Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby request the Special Corporate Stock Budget Committee to report favorably on this application for seventy-five thousand (\$75,000) dollars to place Morningside Park in the state of repair in which it should be kept, and in which the Park Commissioner desires to keep it.

AN ORDINANCE for the regulating and licensing of pool and billiard parlors. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Short Title—This Act shall be known as the Pool Parlor Ordinance. Section 2. Definitions—The term pool or billiard table, as used in this ordinance, shall apply only to pool and billiard tables in a place open to the public.

Section 3. The Continuance of Licenses—Every license heretofore lawfully granted for the maintenance of a pool and billiard parlor shall remain valid for the term for which it was granted, unless sooner cancelled under the provisions of the law under which it was granted.

Section 4. Blanks to be Furnished by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses—The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall furnish blanks for application, bonds and license certificates provided for in this ordinance, which bonds and applications shall be filed as public records.

Section 5. Statements to be Made by Applicant for Pool Parlor License—Each applicant for a pool parlor license certificate shall state the following:

1. Applicant's name. If a corporation or partnership, the name and address of every individual interested.

2. Residence of applicant.

3. When and where applicant was naturalized.

4. References, i. e., the names of the applicant's employers for five years previous to the date of application.

5. The address of premises where the said business is to be conducted.

6. Statement of what business, if any other business is to be carried on in connection therewith or on the same premises by the applicant or any other person, and whether the applicant will sublet the said premises to any other person, firm or corporation.

7. Whether the applicant has ever been convicted of a felony; also whether any pool parlor license certificate issued to the said applicant has ever been revoked or forfeited, and, if so, the date of such revocation and forfeiture.

8. Whether the applicant has ever been convicted of any violation of the law.

9. Whether the premises, for which the license is sought, have been used for a pool and billiard parlor within three years preceding the date of application.

Section 6. Bonds to be Given—Each licensee shall at the time of the making of the application provided for in section 5 of this ordinance file in the office of the Chief or

the Bureau of Licenses a bond to the People of The City of New York in the penal sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), conditioned that there is no material false statement in the application for such pool parlor license certificate, that applicant will not during the time for which such certificate is given suffer or permit any gambling in the place designated by the pool parlor certificate or in any yard, booth, garden or any other place appertaining thereto or connected therewith, or suffer, permit or have any opening or means of entrance or passage for persons or things between the room where the business of conducting a pool parlor is carried on, and any other room or place where any person whosoever suffers or permits any gambling; or suffer or permit such premises to become disorderly; or suffer, permit of having any opening or means of entrance or passageway for persons or things between the room or place where the playing of pool and billiards is carried on and any other room or place which any other person whosoever suffers or permits to become disorderly; that he will not permit any minor under the age of 16 years to play pool or billiards in the premises licensed nor permit him to remain in the said premises for any purpose whatsoever for more than five minutes. Such bond shall be executed by the applicant and by at least two sureties who shall be freeholders, severally owning within The City of New York unencumbered real estate of the value of not less than the penal sum of the bond, and who shall be residents of The City of New York, or instead of such sureties, by a corporation duly authorized to issue surety bonds by the laws of this State. The applicant may in lieu of the bond deposit a certificate of deposit endorsed to or made payable to the City Chamberlain of The City of New York, who shall hold the same until three months after the expiration of the certificate, and if no action is then pending for the revocation of the pool parlor license certificate or to recover the amount of the bond or certificate for violations of law, then the bond or certificate of deposit shall be returned to the licensee. The Corporation Counsel may at any time, for the violation of any of the conditions named in said bond, commence and maintain an action in the name of The City of New York to recover the penalty named in the bond filed pursuant to this ordinance, provided, however, that such action must be commenced within three months after the cause of action has accrued.

Section 7. Examination of Premises by Department of Health—(1) When the application provided for in section 5 of this ordinance is found to be correct in form and shows upon its face that the applicant has complied with all the provisions of this ordinance, and the bond required by section 6 of this ordinance is found to be correct both as to form and sufficiency, then the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall cause the premises for which a license certificate has been asked to be inspected by the Department of Health of The City of New York, and if premises are certified by the Department of Health as sanitary for the purposes intended, a license certificate shall be issued by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. (2) The applicant shall at the time of his application for a pool parlor license certificate deposit with the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses the sum of five dollars (\$5) to pay for the examination of the premises by the Department of Health of The City of New York.

Section 8. License Fee—The license fee for pool parlor certificate shall be five dollars (\$5) for each table in the premises licensed and the license issued shall be for the term of one year.

Section 9. Posting Pool Parlor License Certificate—The said pool parlor certificate shall be suitably framed, having a clear glass face so that the whole of said certificate may be seen therein, and shall be posted up and at all times displayed in a conspicuous place in the room wherein said business of pool and billiard parlor is to be conducted.

Section 10. Corporations, Associations, Copartnerships or Persons Who or Which Shall Not Conduct Pool Parlors—No corporation, association, copartnership or person mentioned in this section shall conduct a pool parlor in The City of New York, except as herein provided:

(1) No person (a) who has been convicted of a felony or employs in the conduct of said pool parlor a person who has so been convicted; or (b) who is under the age of twenty-one years; or (c) who is not a citizen of the United States and a resident of The City of New York; or (d) who has had a pool parlor license certificate issued to him and which has been revoked for a violation of the provisions of this ordinance until one year from the date of such conviction or revocation.

(2) No copartnership unless one or more of the members of such copartnership owning at least one-half interest in the business thereof shall be a resident of this City and a citizen of the United States.

(3) No person who as owner or agent shall suffer or permit any gambling in the place designated by the pool parlor license certificate as that in which the said conduct of the pool parlor is to be carried on, or carries on or permits to be carried on or is interested in any traffic, business or occupation the conduct of which is a violation of law.

Section 11. Places for Which Pool Parlor Licenses May Not be Issued—No pool parlor license certificate shall be issued for any premises wherein a pool parlor license was revoked, until the expiration of six months after the date of revocation.

Section 12. Changing Place of Operation of Pool Parlor—If a corporation, association, copartnership or person holding a pool parlor license certificate is desirous of transferring to and carrying on such business in premises other than those designated in the original application and in the license certificate, and in premises where such traffic or business is not prohibited by this ordinance, upon a payment of an additional fee of five dollars (\$5) for an inspection of the premises by the Board of Health as provided for in section 7 of this ordinance, and said certification by the Department of Health that the premises to which the licensee desires to transfer the said pool parlor license certificate are sanitary, the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall transfer the pool parlor license certificate.

Section 13. Penalties for Violation of This Ordinance—The penalty for violation of this ordinance shall be the revocation of the certificate issued and the bringing of an action upon the bond given in accordance with the provisions of section 6 of this ordinance. All proceedings for the revocation of a license certificate issued herein for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be had before the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses or before any deputy designated by him, upon five days' notice to the licensee, and after a hearing before the said Chief of the Bureau of Licenses or the deputy designated by him to hear and to determine the validity of the charges made.

Section 14. Collection of Penalties and Forfeiture of Bond—Upon the revocation of any pool parlor license certificate or for a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York shall, in the name of the People of The City of New York, institute an action to recover the amount of the bond given under section 6 of this ordinance.

Section 15. Hours of Closing—All pool parlors licensed under this ordinance shall close at one a. m. and shall remain closed until nine a. m., unless special permission shall have been granted by the Mayor of The City of New York permitting the premises licensed to remain open later than the time heretofore specified as the hour of closing. The special permit, if granted, shall be in writing, and shall be framed and posted in the same manner as the licensed certificate.

Section 16. When to Take Effect—This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation.

P. J. SCULLY, Esq., Clerk to the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I beg to advise you as follows regarding the consideration given the resolution introduced by Alderman Wendel and adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 11, 1913, in reference to service on the Tenth Avenue Branch cars of the Third Avenue System.

Forty-second st., from 10th to 2d ave., is one of the most congested streets in the City and for a long time past this congestion has so interfered with the operation of the various lines of cars on that street as to cause many complaints. Pressure has been brought upon the operating officials of the various lines of cars continuously to maintain service on regular headways, but despite all that could be done the intervals between cars on Broadway north of 42d st. and on 10th ave., north of 42d st., have been very irregular. Cars sufficient to more than accommodate all passengers with seats have been operated, but, owing to the interferences, many cars have been overloaded while other cars carried few passengers.

