PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY ON THURSDAY, 24TH APRIL, 1902.

There were present:

Alexander E. Orr, presiding.

John H. Starin, Vice-President; Mayor Seth Low, Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Charles Stewart Smith, Morris K. Jesup and John Claflin.

Albert B. Boardman, of Counsel; William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the preceding meeting, that of 10th April, 1902, were read and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon, Smith, Jesup and Claflin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

The Comptroller asked about the instructions to the Counsel to appear at the meeting of the Sinking Fund Commissioners on the matter of the easement at Forty-second street and Fourth avenue, as determined at the preceding meeting. President Orr explained the reasons for this decision of the Board.

The Comptroller moved the following resolution which the Mayor seconded:

Resolved, That the resolution of the 10th April, 1902, directing the Counsel of this Board to appear before the Sinking Fund Commissioners, be rescinded, and instead, the Secretary be directed to transmit to the Sinking Fund Commission a copy of such entries upon the minutes of this Board as affect this question:

Letter of George W. Wickersham, Esq., of Counsel for the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, dated 24th April, with certificate of incorporation of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, were presented and read as follows:

ALBERT B. BOARDMAN, Esq., Mills Building, New York:

MY DEAR BOARDMAN—I hand you herewith a form of certificate of incorporation which has been prepared for a company to operate the Rapid Transit Railroad under the McDonald contract. This was submitted to Mr. Shepard and approved by him, but owing to a change in the name adopted from "Rapid Transit Interborough Railway Company," to "Interborough Rapid Transit Company" the original certificate of incorporation has not been executed and is being printed to-day.

I shall be glad, however, if the Rapid Transit Board would adopt a resolution in the form printed on page 12 so that as soon as the certificate of incorporation is signed, the certificate required by chapter 544 of the Laws of 1902, the form of which is printed on page 11, can be executed by Mr. Orr.

Will you pardon my submitting a copy of the certificate in this form, which is made necessary by the change in the name and in order to get it before the meeting of the Board to-day, as we are extremely anxious to procure the incorporation within the next day or two.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY.

State of New York, County of New York, ss.:

We, the undersigned, all of whom are of full age and at least two-thirds of whom are citizens of the United States, and more than one of whom are residents of this State, desiring to become a corporation under and in pursuance of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890, known as the Railroad Law, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1902, being an act entitled "An Act to amend chapter four of the Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, entitled 'An Act to provide for rapid transit railways in cities of over one million inhabitants,' " for the purpose of undertaking the construction and operation (including the equipment thereof), of the railway hereinafter described, and for the purpose of maintaining and operating a railroad already built not owned by a railroad corporation, viz.: the railway already constructed or in process of construction under the contract made between The City of New York (acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners) and John B. McDonald, dated February 21, 1900, pursuant to the provisions of the said chapter four of the Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, and amendments thereof, and the agreements amendatory to said contract, do hereby certify:

First—The name of the corporation shall be "Interborough Rapid Transit Company."

Second—The duration of said corporation is to be perpetual.

Third—The kind of road to be built and operated is a rapid transit railway or railways for the conveyance and transportation of persons and property.

Fourth—The length and termini of the said roads are as follows:

One route or line is about fourteen miles in length. Its termini are (1) a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park row, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and (2) a point at or near the present Kingsbridge Station of the New York and Putnam Railroad in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York. The said route or line is to be constructed under and over the following-described route, viz.: Commencing at a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park row, in the said Borough of Manhattan, City of New York; thence under Park row and Centre street to a point at or near its intersection with New Elm street, as proposed; thence under New Elm street, as proposed, to Lafayette place; thence under Lafayette place to Eighth street; thence across and under Eighth street and thence under private property lying between Eighth and Ninth streets and east of the westerly side or line of Lafayette place, produced, to Fourth avenue; thence under Fourth avenue and Park avenue to Forty-second street; thence turning from Park avenue into Forty-second street, and taking for the purposes of the curve if necessary or convenient private property at the southwest corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street; thence under Forty-second street to Broadway; thence under Broadway to Fifty-ninth street; thence under the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; thence by viaduct along and over the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence under the Boulevard and Eleventh avenue to a point on the centre line of Eleventh avenue, produced, one thousand one hundred and five feet north of the centre line of One Hundred and Ninetieth street, running thence under and over Eleventh avenue and private property to Naegle avenue; thence along and over Naegle avenue to Amsterdam avenue; thence along and over Amsterdam avenue to a point at or near its intersection with Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway and south of Riverdale avenue; thence over Kingsbridge avenue to Riverdale avenue, and thence easterly over Riverdale avenue to a point within five hundred feet of the present Kingsbridge Station of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company; including a loop at the City Hall Park which shall connect with the portion of the route aforesaid along Centre street at or near the south end of that street, and thence proceed westerly and southerly under City Hall Park and Broadway, and thence easterly to again connect with the portion of the route aforesaid in Park row. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the City Hall loop to the Post Office, such tracks and connections

