Battery Landing, North River.

Very respectfully, B. F. CRESSON, JR., First Deputy Commissioner.

The landings in this locality have been maintained during the quarter and repairs made from time to time by the force of the Department. The space between the platforms connecting the north and middle landings has been filled in, and the landing where damaged by the Tug "Admiral" has been repaired.

The work of constructing a temporary building on one of the platforms in this location by the Commissioner of Immigration under a permit from this Department has been completed.

Pier "A," North River.

This pier, upon which are located the executive offices of the Department has been maintained and kept in repair during the quarter. The boat landing situated in the vicinity of the pier with the float inside has been maintained and kept in repair.

Pier New 1, North River.

The work of installing fire lines on this pier under Contract No. 1245, Class was begun June 1, 1911, and is in progress.

The work of constructing a stairway on Pier New 1, North River, under Contract No. 1245, Class 2, is in progress, having been begun on June 1, 1911. Repairs have been made to the portion of this pier which has been opened for wharfage. Begun March 15, 1911, and is in progress. The fender system on Pier New 1, North River, has also been repaired.

Cortlandt Street Section, South, North River.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has in progress the work of improving the waterfront in accordance with the New Plan, beginning at the northerly line of Liberty street and extending northerly 203.03 feet. This work is being done under a permit from and under the supervision of this Department.

Piers 25 and 26, North River.

The Old Dominion Steamship Company have constructed foundations and fire walls at this locality, and have also erected electric light and power plant under permit from this Department.

Pier 34, North River.

The work of extending this pier out to the pierhead line, which was originally begun on the 11th of July, 1910, has been in progress during the quarter. Repairs have also been made to this pier where damaged by tugs.

Pier 42. North River.

The Royal Mail Steamship Company have erected a double-deck steel shed on this pier, the work having been completed on April 18, 1911.

Pier 47, North River.

Repairs to the decking and sheathing of this pier have been in progress during the quarter. Work was originally begun January 14, 1909, and is still in progress.

Gansevoort Market Piers, North River,

A new plan for the improvement of the waterfront in the vicinity of Gansevoort Market was adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on the 11th of June. 1909, and was approved by the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund on the 30th of June. 1909. This plan provides for the construction of three piers between Piers 305.633 10 52 and 53, North River, in the vicinity of the New West Washington Market:

these piers to be known as Gansevoort Market Pier South, Gansevoort Market Pier Middle, and Gansevoort Market Pier North. Work was begun during a prior quarter on these piers and was all finished on the 17th of May, 1911. 786.21 by the force of the Department. Pier 53, Bloomfield Street, North River.

During the quarter the Department force was engaged in constructing a platform 10 feet wide along the entire length of the southerly side of Pier 53, and on the southerly side of this platform another platform 25 feet wide by 93 feet in length, beginning at a point 90 feet outshore from the inner end of the pier, has been constructed, to afford the necessary accommodation to the Fire

Chelsea Section, North River.

Work on this section proper was entirely completed some time since, but during the present quarter the Department force has been engaged in making general repairs along the section. The pavement on the marginal street along this section has been repaired where necessary.

West Twenty-Third Street, North River.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company having vacated the ferry at this street, the old ferry buildings have been in course of demolition, and the pier at West 23d street is being reconstructed and lengthened. 225 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

Between 34th and 50th Streets, North River.

Test borings have been taken along the waterfront between these localities to obtain the necessary data in regard to the river bottom.

Pier 39th Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to this pier. Work was originally begun December 5, 1910, and is in progress.

Pier 40th Street, North River.

The work of extending this pier out to the pierhead line has been in progress, to grade where necessary by the force of the Department. and the approach to the pier has been repaired from time to time.

West 42d Street, North River.

During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in repairing the sheathing on bulkhead and roadway, and in raising the approach to the ferry at the foot of 42d street.

Between 32d and 44th Streets, North River.

The granite pavement between these two streets is being repaired where necessary.

Pier 44th Street, North River.

Repairs to the approach to this pier have been in progress during the quarter.

Pier 45th Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to this pier. Work was begun March 23, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier 47th Street, North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun May 20, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier 48th Street, North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun September 13, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 50th Street, North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun May 24, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier 51st Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to this pier under B. O. 8329. Work was originally begun April 14, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 52d Street, North River.

Repairs have been made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work is in progress. was begun May 4, 1911, and finished June 5, 1911.

Pier 54th Street, North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work proposed Pier 41 to the easterly side of Pier Old 54, a distance of 759.94 feet. was begun June 24, 1909, and is still in progress.

Pier 55th Street, North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun May 9, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier 57th Street, North River.

Repairs have been made to this pier at various times by the force of the Department.

77th Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to the fender system at this locality. Work was begun April 25, 1911, and finished May 25, 1911.

Between 77th and 80th Streets, North River.

The granite pavement on the marginal street between these two streets has been repaired from time to time as required.