In these circumstances it was decided some three weeks ago to take off the cars operating through 10th ave. and 42d st. to the East 34th Street Ferry and turn back all Tenth Avenue Branch cars at 42d st. This is being done at the present time, and an inspection made on April 17 and April 21 showed a very great improvement. It is the intention, as soon as the track connections can be made, to operate the Tenth Avenue Branch cars west on 42d st. to the ferry instead of turning them back at 42d street.

It is believed that this will be a convenience to those who wish to go to the West 42d Street Ferry and that, in addition, it will obviate the annoyance of turning cars in a public street. Very truly yours,

To the Supreme Court of the State of New York:

The petition of the Bronx County News Publishing Company respectfully shows to this honorable Court:

First—That at all the times hereinafter mentioned your petitioner was and is a domestic corporation with a place of business at 117 Westchester square, Westchester, Borough and County of The Bronx, City and State of New York, engaged in the printing and publishing of a certain newspaper called "The Bronx County News," which newspaper has been published weekly at said address for more than a year last past.

Second—That all during the year 1912 the said "Bronx County News" was the advocate of and printed and upheld the principles and policies of the political party known as the National Progressive Party, and was during such period the only newspaper published in said County advocating and publishing such principles of said party.

Third—That under the provisions of law, particularly subdivision 1 of section 48 of chapter 32 of the Consolidated Laws, as amended by chapter 97 of the Laws of 1911, and section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, it is the duty of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York to designate in each County embraced within the territorial limits of New York City two newspapers in which shall be published the session laws and concurrent resolutions of the Legislature of the State of New York for the year 1913 and each year, the newspapers so designated to be respectively those supporting the two political parties polling the greatest number of votes at each general election.

Fourth—That at the general election in the year 1912, held on the 5th day of November, 1912, the said National Progressive Party polled in the said Bronx County the second highest number of votes polled by any party.

Fifth—That heretofore, to wit, on January 27, 1913, your petitioner wrote and delivered to Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, a demand as follows:

"The Bronx County News, Westchester, New York City, January 27, 1913.

"Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

"Dear Sir—We are reliably informed that by a motion made by Alderman Mulligan on December 3, 1912, a resolution was passed by your Honorable Board designating 'The Bronx Record and Times,' a Republican paper, as the proper one to publish the Session Laws in Bronx County. We beg to enter our protest against such designation of a Republican newspaper, as the same not in accordance with a recent decision of Mr. Justice Kapper, of the New York Supreme Court, rendered in Nassau County, in which he held that newspapers supporting the Progressive Party, when that party polls a larger vote than the Republican Party, must be designated by the Secretary of State to publish the Session Laws. The Progressive Party polled a larger vote in Bronx County than the Republican Party, and newspapers supporting that party are, therefore, entitled to be designated as the ones to print the Session Laws. In this instance 'The Bronx County News' was the only paper in Bronx County to support the Progressive Party.

"Trusting that you will have the resolution in question revoked and have our paper designated as the one to publish the Session Laws and concurrent resolutions of the Legislature of the State of New York for the year 1913 for the County of The Bronx, we remain, very truly yours,

"Dear Sir—Permit us to invite your attention to a decision of Mr. Justice Kapper, of the New York Supreme Court, rendered in Nassau County last week, in which he held that newspapers supporting the Progressive Party when that party polls a larger vote than the Republican Party must be designated by the Secretary of State to publish the Session Laws. The Bronx County News supported the Progressive Party in Bronx County and was the only newspaper in Bronx County supporting said party. The Progressive Party in Bronx County polled a larger vote than the Republican Party. We are consequently entitled to receive the designation from you of authority to print the Session Laws. Will you kindly make such designation. Very truly yours,

Seventh—That on April 3, 1913, your petitioner caused to be written and delivered by its counsel, Willoughby B. Dobbs, Esq., to Honorable Thomas W. Mulligan, Alderman, the following letter:

"April 3, 1913.

"Hon. THOS. W. MULLIGAN, Alderman, City of New York:

"My Dear Alderman—Pursuant to our conversation of this morning, I beg leave to submit to you the following proposition:

"On or about the 3d day of December, 1912, the following resolution, offered by you, was adopted by the Board of Aldermen:

"No. 2356, by Alderman Mulligan:

"Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 1 of section 48 of chapter 32 of the Consolidated Laws, as amended by chapter 97 of the Laws of 1907, and section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, 'The Bronx Record and Times,' a paper published in the Borough of The Bronx, now County of The Bronx, formerly County of New York (Republican), whose place of publication is in the Borough of The Bronx, be and the same is hereby designated as one of the newspapers in which shall be published the Session Laws and concurrent resolutions of the Legislature of the State of New York for the year 1913, in said County of The Bronx, formerly in the County of New York."

"Since that resolution was adopted, the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court declared The Bronx County Act to be constitutional.

"The law provides, as I understand it, that designations of newspapers to print the matter indicated must be made to such newspapers which represent the respective parties casting the largest vote at the general election preceding such designation.

"The Courts have held that the Progressive Party is a political party within the meaning of the law. That party polled a larger vote in Bronx County at the general election of 1912 than the Republican party polled.

"The only newspaper in Bronx County which supported the Progressive Party was 'The Bronx County News,' published by The Bronx County News Publishing Company, in Westchester, Bronx County.

"The Bronx County News,' therefore, should have been one of the newspapers designated to print such Session Laws and concurrent resolutions.

"Mr. Justice Kapper, of the Supreme Court, Nassau County, rendered a decision some time in January last in which he held that newspapers supporting the Progressive Party when that party polls a larger vote than the Republican Party, must be designated to publish the Session Laws.

"I trust that you will take such action in the premises as the facts warrant, and I am authorized by 'The Bronx County News' to demand, if necessary, its designation as a newspaper to publish the matter indicated. Very respectfully yours,

To this letter no answer has been received.

Eighth—That said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York has failed, neglected and refused and still fails neglects and refuses to comply with the said demand of your petitioner and to perform its said duty of designating your petitioner's newspaper, "The Bronx County News" to print in Bronx County the said Session Laws and concurrent resolutions of the Legislature of the State of New York.

Ninth—The following is the answer received to the letter referred to in paragraph 6 hereof:

"State of New York, Office of the Secretary of State, Albany, January 18, 1913.

"The Bronx County News,' 117 Westchester Square, Westchester, New York City:

"Gentlemen—Your letter of the 17th inst., relative to the designation of a Republican paper in Bronx County, at hand. In reply thereto you are advised that the designation of newspapers to publish the Session Laws in Bronx County is made by the Board of Aldermen of New York City. The designation of papers in this County as made by such Board and filed in this office is regular upon its face, and we have been advised by the Attorney General that it is our duty to recognize the same and act thereon until such time as we shall be otherwise directed by an order or judgment of a Court of competent jurisdiction in a proper proceeding brought to review such designation. Tenth—That no previous application has been made by your petitioner to this or any other court for the relief herein demanded.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays that a peremptory writ of mandamus issue out of this court to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York directing it to perform its legal duty of designating the Bronx County News as one of the newspapers to publish in Bronx County the session laws and concurrent resolutions of the Legislature of the State of New York for the year 1913, and for such other or further relief as to the court may seem just, equitable, legal and proper.

The addition of \$7,000 at this time is caused by the increased cost of meats, poultry, smoked meats, bread and rolls and other miscellaneous food stuffs.

386, Medical and Surgical Supplies, 1913. The allowance of \$77,800 for this appropriation is inadequate; our estimate provided for \$93,354.58, based on actual quantities used. The \$25,200 additional fund needed is made up of \$15,554.58, the amount deducted by the Board of Estimate, and \$9,655.42, for the increased cost of gauze, cotton batting, absorbent cotton and bandage muslins.

