AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), to provide means for the removal of the piles and foundations of the "Old Iron Pier" and for the removal of other piers and jetties from the beach fronting Seaside Park at Coney Island, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 17, 1914, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New

York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved. That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby approves of the ssue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), to provide means for the removal of the piles and foundations of the "Old Iron Pier," and for the removal of other piers and jetties from the beach fronting Seaside Park at Coney Island under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid. Provided, however, that no part of the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized shall be available until after the Board of Estimate has approved forms of contracts, plans, specifications and estimate of cost pertaining to the same, and that no par: of such proceeds shall be used for the payment of fees of any architect, engineer or expert until after a contract with such architect, engineer or expert has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no part of the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized shall be used for payment of any salary or wage of departmental employees, except after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and in accordance with the schedules to be adopted by said Board; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, is directed to subrait to this Board for its approval forms of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost prior to advertising for bids for work chargeable to the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized, and such Commissioner is also directed to submit to this Board for its approval all preliminary and final agreements with an architect or architects, engineer or engineers, expert or experts, whenever such agreements or contracts are chargeable against corporate stock herein authorized.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and he hereby is authorized and empowered to enter into a contract or contracts, without public letting, for the rerovation of the Aldermanic Chamber in City Hall, and for new carpets, desks, chairs, tables, etc., to refurnish said chamber, and to construct a stairway between the second and third floors of City Hall, made necessary by the transfer of the offices of the Art Commission from the second to the third floor; the total cost of this work not to exceed \$16,000.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, JUNE 13, 1914.
BABY WEEK.

Of all the various activities of the Department of Health none has been productive of more gratifying results than the campaign directed against infant mortality. In 1904, of every 1,000 infants born in New York City, 162 died in the first year of life, while last year the rate was only 102. With approximately 135,000 births in 1913, this represents over 8,000 infant lives saved last year. The showing is still more striking when only the deaths from diarrhoeal disease are considered, for here the rate has fallen from 47 per 1,000 births to less than 23. Without depreciating in any way the influence of a better milk supply, it is safe to say that a very large share of this marked reduction in infant mortality must be credited to popular education in infant hygiene.

In order to still further arouse the public and thus to effect additional improvement in this direction, Mayor Mitchel has designated the week of June 20-26 as BABY WEEK, and has appointed a committee representing the various infant welfare activities to carry on an intensive campaign for the saving of infant lives. A million leaflets printed in three languages, are being distributed through the public and parochial schools, and through the agents of two large life insurance companies. Eight hundred moving picture theatres will exhibit slides calling attention to Baby Week. Thousands of hanging cards will be displayed by storekeepers throughout the city. A bill-posting firm has donated the use of fifty large spaces on its bill-boards, and space has also been donated on the sign boards of the elevated and subways. The newspapers, as usual, will contribute valuable assistance in the form of news articles, reading notices, etc. All the churches will aid, and provision has been made for special sermons concerning baby welfare. Much of the educational work of the campaign will center about the Milk Stations, and special lectures will be given there on matters of infant hygiene. The cordial response to the Mayor's call is extremely gratifying and to a large extent undoubtedly reflects the harmonious coordination effected by the organization of the Babies Welfare Association.

PHYSICIANS, TAKE NOTICE. The attention of physicians, dentists and veterinarians, is called to the fact that after July 1, 1914, the prescribing of habit-forming drugs is subject to the provisions of the so-called "Boylan Law." This applies to chloral, opium or any of its salts, alkaloids or derivatives, or any compound or preparation of any of these.

Prescriptions for the drugs just enumerated, must be written upon specially prepared official order blanks, serially numbered, and duplicated, furnished by the local Board of Health. Physicians, druggists, veterinarians and dentists must record the name and address of each person for whom any of these drugs are prescribed. A supply of the official order blanks has been ordered by the Department of Health and it is hoped it will be available for distribution within a few days.

In view of the wide-spread illegitimate use of habit-forming drugs, and of the inadequacy of existing laws to control the evil, it is hoped that physicians generally will heartily co-operate with the authorities, and comply both with the letter and the spirit of the new legislation.

