BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park, on Thursday, September 20, 1906, at 10 a. m.

Present—Alderman Dinwoodie, Alderman Mulligan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Minutes of previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

Laid Over Matters.

No. 392. Changing the grade of Tremont avenue, from Devoe avenue to Rosedale avenue.

Petition of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, by William Greenough, assistant attorney, and report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx were read.

A map prepared by the Topographical Bureau showing the change of grade of Tremont avenue, from Devoe avenue to Rosedale avenue, Twenty-fourth Ward, was submitted.

Although the railroad company does not apply for a change of grade to the extent shown on the map prepared by the Topographical Bureau, it becomes necessary, because the grades of avenues and streets on section 38, approved by the Chief Engineer, require a change between Bronx river or Commerce avenue to Rosedale avenue; also westerly of the railroad to connect with the established grade at Devoe avenue. The grades established at the abutments of the bridge of the railroad agree with those given in the blue print furnished by the railroad company.

The matter of establishing grades on Commerce avenue or Bronx River avenue will be taken care of on section 38 of the final maps.

On motion the Board initiated proceedings for the change of grade of Tremont avenue, from Devoe avenue to Rosedale avenue, as shown on the map prepared by the Topographical Bureau.

No. 359. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for the opening of East Two Hundred and Twentieth street, from Carpenter avenue to Chapin avenue.

Petition of M. Nathan and two others was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

This street is shown on Section 30 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, filed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on June 19, 1905.

There being no opposition at the hearing, the Board adopted a resolution initiating proceedings for acquiring title to said Two Hundred and Twentieth street, from Carpenter avenue to Chapin avenue.

No. 388. Laying out an extension of Fulton street, from East Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street to East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

Petition of Leonard Strubel was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the borough, who suggested an amendment to the plan proposed, by providing for an extension of Prospect terrace from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

On motion, the plan as submitted by the Chief Engineer was ordered advertised.

No. 147. Acquiring title to lands necessary for Wallace avenue, from Williamsbridge road to Gun Hill road.

Petition of Sound Realty Company, by Max Marx, president, was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the borough. Maps filed.

On motion, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution initiating proceedings for the said improvement.

No. 216. Acquiring title to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Wyatt street), from Tremont avenue to Morris Park avenue.

Petition and report of the Chief Engineer were read.

Map pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On motion, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution in favor of initiating proceedings for the said improvement.

Application of August Rehbock for the construction of a retaining wall north side of Taylor avenue, 250 feet east of Van Nest avenue, lots Nos. 374 and 375.

Referred to Chief Engineer of the borough for report.

On motion, the Board adjourned until October 11, 1906, at 10 a. m.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on September 20, 1906, at 3 p. m., in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Kuntze, Alderman Morris, Alderman Murphy and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Absent—Alderman O'Neill.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

Hearings Pursuant to Advertisement in the CITY RECORD.

No. 403. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for Bush street, from the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to Anthony avenue.

Petition of Adolph Wexler and others was read.

No one appeared in opposition.

Map filed in Register's office December 17, 1895. Buildings on land to be acquired.

On motion, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution to initiate proceedings for acquiring title to said street.

No. 404. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for an extension of Crotona parkway, as duly laid out on a map or plan of The City of New York, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 29, 1906, and that the cost and expense of said proceedings be borne and paid for by The City of New York.

No one appeared in opposition.

Map not filed as yet, though it is being prepared by the Topographical Bureau.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board adopted a resolution in favor of initiating proceedings for the said improvement.

No. 405. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Exterior street, from One Hundred and Forty-fourth street to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and paving the roadway with granite block pavement on a concrete foundation.

Petition of Pioneer Real Estate Company, by Geo. E. Foster, real estate agent, was read.

Estimated cost, \$27,000. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$654,650.

Title vested to said street July 8, 1895, and April 15, 1901.

No sewer and no water or gas mains in the street between the limits named.

No one appeared in opposition to the improvement.

On motion of Alderman Kuntze, duly seconded, it was unanimously

Resolved, That proceedings be initiated for this improvement, with the understanding that all subsurface improvements be completed previous to laying the pavement.

Adopted.

No. 406. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Mott avenue, between Park avenue and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Mott avenue and Walton avenue, and in Walton avenue, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and the summit north of Cheever place.

Petition signed by four property owners was read. Also report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough.

Estimated cost, \$20,350. Assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment, is \$223,000.

Outlet constructed. Titles to streets vested.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution to initiate proceedings for the said improvement.

No. 407. Paving with wood block on concrete foundation, Park avenue, east side, between East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Morris avenue, near One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of Ignazio Cavalluzzo, James J. Malloy and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough.

No. 408. Paving with wood block on a concrete foundation, East One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, from Morris avenue to Park Avenue East and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of Ignazio Cavalluzzo and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 409. Paving with wood block on concrete foundation, Park avenue, west side, between Morris avenue, near One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of F. A. Selje and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 410. Acquiring title to Andrews avenue, from Fordham road to West One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street.

Petition filed, as land was ceded by Webb Academy.

No. 324. Acquiring title to Exterior street, from West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street to the Fordham Heights Bridge approach, and also public place adjoining Exterior street.

Petition of the Fordham Dock Company, and protests of New York University, John J. Avery, the Gas Engine and Power Company and Chas. L. Seabury & Co. were read.

Mr. Tobias, of the office of Joseph Flannery, appeared in favor of the petition and stated that he represented Messrs. Seabury & Co., and that they were not opposed to the petition now.

On motion of Alderman Morris the Board unanimously adopted a resolution to initiate proceedings for the said improvement. Adopted.

No. 325. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Exterior street, from West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street to the Fordham Heights Bridge approach, also the public place adjoining Exterior street.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 299. Paving with asphalt block on concrete foundation East One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street, from Park avenue to Third avenue, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of Jesse S. Thorn and others was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer.

Estimated cost, \$7,000. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$233,500.

Title vested October 20, 1900, and August 15, 1904.

Alderman Murphy moved that the proceedings for this work be initiated with the understanding that the water main be placed in One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street, between Third avenue and Washington avenue.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution initiating the said improvement, with the understanding that the necessary water mains be first laid. Adopted.

No. 306. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in Creston avenue, between East One Hundred and Ninety-eighth street and Minerva place, and in Minerva place, between Jerome avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

Estimated cost, \$7,800. Assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$17,720.

Laid over, as no proceedings are under way for Minerva place. Petition for acquiring title requested from owners.

No. 399. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in Grand Boulevard and Concourse, east side, between East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and in the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, west side, from a point about 90 feet south of McClellan street to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

Estimated cost, \$23,250. Assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$53,500.

Title vested in several streets and the Concourse. Construction of outlets authorized.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board initiated proceedings for the said improvement, and recommended that the Board of Estimate recommend that 50 per cent. of the cost and expense be borne and paid for by The City of New York, and that only 50 per cent. be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the improvement. Adopted.

No. 400. Constructing sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Gerard avenue and Walton avenue.

Petition of Francis Bacon Piano Company, by W. H. Bacon, president, was read, also report of Chief Engineer of the Borough.

Estimated cost, \$2,000. Assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment is \$11,000.

There being no opposition at the hearing, on motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution in favor of initiating proceedings for said improvement.

No. 300. Granite paving on concrete foundation, Exterior street, from One Hundred and Forty-fourth street to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of Pioneer Real Estate Company, by Geo. H. Foster, agent, was read.

Placed on file as No. 405 is a substitute for this petition.

Special Resolution Adopted in Accordance With Section 429 of the Greater New York Charter.

Whereas, A complaint from the Department of Health, dated August 9, 1906, has been received by the President of the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, The said complaint was submitted to the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, which did duly consider the same, as well as reports of the Superintendent of Highways and the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, in the Borough of The Bronx, dated August 20 and August 24, 1906, respectively; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to section 429 of the Greater New York Charter, That the nuisance complained of be abated by the construction of the sewers as recommended in the report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, as follows:

For constructing sewers and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Park avenue and Canal place; in East One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Park avenue and Canal place, and in Canal place, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That the petitions for these improvements presented this day by the Alderman of that District, be duly advertised for a public hearing before this local board on October 11, 1906.

Adopted by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, on the 20th day of September, 1906.

Alderman Kuntze, Alderman Morris, Alderman Harnischfeger and the President of the Borough of The Bronx voting in favor thereof.

Negative—None.

Adopted.

No. 268. One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, between Park avenue East and Third avenue.

The resolution denying this petition was taken from the table on the motion of Alderman Murphy and reconsidered.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board's former action was rescinded.

On motion of Alderman Murphy, duly seconded, the Board then initiated proceedings for the said improvement. Adopted.

Vesting title to Tremont avenue, between Boston road and Bronx river, as money has been provided for bridge approach.

Recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On motion, the Board adjourned until October 11, 1906, at 3 p. m.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

EXECUTIVE SESSION OF LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the President of the borough, the members of the Local Board met in executive session in the office of the said Borough President, Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on September 20, 1906, at 4:30 p. m.

Present—President Haffen, Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Murphy, Alderman Morris and Alderman Kuntze.

Absent—Alderman O'Neill.

No. 35. Acquiring title to One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street, from Walton avenue to Davidson avenue.

Laid over indefinitely.

No. 50—Laying out of a public park bounded by Jerome avenue, Anderson avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

New proposition having been adopted on June 14, 1906, this petition was denied.

No. 173. Cambreling avenue, paving with sheet asphalt on concrete, where grade is $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. or less, and with block asphalt on concrete where grade is over $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., from One Hundred and Eighty-second street to St. John's College grounds.

On motion the matter was denied.

No. 265. Cambreling avenue, asphalt block, between East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and St. John's College grounds.

On motion the matter was denied.

No. 223. Laying out an extension of Mohegan avenue, from East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street to Southern boulevard.

On motion the matter was denied.

No. 230. Laying out Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, at a width of 60 feet, from Putnam avenue West to Kingsbridge avenue.

Recommended to the favorable consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the understanding that the lines be shifted southerly so as to avoid the acquiring of two two-story buildings. Adopted.

No. 231. Putnam avenue West, laying out, 60 feet wide, between West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

Laid over indefinitely.

No. 232. Putnam avenue West, acquiring title, from Two Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to Van Cortlandt Park.

Laid over indefinitely.

No. 234. Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, acquiring title, from Albany road to Kingsbridge avenue.

Withdrawn by request of counsel for petitioner.

No. 47. Constructing a vehicle bridge across the New York and Harlem Railroad tracks at East One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street.

Recommended that a bridge be constructed at this street across the said railroad tracks and that the cost and expense be paid for by the railroad companies.

No. 243. East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, widening, from Brook avenue to Third avenue.

Petition of John W. Decker and others, protests of Henry Ruhl and others, reports and map were submitted to the Board, as well as communication addressed to the Mayor and forwarded to the President of the borough for his consideration under date of September 6, 1906.

The Board decided not to reverse its previous action whereby the petition was denied.

No. 398. Locating and laying out a public park bounded by Sedgwick avenue, Cedar avenue and West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

Petition and protests presented to Local Board, as well as map showing the surrounding avenues and streets and buildings.

On motion, the Board unanimously recommended the proposed layout to the favorable consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