387, Laundry, Cleaning and Disinfecting Supplies, 1913, shows an estimated deficit of \$7,100. The annual estimate provided for \$12,800 for these supplies and the

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—Enclosed you will find copy of a letter I have received from the Commissioner of Records of the County of Kings, relative to the removal and rearrangement of all books, records and documents in this office, which was made necessary by the new equipment and necessary alterations that are under way, as provided for by resolution of your honorable Board in conjunction with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The contracts for this work, as I have been informed, are all let and the contractors are ready to begin their work. As a matter of fact, the work cannot be commenced until there is some provision made for the removal of the books, records, documents, etc.

There are over 2,500,000 papers in the Register's office to be moved, cleaned and arranged systematically and accurately so as to be easy of access to the public.

The Laborers that we have in this office at the present time are kept busy in routine work of the office, and in order to have this work done it will be necessary to employ additional help, and I would respectfully ask your honorable Board for an appropriation not to exceed the sum of six thousand three hundred dollars (\$6,300) for the temporary employment of a sufficient number of Laborers at the rate of sixty dollars (\$60) per month.

Hon. EDWARD T. O'LOUGHLIN, Register of Kings County, Hall of Records, Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—An examination of the books, records and documents in your office discloses the fact that there are in the vault in the cellar about 2,500,000 papers and books—of these, 500,000 are satisfactions of mortgages, and 300,000 are chattel mortgages, in large bundles, not arranged in order; at the present time it is difficult, in fact, almost impossible, to find any particular paper that may be required. These papers are covered with layers of dust and dirt. The wooden racks in which said papers and books are stored are to be replaced by metal cases, and it will be necessary to remove all records from the vault to some temporary storage place during such alteration.

The alterations and installation of new metal furniture in the document room will necessitate the removal and arrangement of about 800,000 chattel mortgages and satisfactions of mortgages.

The alterations in the record room will necessitate the moving and arrangement of about 13,000 heavy libers.

At the time these books and records are being moved, I believe the public interests require that the same be thoroughly cleaned and dusted, and find that the "care and preservation" of such records during the alterations in your office and the installation of new metal cases, will require the employment of a number of Laborers.

In pursuance of the authority vested in me by sections 4 and 5 of chapter 171 of the Laws of 1904, you are, therefore, authorized to immediately employ such number of Laborers as you deem absolutely necessary for the cleaning, protection, moving, arrangement and convenient examination of said records, the compensation for such Laborers to be at the rate of sixty dollars (\$60) per month. Sir—Application is hereby made for revenue bonds in the amount of \$20,000 for the renovation of certain portions of the interior of the City Hall. Attached hereto find itemized statement of the work to be done and the estimated cost of the same.

The work shown in attached schedule is to be done in a similar manner as that already performed, and to be under the immediate direction and supervision of the

additional funds required will now make our total less than the amount estimated for the year.

389, General Plant Supplies, 1913, requires an additional amount of \$9,556; this appropriation is composed of miscellaneous charges that are not accounted for in any of the other supplies' appropriations and there is no basis to go by other than the activities of the first two months. The total estimated amount required for the year is \$30,000.

390, Office Equipment, 1913, not specially requested by this Department, was created by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to meet a general classification in the new segregated budget. The amount of \$400 is inadequate, and it is estimated that \$3,600 additional funds will be required for the balance of the year.

393, Motorless Vehicles and Equipment, 1913. This appropriation is accounted for in the same manner as 390, Office Equipment, 1913; the amount of \$900 is inadequate, and it is now estimated that \$2,100 additional funds will be required for the balance of the year.

395, Wearing Apparel, 1913, is inadequate. This Department requested \$40,420 in the annual estimate and was allowed \$39,420. The additional amount of \$1,280 now needed is made up of the \$1,000 deducted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and \$280 due to the increased costs of uniforms and dry goods.

All other appropriations for supplies and equipment may be sufficient for the balance of the year, at least the activities of the first two months would so indicate. The appropriations for repairs cannot well be figured at this time as most of the demands on these funds cannot be anticipated, but as the amounts in nearly every instance are less than the amounts requested in the annual estimate, it is probable that at a later date it may be necessary to request additional funds. Sir—Application is hereby made to the Honorable Board of Aldermen for the issue of special revenue bonds, to the amount of \$3,500, to repair and put in habitable condition the Hunter House at Hunter Island, Pelham Bay Park.

The architects prepared a specification for a contract No. 12 to complete these parts, and made a preliminary estimate that the work would cost about \$85,000. On September 18, 1911, therefore, you applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for corporate stock to the amount of \$85,000 to cover the cost of this work. The Comptroller, however, ruled that most of it was repair work, and therefore not properly chargeable to corporate stock.

Nothing further was done until February, 1912, when the Director of the Library, Dr. Billings, wrote you that all of the work mentioned above could be done by the Library authorities for about \$59,035. You then applied to the Board of Aldermen for revenue bonds for this amount. After your application had run the gauntlet of Examiners in several City departments, you finally succeeded in getting \$23,610.

The greater part of the work, therefore, still remains to be done. Some time ago the Director of the Library asked the Superintendent of the building to make an itemized estimate of the remaining work which he considered necessary. This he did, and the various items he listed totaled \$49,600. The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees felt that they would like to have expert advice about these various items and estimates, and therefore asked one of their number, Mr. Wm. Barclay Parsons, whose eminence as an engineer is well known, to go over the estimate of the Superintendent of the building and give the Committee the benefit of his judgment. Mr. Parsons not only went over the various items of the estimate on paper; he personally went over the building with the Superintendent and studied each problem on the ground. As a result he reported that all of the items in the Superintendent's list were desirable, but that some of them might be postponed without injury to the building or interference with its successful operation.

The following items he regarded as urgent and necessary for the proper preservation of the building and its operation for library purposes:

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—That many needed repairs, alterations and additions have been ordered by the local Inspectors, United States Steamboat Inspection Service, on the several steamboats of this department, which are mandatory. So far we have only been able to make the required repairs to the steamer "Massasoit," and by the time we have completed all the work on this boat to comply with the laws of the United States Steamboat Inspection Service, our existing funds for repairs to steamboats for year 1913 will be entirely exhausted.

Therefore, in view of these facts, that we are obliged to obey the orders of the United States Steamboat Inspection Service or tie up the boats, I deem it very important that a request be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at once for special revenue bonds for at least \$10,000, to complete the repairs, etc., necessary to the steamboats of this department to permit them to continue to navigate. The following is what will be necessary to be done to the several boats:

Gentlemen—Attached hereto please find copy of a formal communication from this committee to the Board of Estimate of The City of New York.

Our committee invites your Board to act in concert with the Board of Estimate in having The City of New York contribute the sum of \$7,000 toward the cost of the foundation of the National Maine Monument which is about to be unveiled at the corner of 8th ave. and 59th st., just inside of the Central Park entrance.

The monument is costing approximately \$183,000, and our committee is providing all the funds for the monument proper and about \$30,000 for the new entrance gates to Central Park, which were required by the Municipal Art Commission and which were not a part of the monument as originally planned and contracted for.

The unveiling of this monument marks not only the completion of a beautiful City adornment but it is of such national significance that the Secretary of the United States Navy has just directed the attendance of the entire North Atlantic fleet, with all of its magnificent ships, at the time of the dedication.

Board of Estimate, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The National Maine Monument, which is now practically finished, at the entrance to Central Park, at 59th st. and 8th ave., will on May 30 of this year, be dedicated and presented to The City of New York. The Mayor will be asked to receive the monument in behalf of the City. There will be simple but impressive ceremonies, which will be attended by National officials, and State and City officials will be invited. A luncheon at a hotel also is being arranged.

The National Maine Monument Fund to date, with all trust fund interest thereon, amounts to about \$143,000. The actual cost of the monument including the unveiling is at this moment estimated to be \$183,000. The shortage of \$40,000 is due mainly to the addition of the beautiful gates which constitute a new entrance to Central Park. As planned and contracted for originally, the monument did not include these gates. They were required by the Municipal Art Commission at the time of the original presentation in connection with the present site.

Our committee cheerfully obligated itself to see that these gates were built, and without asking the City for one penny, has practically finished the monument, all of the great works of sculpture being ready to put in position this month. Of the approximate deficiency of \$40,000 one of the members of our committee has offered to give a dollar for every dollar that is raised by our committee in any other way. This leaves about \$20,000 to be raised in other ways. Of this sum prominent gentlemen have already subscribed a portion, and the committee has made arrangements to get some in other directions.