being under the City Hall Park and under the portion of Park row between the south end of Centre street and Ann street. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the portion of the route near the corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street to the yard and tracks of the Grand Central Station. All of the tracks and connections last mentioned shall be under Park avenue and Forty-second street and private property to be acquired.

The other route or line is about seven miles in length. Its termini are (1) a point of connection with the first above-described route on the Boulevard (or Broadway), in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, at or near its intersection with One Hundred and Third street, and (2) a point at or near the intersection of Boston road with Bronx Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

The said route or line is to be constructed under and over the following-described route, viz.: Beginning at a point of intersection with the first above-described line on the Boulevard or Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets; thence under private property to a point in One Hundred and Fourth street; thence under One Hundred and Fourth street to and across Central Park, West; thence under Central Park to the intersection of Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street; thence under Lenox avenue to a point near One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence curving to the east and passing under private property, One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets to the Harlem river at or near the foot of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; thence under the Harlem river and private property to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street at or near its intersection with River avenue; thence under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to a point near its intersection with Third avenue; thence with a curve to the left and under Third avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester avenue; thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester avenue, and thence by viaduct over and along Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard; thence over and along the Southern Boulevard to the Boston road, and thence over and along the Boston road to Bronx Park.

Also with a branch or spur extending from One Hundred and Forty-second street under Lenox avenue to One Hundred and Fiftieth street.

The said above-described railroad being the railroad constructed and in process of construction at the expense of The City of New York under contract made by and between said City of New York (acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for said City) and John B. McDonald, dated February 21, 1900, and the agreements amendatory thereof.

Fifth—The said corporation shall also have power to enter into and fully perform any contract for the construction and operation of any other rapid transit railway authorized or which may be authorized to be constructed pursuant to the provisions of chapter four of the Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, and its amendments and supplements.

Sixth—The name of each county in which any part of its railroads are to be located are the counties of New York, Westchester, Kings and Queens.

Seventh—The amount of the capital stock shall be twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000).

Eighth—The number of shares into which the capital stock is to be divided is two hundred and fifty thousand (250,000), and the par value of each share is one hundred dollars (\$100). All of the said stock is to be common stock.

Ninth—The names and post-office addresses of the directors of the corporation who shall manage its affairs for the first year are as follows:

Tenth—As soon as practicable the directors shall divide themselves into classes, of which the first class shall consist of five directors, each of whom shall hold his office for one year, or until the first annual election; the second class shall consist of four other directors, each of whom shall hold office for two years, or until the second annual election; the third class shall consist of four other directors, each of whom shall hold office for three years, or until the third annual election; and at each annual election the successors to the class of directors whose terms shall expire in that year shall be elected to hold office for the term of three years, so that the terms of one class of directors shall expire in each year. The board of directors may make by-laws to carry out this provision, which by-laws shall bind the members of the corporation.

Eleventh—The place where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Twelfth—The corporation shall have power to purchase, acquire, hold and dispose of the stocks, bonds and other evidences of indebtedness of any corporation, domestic or foreign, and to issue in exchange therefor its own stock, bonds or other obligation.

Thirteenth—The board of directors, by an affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board, may annually appoint an executive committee, composed of seven of the directors, who shall continue as such committee for one year, and until their successors are appointed. The said executive committee shall have and may exercise any and all of the powers of the board of directors, except when the board is in session. Vacancies in said committee shall be filled by the board. A majority of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Will you kindly have your Board pass a resolution authorizing the present location of this pipe, so that in the future we will have some authority for maintaining it in its new position?

