalt. This work has been done on specially advantageous terms to the city by its sup-plying the material and contracting for the laying of the same. The various other city parks and triangles have received attention from time to time as required. The work at Riverside Drive has been altogether of a maintenance character, consisting of cleaning lawns, roads, gutters, etc. The work at this point has been attended to. At Morningside Park the work is of a construction character, and consisted of excavating for walk and surface basins and laying drain-pipe to connect with same, repairing wash-outs caused by rain storms, grading and shaping course of walks, preparing rock-work and arranging stone steps at various points. The execution of the overhanging rock-work at One Hundred and Twenty-third street is very difficult. During the past quarter the drives of the Central Park and Riverside Drive have been improved

During the past quarter the drives of the Central Park and Riverside Drive have been improved by the application of 4,094.98 cubic yards of double screened gravel.

Mechanical Work-Carpenters.

The Carpenters of the Department have been engaged as follows : Repairing 5 cottages, 6 summer-houses, rustic bridges and arbors, and eight other buildings, such as Arsenal, green-houses, stables, etc. Two cottages and 2 gate-boxes were repaired on the city parks. At the Harlem river bridges necessary repairs were made to the roadway of the Third and Madison Avenue Bridges and Central Bridge. 2,161 settees were repaired for the Central and city parks, as follows :

In addition to this there has been put together 20 settees at Jeannette Park, 30 at Canal street and 31 at Jackson Square, together with platforms for same. Made 44 new signs and repaired 25 old ones, also made 6,098 stakes for Morningside Park, East River Park and Riverside Park.

Made necessary repairs to tools, tool-boxes, derricks, water-troughs, etc.; also to 34 pieces of rolling-stock.

Painters' Work.

Painted, grained and varnished inside and outside of three cottages, also painted and glazed the repairs of three other cottages on the Central Park. Painted and glazed repairs of gate-boxes, green-houses, stables, Harlem river bridges, music-stands, rolling-stock, etc. Painted 1,398 settees on the Central Park and 166 on the city parks. Painted iron-work of urinals and railings at Jeannette Park, Duane Street Park, Beach Street Park, Canal Street Park, Abingdon Square, Christopher Street Park, Washington Square, Jackson Square, Triangles at Thirty-second and Thirty-fifth streets, Broadway and Sixth avenue, and Bryant Park. Park.

#### Machinists' Work.

This force consists of steam engineers and men employed in operating the bridges over the

Harlem river ; of skilled laborers, blacksmiths, tool dressers, etc. The 3 draw-bridges over the Harlem river have been operated satisfactorily. Repairs have been made to the iron railings and urinals on the Central and city parks, also to the tools and rolling-stock.

#### Masons' Work.

At Jackson Square removed, recut and reset 564 feet of 6-inch curb, repaved 1,188 feet of street gutters, built walk-basins and laid 45 feet of 4-inch iron drain-pipe, connecting with Greenwich avenue sewer, cut out granite base course for 10 foot gateway, cut and set 5 granite-blocks, recut 3

avenue sewer, cut out granite base course for 10 foot gateway, cut and set 5 granite-blocks, recut 3 granite fence posts and pointed 500 feet of granite coping. At Canal Street Park removed, recut and reset 768 feet of 4-inch stone curbing, repaved 1,536 feet of street gutters, cut out 20 feet of coping for gateway, cut and set 10 blocks of granite for gates, built walk basins and laid 25 feet of 4-inch drain-pipe. At Morningside Park built 1,837 feet of stone foundation walls at One Hundred and Sixteenth street and laid 278 feet of drain-pipe. On Central Park built 51 basins and laid 494 feet of drain-pipe. At Bridge 6, on West Drive, near Sheepfold, cut out all old mortar, cleaned walls, and laid 2,973 square feet of cement plastering in two coats, laid 1,716 cubic feet of concrete, cut through 8 feet of stone wall, laid 64 feet of 8-inch drain-pipe, laid 231 cubic yards of dry stone filling and reset 64 feet of grutter stone. 64 feet of gutter stone. Excavated 165 cubic yards of earth and laid 752 cubic feet of stone foundation for new gentle-men's cottage at Mount Morris Park.

## Plumbers' Work.

Attended to the repair of urinals, water-closets, street washers, fountains and bursts in Croton water-pipes at various points throughout the Central and City Parks and Riverside Park.

### Riverside Avenue.

The work of completing the unfinished portion of the avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-eighth streets, is being prosecuted under contract. The filling and walls are mainly completed and the superstructure of roadway and walks are

now in progress The quantities of work done since June 30, 1888, are : 12,500 cubic yards filling furnished. 300 lineal feet new curb stone set.

#### The Morningside Park.

The work being done by men in the employment of the Department, who are under the supervision of the Superintentendent of Parks, has been upon the excavation of rock along One Hundred and Twenty-third street, excavation and substructure of walks, shaping of the grounds and rockwork, masonry for foundation of coping around Esplanade at One Hundred and Sixteenth street, and the laying of drain-tiles and pipes. 62 cubic yards rubble masonry in foundation wall has been laid. 1,728 lineal feet of drain-pipe, from 4-inch to 10-inch diameter, and 1,720 lineal feet of 2-inch and 3-inch drain-tiles have been laid.