At conferences between a representative of this committee and City officials, our committee has become convinced that it is quite proper to ask The City of New York, through its Board of Estimate, if it wishes to contribute toward this great memorial. We are informed that in connection with the Carl Schurz Memorial the City originally gave \$25,000 to provide means for erection of the memorial, and within a week your Board has passed a resolution giving \$10,000 toward the dedication ceremonies in connection with that memorial.

Our committee is informed that in practically every instance of the building of a public monument the City has contributed either toward the foundation or other work in connection with the monument or toward the dedication of the monument. We have decided to make no request at all of the City in connection with the monument itself, the additional gates we have built or the dedication services of the National Maine Monument. We have, however, come to the conclusion that we will offer The City of New York an opportunity to provide a place on which to put the monument and the gates by expending the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) for work done on the foundation for the monument under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. Park Commissioner Stover permits us to state that he is in hearty accord with such action, and that he feels, in view of all the public and this committee have done, it would indeed be only a small thing for the City to provide the foundation for such a permanent and beautiful patriotic memorial.

Our committee requests that the Board of Estimate by unanimous consent at its meeting on Thursday, April 17, consider a resolution providing the sum of \$7,000 for the purpose stated. In conclusion, permit me to say at the time stated, I, as chairman of the National Maine Monument Committee, will in person present the monument to the Mayor of New York for the City. Respectfully,

One of the most necessary and important duties of the Topographical Bureau is the search of the records of streets and data relating to them prior to consolidation. It involves a search of old village records, town highway commissioners' records and other books kept by the former municipalities now in the custody of the Bureau of Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance in accordance with statutory provision.

The information in these books is of great value and is the original and official record which is essential in proceedings relating to old roads and streets. The books also contain the record of the improvement of streets paid for from county or other funds prior to consolidation.

Much work has been done by this Department in setting up such a record from the originals, but the volume of detail is great and the force of employees limited. It is my judgment that the work can be greatly economized by copying on a large scale and thereby dispose of the work quickly and efficiently. This request is made because we have an inadequate number of Supervising Nurses and with this lack of supervisory force we are unable to properly train our Nurses and keep in touch with the work. In the general hospital with nearly seven hundred (700) patients, the only people having more than \$600 are the Assistant Superintendent and one (1) Supervising Nurse. In the tuberculosis infirmary with nearly one thousand (1,000) patients, the only person having more than \$600 is the Second Assistant Superintendent. There is no Night Supervising Nurse and we are obliged to get along at night with \$600 positions. For this reason we are unable to retain our best Nurses in responsible positions at \$600, with the result that we have very frequent changes and many trying situations which could be avoided if the salaries paid were commensurate with responsibilities. Much of the time of our Superintendent of the Training School and Assistant Superintendents, which ought to go into bigger things, is spent going over the old routine with the constantly changing Nurses. We are of the opinion that the detention pens attached to our courts are identical with the "district prisons" that are referred to in the "Inferior Criminal Courts Law" (see section 112), and which prisons are made subject to your control.

I now write, pursuant to a resolution of our Board, to inquire as to whether you can hold out an early prospect of providing each of our district prisons with the necessary number of attendants to take charge of the prisoners, so as to relieve us of the unlawful work that our force is now obliged to perform in that respect. We are not disposed to hurry you in the matter, but we do wish to have you keep the subject in mind with a view to a definite determination of the question involved.

Gentlemen—There was transmitted to this office by the Clerk of your Board, on January 22, 1913, a certified copy of an ordinance duly adopted by your Board on January 6, 1913, and approved by the Mayor on January 21, 1913, selecting as a site for municipal purposes, in the care and under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, of the President of the Borough of Richmond, the following described property in the Borough of Richmond:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Tompkins ave., said point of beginning being the northeasterly corner of land occupied by the Clifton Refuse Destructor, which was conveyed to The City of New York October 4, 1907.

1. Thence in a northwesterly direction 101.92 feet along the westerly side of Tompkins ave. to the right of way of the Staten Island Railway.

2. Thence deflecting to the left 92 degrees 53 minutes 40 seconds in a southwesterly direction along said railroad right of way 12 feet.

3. Thence deflecting to the left 24 degrees 43 minutes in a southwesterly direction along said railroad right of way 231.27 feet.

In the matter of the application of The City of New York relative to acquiring title wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired for the same purpose in fee to the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the opening and extending of Rosebank ave. from Southside boulevard to Broad st., in the Second and Fourth Wards of the Borough of Richmond, City of New York."

The oaths of the Commissioners in the above proceeding were filed on December

26, 1912, and I am informed by my assistant in charge of said proceeding that the title to the property to be acquired will vest in The City of New York six months after the date of the filing of said oaths.

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Tompkins ave. adjoining the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, running thence southwesterly at an angle of 92 degrees 53 minutes 40 seconds, a distance of 12 feet, to the westerly side of Rosebank ave. as laid out, running thence southerly along the westerly side of Rosebank ave 101.81 feet, running thence easterly at right angles to the westerly side of Tompkins ave. 19.72 feet to the westerly side of Tompkins ave., running thence northerly along the westerly side of Tompkins ave. 101.92 feet to the point or place of beginning.

As such portion of the property selected by your Board as is comprised in Damage Parcel No. 9 in said street opening proceeding has been designated for street purposes, it should not be selected for another and inconsistent public use.

Hon. HENRY H. CURRAN, Chairman of Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting to-day adopted four resolutions relating to issues of corporate stock for the uses of this Department. Three of the resolutions rescind from funds known as C-DB-1A, C-DB-7C and C-DB-56 a total of \$35,000, and the fourth resolution authorizes an increase of this amount in the fund known as C-DB-42A. This additional money is needed in the fund C-DB-42A for the purpose of completing the strengthening of the Williamsburg Bridge to permit of the running of subway trains thereon in connection with rapid transit improvements. A contract was let for the strengthening of the end spans of the bridge on June 16, 1911, and this contract is approximately 90 per cent. completed.

The work of strengthening the main span of the bridge is now under way, the Department using its own labor on this portion of the work. The balance in the fund for this work on this date is only \$807, which amount will carry the force only to April 23. It would be unwise at this time to stop work, but this will have to be done unless the amount requested, \$35,000, is authorized. All of the material for this work has been purchased under contract and is practically all delivered at the site. The cessation of the work at this time would mean the postponement of the operation of subway trains across this bridge into the Center street loop. Such operation has already been authorized by the Public Service Commission, and those concerned in this operation state that they will be ready within two months to run cars through this subway, and it is important that the work of strengthening the main span be not interfered with.

When this matter of authorizing the \$35,000 additional comes before your Committee for action, I beg to request that you do everything in your power to hasten early favorable action on the four resolutions mentioned above. Yours truly,

I believe that by purchasing in the open market of the best type known at present, with a specification only showing the exact requirement of the department service, and without entering too much in detail as to the mechanical construction and equipment, but leaving the matter so that the motor truck manufacturers must of necessity present the highest type as a sample, will bring out the best results. I find that but few manufacturers to-day are putting out a truck which can meet our requirements, but from these few I can choose the one which now meets the necessary details of construction to suit the necessities of our work. As to the tractor, I ask that I be permitted to have this one in order to find if there is virtue in the claim that it may be substituted on various vehicles used in the department work for horse traction, so as to make it available for more than one vehicle and more than one service. I would therefore request your Honorable body to grant me the power to purchase one gasoline truck, one electric truck, and one tractor in the open market for the purpose here stated, at a cost not to exceed, for the three, \$15,000. REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

The Special Committee appointed to investigate the subject of push-carts and markets, makes the following report and recommendations, and submits the following ordinances for adoption:

This Special Committee was appointed by the Rules Committee, pursuant to a resolution introduced in the Board of Aldermen, on the 9th day of July, 1912.

Pursuant to the terms of said resolution this Committee was appointed to investigate the subject of push-carts and public markets, but in making this report, they are dealing only with the subject of push-carts, for the reason that on the appointment of the committee and after conferences among its members, the Committee decided that immediate steps should be taken to investigate and report with their recommendations, first on the subject of push-carts, for the reason that it seemed in the judgment of this Committee that the push-cart problem was the one that required immediate attention and on account of the conditions under which push-carts were operated, some immediate relief should be afforded.