At the same time I would beg leave to remind you that no resolution has been passed by your Board authorizing us to maintain our 30-inch and 36-inch mains under the sidewalk at the east and west sides of Broadway and Sixty-sixth street.

President Orr presented the following correspondence with the Contractor as to the necessity of hastening the work on certain portions of the Rapid Transit Railroad:

New York, April 11, 1902.

JOHN B. McDONALD, Esq., Contractor, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row.

DEAR SIR—Referring to the contract between yourself and The City of New York for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, I have, in behalf of the Rapid Transit Board, to advise you that the work of excavation on some sections of the Rapid Transit work has not been carried forward to the satisfaction of the Board. Among these sections are Nos. 1, 2, 5-A, 6-B and 11. Especially upon sections 6-A and 6-B along Broadway, from Sixtieth street to One Hundred and Fourth street, the work of excavation is far behind the stage which it should have reached by the present time. The Board understands that the excavation of most of the sections will be completed prior to the close of the present year; and the Board is advised that the excavation on the other sections can be completed within the same time, provided an equal amount of force is employed and similar energy displayed. It is clear that the contract obliges you to employ such force and exercise such energy.

This work of excavation involves a very large amount of public inconvenience; and apart from that consideration it is the opinion of the Board that unless the excavation upon sections of the work mentioned, and especially upon sections 6-A and 6-B, shall be completed by the end of the present calendar year, the completion of the railroad will be unnecessarily delayed. The Board therefore requires that you shall so arrange and conduct your work under the contract as that the excavation shall be complete by 31st December next, and to that end you shall employ additional force and night force upon sections 6-A and 6-B, and elsewhere as may be necessary. You are to remember that the contract accords power to the Board to require you to conduct your work so that it shall not remain open or obstruct traffic an unreasonable length of time, and that the interference with public travel incident to the work shall be reduced to a minimum.

You are further to remember that the requirement of the contract is (p. 70) that "all the work shall be prosecuted in the manner according to location best calculated to promote rapidity in construction, to secure safety to life and neighboring property and to reduce to a minimum any interference with public travel."

The contract further provides (same page) that "at all points the Board shall have power to require the contractor to so conduct its work that it shall not remain open or obstruct traffic an unreasonable length of time."

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 11, relating to the progress of the work on the Rapid Transit Railroad.

I note with surprise and regret your statement, on behalf of the Rapid Transit Commission, "that the work of excavation on some sections of the rapid transit work has not been carried forward to the satisfaction of the Board." While there have been, from time to time, certain differences of opinion between the Chief Engineer and myself, I did not think that these differences were so serious or so important as to induce the Board to express itself as dissatisfied with the conduct and progress of the work, especially on the sections mentioned in your letter, for from personal observation of the work on section 6 and of the methods employed, I cannot consider that the work on this section is very far behind the stage which it should have reached by this time.

The amount of earth and rock to be excavated on section 6, according to the original estimates of your Chief Engineer, was 586,076 cubic yards. Of this amount 297,898 yards have been excavated up to April 1, 1902. It is now apparent that the total amount required to be excavated will exceed the Chief Engineer's estimates by at least 75,000 cubic yards, while the amount of concrete will exceed the estimate by about 9,000 yards.

Mr. Bradley, the sub-contractor on that section, is now working his forces twelve (12) hours a day, and is excavating quite as much material as he can dispose of with the dumps and facilities at present available for its removal.

That fact necessarily determines the maximum speed of the work, and to put an additional force of men at work upon that section at the present time would only result in the accumulation of material which could not be removed, and which would shortly disarrange and arrest the systematic and orderly progress of the work.

On section 5-A the amount of excavation has been increased over the original estimate of the Chief Engineer by about 26,000 cubic yards and the concrete about 19,000 cubic yards. The effect of these increases must postpone to a degree the date of completion.

It has been my effort to carry on the work so that the excavation would be completed on or before the close of the present year on all of the sections, except section 9, on which work was delayed because of the proposed change from tunnel to bridge, and on section 14, where the work was held up for right of way at Fort George. I believe that with these exceptions this effort will be successful, but I am unwilling to say definitely that it will be.

