

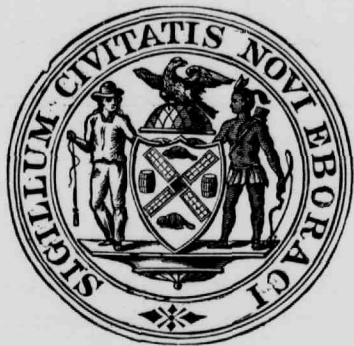

The Board met this day.

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of new houses were received and ordered on file.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 24, 1882.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors, was 1,915, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 776 tenement-houses, 121 private dwellings, 83 other dwellings, 36 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 6 public sewers, 6 lodging-houses, 1 boat, 1 smoke house, 1 coal yard, 66 sunken and vacant lots, 81 yards, courts and area, 134 cellars and basements, 196 waste-pipes and drains, 272 privies and water-closets, 18 street gutters and sinks, 11 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 6 cess-pools, and 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 676.

During the past week 257 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

91 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

216 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 196 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 171 houses, 171 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

22 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 512 births, 58 still-births, 167 marriages, and 661 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 24, 1882; this shows an increase of 48 births, 15 still-births and 53 deaths, and a decrease of 33 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 54 births, and 10 still-births, and a decrease of 65 marriages and 38 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; measles, 4; croup, 6; typhus fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 4; inanition, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 17; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; premature and pretermatural births, 1; surgical operations, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 8; diphtheria, 13; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 34; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 7; pneumonia, 2; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; convulsions, 10; direct Effect of Solar Heat, 1; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicide 1, and drowning, 3.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 160 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 221 under two years, 310 under five years, and 31 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 45 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.90 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 130 were in institutions, 367 in tenement-houses, 148 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 118 on the first, 167 on the second, 127 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 650 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 55 were stated to be single, 152 married, 62 widowed, and the condition of 392 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 661; still-births, 58; bodies in transit, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 512 births; 167 marriages; 58 still-births; 661 deaths; 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 91 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 50 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 24, 1882, was 72.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.844, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,017, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.92 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 625 deaths and still-births, or 86.93 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 246; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 94; Greenwood (undenominational), 46; Lutheran, (undenominational), 113; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 12; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 9; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending June 17, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 28; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 29; Tenth, 15; Eleventh, 42; Twelfth, 56; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 16; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 36; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 96; Twentieth, 49; Twenty-first, 40; Twenty-second, 52; Twenty-third, 7; Twenty-fourth, 3.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 17, 1882, was 604; this is 32 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 24.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,278,134.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 19.83; Brooklyn, 18.82; Baltimore, 23.64; New Orleans, 30.31; Savannah, 29.2; Lowell, 20.11; Worcester, 15.60; Cambridge, 18.73; Fall River, 24.40; Lynn, 12.22; Springfield, 9.36. Monthly returns—Hudson County, N. J., 28.5. SIR—There were 661 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 24, 1882, which is an increase of 53, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 38 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending June 17, 1882, was 604, which is 24.6 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,278,134.

## LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1882.

## CHAPTER 191.

AN ACT to enforce the assessment of shareholders in banking associations to make good a deficit in capital.

Passed May 20, 1882; three-fifths being present.\*

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Whenever the superintendent of the bank department shall find a deficit in the capital of a banking association below the amount required by law, or by its certificate or articles of association, and the said superintendent shall make a requisition on said banking association to make such deficiency good, it shall be the duty of the directors of said association to give notice of such requisition to each shareholder of said association, and of the amount of his respective assessment for such purpose, by a written or printed notice, mailed to his place of residence.

Sec. 2. If any shareholder or shareholders in such banking association shall refuse or neglect to pay the pro rata assessment so ordered, to make said deficit good, within sixty days from the date of said notice, the directors of such association shall have the right to sell, to the highest bidder, at public auction, the stock of such shareholder or shareholders, after giving previous notice of such sale for two weeks, in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the place or county where such banking association is located, provided that such stock shall not be sold for a smaller sum than the valuation put on it by the bank superintendent in his determination and certificate; and the necessary costs of the sale shall be paid out of the avails of said stock sold.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 244.

AN ACT to insure and increase the supply and disposition of wholesome fresh fish in the city of New York, and to regulate the use of piers number twenty-two and twenty-three East river.

Passed May 23, 1882.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The slip and part of the waters adjacent to the wharves of the city of New York from the center of pier number twenty-two to and including the center of pier number twenty-three for the whole distance of said piers in length from the bulkhead of said slip on South street, together with said bulkhead, are hereby set apart, until May first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, and shall hereafter be appropriated during said period for the exclusive purpose of fresh fish commerce, and the use of vessels engaged in such business, and such person or persons as now lease, or may hereafter lease, the same from the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of such city shall be authorized to erect and maintain, and enter thereon such improved structures, appliances, inventions and vessels as may be necessary and proper to preserve fresh food fish for supply of the public, and for the more convenient disposition and care of the same. The plans for such structures or improvement shall be first submitted to the board governing the department of docks for their approval and the same shall not be erected or proceeded with unless approved by said board.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the captain of the port of New York, and of the harbor-master thereof, and of all officers who now are or hereafter shall be empowered by law, or by any ordinance of the city of New York, to regulate or station ships or vessels in the harbor of said city, to prohibit and prevent during the time specified in the first section of this act all boats, barges, ships and vessels not engaged in fish commerce from entering or lying in said slip, or at the end of said piers, and to remove therefrom, on request of said lessees, or any of them, or their agent or agents, any vessel not engaged in said fresh fish commerce.