The Boylan Law. Sale prohibited; exception. No pharmacist, druggist or other person shall sell, have or offer for sale or give away any chloral, opium or any of its salts, alkaloids or derivatives or any compound or preparation of any of them except upon the written prescription of a duly licensed physician, veterinarian or dentist, provided that the provisions of this article shall not apply to the sale of domestic and proprietary remedies, actually sold in good faith as medicines and not for the purpose of evading the provisions of this article and provided further that such remedies and preparations do not contain more than two grains of opium, or onefourth grain of morphine or one-fourth grain of heroin or one grain of codeine, or ten grains of chloral or their salts in one fluid ounce or if a solid preparation, in

one avoirdupois ounce, nor to plasters, liniments and ointments for external use only. 246. Prescriptions; certificates. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell at retail or give away any of the drugs, their salts, derivatives or preparations mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter except as herein provided without first receiving a written prescription signed by a duly licensed physician, veterinarian or dentist. The prescription must contain substantially the following: The name in full of the physician, veterinarian or dentist issuing such prescription, his office address, his office hours, and telephone, and the name, age and address of the person to whom and date on which such prescription is issued. It shall be unlawful for any duly licensed physician, veterinarian or dentist to issue any such prescription containing any of the drugs, their salts, derivatives or preparations mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter except after a physical examination of any person for the treatment of disease, injury or deformity. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell at retail any of the drugs or preparations of any of those mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five of this article without first verifying the authority of any prescription containing more than four grains morphine, thirty grains of opium, two grains of heroin, six grains of codeine or four drams of chloral. Such verification can be made by telephone or otherwise. Such prescription so received shall be filled out at the time of receiving the same for the full quantity prescribed and no prescription so received shall be filled out more than ten days after the date which said prescription be dated. Such prescription, from which no copy shall be taken, shall be retained by the person who dispenses the same and shall be filled but once. Such prescription shall be kept on the general prescription file and given a regular consecutive number on such file. On such prescription shall be inscribed the name and address of the purchaser making retail, furnishes or dispenses any of the drugs mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter upon a written prescription by a duly registered

physician or veterinarian or dentist shall at the time of dispensing the same, place upon the package a label or deliver therewith a certificate stating the name and address of the person selling or furnishing the same, the name and address of the physician, such purchase and the date upon which said sale is made. Any person who sells at veterinarian or dentist upon whose prescription such sale is made, the date of sale, and the name of the person to whom such sale is made. Any person, other than a manufacturer of any of the drugs mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five or a wholesale dealer in drugs or a licensed pharmacist, licensed druggist, duly registered practicing physician, licensed veterinarian or a licensed dentist, who shall possess any of the drugs mentioned in section two hundred and forty-five or their salts, derivatives or preparations, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, unless said possession is authorized by the certificate described in this section. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit the sale of any of such drugs by any manufacturing pharmacist or chemist or wholesale or retail pharmacists or druggists, or to hospitals, colleges, scientific or public institutions, except that such sales shall be made in the manner provided in the next succeeding section.

247. Order blanks; filing. The state commissioner of health shall prepare and furnish to all Board of Health or officers official order blanks, serially numbered in duplicate, bound in book form, with carbon or transfer paper between the duplicate pages. The said official order shall be furnished by the local health board or officer to any local, duly licensed physician, dentist, pharmacist, druggist or veterinarian, upon which must be written all orders for the purchase of any of the drugs enumerated in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter for the use of such physician, dentist, pharmacist, druggist or veterinarian. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, furnish or dispose to any physician, pharmacist, druggist, veterinarian or dentist any of the drugs enumerated in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter without first receiving from such physician, druggist, veterinarian or dentist an official order blank as provided in this section, which official order shall be retained by the person or corporation who sells, furnishes or dispenses any of the drugs enumerated in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter, and such official order shall be kept in a separate file or book and an entry made or caused to be made on the order stating the date of sale, the name and address of the purchaser and the name of the person making such sale.