Your Committee believes that a comprehensive system of public markets should be established as soon as possible, throughout the greater City, in sections most convenient to the public and adjacent to a railway or water route, so that supplies could be delivered directly to these markets by the farmers and truck gardeners in the immediate vicinity of New York. Your Committee will make a further report in regard to markets, within a short time.

In approaching the solution of the so-called push-cart problem, three facts must be borne in mind:

First—That the push-cart is an economic necessity and tends greatly to reduce the high cost of living for the people living in the sections of the greater City, where the push-cart has become an established factor in trade.

Second—That the push-cart business is a legitimate one, and the people engaged in this business are self-respecting merchants carrying on a legitimate business, and should be treated as such, and should be accorded proper facilities under which to carry on their business.

Third—That the push-cart is as much a necessity to certain sections of New York City as are large department stores and shops in other sections. That the quality of food and merchandise sold from these push-carts is in the main of as good a quality as can be bought anywhere else in the City, and much cheaper.

This Committee has made their investigation without the aid of any appropriation, and have given their time and consideration to the solution of this very important problem. As near as your Committee can judge, there are between five and six thousand push-carts in the greater City, about three thousand of these are on the lower East Side, probably fifteen hundred on the upper East Side, and the rest scattered. About 50 per cent. of these, as near as your Committee can judge, have licenses.

Subsequent to the appointment of this Committee by the Rules Committee the Committee made a thorough investigation of the Greater City in regard to pushcarts, and they found that the principal pushcart sections in the City were at follows:

The section from 106th to 116th sts., lying between 5th ave. and East River, known as "Little Italy."

The section along 1st ave., from 6th to 14th st.

The section on the lower east side, lying between the Bowery and the East River, North and South sts.

In Brooklyn the pushcart sections are known as the Siegel, Moore st. and Graham ave. Districts and the Brownsville District.

The pushcart, at the present time, does not seem to be a problem in The Bronx, Richmond or Queens.

In this investigation that the Committee made their purpose was to afford some immediate relief to these sections where the Committee found the pushcart problem, and the Committee felt that if they waited until permanent pushcart markets could be established, owing to the length of time it would take to acquire property and to erect buildings, that the term of the present Board of Aldermen would have had long since expired before these markets would be established. Therefore, in this investigation, it was the purpose of the Committee to find, if possible, open spaces in the City where it would be practicable to segregate the pushcarts, thus relieving the sanitary and congested conditions of the City streets in these sections, and at the same time placing the pushcart peddler in a market where he would have a permanent stand and could work up an established trade and not be required, as now, under the present ordinances, to move every twenty minutes. With that end in view, the first spaces which your Committee discovered as suitable space for the establishment of pushcart markets were the spaces under the Williamsburg and Manhattan bridges, the old Essex Market Court House, between Ludlow and Essex sts.; the blind alley, between the court house and the abandoned school, and the abandoned school and the available portion of the old Union Market.

From its investigation your Committee believes that the entire pushcart problem of the lower east side could be solved by the placing of these pushcarts in the spaces under the bridges, the Essex Market House, this blind alley and the abandoned school and the old Union Market. The president of the Borough of Manhattan has offered the use of the Essex Market Court House for a pushcart market. Your Committee has endeavored to obtain the use of the school house from the Board of Education for this purpose, but up to the present time has been unsuccessful.

In utilizing the spaces under the Manhattan and Williamsburg Bridges, in order to make the market a success, the streets adjacent would have to be closed to pushcart peddlers, otherwise the market would be a failure.

At the present time there are a good many pushcart peddlers under the Williamsburg Bridge who pay a dollar a week to the City for the privilege of standing under this bridge. But many complaints, and justly so, are received by the Comptroller's office, for the reason that at the present time a peddler is allowed to stand in all the streets adjacent, many times without even obtaining a license and without paying any revenue to the City, and sell his wares, thus taking away the business of the peddler who is under the bridge.

At the present time there are probably about 200 peddlers under the Williamsburg Bridge. From this small amount the City derives a revenue of about \$12,000 a year, and the total expenses are about \$3,000, making a clear profit to the City of about \$9,000 from City property which, unless rented for this purpose, would otherwise be useless as a revenue producer. If all the pushcart peddlers on the lower east side were placed under these bridges and in the Essex Market Court House there would be an additional revenue to the City of about fifty to seventy-five thousand dollars at very little additional expense. The Essex Market Court House and the old Union Market, with expenditure, could be placed in immediate con-

dition for occupancy by the peddlers. The bridge spaces are immediately available and would require no outlay of expense whatever. As to feasible spaces for the push-carts along 1st ave., from 6th to 14th sts., and from 106th to 116th st., from 5th ave. to the East River, your Committee has not been able at the present time to find suitable spaces. The section lying under the New York Central tracks from 106th to 116th st. would be, in the opinion of your Committee, a suitable place for a pushcart market, and it will be recalled that some years ago the peddlers were segregated in this place under the tracks, but your Committee has been advised by the Corporation Counsel that at the present time, under section 50 of the Charter, the Board of Aldermen has no power to preempt a public highway or any part thereof for a market, and the only way in which this space could be utilized for market purposes would be by application to the Legislature to amend the Charter. It necessarily follows that this opinion would apply equally to the space under the elevated tracks from 6th to 14th st. on 1st ave.

It would seem from the result of the Committee's investigation as to the pushcart problem in the Borough of Brooklyn that the only solution of the problem, in so far as it relates to this particular Borough, would be the erection or establishment of pushcart markets, as there are no available spaces in that Borough, similar to those in Manhattan, where pushcarts could be segregated and still be conveniently located to the people who do their marketing from these carts.

In Brownsville there is now what is termed the "Peddlers' Market," which consists of a one-story building leased, as your Committee is advised, by certain peddlers in that neighborhood who have joined themselves into an association in order to better their condition, but the result of that market is practically the same as the one at present under the Williamsburg Bridge; for as soon as the peddlers segregated themselves in this market in Brownsville and took their carts off the streets adjacent thereto other peddlers came and occupied the streets abandoned by the peddlers who went into the market, thus making it really of no advantage for the peddlers to remain in the market, on account of loss of trade and in order to protect themselves the peddlers who remained in the market were forced to place their carts on the street again. The condition of this peddlers' market is not of the best, and the food stuffs sold are not, in the opinion of your Committee, of as good a grade as were found elsewhere, and the conditions, if anything, under which food stuffs were sold, were more unsanitary. The Committee would recommend that the City, through its proper officials, should take steps as soon as practical, to acquire this market or erect one similar thereto in this section, which would be under the supervision and regulation of the Borough President and the Comptroller, and be frequently inspected by the Board of Health.

Other locations in Brooklyn suitable for pushcart markets and recommended by your Committee are the following:

The block bounded by Siegel st., Graham ave., Moore st. and Manhattan ave., 100 feet frontage on Siegel and Moore sts., running through the entire block. In Brownsville the block bounded by Sutter ave., Osborne st., Blake ave. and Thatford ave., 100 feet frontage on Sutter and Blake aves. This latter location is only a short distance away from the peddlers' market heretofore mentioned in Brownsville, and your Committee was informed at the public hearing which was held in Brooklyn in regard to pushcart locations, that these two locations could be obtained by the City for market purposes at a very small outlay.

As to the conditions under which the push-carts operate at the present time, the Committee find them most deplorable, both from a point of danger to life and limb and on account of their congestion in the streets, and also from a sanitary standpoint.

Your Committee found that during certain times of the day, between the hours of 9.30 and frequently as late as 6 or 7 o'clock, the streets, on account of the large number of push-carts, were impassable for any sort of vehicle, and it was with difficulty that your Committee were able to make their way through this congestion in order to make an inspection of the wares offered for sale. Your Committee found that frequently foodstuffs offered for sale were often placed on top of garbage cans which were filled with garbage; that half-clothed children were frequently found playing among the fruits and vegetables and other foodstuffs offered for sale; that the drippings from the carts caused stagnant pools to form under the carts; that the refuse from the push-carts were thrown indiscriminately in the streets, there to lie and decay until such time as the Street Cleaning Department could come along and remove the same. On account of these conditions, the condition of the streets were necessarily indescribably filthy, and whole blocks were so congested from this pushcart traffic that it would have been impossible, in case of fire, for the Fire Department to make their way through, and it is the opinion of your Committee that, unless these conditions are alleviated immediately, sooner or later there will be a frightful loss of life, either by people being trampled upon or on account of the Fire Department not being able to reach their destination with sufficient speed, owing to this congestion.