In view of the many contingencies that may arise and have already arisen, I trust that you will not insist upon the requirement that I shall so arrange and conduct my work that the excavation must be completed by December 31 next.

I think it would be unfortunate to attempt to press work forward too rapidly. There is still a great deal of excavation to be done, including a good deal of rock work to be blasted, especially section 6, and if that work is pressed too rapidly the danger of accidents will be materially increased.

The work on sections 5-A, 6 and 11 is conducted under great difficulties, owing to the necessity of maintaining the street railway tracks, their electrical conduits and other subsurface structures so as not to interfere with the operation of the railroad upon them and no additional force of men could be employed there without greater obstruction to traffic than is now caused by the work. To attempt to work at night there would be attended with much more danger, and I do not know of any good reason for assuming that risk.

With reference to the work on section 1, the delays, if any on this work, will be occasioned by reason of the fact that I am unable to begin the work on the west side of the Brooklyn Bridge station because of the necessity either for the removal of the Hall of Records building or for such plans as will enable me to support it. You are aware that the west approaches to this important station are involved in this question, and I beg now to repeat my previous request to be furnished with plans and right of way at this point.

On section 2 the only delays which can occur are on the 1,200 feet of the west section at Canal street and orders have been given to push this work.

I beg to call your attention to delays which may occur at Astor place, on section 3, because of right of way and plans, which I ask may be supplied at the earliest practicable date.

On section 11 orders have been given to meet the views of your Board, although the difficulties in the matter of supporting the tracks and surface and subsurface structures have been greatly increased by the addition of a third track, while the quantity of excavation has been increased 33 1-3 per cent.

All of the sub-contractors are bound by their agreements to complete their work one year or more before the time fixed in my contract with the City.

The rate of excavation carried on during the present month with the natural increase that may be expected during the summer and autumn months will, I am sure, satisfy you that the total excavation will be completed during the present year and I think upon a full investigation of the facts you will be convinced that the work is being prosecuted quite as vigorously as conditions will permit.

I beg that your honorable Board will take these suggestions into careful consideration before insisting upon the requirements contained in your letter of the 11th instant.

MY DEAR SIR—I beg leave to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 16 in answer to my letter of the 11th.

I do not think that my letter need have caused you any surprise nor regret; for it is to be expected that letters of such character are to be written from time to time, in order that you may be informed as to the wishes of the Board and be acquainted with how the Board is impressed by the conduct of your work. In general, the Board is much gratified to witness that, on the average, your work is up to date and is being carried on in a manner that meets all reasonable demands; but as is to be expected, where work is sub-let to a number of sub-contractors, some variation in rapidity of execution is to be looked for.

It is the desire of the Board that such sections as are behind others may be brought up to the condition of those that are more advanced. To this end the Board required a report from its Chief Engineer to show the progress of the work at various points. From the report of the Chief Engineer it was evident that certain sections, especially those mentioned in my letter of April 11, were not advancing as rapidly as certain other portions of your contract.

I note that in your letter you raise several practical points, which, although extremely important, do not seem to me to be relevant in this connection; as the causes for delay thus described are necessarily incident to every great work, and, moreover, are equally common to all of your sub-contractors, and are not special burdens upon the sub-contractors in question. Among other things, you refer to certain extra quantities. The Board has imposed upon you no extra quantities, except such as you have directly requested for increased station accommodations, additional side tracks, space for ducts or similar purposes. Such increases were made equally on such sections as, for instance, Nos. 4 and 8, where the sub-contractors have found no difficulty in taking care of them. Similarly, as to the support of the surface tracks that your letter seems to make a special burden upon Mr. Bradley, the sub-contractor along Fourth avenue has to support such tracks in a much more difficult manner than Mr. Bradley has to, because the latter has the advantage of the central parkways in which to work, and with less traffic, both vehicular and car, to bother him; yet, on Fourth avenue, your sub-contractor has found no difficulty in working at night.

As to the difficulty encountered in the disposal of material, that is a question that has to be, of course, considered. The Board has never learned, and does not know now, that there are any extraordinary difficulties in connection with section 6 that cannot be overcome. From our information, however, we believe that Mr. Bradley has not been as diligent in this matter as your other sub-contractors. When you had difficulty in procuring proper dumping facilities in the lower part of the city, you applied to the Board for its assistance, and the Dock Department finally granted you the required facilities; you have never made any complaint as to the lack of facilities uptown.