Sec. 3. The neglect or refusal of the said captain of the port or harbor-master or other said officer to comply with such request, or the neglect or refusal of the person or persons in charge of the said prohibited vessel or vessels to immediately remove therefrom on request, shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and shall, in addition thereto, render the person or persons and officer neglecting or refusing jointly and severally liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each offense, to be recovered by a civil action brought by said lessee or lessees or their authorized agent, in any court of competent jurisdiction.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 259.

AN ACT to provide for additional ferry slips and facilities in New York city for the ferries operated and running between Whitehall street in the city of New York and the city of Brooklyn.

Passed June 1, 1882; three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The pier known and designated as pier number two in the East river, in the city of New York, and the land under water lying easterly of said pier to the westerly side of pier number three, shall after the fifteenth day of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, be devoted and set apart for the purposes of additional ferry slip accommodation, for the ferries operated and running between Whitehall street, in the city of New York, and Atlantic avenue in the city of Brooklyn, known as the Union Ferry Company.

Sec. 2. Before using the said pier number two, or the waters easterly thereof to pier number three the lessees of the aforesaid ferries are hereby authorized and required to purchase or acquire the right to use the said pier number two and the land under water described in the first section of this act, provided they can agree with the owner or owners, and lessee or lessees on the price to be paid therefor. And should the lessees of said ferries be unable, within sixty days after the passage of this act, to agree with the said owner or owners, and lessee or lessees, for the purchase of or the right to use the aforesaid pier and land under water, they shall acquire title to the same in the manner and by the proceedings provided by law for acquiring title to lands for railroad use by railroad corporations, so far as the same are applicable thereto; except, that in any of the proceedings authorized by this section, it shall not be necessary that the petition to the supreme court shall make any allegations of, or any reference to, any incorporation or capital stock, nor to any surveys or maps further than to describe the property proposed to be taken, nor of the filing of any certificate of location. Provided that nothing in this section shall authorize the Union Ferry Company to acquire the fee of any property now owned by the city of New York.

Sec. 3. The property herein authorized and directed to be acquired for the purposes of additional ferry slip accommodations shall, after the title thereto is acquired in accordance with the provisions of this act, be thereafter fitted for, devoted to and used exclusively for said purposes, and shall be taken and paid for by any future lessees of said ferry in the same manner that other property owned by the previous lessees is or has to be paid for on a change of lessees of said ferry.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed, so far as they are in conflict therewith.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED**  
for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required,

and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

# REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK. BY ORDER OF HUBERT O. THOMPSON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

"The said Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of Croton water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law."—Chap. 574, Sec. 5, Session Laws of 1871.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

**Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates, as established by Ordinance of the Common Council, March, 1851.**

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family the sum of one dollar per year shall be charged.

Each flat or suit of rooms for one family shall be charged ten dollars per year where they have hot and cold water, stationary wash-tubs, bath, and water-closet, with the privilege of using meter.

**METERS** will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

**BAKERIES**—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, the sum of three dollars per annum.

**BATHING TUBS** in private houses, beyond one, at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding houses, bathing establishments, and barber shops.

**BOARDING SCHOOLS** shall be charged at the rate of from fifteen to fifty dollars each; and school houses at the rate of from ten to twenty dollars each per annum.

**BUILDING PURPOSES**—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

**COW STABLES**—For each and every cow, the sum of seventy-five cents per annum.

**FOUNTAINS** or jets are prohibited.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

**HORSES, PRIVATE**—For two horses there shall be charged the sum of six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of two dollars.

**HORSES, LIVERY**—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, the sum of one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of one dollar.

**HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART**—For each horse, the sum of one dollar per annum.

**HORSE TROUGHS**—For each trough on sidewalks the sum of twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste, this must be kept in order.

**HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES** shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**PORTER HOUSES, TAVERNS AND GROCERIES** shall be charged an extra rate of either ten to twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works. **LAGER BEER SALOONS**, with no water fixtures in the saloon, five dollars per annum.

**PRINTING OFFICES AND REFECTORIES** shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

**SLAUGHTER HOUSES** shall be charged at the rate of five cents for every bullock slaughtered.

**STEAM ENGINES** shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: for each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, and about stables, is prohibited, because it is absolutely necessary to save water for more necessary purposes. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the Police or Inspectors may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

**WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS**—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge, each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets or urinals in which the Croton water from any service pipe or hydrant connecting with a privy vault or man-hole shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

**WATER-CLOSET RATES**—For hoppers, of any form when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each per year twenty dollars.

For any pan-closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health Regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

## METERS.

Under the provisions of section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873 (City Charter), water meters, of the pattern approved in accordance with said section 73 of the Charter, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores,

workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, a wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet for all manufacturing or other purposes.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, Head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they shall pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled on its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities, as bail, surety, or otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 27 of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the national banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimates, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been deposited by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but, if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or proposal, or if he or they accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet as provided by law.

The quality of the articles, supplies, goods, wares, and merchandise must conform in every respect to the samples of the same respectively, at the office of the said Department. Bidders are cautioned to examine the specifications for particulars of the articles, etc., required, before making their estimates.

Bidders will state the prices for each article, by which the bids will be tested.

Bidders will write out the amount of their estimate, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Payment will be made by a requisition on the Comptroller, issued on the completion of the contract, or from time to time, as the Commissioners may determine.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless under the written instruction of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction.

The Department of Public Charities and Correction reserves the right to decline any and all bids or estimates if deemed to be for the public interest, and to accept any bid or estimate as a whole, or for any one or more articles included therein. No bid or estimate will be accepted

from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.