In approaching the solution of this problem, as before stated, the Committee have endeavored to act in a spirit of fairness to all interested in the solving of this problem, and, after the Committee had made this investigation, a public hearing was called during the month of July, which was widely advertised and at which appeared a large number of advocates of the segregation of peddlers, taking them from the streets and finding some convenient and suitable places in which they could ply their trade. A great many of the push-cart peddlers appeared also, either individually or by proxy or by the representatives of their organization.

The Committee have found that push-cart men, particularly in Manhattan, are well organized, and they are anxious to better their condition, and that at the hearing the peddlers appeared to be unanimous for the proposition to take them off the streets and give them suitable places to ply their trade, subjecting them to regulation, provided they could be placed in sections which would be convenient to the people who depend upon push-carts to do their trading. Your Committee has talked to a great many individual peddlers and to their organization representatives, and the Committee is informed and believes that the push-cart peddlers are now ready and willing to occupy these spaces under the bridges and Essex Market Court House, and such other places as could be found for them, provided ordinances could be passed to protect them in their trade when once they have submitted themselves to regulation.

As near as your Committee can ascertain, not more than 50 per cent. of the push-cart peddlers to-day have licenses, and the reason for the large discrepancy between the total number of push-carts and total number of licenses is that it has been the policy of the Bureau of Licenses, for some time past, to refuse to issue new push-cart licenses, on the ground of the great congestion which they created in the streets, and only renewal licenses were issued, and the natural result was that peddlers, finding they could not get a license, got a cart and commenced to peddle without one. The City authorities have tried to handle the push-cart problem along the lines of least resistance, until some solution of the problem could be found. Under the present ordinances, push-cart peddlers are supposed to move on every twenty minutes, but in the situation in which the push-cart problem is to-day, it would require practically the whole police force to make them obey this ordinance, leaving the police time for little else.

What better method of reducing the high cost of living than to establish pushcart markets, where the push-cart peddlers buy direct and sell direct, at the least possible cost? The segregation of the push-cart peddler would give to his business a permanency of character which it now necessarily lacks, and would guarantee him a permanent place of business to build up his trade, and would do away with his constant moving from place to place.

It is not the desire of the Committee to make a voluminous report, but to try and point out as briefly as possible what, in their opinion, would be the immediate solution of the push-cart problem. Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the following locations be designated by the Board of Aldermen for market purposes, and that the same shall be declared by the Board of Aldermen as public markets, and shall be set aside as a market for such purposes during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen, subject to such rules and regulations concerning fixtures, the order of doing business and the general management of said markets, as may be made by the Comptroller of The City of New York; that the moneys received by the City for market spaces under the bridges be received by the Comptroller and be applied toward the maintenance of said bridges; that section 6 of article 1 of chapter 1 of part 2 of the Code of Ordinances be amended so as to prohibit push-cart peddling in the following streets and highways of The City of New York, and providing for a penalty for failure to obey this ordinance.

Proposed ordinances, in accordance with this report, are hereto annexed, and resolutions calling upon the Health Department, Police Department, Bridge Department and the Street Cleaning Department to co-operate with the Board of Aldermen in placing the peddlers in these spaces:

1. The Essex Market Court House.
2. Blind alley, lying between Ludlow and Essex sts., between the old Essex Market Court House and the school.
3. So much of the premises at the junction of E. 2d st. and E. Houston st., bounded on the westerly side by Sheriff st., heretofore known and used as the Union Market, as may be available.

4. The spaces under the Manhattan Bridge, as follows:

(a) Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Cherry st. and the westerly line of the Manhattan Bridge approach; thence easterly to and around the anchorage of said bridge to the easterly point of intersection of the Manhattan Bridge and Cherry st.; thence northerly along the line of the said bridge approach to its intersection with Monroe st.; thence westerly to its intersection with Monroe st.; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; same being parcel I.

(b) Beginning at a point at the intersection of the westerly side of the Manhattan Bridge approach and the northerly side of Monroe st.; thence easterly to the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach on the east; thence northerly to its easterly intersection with Madison st.; thence westerly to its westerly intersection with Madison st.; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel II.

(c) Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Madison st. at its intersection with the Manhattan Bridge approach; thence easterly to its intersection with Madison st. on the east; thence northerly to its intersection with Henry st. on the east; thence westerly to its intersection with Henry st. on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel III.

(d) Beginning at a point at the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach and Henry street on the west; thence easterly to its intersection with Henry st. on the east; thence northerly to its intersection at the southerly side of East Broadway; thence westerly to its intersection with East Broadway on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel IV.

4. Space under the Williamsburg Bridge.

Bounded on the north by the northerly side of the Williamsburg Bridge approach at the intersection of Ridge and Delancey streets; running thence easterly to the line of the Williamsburg Bridge at the intersection of Cannon and Delancey sts.; thence west along the line of the Williamsburg Bridge to its intersection at Ridge st.; thence northerly to the point or the place of beginning.

Beginning at a point at the intersection of the westerly side of the Manhattan Bridge approach and the northerly side of Monroe street; thence easterly to the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach on the east; thence northerly to its easterly intersection with Madison street; thence westerly to its westerly intersection with Madison street; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel 2.

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Madison street at its intersection with the Manhattan Bridge approach; thence easterly to its intersection with Madison street on the east; thence northerly to its intersection with Henry street on the east; thence westerly to its intersection with Henry street on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel 3.

Beginning at a point at the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach and Henry street on the west; thence easterly to its intersection with Henry street on the east; thence northerly to its intersection at the southerly side of East Broadway; thence westerly to its intersection with East Broadway on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel 4.

Space Under the Williamsburg Bridge.

Bounded on the north by the northerly side of the Williamsburg Bridge approach at the intersection of Ridge and Delancey streets, running thence easterly to the line of the Williamsburg Bridge at the intersection of Cannon and Delancey streets, thence west along the line of the Williamsburg Bridge to its intersection at Ridge street, thence northerly to the point or place of beginning.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1.—The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 3, 1913 and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), to provide means for the purpose of paying for the expense of surveys, plans, specifications and other work in connection with the reclamation of submerged lands lying in front of Concourse Park, to be expended under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof, to the amount of the par value of the stock, to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

The concourse lands at Coney Island originally contained 70 acres. They have a sea frontage of 2,750 feet and a uniform depth of 1,000 feet. The shore front has materially changed at the eastern end and for a distance of over 500 feet along the shore the entire park lands have been washed away. An area of over 30 acres has disappeared at the eastern end and a small amount has been added to the west end. These lands are intersected on the north side, near the centre, by the renowned Ocean parkway. This drive, 210 feet wide, 5½ miles long, with the concourse lands and improvements, cost complete, approximately, \$1,000,000. The remaining portion of the concourse lands is alone worth many times this amount, and several million dollars would not compensate for the loss of these 30 acres of shore property.

The concourse was partly improved and opened to the public in 1876. The improvement consisted of a beach concourse made of bituminous concrete running the entire length of the ocean front, 100 feet wide, for carriages and pedestrians. It did not prove very durable, as in 1884 it was not fit to use and had to be replaced by a new covering, at a cost of \$30,000. It was located about 500 feet from the northern boundary. This concourse was protected on the shore side by an inclined asphalt surfacing 3 inches thick by 18 feet wide buried in the sand to low water mark and connected with the edge of the concourse concrete. It protected the concourse from being undermined by the waves when they came from the front, but proved useless when attacked obliquely at the side at the east end. During the storm which prevailed on November 24, 1885, the ocean face of the bituminous concrete upon the embankment of the concourse was carried away for a length of 250 feet by 15 feet in width at the eastern end. Several schemes were adopted in an endeavor to save the remaining beach front, but owing to the fact that the Park Department was unable to secure sufficient appropriation to properly protect this property these schemes failed.