248. Physicians, et cetera, to keep records. All physicians, druggists, pharmacists, veterinarians and dentists shall keep on record the name and address of each person to whom such physician, dentist or veterinarian administers or disposes in any way whatsoever any of the drugs enumerated in section two hundred and forty-five of this chapter, and the quantity so administered, disposed of or given away. Such record shall be preserved for five years and shall always be open for inspection by the proper authorities. Any violation of this section is hereby declared to be a mis-

DIPHTHERIA.

The appended standard table gives statistical data concerning diphtheria during the first quarter of 1914. Comparing this with the total of reported cases for the corresponding quarter of 1913, one notes an increase of 493 cases; 30 per cent. of this increase is accounted for by the fact that trial cultures were much more frequently taken than heretofore; so that with 622 trial cultures this year, 150 positive cases were discovered, as against one positive case out of 158 trial cultures during the corresponding quarter of 1913. Manhattan with 465 trial cultures, contributed the greatest number, 141 positive cases.

TYPHOID VACCINE BLAMELESS.

On May 11, 1914, Dr. Sidney E. Smith of 78 Arlington ave., Brooklyn, reported having immunized five patients in the Mercer family, where the family was ill with typhoid fever, beginning three weeks before. The injections were made on May 2d, the typhoid cultures used for immunization having been obtained from the Department of Health. Within twelve hours three of the children, who, he said, had been perfectly well prior to immunization, showed severe reactions, with temperatures ranging between 101 and 104, reaching 105 in the case of the eldest of the three children. The mother and aunt of the children were stated to have had a severe reaction lasting several days, but were improved at the time of the doctor's writing.

On May 18th, following a consultation with another physician, the illness of the immurized patients was tentatively diagnosed as "anaphylaxis," a phenomenon met with following injections of antitoxic sera. By May 20th the condition of the children was alarming and another consultation was decided on. This was held on May 22d, and was participated in by Dr. Krumwiede and Dr. Nicoll of the Health Department Research Laboratory, Dr. Blatteis, Pathologist of the Jewish Hospital, Brooklyn, and Dr. Sidney E. Smith, the attending physician. The clinical examination made by these physicians, subsequently confirmed by the result of laboratory investigations, showed that the children had typhoid fever, the result of infection prior to the immunizing injections.

Although the correctness of this diagnosis has been questioned, it may be stated that the Department of Health has abundant evidence to sustain its position. The blood examination made by Dr. Blatteis on May 21st, showed a marked diminution of the white corpuscles, with a relative increase in the proportion of lymphocytes. This is characteristic of typhoid fever. In so-called "blood poisoning" due to contaminated vaccine or to infection introduced at the point where the injection was made, just the opposite condition is found in the blood, that is, there is an increase in the number of white blood corpuscles and a relative fall in the proportion of lymphocytes.

Furthermore, in "blood poisoning," cultures made from the blood frequently show the presence of the contaminating germ. In this case such blood cultures, made May 20th, remained entirely sterile.

Moreover, the Widal test was positive even in a dilution of blood 1 to 1,000; such positive reactions are almost unknown after a single immunizing injection.

Finally, on May 21st, as conclusive evidence of the nature of the disease, the bacter ologists of the Research Laboratory of the Department of Health, found that the intestinal discharge contained typhoid bacilli.

The clinical course of the illness in Mrs. Mercer, conformed to the classical type of typhoid fever familiar to all experienced physicians, and the termination was likewise the all too-familiar one of intestinal hemorrhage, with death from shock. The cause of death as here given is taken practically verbatim from the official death certificate signed by the attending physician.

The entire history of this case bears out the contention of the Department made three weeks ago that these were all typhoid infections, and that the immunizing injections were in no way responsible.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT MAY DESTROY BITING AND VICIOUS DOGS.

A dog owned by William Scholand, No. 379 Park place, Brooklyn, having bitten a child on April 3d, and investigation by the Department of Health having shown that five other persons had been bitten by the same animal since September, 1910, steps were taken to destroy the animal in accordance with section 132 of the Sanitary Code. The dog was thereupon removed to the Health Department's Shelter for examination and observation.

