Approved Papers for the week ending Saturday, October 5, 1889.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles F. Petry to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb-line, in front of his premises, No. 976 Tenth avenue, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 24th day of September.

Present—Commissioners McClave, Voorhis, MacLean, and Martin, Commissioner Martin in the chair.

Bureau of Elections.

Resolved, That the "New York Tribune" and the "New York Daily News" be designated as the newspapers for the advertising required under section 1929, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, at the usual rates, Commissioners Martin, McClave, and Voorhis voting aye, Commissioner MacLean voting no.

Resolved, That the proposition of the Ducker Portable House Co. for the erection of seven houses or booths for use of election officers on days of registration and election, in October and November next, said houses to be 12 x 16 feet in size, to have two doors and four windows to each house, to be furnished and set up for 1889, stored for one year and reset up in 1890, for the sum of \$140 each house, be and hereby is approved and accepted.

The Construction or Executive Committee report:

That Clinton Stephens, the contractor for the construction of roads and highways in Putnam County, New York, has requested the Aqueduct Commissioners to lease to him until such time as the same shall be required for aqueduct purposes, the old buildings standing on Parcels of land Nos. 18, 23, 33, 35 and 37, taken for reservoir purposes, in Putnam County, New York, and as the Chief Engineer reports that said property will not be covered with water for some time, and recommends that the use of the buildings referred to be given to Clinton Stephens, at a rental of \$150 per year, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature, Chapter 449, Laws of 1889, which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the City of New York, in writing, of his intention of paving, repaving or repairing the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed for paving, repaving or repairing the same, and that he assigns and releases thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repave, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the lot shall be the lot therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in front of adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for paving, repaving or repairing the same. The Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until such work is authorized by ordinance by the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meter is now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter water.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Changes for so-called extra water rents of every nature, as to paving, repaving or improving streets, or consumption of water, may be practicable, and may be modified, after, amend and increase such scale from time to time.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS, shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and shall be paid by the owners of the different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as may be practicable, and may be modified, after, amend and increase such scale from time to time.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1889, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws of 1887, the Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and shall be paid by the owners of the different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as may be practicable, and may be modified, after, amend and increase such scale from time to time.

All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall be a charge and lien upon the buildings upon the expiration of meters, their construction and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law. * * *

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses and the premises that one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERSIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARKER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combining and stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PERCHES.—For each one building brick laid, thirty cents per thousand; for plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DISH SALVAGE.—For each and every dish or tin of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

FOR RATES not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORN TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; and for each additional trough, ten dollars per annum; to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for water, be charged for each and every lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each wash-tub.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents per annum; for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-clocks, stop-cocks, ball-cocks, or other devices, the sum of five dollars per annum, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper, or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the building, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at the lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-valve, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1889, water-meters, approved patterns, shall be hereafter placed on all premises supplying all stores, work-shops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1889, that "all expenses of meters, their construction and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied
