And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

A copy of the rules and regulations governing the ambulance service in the Borough of Brooklyn, as approved by the Board of Health January 21, 1903, was submitted by the Acting Sanitary Superintendent, with the recommendation that said rules and regulations be amended to accord with suggestions submitted by the Surgeon-in-Chief of the Brooklyn Hospital, and referred to the General Medical Officer.

Clennon Bishop, to whom was granted a permit to conduct a poultry slaughter house at Nos. 408 and 410 East Third street by the Board of Health, appeared pursuant to notice to show cause why said permit should not be revoked for failure to comply with the rules and regulations of this Department governing the conduct of such establishments as mentioned above, and submitted his explanation of the violations charged against him. Said Clennon Bishop was reprimanded by the President of the Board of Health and informed that a repetition of the offense would be deemed sufficient cause to revoke the permit in question without further consideration.

H. S. Shlebin, M. Whereas, Numerous complaints have been made to the Board of Health against various street railroads operated in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, County of Kings, on account of noises caused by the running of defective cars, to wit, the pounding and thumping of flat wheel cars, especially during the night time, along the public streets and avenues; and

Whereas, This Board has taken and filed among its records what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaring that the said cars so used and having defective or flat wheels are public nuisances and that the running thereof is dangerous to life and health; and it is therefore

Resolved, That the running of cars having defective or flat wheels along the public streets and avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, by the street railway companies, especially during the night time, is and is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health; and it is further

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, section 1176, the said street railway companies operating street railway lines in the Borough of Brooklyn be directed to discontinue the operation and running of cars having flat or defective wheels along the public streets or avenues in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York.

In accordance with the above preambles and resolution, the following order was directed to be entered upon the minutes and served upon the president, directors, etc., of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company:

To the president, directors and other agents, officers, or employees of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company:

Section 84. No cattle, sheep, swine, pigs or calves shall be driven in the streets or avenues of the boroughs of Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond except in such streets or avenues as shall be set apart and designated by the Board of Health.

Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

The boxes to hold the clothing of women employees have been supplied and are now being assigned to the quarters in the new dormitory building.

The rooms formerly occupied by the Bookkeeper and his assistants are being rearranged as an additional dining room for the Ambulance Drivers and Clerks, in accordance with the authority granted by your Board last fall. It was found necessary to put down a new floor in one of the rooms, tear down the partition between the two rooms and put up a new steel ceiling.

Estimates are now being prepared for a bath-room for the servants who sleep in that part of the building near the Steward's dining-room.

Owing to the increased number of persons to be served at the Steward's mess additional accommodations will have to be provided in the kitchen by tearing down the partition between the bath-room and the kitchen and making it one room.

The room formerly occupied as the Doctor's laundry is now being made over as a diet kitchen for the training schools. It was found necessary to replaster all of this room and to lay new floors.

It is respectfully suggested that the Civil Service Commission be requested to exempt from competitive examination Dr. George D. Creevey, appointed Anæsthetist last year, and to allow a compensation not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars a year.