The discussion of such questions in detail seems to me, however, to be unnecessary; as these are the problems that you have undertaken to solve, and the Board has every

confidence in you, in your executive ability and in your forceful energy, and believes that you will be able to solve them all successfully. In making the demand upon you to complete your excavation during the current year, you must remember that you are using public streets, and that the very presence of your construction work entails a great hardship and direct financial loss upon all abutting residents. The Board is firmly of the opinion that this hardship and loss, together with the general annoyance to the public, should be reduced to the minimum, and does not consider it at all unreasonable to require that all your sub-contractors should display substantial energy. If a majority of your sub-contractors, as now appears to be the case, can complete their excavation during the current year, there seems to the Board no good reason why the other sub-contractors should not do the same. It is apparent, however, that your contractors are not displaying equal energy, as there is a great variation in force employed in doing substantially similar work.

I also wish to point out to you that, as you are of course aware, you are under great financial pressure to complete the work as rapidly as possible. Our accounts lead us to estimate that there will have been paid to you at the end of the year at least \$25,000,000 the interest charges on which are being capitalized against you.

It is with great pleasure that I note the expression on the second page of your letter wherein you state, "It has been my effort to carry on the work so that the excavation would be completed on or before the close of the present year on all of the sections except sections 9 and 14." It is evident, therefore, that you are already working along the same lines as laid down in my letter, and, as I stated above, I believe that if you will devote your energy to accomplishing this very desirable end, the same will be reached, although I can well appreciate that there are difficulties in its accomplishment. I must repeat again, however, that the Board insists that the occupation of the streets be reduced to the minimum.

Letter of the Corporation Counsel as to amendment of section 44 of the Rapid Transit Act was presented and read, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to inform you that section 44 of the Rapid Transit Act which required notice by publication in two newspapers of the intention of the Corporation Counsel to make application to the Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal for six weeks daily, Sundays and holidays excepted, immediately previous to said application, has been amended so that the publication of said notice is now required to be made only twice a week for six weeks.

You will remember that you forwarded to my predecessor map showing the route of the Rapid Transit Railroad on the Southern Boulevard and other streets in the Borough of The Bronx, but no proceedings to acquire the easements along the route were begun, owing to the great expense which would be necessitated under section 44.

Now that the expense has been materially reduced, I shall be glad to institute the proceedings if your Board desires that the easements shall be acquired; or, if you prefer it, I shall be pleased to turn over the papers to your Counsel and designate them to appear on behalf of the City.

The following letter of the Contractor as to construction of fire alarm conductors between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Seventh street, was presented and read:

ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—I have your favor to-day of the 15th instant inclosing copy of a resolution adopted by the Rapid Transit Commission on April 10, directing that you require me on or before the 30th day of this month to complete the moving of the fire alarm electrical conductors underground from the centre to the east side of Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, and to reconnect the same with other portions of the fire alarm telegraph system of The City of New York, and that in case the Contractor shall not forthwith conform to such requirement the President be authorized to take proceedings against him for violation of his contract.

I beg to hand you herewith a copy of a contract which was made between William Bradley and The City of New York, dated December 24, whereby the City entered into contract with Mr. Bradley to construct a new and better line of electrical fire alarm along Broadway and One Hundred and Fourth street beyond the limits of the Rapid Transit Railroad.

I respectfully suggest that it is not fair to serve upon me such a peremptory notice as is embodied in the resolution which you transmit, when the City has itself entered into a separate and independent contract for the construction of the work. I request that you will submit this contract and letter to the Board, and that the resolution of April 10 be rescinded.

My object in thus addressing you is to ascertain whether it be true, as reported, that the building of the rapid transit subway makes it imperative to remove the old Hall of Records? If such removal be contemplated, is it not possible—by legislation, if need be, to modify the plans? In other words, cannot the tunnel be completed under the said building, without necessarily removing it? The practicability of the same, rather than the advisability thereof, is what I would like you to decide. If practicable, the question ought then to be discussed calmly and fully by all interested parties.