Contending that the Department of Health had no right to destroy his dog, the owner applied to the Supreme Court, Kings County, for a writ of injunction. In denying this motion Mr Justice Aspinall rendered the following opinion:

"The Department of Health of The City of New York is charged by law with the imperative duty of preserving human life, and the care, promotion and protection of the lives of the inhabitants of this great City. The Department has acted in this manner pursuant to the provisions of section 132 of the Sanitary Code and has decided that the dog owned by the plaintiff in this action is a public nuisance and dangerous to public health and safety; in other words, that the said dog is rabid and vicious and should be destroyed by the Department. I am of

opinion that in a case like this the action of the Department of Health is not reviewable by a suit in equity. The action of the Department is administrative in its nature and not judicial, and may be effected without notice and without an opportunity to be heard, and its action is not reviewable by appeal or certiorari."

SCARLET FEVER.

In the standard table that follows, are presented the figures showing the occurence of scarlet fever for the first quarter of 1914. Comparing them with those for the corresponding quarter of 1913, we find a reduction of 244 cases in the total number reported from the five boroughs; this, notwithstanding that it is the season of its maximal prevalence, and that the population in this area has appreciably increased. It would appear just to attribute some measure of these results to the increased effectiveness of the supervision by Nurses.

MEASLES.

In the following standard table are given the figures relating to the prevalence of measles during the first quarter of 1914. A comparison with the figures for the corresponding quarter of 1913, shows a reduction of 1207 cases in the total number reported from the five boroughs. Sharp fluctuations in the curve showing the incidence of measles, are familiar, and this fact would go far to account for the very marked decrease experienced this year. The steady tendency toward mildness and freedom from complications in the manifestations of this disease noted during several of the preceding years, has again been strikingly evident this year.

The complaint has been referred to the County Medical Society, whose business it is to investigate such cases and prosecute them in court.

While anonymous complaints are always investigated, the Department of Health is often greatly hampered in doing effective work by not being able to make further inquiries of the complainant. Inasmuch as all inspectors of the Department are positively instructed under no circumstances whatever to reveal the name of any complainant, we urge all who make complaint to the Department of Health to sign their correct name and address.



SEC. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the grantees.

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said transmission line shall be held and enjoyed by the grantees from the date upon

which this contract is signed by the Mayor until January 1, 1938, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the grantees shall determine to exercise the privilege of renewal they shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the grantees and the

If the grantees and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the grantees shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as

shall be determined by three disinterested free-holders selected in the following manner: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the grantees; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and the r report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as hey may obtain by inquiries and investi-gations, without the presence of either party. They slall have the right to examine any of the books of the grantees and their officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual compensation shall, in any event, le less than that required for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual compensation shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the annual compensation theretofore prevailing shall continue until the new rate shall be determined, and the grantees shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual compensa-tion then determined over the previous annual compensation. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the grantees, each paying one-half thereof.

Second-As compensation for the privilege hereby granted the grantees jointly and severally agree to install equipment and furnish electrical current to the City without charge to

(a) Install, reserve and maintain for the exclusive use of the City, as an integral part of the generating and distributing systems of the grantees, generating machinery, sub-station apparatus, catles, switches and controlling apparatus up to the switchboards in the structures of the crainage chambers now or to be hereafter provided by the Board of Water Supply of the City for the unwatering of the pressure tunnels of the Catskill Aqueduct; said drainage cham-

(1) At or near Croton Lake at the shaft known as the Croton Lake Drainage Shaft;
(2) At or near the intersection of Clinton and South Streets at the shaft known as

and South Streets at the shatt known as No. 21 of the City Aqueduct; and

(3) In Morningside Park between West 120th and West 121st Streets, if the same were extended, at the shaft known as No. 11 of the City Aqueduct,

--sufficent in capacity to deliver 850 kilowatts

of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 2200 volts at each of the shafts Nos. 11 and 21 and 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 40,000 volts at the Croton Lake Drainage Shaft.