The Brooklyn Engineers' Club, through the generosity of Mr. Alfred T. White, has offered a prize to the engineer who submits the best plans and specifications for the most economical method of reclaiming the lost acres of ocean front. There are 48 contestants entered in this competition. They are scattered all over this country and Canada. The engineering schools have also taken great interest in this problem and the engineering magazines have given it considerable publicity. There is no doubt that this competition will be the means of developing a rational scheme for reclaiming this beach property.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommended this appropriation of \$10,000 corporate stock, to be used by the President's office to prepare

plans to reclaim the concourse lands, and the problem is now being seriously considered by the administration. The success secured by the Manhattan Beach corporation in reclaiming the many acres of land washed away in front of their property demonstrates how readily and economically the concourse lands can be restored. In order to properly reclaim this land it will probably be necessary to build a strong and durable breakwater on the eastern boundary, from a secure point inland, southerly out to the sea, to the original or 1,000-foot shore line, turning the corner with an easy curve and running westward parallel with the concourse about 400 feet. It should be about 12 feet high above mean high tide, well put together with piles driven deep to protect it. It should be backed on the inside with earth or clay. The eastern front would act as a breakwater, shielding and protecting the property against the strong eastern current, which would then flow around the curve to the southern face of the barrier. Thus the natural direction of the current will be restored by the straight face of the sea wall. The building of this sea wall is not a problem of great magnitude, as might at first appear. The rock ballast can be had, in many cases, for the hauling of it, and the sand filling can be pumped in from the sea for less than ten cents per cubic yard. It can, therefore, be seen that the whole improvement would not be an expensive one, as the building of this wall is in no way an experiment. It has been accomplished at numerous points along the sea coast. Even if it was expensive, the best and most permanent things are always in the end the cheapest and most satisfactory. This broad embankment projecting well out to sea could be improved as a recreation pier, and would undoubtedly be a favorite resort in the summer time.

Inasmuch as the ocean front of the concourse grounds is limited, it is, therefore, advisable, in order to make a comprehensive system of coast protection, that the adjoining property owners on the east side of the concourse front should co-operate with the City in the construction and carrying out of such a system. The advantages of co-operating with the City can be readily demonstrated to the property owners between Manhattan Beach and the concourse lands. There is no question that it would be more economical to protect the entire ocean front, from Manhattan Beach to Dreamland Park, in one operation.

The old Iron Pier in Dreamland could be reconstructed and filled in with rock and thereby form a barrier at the west end of the boundary of the City land against the action of the ocean. Ocean parkway could be extended 1,000 feet southerly to the ocean and at its southern end a terminal feature or parking space could be provided for automobiles, etc. The old iron pier could be double decked and a municipal dancing pavilion established thereon, which would undoubtedly prove very popular and pay for the maintenance of the pier.

The improvement of this entire concourse land would probably not exceed one-half million dollars, and at the price for which the City will be compelled to pay for Dreamland Park the reclaimed portion of the concourse park will be worth over \$4,000,000.

The reclamation of the concourse lands, by affording protection for Dreamland Park, would undoubtedly increase the extent of the latter, and thereby add considerably to its value.

It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of corporate stock of The City of New York in the sum of eight thousand two hundred dollars (\$8,200), to provide means for the installation of an elevator in the New York County Court House, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Your Committee had general supervision of the entire expenditures and special direction of awarding the contracts for fireworks and illuminations. In awarding the contracts for fireworks the Committee pursued the following plan:

It received itemized bids from all dealers in fireworks in the vicinity and caused dummy samples to be furnished of each article to be used. The Committee decided to accept bids only from those firms having plants within the City limits and employing American labor. The contracts were awarded after careful examination by experts. Inspectors from the Comptroller's office sealed all shipments from the dealers before they left the premises and checked the same at the various receiving points. This procedure insured the receipt of the City of the exact fireworks contracted for and full value for every dollar expended.

The Committee believes that the various celebrations gave general satisfaction and were a proper and fitting recognition of Independence Day and that the avoidance in large measure of general disorder and casualties by which former unofficial demonstrations have been marred has justified the official regulation and observance of a "Safe and Sane Fourth."

The Committee was hampered by lack of time to make its necessary arrangements the fact that the appropriation did not become available until the 2d day of July. Should a similar celebration be contemplated for 1913, your Committee would earnestly urge an immediate appropriation, not only for the convenience of the Committee, but also for the reason that substantial economies might be accomplished in purchasing.

Your Committee desires to express the appreciation of the assistance rendered it by the offices of the Comptroller and Commissioners of Accounts and express its thanks to Messrs. Monroe, Withington and Mellick, the Committee appointed by the Comptroller to act with your Committee in considering the propriety of the proposed expenditures.

Section 1. No person who is not a citizen and resident of the State of New York shall be eligible to appointment or be employed in any or either of the departments of the City government, nor shall any person not a citizen and resident of this State, who may be so appointed or employed, have any valid claim against The City of New York for any salary, wages or compensation under or by virtue of holding an appointment or employment in either of the departments or branches of the City government.

Sec. 2. Any person holding any appointment or employed in any of the departments or branches of the City government who shall, while holding such appointment or employment, remove from within the limits of the City, shall be deemed thereby to have resigned such appointment, or abandoned such employment, and it shall be the duty of the head of every Department, or other person authorized to make appointments or give employment, to appoint or employ a resident of this City to the appointment made vacant, or employment so surrendered, by said removal from this City, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to appointments or employments for services or work to be performed for The City of New York outside the State of New York; nor to a temporary appointment or employment for a specified service or work where peculiar or exceptional qualifications of a scientific, professional or educational character are necessary. Prior to such temporary appointment or employment evidence in writing shall be furnished that the services or work to be performed cannot be well done by any citizen and actual resident of the State of New York who can be discovered, and that the non-resident person proposed to be appointed or employed is generally recognized as one possessing such exceptional qualifications in a high degree. No appointment or employment under this section shall be valid unless the consent of the Mayor shall be first obtained; and he may require the Civil Service Commission to pass upon the matter, and certify whether such appointment or employment be necessary, and whether the non-resident person proposed therefor be competent, and also necessary for lack of a citizen and actual resident of the State of New York who is competent.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect October 1, 1913.

No person or persons shall throw, cast or lay, or direct, suffer or permit any servant, agent or employee to throw, cast or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth or rubbish of any kind whatsoever in any street in The City of New York, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, except that in the morning before eight o'clock, or before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time.

It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, janitor or other person in charge of their respective buildings or premises, to keep the sidewalks and gutters in front thereof, swept and free from all manner of rubbish, paper and other light material.

The wilful violation of any of the foregoing provisions of this section shall be and is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars, or by imprisonment for a term of not less than one or more than five days.

Gentlemen—We, the undersigned, hereby petition your honorable Body to amend the Building Code by striking out that part of section 146 reading as follows:

The sills of all frame dwellings, except where the first floor is used for store or business purposes, shall be not less than two feet above the ground to the underside of the same.

The reasons for:

1. There appears to be no substantial reason for such a limitation.
2. This limitation of height of house sill to not lower than two feet above ground seriously interferes with the house beautiful in our valuable suburban sections. It prevents the true architecture of the colonial, the southern type of bungalow or craftsman house. All of which designs are supposed to give us the low rambling country house effect, with the near the ground terrace, porch and verandas, requiring no stair climbing or ladders between the house floor and the out-of-doors.

3. There seems no sanitary reason involved so long as cellars are provided under this class of house, and a shorter distance than two feet can amply provide for proper lighting and ventilating of cellars. Therefore the architect should not be hampered to exercise his merits to create correct proportion and still observe physical necessities for sanitation.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Report for Week Ending April 26, 1913.

COLORING MATTER IN FOODS.

In a letter recently received from a large chemical house, the writer states that one of his customers, a jobber in bakers' and confectioners' supplies, has informed him that an inspector of the Department of Health had asserted that coal tar colors, whether certified or not, could not be used in food in the City of New York. The writer thought that possibly the inspector's statement was incorrect, and requested information in regard to the department's attitude in the matter.