The Chief Engineer explained that Mayor Van Wyck had informed him that the old building would be vacated by the time the Rapid Transit work was ready to be constructed underneath it, but that it was possible, although a task of not a little difficulty, to support the building with the records in it and construct the railroad underneath. The Secretary was instructed to write Alderman Goodman to that effect.

Letters of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, with resolutions as to the change of route at East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Westchester avenue were presented and read, as follows:

This request is made because the construction of the tunnel in Third avenue and Westchester avenue will interfere very materially with the traffic on those two thoroughfares at a very important centre.

The present plan will involve the closing of Bergen avenue, and will reduce the width of Westchester avenue, causing great damage to property; whereas the line herein recommended will cause no damage, and will leave all streets open to traffic.

N. A. Gumbleton, Secretary of President Louis F. Haffen, of the Borough of The Bronx, appeared in his behalf and spoke in favor of the proposed change of route at East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Westchester avenue. He also spoke in favor of a new east side route from Forty-second street, north, to The Bronx Borough.

After a short executive session, the following resolution of the Harlem Club was presented and read:

The Subway Commissioners:

At a regular meeting of the Harlem Club held April 11, 1902, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The rapid growth in population of that section of the city tributary to the subway now in progress of construction in Lenox avenue will prove the said subway totally inadequate to meet the needs of Harlem people; therefore,

Resolved, That this club urgently request the Rapid Transit Commissioners to make prompt provision for the early construction of a subway to and through the densely populated east side of Harlem and into the Borough of The Bronx.

The Mayor said he supposed it to be well understood that the City had no funds with which it could enter upon the construction of such a road, but he thought it would be good judgment for the Board to refer the question of an east side route to the Chief Engineer for consideration and report, as it would be some time before such a study could be completed.

The Mayor moved and President Orr seconded the following resolution:

Resolved, That it be referred to the Chief Engineer to investigate and report to this Board at as early a date as possible a plan or plans for the extension of the subway north from Forty-second street, on the east side of the city to the end that all preliminary steps looking to the construction and operation of such an extension so soon as the financial condition of the City will permit, may be taken without unnecessary delay.

The Mayor then addressed the Board. He said the problem divided itself into two parts, temporary relief of existing pressure of congestion at that point and a permanent solution of the Rapid Transit problem involved, looking ahead to conditions for years to come. He said three plans had been suggested, one by a Board of Expert Engineers, one by Mr. C. C. Martin, at present Consulting Engineer of the Bridge, and a third by the present Bridge Commissioner, and that he would at the next meeting of the Board present these three plans to it. He did not wish it to be understood, however, that the Bridge Department or other city departments waived their authority in the premises.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with the request you expressed at the interview you accorded me this afternoon, I herewith send you a plan suggested by the Women's Health Protective Association for public comfort stations.

As every station on the Rapid Transit line will certainly be provided with a room for men, and a room for women, this association respectfully requests that these rooms be turned into public comfort stations, to be accessible from the street without the necessity of first purchasing a ticket to gain admittance to the platform, and that they shall be in charge of matrons who shall keep them clean.

The association believes that one matron could look after five or six of these rooms; it being possible for her to travel by train from one to another she would be able to reach any of the stations in her care inside of a few minutes, and therefore would be able to attend to several of them.

The association wishes to call your attention to the fact that this plan, if adopted, would save the City the large sums of money necessary for the erection of public comfort stations without causing much change or extra expense to the Rapid Transit plans, as such accommodations would have to be provided in any case whether for the use of the patrons of the road or for the good of the general public.

In conclusion, the association wishes to remind you that the lack of such accommodation is detrimental to the health of women and children, and that through the lack of public comfort stations young men and boys have to acquire the habit of visiting liquor saloons.

Trusting that you will give this matter your attention and bring it before the Rapid Transit Commission at your earliest convenience, and with many thanks for your courtesy in the matter,

No. 1.

Petition for the construction of the Bushwick creek sewer.

The following reports from the Superintendent of Sewers and the Commissioner of Public Works:

Office of Commissioner of Public Works,
Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.
Superintendent of Sewers' Office, February 8, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—It has been reported to me that notice has been given to the authorities of the old City of Brooklyn and the present Borough of Brooklyn for many years past to the unsatisfactory drainage facilities which exist in the vicinity of old Bushwick creek. Recent attention has been drawn thereto by the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York. The condition existing has resulted in the attention of the authorities being called, both directly and by implication, to the fact that property has been damaged by the flooding of cellars in the vicinity of Leonard street and Van Pelt avenue, and in Driggs avenue, between North Twelfth and North Thirteenth streets, also in other places adjacent to the bounds of old Bushwick creek, especially in the cases of Friberg against The City of New York, and Patridge against The City of New York.

