## POLICE DEPARTMENT.

### Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 1554, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending September 30, 1905.

#### Report.

On the 30th day of September, 1905, the number of the Force of all grades (including those on probation) was 8,737.

#### Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be found that the sick time lost was 20,159½ days; the sick time paid was 10,079¾ days, and the sick time unpaid was 10,079¾ days. Total days' time of the Force was 761,565. Per cent. of sick to full time was 2.65, and for preceding quarter 2.63.

#### Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 41,480; females, 10,595. Total, 52,075. Number arrested for principal felonies, 4,227; number discharged without trial, 1,732; number acquitted, 344; number convicted, 549; number sent to other authorities, 48; number died, 3; number pending, 1,551.

#### Lost Children.

Males, 442; females, 206. Total, 648. Restored to parents or guardians, 617; other dispositions, 31. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 527.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made from the daily returns from the station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time of arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.


