

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS CONSTITUTED BY CHAPTER 299, LAWS OF 1890, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 414, LAWS OF 1892, TO SELECT AND LOCATE A SITE FOR, AND TO ERECT THEREON, A NEW MUNICIPAL BUILDING, IN THE CITY HALL PARK, OR ON THE LAND

The undersigned, by resolution adopted by the Board at the same meeting, were appointed a committee "to make the necessary arrangements for preparing and advertising for plans and " specifications " of the said building " upon the site in the City Hall Park, selected and described " in the foregoing resolution, and to submit a report to the Board with a recommendation as to " exact lines of the site proposed to be occupied by the said building, and other particulars in regard " thereto."

The Committee, under the authority given by a resolution adopted by the Board at the same meeting, "to consult experts for professional advice in regard to plans for such building, and the " best means of inviting and securing designs for the same," secured the services of three architects eminent in their profession, viz. : Messrs. Richard M. Hunt, William R. Ware and N.

ADJACENT THERETO.

At the call of the Mayor, the Board met at the Mayor's Office, at 12 o'clock M., on Thursday, March 30, 1893.

Present-Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor ; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller ; and Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain-Commissioners of the Sinking Fund ; and Patrick J. Scully, Deputy County Clerk ; Ferdinand Levy, Register, and Frank T. Fitzgerald, Surrogate.

The minutes of the meeting held January 11, 1893, were read and approved.

The Committee appointed to make arrangements for preparing and for advertising for plans and specifications of the new Municipal Building presented the following report, together with "Notice to Architects," and "Instruction to Architects," etc. :

NEW YORK, March 20, 1803.

To the Board of Commissioners constituted by chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, amended by chapter 414, Laws of 1892 :

GENTLEMEN-At a meeting of your Board held January 11, 1893, a resolution was adopted locating the site of the New Municipal Building, to be erected in the City Hall Park, pursuant to chapter 299, Laws of 1890, as amended by chapter 414, Laws of 1892, "in that part of said park " situated and lying south of the New County Court-house, west of Park Row and east of Broadway, " said building to face southward."

Le Brun.

After a most careful consideration of the question of site, and a thorough study of the matter in all its bearings, in which they have had many consultations with the gentlemen above named, the Committee recommends the site approved by the Consulting Architects, shown on the accompanying diagram, as in their opinion the very best that can be fixed upon.

This site differs from that first adopted only by extending wings to within fifty feet of the curbline on Chambers street.

One of the chief advantages of this site is that the southern front, being nearly on a line with the present City Hall, the open space to the south will not be materially interfered with.

Fine fronts are obtained on Broadway, Centre street and Park Row, and a broken front on

As the wings are not to approach nearer to the Court-house than sixty feet, the light and air of that building will not be obstructed, and the space between it and the new building will form an ample court yard.

All the fronts are capable of great architectural development.

The "Notice " and " Instructions " to Architects, herewith submitted, have been prepared with great care by the Consulting Architects and minutely revised by the Committee, and it is believed that ill the necessary points have been presented. It will be observed that the architects are left free in the preparation of their designs, the only restrictions being that they shall confine themselves to the lines given ; that the building shall be of marble ; that the basement story shall be at least twenty feet in height and the floor two feet above the highest point of the plot ; that the building shall be five stories in height, including the basement and attic ; that the room area of each floor shall be about 60,000 square feet, and that certain openings shall be left for pedestrians.

These designs will be submitted to a Committee of Architects, three in number, who have not taken part in this competition, to be appointed by the Board of Commissioners from lists furnished by the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and the Architectural League of New York, who will examine them, and select those which they find to be the best, six in number, which they will name to the Board, with their comments. For these services he shall receive compensation at the rate of five per centum upon the first \$1,000,000, four per centum upon the second \$1,000,000 and three per centum on the remainder of the cost of the building. These shall be estimated upon the total amount of the contract or contracts, and shall be paid to him in installments in accordance with the schedule approved by the American Institute of Architects.

In the event of the author of the selected design being, for any reason, an unsuitable person to be put in charge of so important a work, the Board of Commissioners reserves the right to asso-ciate with him some other architect, to be agreed upon between him and the Board, and to divide the compensation between the two, according to the division of the work and of the responsibility. The competing architects will submit with their designs an approximate estimate of the cost of the work, and a descriptive specification of the materials proposed to be employed, and of the mode of construction and of heating and ventilation to be adopted, and of the manner of lighting. This is one of a long series of complaints which are due to the utter disregard by the East River Electric-light Company and its successor, the Thomson-Houston Electric-light Company of their contract obligations for more than a year past, despite all efforts on the part of this Depart-ment to enforce these obligations. The inclosed copy of the report made on the subject by the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas sets forth the situation.

Under the circumstances presented I respectfully recommend that the officers constituting the Gas Commission take decisive measures to compel the delinquent company to comply with the conditions of the contract or to forfeit the contract.

SIR-In the matter of the annexed paper 979, from the Mayor, with letter from Adolph Beer and others complaining that Fourth avenue has not yet been lighted by electric lamps, I have to report

That this avenue was included last year in the contract of the East River Electric-light Company (now Thomson-Houston Company), and frequent efforts were made by me to get the com-pany to comply with its contract by lighting Fourth avenue; but, notwithstanding repeated promises

were made by the company to light the avenue, the year expired without a lamp lighted. In the bid received from this company in December last Fourth avenue was again included, and it is now in their contract. On the 3d instant I wrote to the company asking when they pro-posed to begin the lighting of this avenue, and they replied that they would light it within ten days.

Twenty-six days have now expired and no lamps have yet been lighted. On March 23 Mr. Dexter stated that he expected to light this present week, but the week has nearly expired and yet no light. The Thomson-Houston Company has also a contract to light Irving place, which is about to be paved, and also to light Church street, from Chambers to Canal street. Nothing is being done

On Grand avenue, the main thoroughfare between the station of the New York and Northern Railroad and the station of the New York and Harlem Railroad, the proposed average distance between lamps is 352 feet, and as there are several bends in the avenue the distance could not be increased without detriment to effective lighting. The Superintendent of Lamps and Gas therefore expresses the opinion, in which I concur, that a lesser number than 56 electric lamps would not be sufficient for the proper lighting of the structs at Woodleven Heights.