(b) Furnish when called upon by the Board of Water Supply or its authorized representatives electrical energy up to the capacity of 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 2200 volts at each of the shafts Nos. 11 and 21 and up to the capacity of 850 kilowatts of three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second at a pressure of 40,000 volts at the Croton Lake Drainage Shaft.

(c) Install and maintain for the use of the City wires, cables or other conductors and con-frolling apparatus up to the switchboards in the buildings or other structures owned by the City and used in the operation of the Catskill Aque duct; that is to say, gate-houses, offices, bridges and all other buildings and chambers used in the operation and maintenance of the aqueduct and aqueduct lands of the city which may be situated north of Battery Park in the Borough of Marhattan and south of the bundary line be-tween he Counties of Westchester and Putnam.

(d) Furnish whenever required two-phase or three-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second, at a pressure of 110 or more volts, sufficient for operating all motors and other apparatus as may be required for the maintenance and operation of the aqueduct.

(e) Furnish whenever required single-phase alternating current having a frequency of sixty (60) cycles per second, at a pressure of 110 or more volts, or direct current at a pressure of 120 or more volts, sufficient for lighting all said buildings, bridges and grounds as may be necessary, and for any and all other purposes as may be required in connection with the maintenance and operation of the aqueduct and appurtenant works and structures.

Any and all payments to be made or service to be rendered by the terms of this contract to the City by the grantees shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such raymer ts shall be made and such service rendered n addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the

State of New York.

Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, to operate upon a route upon all or any part of lands acquired for aqueduct purposes.

Fourth—The service hereby required to be rendered as payment for the rights hereby granted shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any pirpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the lease of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on

part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to service to be rendered as payment for the rights hereby granted, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth-The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of any of the grantees, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth-Should the grantees at any time fail to supply the service herein required as payment for the privilege herein granted in an efficient manner satisfactory to the Board of Water Sup-ply, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine, and all sums paid or deposited with the City shall be and become the property

of the City.

Seventh—It is understood by the parties hereto that the right herein granted is subject to any and every limitation imposed by law upon the use of the aqueduct lands outside of the present limits of the City or by any and every condition upon which such lands were purchased or acquired. It is understood also that no rights of any kind whatsoever are herein granted to or in any of the aqueduct lands lying within the present limits of the City.

Eighth—The transmission line hereby author-

ized shall be used only for the transmission of electrical current to and within the Counties of Westchester and Putnam of the State of New York, and shall not be used as a portion of or in connection with a transmission line extending into any other portion of the State of New York nor into any portion of any other state; provided that the Board may by resolution authorize the use of such transmission line for the transmission of electrical current from, to and within districts outside of said Counties of Westchester and Putnam, but the Board may, upon the adoption of such resolution, require such compensation for the additional right and prescribe such terms and conditions to govern the same as in its discretion it may deem proper. Ninth-The grantees shall immediately begin

the construction of ducts, conduits, poles and towers and the installation therein or thereon of wires, cables or other conductors and com-plete so much of such construction and inplete so much of such construction and in-stallation as shall be necessary to furnish the service herein required and stand ready to sup-ply the current herein required for the pur-poses of the Board of Water Supply, and the City of New York on or before October 1, 1914; otherwise this right shall cease and de-termine; provided that the time for completion of such construction and installation and the of such construction and installation and the commencement of current supply, as required, may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time shall not exceed twelve months; and provided further that when the completion of the construction or installation or the delivery of current shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement or from other causes not within the control of the grantees, then such time may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the grantees and crowided further that cuted by the grantees and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the grantees shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay and shall have delivered to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the grantees shall in writing consent that the Board, either in its own name as a

sent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or the termination of the rights hereby the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, the conduits, poles, towers, fixtures, wires, cables and equipment of the grantees constructed pursuant to this contract shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any currous whotever. posed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the grantees shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any part or all such conduits, poles, towers, fixtures, wires, cables and equipments constructed pursuant to this contract and the aqueduct lands shall be restored to a condition satisfactory to the Board of Water Supply at the sole cost and expense of the granteer. of the grantees.