Bushwick creek formerly extended inland from the East river, following approximately North Fourteenth street on one side and North Fifteenth street on the other, to and beyond Driggs avenue. Outlet sewers were built, discharging into the then existing creek at Driggs and Union avenues, at Nassau avenue and Banker street, at Norman avenue and Banker street, and at Kent avenue and North Fourteenth street. All of these outlets have been discontinued by the filling in of said creek, excepting the last two mentioned, by extending temporary sewers to North Twelfth street. By such procedure the North Twelfth street sewer has been surcharged by some forty-three acres of drainage, which, according to the adopted drainage plans of The City of New York, should be drained elsewhere. A small and ill graded channel extends from the Norman avenue outlet at Banker street to North Fourteenth street and Kent avenue, discharging into what remains of Bushwick creek, which the authorities will not be able to fill in until proper sewers for the drainage of the vicinity are constructed, thereby continuing a nuisance.

It is recommended, therefore, that main sewers be constructed in the following mentioned streets:

Quay street, from the East river to West street;
North Fifteenth street, from West street to Engert avenue;
West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street;
Engert avenue, from North Fifteenth street to Humboldt street; and in
Engert avenue, from Russell street to North Henry street; also in
Wythe avenue, from Norman avenue to North Fifteenth street
—the estimated cost of which is \$75,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, which is \$3,510,805.

I urgently recommend that the above construction may be authorized by the proper authorities, to abate damage to property, to relieve the North Twelfth street sewer from surcharge of drainage, and to abate a nuisance by the removal of sewage discharge at the foot of Norman avenue into the present ill-graded Bushwick creek.

Dear Sir—I beg respectfully to report the following:
(a) Petition for what is known as the Bushwick creek sewer;
(b) Report of Superintendent of Sewers, dated February 8, concerning same.
(c) My letter to you of February 11.
(d) My letter to you of March 3.

I now beg to report further, as follows, concerning street opening:

Quay street is paved its entire length from bulkhead at East river to West street, and may be considered open. Proceedings should be taken to open West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street.

North Fifteenth street is on the city map, but not open from Franklin street to Engert avenue. It is not on the map and is not open between West and Franklin streets. Proceedings should be taken to put it on the map from West to Franklin street, and to open it from West street to Nassau avenue. From Nassau avenue to Engert avenue, it is in McCarren Park and should not be opened.

Engert avenue, from Graham avenue to North Henry street, is open and paved. It should not be opened from Leonard street to Graham avenue or from Driggs avenue to Leonard street, for it is in McCarren Park and should not be opened.

Wythe avenue should be opened from Banker street to North Thirteenth street to complete it.

Dear Sir—Herewith, I return petition for opening Wythe avenue, between the end of the present pavement and Banker street, at the intersection of Norman avenue.

In reply I would say that the street should not be opened for any further distance. It is laid down on the map of The City of New York, and that there are no buildings on the line of the proposed street. The present pavement ends at North Thirteenth street. According to the Brooklyn Compendium, page 66, Second street, now Wythe avenue, is opened from Brooklyn city line to Bushwick creek; this was about North Fourteenth street. There seems to be no record of the street having been opened on the part now asked for, although there is a map on file, entitled "Assessment Map of the north section of Second street." This is dated Williamsburg, September, 1849, F. D. Murphy, Village Surveyor. Whether this is an opening map or not I am unable to say. The matter should probably be confirmed by the Law Department.

Freeman street is laid down on the Commissioner's map of the northerly part of the Town of Bushwick, filed in the office of the County Clerk of Kings County. There are buildings on the land, and there is no record to indicate that this part of the street has ever been legally opened.

The Common Council of the former City of Brooklyn, by resolution passed February 25, 1895, declared Freeman street a public street, from Oakland street to Whale creek. The block from Oakland street to Provost street is in use and has water, sewer and gas in the street. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