Repairs of the Battery Sea Wall, and Repairing the Walk in connection. The work of repairing the wall, etc., which was commenced by the contractor, June 4, has been completed. The work done during the quarter has been : 41.26 cubic yards wall taken down and rebuilt. 262 lineal feet of wall underpinned. 362.18 lineal feet of coping reset. 821 lineal feet of wall joints filled and pointed. 112.01 cubic yards of concrete put in. 500.81 square yards of new rubble-stone pavement. 383.67 square yards of old rubble-stone pavement relaid.

383.67 square yards of new hoose-stone pavement relaid. The work of repairing walk was commenced August 20, under a contract executed May 28, 1888, and is nearly completed. 30,000 square yards pavement of concrete and mortar of Portland cement have been laid.

Setting Curb-stones, Repairing and Resurfacing Roadway, etc., of Seventy-second Street, between Eighth and Tenth Avenues.

A contract for this work was executed August 15, 1888, and work was commenced August 27, 1888, and is still in progress. The work done to September 30, have been – 14,000 lineal feet new curb-stones furnished and set. 800 cubic yards of excavations for tree holes, etc. 1,300 cubic yards of mould furnished for tree holes, etc.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES.

Third Avenue Bridge.

A contract for the renewal of the flooring of this bridge was executed on July 30, and the contractor has been notified to begin work on October 3, 1888.

The work of repairs to the draw-span has been completed, and also the contract for the renewal of the easterly approach which was in progress on July 1, was completed on July 25, and consisted of an entire new superstructure above the floor beams, viz. : 178 lineal feet of two courses of flooring of roadway. 490 lineal feet of two courses of flooring of foot-walks.

During the last quarter, as heretofore, the work of destroying noxious insects parasitic upon the valuable plantations of the Central and city parks, has been continued, and the most effective work has been accomplished with the valuable spraying machine now owned by the Department. The Elm Beetle, formerly uncontrollable, has been very successfully dealt with in the applica-tion of insecticides with this machine. The spray being so very fine and the force so great, it is now an easy matter to penetrate the heretofore inaccessible foliage, and the entire surface of the lowers may be most successfully accessfully used with the point with the notion with the notion.

leaves can now be most successfully covered with the poison used. Notwithstanding the fact that the machine was received four weeks later than the time the first

application should have been made, the trees, in most cases, were entirely preserved, save a few on Riverside Drive.

The machine has been and is now being used for the destruction of scale insects, coccus and other minute parasites infesting the trunk, limbs and branches of trees and shrubs. At present the number of noxious insects classified and named as destructive to the foliage of our city parks is nearly 1,300 species ; and there seems to be very few, if any, plants exempt from their

ravages. The Orgyia has been more abundant this year than usual, as also the web-spinners, defoliating many of our most valuable trees, and rendering them unsightly with their webs. These, as with the cocoons and egg-masses, have been removed as fast as was possible with the force employed two men with myself.

Insects of about forty species have been very abundant during the past quarter, and have de-manded extra exertions on the part of those in charge in order to keep them in proper subjection. Nearly 19,000, bisuphide of carbon, crude carbolic, cyanide of potassium, veratrum album, prethrum, sulphur, etc., as experience has shown to be most effective in each case, and the continual experimenting has proved their efficiency and the fine foliage of our parks the successful treatment. Central Park—In the Central Park the work has been very thoroughly prosecuted, and the trees show a measure of growth and vigor not surpassed by any preceding year. Nearly 13,000 trees have been cleaned of scale insects, orgy in cocoons and egg-masses, datorias, hyphontrias, elim beetles, ichthura, coccus and other insects injurious and in masses. The Terrace Bridge and Mall orna-ments have been given a thorough cleaning. The trees on the Mall have been cleaned of cocoons seven times during the past quarter, thus keeping them in the best condition during the season of music and at such times as the people congregated. All the drives and principal walks have been gone over every week, and unsightly webs removed. Union Square—In Union Square all the trees have been given careful attention in the removal of cocoons, syringing and use of polysolve for the destruction of scale insects. Madison Square—The trees in Madison Square have been given the usual attention, the removal of cocoons and debris, the destruction of scale insects and the poisoning of the foliage for the leaf destroyers. In addition, the horse-chestnuts on the Worth Monument Plazza have had a very thorough cleaning of cocoons, and the entire tree-trunk of each tree given a thorough wash with polysolve. These trees have, during the past season, shown a marked improvement in growth and appearance. appearance. Riverside Park—All the trees have been examined in Riverside Park. 



METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.   PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
  SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BERE FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.
  STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the Commissioner of Public Works.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ies.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises re-sonsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore even to all householders that, in all fullowance will be made on account of waste of water oplumbing, or wasteful use of water by trenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may howeness of the buildings.