80th Street, North River.

finished April 28, 1911. Some other repairs have been made to this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 7509.

95th Street, North River.

Test piles have been driven at this locality to ascertain the nature of the river bottom.

97th Street, North River.

Pier 133d Street, North River.

The work of extending this pier out to the pierhead line has been in progress

134th Street, North River.

A contract, No. 1220, was let in three classes for preparing for and extending the pier at this street, and depositing cobble and riprap thereat. The work of depositing cobble under class 3 was completed on December 19, 1910. The work of depositing riprap under class 2 was begun October 1, 1910, and completed January 16, 1911. The work of extending the pier under class 1 was begun March 25, 1911, and finished June 24, 1911. 676 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done, and the superficial area of the City's piers Department in connection with the berthing of fireboat. Work was originally has been increased 18,480 square feet. Other portions of the pier have been repaired by the force of the Department. The old dump and runway of the Department of Street Cleaning have been removed, and a new dumping board and ramp erected.

Carmansville Section, North River.

On the section of the waterfront between 153d and 158th streets, North River, improvements have been in progress under action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 14, 1907, authorizing the same.

156th Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged during the quarter in the depositing of rip-rap for the construction of a new pier at this locality.

158th Street, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to the pier at this street under B. O. 9012. Work was begun April 17, 1911, and is in progress.

Man-of-War Landings.

The Department force has repaired and maintained the Man-of-War Landings along the North River as required from time to time during the quarter.

Marginal Street, North River.

The granite pavement along the North River has been taken up and relaid

Whitehall Terminal, East River.

The work at this section will be found described further on in the report under the heading of "Ferries."

Pier 5, East River.

Extensive repairs have been made to this pier under Contract No. 1244. Work was begun January 9, 1911, and finished May 25, 1911.

Pier 6, East River. The work of repairing this pier by the force of the Department under B. O.

8379 was completed on the 3d of April, 1911.

Pier 11, East River. The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to this pier under

B. O. 9253. Work was begun March 22, 1911, and is in progress.

Jefferson Section, East River. The authorization for this section is resolution of the Board of Docks passed February 23, 1900, also action of Commissioner of Docks of March 28, 1908, B. O. 6049. This section extends from the northerly side of Rutgers Slip, East River, to the southerly side of Montgomery street, a distance of 1,237.92 feet. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper.

Pier New 37, East River.

The work of widening this pier is in progress.

Montgomery Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks on the 20th of January, 1909, under B. O. 7028, directed the supervision of the construction of a bulkhead by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, between Montgomery and Gouverneur Slip, East River, a distance of about 474 linear feet. Work includes the construction of three piers, Nos. 39, 40 and 41. Work was begun by the rail-road company on the 25th of March, 1909, and is still in progress. A steel shed has been erected on Pier 39, and the work of erecting a steel shed on Pier 40

Corlears Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of Commissioner of December 23, 1909, B. O. 8029. This section extends from a point at the easterly side of Work in the vicinity of this section has been in progress.

Pier New 42, East River.

A new pier, to be known as Pier New 42, East River, is being constructed by the force of the Department under B. O. 9138.

Pier Old 53, East River.

The Department force has repaired this pier under B. O. 9238. Work was begun March 14, 1911, and finished April 18, 1911.

Pier Old 54, East River.

The work of repairing this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 8925 is in progress. Roosevelt Street Ferry, East River.

The City having taken possession of the old Roosevelt Street Ferry, the work of repairing and reconstructing the ferry structures was completed in 1910, and the work of rebuilding the Broadway Terminal at Brooklyn having progressed so far the Department was enabled to re-establish the ferry between this Contract No. 1257 having been let to the Riverside Contracting Company point and Broadway, Brooklyn, on the 16th of March, 1911. Other repairs have for repairing the pier at this street, the work was begun February 7, 1911, and been made in this vicinity during the quarter.

Pier 3d Street, East River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 9473. Work was begun May 3, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier 5th Street, East River.

Extensive repairs have been made to this pier under Contract No. 1260. The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to the pier at Work was begun February 28, 1911, and finished May 12, 1911. East 23d Street Ferry, East River.

The City having taken possession of the old East 23d Street Ferry, the The removal of the ice breaker from the bow of the U. S. Steamship "Granite work of repairing and reconstructing the ferry structures was completed in 1910, and some further repairs were made during the present quarter.

26th Street, East River.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for the use of the Department of Public Charities for the purpose of laying a concrete deck on the pier at this

Yorkville Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks dated October 10, 1904, B. O. 2757. Work on this section has been in progress during the quarter. Between 66th and 70th streets, mud, sand and gravel have been pumped and stone and rip-rap tubbed from the foundation. Granite has been set in the wall and pointed, and earth filling has been deposited in rear of that portion of the wall built. Paving blocks have been loaded for use at this section and piled along the bulkhead wall. Between 71st and 74th street, mud, sand and gravel have been pumped and stone and rip-rap tubbed from the foundation. Concrete in bags has been deposited on foundation. Chain holes been engaged in concreting the same. Gangways were cut and spring piles were in blocks have been filled with concrete in bags. Retaining wall of rip-rap has been constructed.

