

#### Santary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 1, 1885:

August 1, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,018.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,042.

During the past week 533 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 86 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 13 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 203 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 203 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 26 visits were made, and 5 disinfections and 2 furnigations were performed, visits to tenement-houses, 160; visits to families, 1,158; number of sick children visited, 51.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 3.

The number of vaccinations performed was 17, of which 4 were primary and 13 re-vacci-

nations

There were seized and condemned 6,550 pounds of meat, and 5,906 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 112; the number of analyses of same made was 3; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 204; the number of arrests made was 5.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 22,518 privies; 16,386 yards; 13,384 cellars; 19,442 garbage boxes; street gutters and culverts, 137½ miles; vacant lots 4.

The certificates of 566 births, 50 still-births, 161 marriages, and 926 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 1, 1885. This shows an increase of 110 births, and 10 still-births, and a decrease of 1 marriage and 168 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 61 births and 79 marriages, an increase of 200 deaths and the same number of still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small now decreased. 79 marriages, an increase of 200 deaths and the same number of still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 9; scarlatina, 5; diphtheria, 11; whooping cough, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 83; inanition, 5; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 6; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 14; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydro-cephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 26; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 15; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 9; sucide, 1; and drowning, 6; while the deaths from croup increased 5; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; alcoholism, 6; heart diseases, 23; direct effect of solar heat, 2; apoplexy, 1. The number of deaths from erysipelas, cancer and cyanosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks.

The ages of 359 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 442 under two years, 484 under five years, and 49 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 280 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 52.27 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 172 were in institutions, 556 in tenement-houses, 182 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 161 on the first, 210 on the second, 171 on the third, 148 on the fourth, 44 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 926 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 44 were stated to be single, 162 married, 71 widowed, and the condition of 649 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 926; still-births, 50; bodies in transitu, 20; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 128 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 566 births, 161 marriages, 50 still-births, 926 deaths; 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 63 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 1, 1885, was 79.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.818, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 735, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.40 inch depth of water, as reported by D. DEAR SIR-In answer to your letter of the 18th instant, I return the following, to wit: There were 14,557 complaints or orders received by the Attorney from January 1, 1884, to

Inere were 14,557 complaints of orders received by the Attorney from January 1, 1604, to July 1, 1885.

The number of civil suits to enforce the same begun during the same period was 2,265, of which 1,546 were discontinued by the Board of Health, and 42 were dismissed by the Court.

There were 64 judgments opened after recovery, none by consent, except where there was a mistake in an adjourned return day, or there appeared to have been no personal service of summons. There are still many other cases, in which the summons is indorsed "not served;" such cases are simply dropped, and are neither discontinued by the Board or disposed of by the Court, but new suits are brought or the order is enforced by criminal proceedings.

The list annexed hereto contains the names of the judgment debtors; of these judgments the following were paid, to wit:

—the amount of the judgment being for the penalty of \$50, and costs of \$9.50. The judgments in the annexed list are for the like penalty of \$50, and the costs of the action. It is proper to remark that since June 11, 1878, the rule of the Board of Health has been to discontinue all suits without costs, on proof that the orders have been complied with. The Marshal has taken every judgment to enforce, and if not successful in a few cases where the work has not been done, transcripts have been filed, but where the judgment is by default and ownership is denied, or the summons has not been served, the Court opens it as a matter of course on application.

Every judgment paid has been turned over to the City Chamberlain at the end of the month. There were 156 criminal prosecutions begun during the same period; in addition about 15 persons were arrested and discharged, and a very large number of petty offenders were arrested, most of whom were fined and some were discharged.

In answer to the ninth question, I may say that no criminal prosecutions were discontinued by the Department after arrest was made, but some defendants have demanded an examination and adjournments, and in the meantime have abated the nuisances. In such cases, not infrequently, the justice has finally dismissed the case. There are great delays possible in criminal cases, and those cases in which the defendants elect to be tried at the General Sessions fall into the District Attorney's exclusive control.

No certain answer can be given as to the number of cases dismissed at the trial, except from the Court records. Petty offenders are dealt with by the Courts in their discretion.

For the names of persons convicted criminally, see list of criminal cases annexed. The Court records must be consulted to see if the fines are paid. Such fines are paid directly to the Clerk of

To ascertain the fines remitted after conviction, the Commissioners of Accounts must consult the records of Special and General Sessions. The question relates to the discretion of the Court, and it is contrary to custom for the Attorney to seek to interfere, when the facts have once been presented to the Court. I know of no such cases.

Transcripts were filed in the County Clerk's office in eleven civil cases. For these and for the executions \$14.08 were paid in fees to the Sheriff and the County Clerk. Nothing has yet been paid to the Department on these executions.

There have been one hundred executions issued in civil cases during the same period.

In addition there were 351 cases under the Plumbing law sent to the Attorney for prosecution, and 22 cases nnder the Tenement-house law during the same period, also a suit for an injunction against the Fire Department, which was sustained by the Court at General Term, and the Fire Department was restrained from taking away from the Health Department the possession of the premises No. 128 Worth street, used by the Ambulance and Disinfecting Corps of the Health Department, and as a Laboratory.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
