Resolved, That James G. Murphy be and he is hereby reappointed a Commissioner of Deeds.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Peter J. BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, October 20, 1875.

The Board of Education held a regular session at the hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, on Wednesday afternoon, 20th instant, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Hon. Wm. H. Neilson, President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Dowd, Fuller, Halsted, Hazeltine, Jenkins, Kelly, Klamroth, Lewis, Man, Mathewson, Schell, Townsend, Traud, West, Wetmore, and Wood—19.

Absent—Commissioners Herring and Patterson—2.

The minutes of the preceding session were amended and approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several Wards:

From the First, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Ninth, Eleventh, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, and Twenty-fourth Wards, nominating teachers for Evening Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Fifth and Ninth Wards, against the new system of musical instruction. Referred to the Committee on the Course of Study and School Books.

From the Eighth Ward, nominating Miss Annie D. Kydd for Vice-Principal of Female Department, Grammar School No. 38. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Trustees of the Sixth Ward, relative to the resignation of two members of the Board. Referred to the Committee on Nomination of Trustees.

From the Eleventh and Twentieth Wards, asking to excuse absence of Teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Sixteenth Ward, nominating a Principal and Vice-Principal for Grammar School No. 56. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Nineteenth Ward, for an appropriation of \$399.57 for repairs; and for permission to use the Janitor's rooms for School purposes. Referred to the Finance and Building Committees respectively.

The President laid before the Board the following communications:

Memorial from Principals and Vice-Principals of Public Schools, against change in the system of musical instruction; from the State Superintendent of Schools, relative to industrial drawing; from Mrs. E. B. Burns, relative to teaching phonic short-hand in the Evening Schools; from C. Mahoney, relative to music charts; from Frank Leslie, President of the New York State Centennial Board, relative to the Exposition; from Mrs. C. Slade, relative to needle-work in the Schools. All referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

Commissioner Beardslee offered a resolution authorizing the Committee on Supplies to advertise for proposals for supplies and printing. Adopted.

Commissioner Wood offered a resolution to change the name of the "Model School" to that of "Training School of the Normal College." Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

Commissioner Mathewson gave notice of a motion to amend the By-laws, relative to the hours for session of Evening Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

Reports were received from the Superintendent of Schools and the Superintendent of Truancy. Ordered that they be entered in full in the minutes.

Reports from Standing Committees were presented, as follows :

Commissioner Baker presented a report from the Committee on Warming and Ventilation to pay sundry bills for repairs. Adopted.

Commissioner Townsend presented a report from the Committee on By-Laws, etc., recommending the appointments of John Curtin, John S. Ketcham, and A. L. Heckler, for agents of Truancy. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Committee on Buildings, recommending the payment of sundry bills for repairs. Adopted.

Commissioner Wood presented reports from the Committee on Normal Schools, as follows :

To pay sundry bills. Adopted.

To advertise for proposals for laying out the grounds of the Normal College. Adopted.

To adjust salaries of teachers in the Model School. Adopted.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nomination of Trustees, adverse to the resignation of Trustees Van Glahn and Mitchel. Adopted.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nautical School, asking for authority to have the School-ship repaired. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Beardslee presented a report from the Committee on Supplies, recommending the printing of five hundred copies of the Teachers Manual. Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented reports from the Committee on Teachers, as follows :

To appoint Miss Jennetta Robertson for Principal, and Miss Sarah J. Burke for Vice Principal, Female Department, Grammar School No. 4. Adopted.

Also, to appoint D. B. Frisbee for Vice Principal, Male Department, Grammar School No. 4. Adopted.

Also, to appoint Miss Antoinette Brush for Vice Principal of Grammar School No. 47. Adopted.

Commissioner Mathewson presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, recommending an amendment to the By-laws, changing the hours for opening and closing Evening Schools. Adopted.

Commissioner Man presented a report from the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, submitting the list of Supplies for 1876. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Finance Committee to appropriate \$1,000 to repair the School-ship St. Mary's. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$28,000 for the purchase of four lots in Fifty-sixth street, for a school site. Adopted.

Also, for the purchase of a Piano for Primary Department, Grammar School No. 33. Adopted.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 551.

During the past week 47 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 38 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 28 houses, 28 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

CORPORATION SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISES.

SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED AND publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, on Thursday, October 28, 1875, at 2 o'clock P. M., for Leases of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several ferries around the City of New York for the terms and on the conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regulations, ordinances, or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may be made or passed by the Common Council or State Legislature, and the leases will also provide that the lessees shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the City of New York to the present lessees of ferries in relation to boats, fixtures, etc., belonging to such lessees at the respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at two and one-half per centum of the gross receipts for ferrage that shall hereafter accrue at each separate ferry, to be paid quarterly-yearly to the Corporation, and a covenant will be contained in each lease requiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York, quarterly-yearly, a statement in writing verified by oath or affirmation of the lessee or of such proper officer of the lessee as may be designated by the Comptroller of the actual total gross receipts for ferrage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall keep regular books of account showing the daily gross receipts of the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease the property in wharves, piers, slips, and lands under water belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the ferry franchise shall be awarded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the term specified for the lease of the franchise, at the rates set forth hereafter, and no deviation will be made from the same, and covenants will be contained in such leases for construction, maintenance and surrender of all necessary fixtures and appurtenances to the wharf and pier property belonging to the city used by such respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry franchise at the respective ferries, to state the maximum percentage on gross receipts which the person or parties offering to take each ferry will pay in addition to the rent fixed by the Department of Docks for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city, but no lease will be given at less than the minimum rate of 2 1/2 per cent. on the gross receipts.

Security satisfactory to the Comptroller will be required for the punctual performance by the lessees of the covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

The several ferries at which the franchise only is to be leased are as follows:

1st. The ferry from the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from November 1, 1875.

The several ferries at which the franchise is to be leased, with use of pier and wharf property belonging to the City of New York, are as follows:

2d. The ferry from the north side of Twenty-third street, East river, as now occupied, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from November 1, 1875, subject to \$2,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

3d. The ferry from the foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., including such wharf property as shall have been heretofore used by the ferry run for these points, for the term of ten years from November 1, 1875, subject to payment of \$2,000 per annum during the first five years and \$3,000 per annum during the second five years, rent payable quarterly-yearly to the Department of Docks.

4th. The ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey, for the term of one year from November 1, 1875, subject to \$3,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.