Eleventh.—The grantees shall comply with all laws, ordinances or rules of the local authorities having jurisdiction over the construction, maintenance or operation of the transmission line herein authorized.

Twelfth—The position of said transmission line upon said aqueduct lands shall be such as shall coincide with that designated and fixed by the Board of Water Supply. Before any work of construction or installation herein authorized shall be commenced, the grantees shall submit to the Board of Water Supply plans and specifications which shall show and specify in detail the charwhich shall show and specify in detail the character of the structure or structures proposed by the grantees and the location of the same upon City land. Said plans and specifications must be approved by the Board of Water Supply before such work shall be commenced. The work of construction and installation shall be under the supervision of the Board of Water Supply, and any rules or directions given by said Board shall be complied with by the grantees. If in the opinion of the Board of Water Supply it shall become pressure to change at any time during become necessary to change at any time during the term of this contract the location or the character of the construction or installation of said transmission line for the protection of life or property, or if in the opinion of said Board it shall become necessary for the City to use during said term any part or all of the lands upon which the structures herein authorized shall ated for any of the purposes for which said lands were acquired, then the grantees shall make at their own expense such changes in the character of the construction or installation or changes in the position of such structures on said Aqueduct Lands as directed by the Board

of Water Supply.

Thirteenth—All structures and appurtenances erected hereunder shall be kept in good and safe repair and in accordance with the instructions given by the Board of Water Supply.

Fifteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the grantees, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract, by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the grantees of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, or the Board of Water Supply, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the furnishing of service herein required for the privilege hereby granted, and the maintenance of the property in good and safe condition throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the grantees of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceed-ings; or after default in the payment of the an-nual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' no-tice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board or Board of Water Supply, acting hereunder, the grantees shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collec-

tion of the penalties in this contract shall be as

follows: The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the grantees, directing their Presidents, or any one of them, or other officers to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the grantees should not be pen-alized in accordance with the foregoing pro-visions. If the grantees fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear in the judg-ment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the grantees shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or pro ceeding or right under the provisions of this con-tract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies

or causes of action belonging to the City.

Sixteenth—The grantees shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the transmission line and its appurtenances authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of he same, and the grantees hereby agree to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or de-fault of the grantees. The grantees shall pay all taxes on all property constructed or maintained pursuant to this contract and shall reimburse the City for all taxes upon said property which the City may be required to pay and shall reimburse the City, its officers and agents for any and all costs or expenses whatsoever of every name and nature to which the City may be put by reason of the construction, operation or main-tenance of the transmission line and its appur-tenances and shall save the City, its officers and

agents harmless therefrom.

Seventeenth—If at any time the powers of the Board or of the Board of Water Supply, or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or the Board of Water Supply or other authorities, officer or

officers. Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as reviving or validating any lapsed or invalid franchise heretofore granted to any of the grantees herein or to their prede ressors, or as enlarging or adding to the powers or privileges contained in said grants of franhises or as waiving any forfeiture thereto.

SEC. 4. Each of the parties of the second

part, jointly and severally, promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

SEC. 5. This contract shall not become operative unless and until the grantees shall procure and cause to be executed an agreement which shall be proved in proper form for record and duly delivered to the Board, by which the Northern Westchester Lighting Company and the Peeks-kill Lighting and Railroad Company shall agree with each other, with the Westchester Company and with the City to furnish, whenever called upon by either the Westchester Company or the City, such service as may be required by the Westchester Company in order to supply to the City the electrical current necessary to fulfill terms of this contract, and by which the said Northern Westchester Lighting Company and the said Peekskill Lighting and Railroad Company shall further agree with each other, with the Westchester Company and with the City to permit the Westchester Company to use so much of their facilities as shall be necessary to carry out the provisions of this contract. Upon the failure of either or any of said Companies to furnish such service or to permit the use of said facilities for any reason at any time here-after, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine and this contract shall be null and void and of no effect.

The City of New York will rot be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will

permit. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations while the telephone the state of the state tions shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per century.

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The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