The present provisions of the Sanitary Code relating to the use of colors in foods are found in the following extract from section 68:

"Food shall be deemed adulterated if it be colored, whereby damage is concealed or it is made to appear better than it really is."

"In the case of confectionery poisonous colors are prohibited."

Injurious colors are also delarred under general sections. The department has never had a sufficient force of inspectors or chemists to safeguard our food supplies properly and fully. This year, by the addition of two chemists and ten inspectors, it has been possible to take up new lines of food work. The lack of definite standards and regulations has been felt, and the department is now engaged in the preparation of a code of food standards. They will soon be printed and distributed in tentative form, and the consumer and dealer will both have the opportunity to make suggestions. For the present, it is the intention of the department to follow the general plan of the Federal Government, requiring, in cases where colors are permitted at all, the use of certified or approved colors. The use of colors for fraudulent purposes will be prohibited, for example, the use of yellow coloring matter as a substitute for eggs in cake, or brown colors in place of chocolate or cocoa, and similar frauds.

The Commissioner of Health believes that the use of colors in foods has been entirely overdone, and that the public should be educated to discourage their use whenever there is a semblance of fraud involved. It is hoped and believed that the manufacturers of the City, knowing the position the Department takes with regard to coal tar colors will co-operate with the Department in its efforts to prevent deception and fraud in this direction.

USE OF COPPER SALTS IN THE "GREENING" OF FOODS.

In March, 1909, the question of the use of copper salts in the greening of foods was referred by the Secretary of Agriculture to a Referee Board of Consulting Scientific Experts. This Board conducted an exhaustive investigation, and the main general conclusions reached from a study of their experimental results and other considerations were as follows:

(a) Copper salts used in the coloring of vegetables, as in commercial practice, cannot be said to reduce or lower or injuriously affect the quality or strength of such vegetables as far as the food value is concerned;

(b) Copper salts used in the greening of vegetables may have the effect of concealing inferiority inasmuch as the bright green color imparted to the vegetables simulates a state of freshness they may not have possessed before treatment;

(c) In attempting to define a large daily quantity of copper regard must be had to the maximum amount of greened vegetables which may be consumed daily. A daily dose of 100 grammes of coppered peas or beans, which are the most highly colored vegetables in the market, would not ordinarily contain more than 100 to 150 milligrams of copper. Such a bulk of greened vegetables is so large, however, that it would hardly be chosen as a part of a diet for many days in succession. Any amount of copper above 150 milligrams daily may, therefore, be considered excessive in practice. A small quantity is that amount which in the ordinary use of vegetables may be consumed over longer periods. From this point of view 10 to 12 milligrams of copper may be regarded as the upper limit of a small quantity.

It appears from these investigations that, in certain directions, even such small quantities of copper may have a deleterious action and must be considered injurious to health.

It is apparent from the findings of the Referee Board that all foods greened with copper salts are positively adulterated under the first above-quoted provision of the law, and that in certain cases foods may be adulterated under the second above-quoted provision. As a result of this report, the Secretary of Agriculture stated that he would regard as adulterated under the Food and Drugs Act foods greened with copper salts which, on and after January 1, 1913, are offered for entry into the United States, or are manufactured or offered for sale in the District of Columbia or the Territories, or are shipped in interstate commerce.

At a meeting of the Board of Health held April 22, 1913, the following resolution was adopted, shaping the policy of the Department of Health to conform to that of the Federal authorities.

Whereas, It appears from scientific investigations that in certain directions, even in small quantities, copper may have a deleterious action and must be considered injurious to health; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board regards as adulterated, under the Sanitary Code, foods greened with copper salts; and be it further

Resolved, That on and after June 1, 1913, no foods greened with copper salts shall be brought into the City, held, kept or offered for sale therein.

RECENT REGULATIONS IN REGARD TO HOUSEBOATS.

Section 157a of the Sanitary Code of the Board of Health of the Department of Health adopted September 17, 1912, provides as follows:

Section 157a. No houseboat, while used or occupied as such, shall be moored, anchored or located in the waters of any inlet or bay, except the upper or lower bay of New York Harbor, without a permit in writing therefor from the Board of Health of said City, and subject to the rules and regulations of the said Board; and no persons shall use or occupy for living purposes any such boat so moored, anchored or located in the waters aforesaid, unless a permit for such boat has been issued as herein provided.

In the granting of permits referred to in the section above, the department in the past has held a houseboat to mean any covered boat, fitted up as a dwelling, or a boat with a deck cabin suitable for a dwelling and used for dwelling purposes and which contained no means of self propulsion, and the policy of the Department has been to grant no permits except where the boat has been provided with suitable receptacles for night soil, garbage, or other refuse or waste material except wash water. It has also been required that no refuse or waste material except wash water should be thrown into the waters where such boat is moored, anchored or located.

It was felt that the action of the Department in regard to houseboats should be more accurately defined, and on April 22, 1913, at a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following rules and regulations for the control of houseboats, be and the same are hereby adopted:

1. Each houseboat shall be provided and equipped with suitable receptacles for night soil, garbage, or other refuse or waste material, except wash water.
2. No refuse or waste material of any kind, except wash water, shall be discharged into the waters in which a houseboat is moored, anchored, or located.

IMMUNIZATION AGAINST TYPHOID FEVER.

Anti-typhoid immunization has been practiced by the Department since January 1, 1913. When a case is reported, the home of the patient is visited to obtain historical data bearing on sources of infection. At the same time and with the assent of the practitioner in charge, immunization is offered to members of the household. Three doses are administered, 7 to 10 days apart, the first one containing 500 million killed bacteria in glycerin suspension, the others 1,000 million each. Reactions are observed and adequate histories are filed.

Over twelve hundred injections have been given to about four hundred people, with no serious reaction. In the severest one on record there was nausea and vomiting, a marked chill, no rise in temperature, and considerable malaise. All of these symptoms subsided within 48 hours with no other ill effect. This reaction followed the first dose, the second and third causing only the mildest reaction.

Among those immunized but one person developed typhoid fever. This case was a child already in the stage of incubation, who came down two days after the initial dose. The course was exceptionally mild, an abortive form of the disease. It cannot be said in this case that the disease was possessed of little virulence, for two other children in the same family died with typhoid fever just before the culture was administered to the remaining members. There was no apparent reason for the favorable behavior in the third case, except the benign influence of the injected culture.

In a family of eleven there were two cases of typhoid. Immunization was offered to the remaining nine members. Eight accepted and did not contract the fever. The one who declined immunization did develop typhoid very soon thereafter.

In other instances within the experience of the Department, persons exposed to the disease and refusing the preventive treatment have succumbed. On the other hand none have developed it who have received immunization, with the single exception of the child mentioned, who was already infected and who ran so mild a course in the presence of a virulent type of the bacillus typhosus.

Foreign statistics corroborate these results. Thus there were 400 immunizations in the Maidstone Asylum, England, during an epidemic. Among these but 1 per cent. developed typhoid, whereas 14 per cent. among those not so treated contracted it.

The typhoid incidence in New York City has been low, and the opportunities for immunization comparatively few. As the season advances the injections will necessarily increase in number with the increasing incidence of the disease, and it is expected that a reduction in the percentage of direct contact infections shown in previous years will take place.

It has been thought inadvisable to administer the treatment to those having incipient or other tubercular lesions, as some writer intimates that exacerbations of the tuberculosis may follow such immunization. The Department therefore will not inject the culture in the presence of manifest tubercular or other serious lesions, until this question has been settled by further observation.

DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

There were 1,677 deaths reported and a rate of 16.28 during the past week, as against 1,529 deaths and a rate of 15.42 in the corresponding week of 1912, an increase of 148 deaths and .86 of a point in the rate. This increased mortality extended throughout all age groups, almost one-third of it taking place among children under five years of age. The increase was due to the comparatively large number of deaths reported from diphtheria and croup and whooping cough in the Borough of Manhattan. Among the adults there were 49 more deaths reported from heart diseases, 24 more from acute respiratory diseases, and 53 more from pulmonary tuberculosis.

The death rate for the first seventeen weeks of 1913 was 15.68 as against 15.80 during the corresponding period in 1912, the rate being thus .12 of a point lower during the present year up to date.



The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt of contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