Paving has been laid along the marginal street, and paving blocks stored on the bulkhead for further use.

Blackwell Section, East River.

The work at this section is being done under action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2756. No work has been done on the bulkhead wall proper at this section during the quarter, only a few charges being made against the section, such as placing rip-rap and unloading stones for use in the vicinity.

Pavement has been laid along the marginal street.

100th Street, East River.

Extensive repairs have been made to the pier at this street under Contract No. 1254. Work was begun March 11, 1911, and finished on the 17th of June, 1911.

138th and 139th Streets, Hudson River.

Repairs have been made to the bulkhead in this vicinity by the force of the Department under B. O. 9043.

210th Street to Fordham Road.

Two 36-inch gas mains are being placed and crib bulkhead built at this locality by the National Sugar Reby the Consolidated Gas Company, under permit from this Department. Work fining Co., under permit from this Department. Work was begun November 28, 1910, was begun April 1, 1910, and is in progress.

Clason Point, Bronx.

Ferry terminal is being constructed at this locality by the Twin City Ferry Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 24, 1911, and is in progress.

Pugsley Avenue and Compton Street, Bronx.

F. Siebel under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 1, 1911, begun May 20, 1911, and finished June 17, 1911. and completed April 20, 1911.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of The Bronx has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

The pavement along the marginal street on the East and Harlem Rivers has been relaid from time to time as necessary.

General Repairs, East and Harlem Rivers.

Repairs have been made by the force of the Department to the coal dock of the Metropolitan Hospital at this island, under B. O. 8690. Work was begun cerned, including the numerous creeks and inlets from the Bay to the westward. April 4, 1911, and finished April 22, 1911.

Borough of Brooklyn,

Whale Creek Section, Brooklyn.

A plan has been submitted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, establishing new lines for bulkheads and piers, with marginal street, wharf or place, extending from 28th to 64th streets, South Brooklyn. This section extends from the northerly side of 28th street to the southerly side of 36th street, South Brook-lyn, a distance of 2,142.82 feet, more or less. There have been completed up to 12, 1911, and is in progress. Department Yards at West 57th and East 24th Streets.

Ferries.

Staten Island Ferry.

The New Staten Island Ferry, operating between the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan, and the foot of South street, St. George, Staten Island, with the Whitehall Terminal at the Manhattan end and the St. George Terminal at the Staten Island end, was started in operation by the City on October 25, 1905. Racks, ferry slips, etc., have been kept in repair during the quarter.

St. George Terminal.

Contract No. 1243 having been let for regulating, grading and paving the South Street Ferry Approach and for constructing ducts at the St. George Ferry Terminal along the wall that was built recently by this Department and connecting the ferries with the approach built by the Richmond Borough authorities, has been completed, the hauled, 1. work having been finished on the 28th of June, 1911.

The ferry structures at St. George are being painted under Contract No. 1262. This work is about 90 per cent. completed.

The metal lining under the trolley platform is being repaired under B. O. 9521 by the force of the Department.

Stapleton Terminal.

The proposition for establishing a Municipal Ferry to Stapleton was consummated on the 27th of May, 1909, by preparations made for the running of ferryboats from that point to Whitehall street, Manhattan. Plans and Contract No. 1182 have been prepared for the construction of new ferryboats for service on this ferry. A contract has also been in course of preparation for constructing a new ferry terminal at this

Port Richmond Terminal.

The proposition for extending the Municipal Ferry from Manhattan by an additional terminal at Port Richmond has been under consideration during the quarter.

South Brooklyn Ferry.

39th Street Ferry, South Brooklyn, Manhattan Terminal.

On November 1, 1906, The City came into possession of the property of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry & Steam Transportation Co., operating a ferry between Whitehall street, Manhattan, and 39th street, South Brooklyn, and since that time the City has been operating the ferry as a Municipal Ferry.

During the quarter the pavement in front of the Manhattan Terminal has been regraded and silt basin installed thereat.

39th Street, South Brooklyn Terminal.

Preliminary studies have been prepared for a ferry house at 39th street, South

West Side Freight Terminal and Elevated Distributing Railroad.

Studies have been prepared and plans submitted for the consolidation of the traffic requirements of the various trunk line railroads, so that freight and merchandise may be received and taken directly from car floats and piers into factories and warehouses. These plans have been finished and the matter is now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Drafting Room.

Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements amounts to 1,078 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 89,513 square feet. New wharfage room made by private parties under permit from this Department amounts to 4,217 linear feet, and the wharfage room destroyed by private parties amounts to 3,336 linear feet.


