

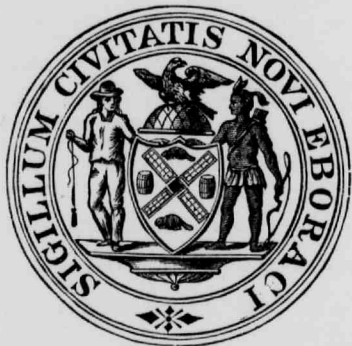

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the order numbered No. 1 in above-named premises.

Resolved, That the resignations of Assistant Sanitary Engineer Owen and Assistant Resident Physician Fisher, be and are hereby accepted, to take effect May 31.

Resolved, That leave of absence of three weeks be and is hereby granted to Miss Holden, nurse at Riverside Hospital.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to amend the death register as follows:

The following resolution was presented by the Sanitary Committee and laid on the table for consideration:

Resolved, That in the exercise of the discretion imposed by section 13 of the Tenement House Acts, this Board will in future be guided by the following rule:

1st. Tenement or apartment houses not more than five stories in height, may cover seventy-eight per cent. of the lot; six stories in height, seventy-five per cent.; seven stories in height, seventy per cent.; eight or more stories in height, not more than sixty-five per cent.

2d. In the case of corner lots, which are exempted from the sixty-five per cent. clause of the Tenement House Acts, the Board will require in future, that where the building is more than eight stories in height, a clear open space ten feet in width shall be left at the rear of the lot.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,618, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 703 tenement-houses, 102 private dwellings, 43 other dwellings, 24 manufactories and workshops, 32 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 57 slaughter-houses, 2 ash dumps, 1 tannery, 1 gas works, 2 public sewers, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 71 yards, courts, and areas, 90 cellars and basements, 176 waste pipes and drains, 173 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 13 dangerous stairways, 10 smoky chimneys, 4 cesspools, and 9 other nuisances.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 519.

During the past week 212 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

107 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

165 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 112 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 109 houses, 109 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

10 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 443 births, 46 still-births, 200 marriages, and 643 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 26, 1883. This shows a decrease of 70 births, 142 marriages, and 85 deaths, and an increase of 9 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was a decrease of 22 births, 11 still-births, 14 marriages, and 45 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 17; scarlatina, 6; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 11; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 14; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preterm births, 3; suicide, 1; and drowning, 7; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 8; whooping-cough, 2; erysipelas, 10; typhus fever, 1; pneumonia, 4; convulsions, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 9; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3. The number of deaths from croup and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 330 in tenement-houses, 149 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 16 were on the basement floor, 117 on the first, 155 on the second, 103 on the third, 74 on the fourth, 18 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 625 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 18 non-residents; 81 were stated to be single, 170 married, 92 widowed, and the condition of 300 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 643; still-births, 46; bodies in transit, 21; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 58 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 443 burials; 200 marriages; 46 still-births; 643 deaths; 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 73 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 43 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 26, 1883, was 64.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.633, the mean humidity was 62, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,345, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.22 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 588 deaths and still-births, or 85.34 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 11; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 236; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 76; Greenwood (undenominational), 46; Lutheran, (undenominational), 88; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 49; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 15; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 0; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending May 19, 1883, was 704; this is 35 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1882, and 79.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.88 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,313,236.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1883.

CHAPTER 375.

AN ACT to limit the carrying and sale of pistols and other fire-arms in the cities of this state.

Passed May 10, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. No person under the age of eighteen years shall have, carry or have in his possession in any public street, highway or place in any of the cities of this state, any pistol or other fire-arms of any kind, and no person shall in such cities sell or give any pistol or other fire-arms to any person under such age.

Sec. 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and in all trials or examinations for said offense the appearance of the person so alleged or claimed to be under the age of eighteen years shall be evidence to the magistrate or jury as to the age of such person.

Sec. 3. Nothing herein contained shall apply to the regular and ordinary transportation of pistols or fire-arms as articles of merchandise in said cities, or to the carrying of a gun or rifle through a street or highway of any city, with the intent to use the same outside of said city; nor to any person under such age carrying any pistol or other fire-arms under a license given by the mayor of said cities; but no licenses so given shall be in force more than one year from its date, and all such licenses may be revoked at the pleasure of the mayor, and a full, complete and public record shall be kept by the mayor of said cities of all such licenses, and the terms and date thereof.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 380.

AN ACT to repeal sections eight and nine of chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to protect primary elections and conventions of political parties, and to punish offenses committed thereat."

Passed May 11, 1883.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section nine of chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to protect primary elections and conventions of political parties, and to punish offenses committed thereat," is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 415.

AN ACT to repeal chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act for the removal of the reservoir situated in the city of New York between Fortieth and Forty-second streets," and parts of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the local and special laws affecting the public interests in the city of New York."

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act for the removal of the reservoir situated in the city of New York between Fortieth and Forty-second streets," is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Sections one hundred and thirty, three hundred and forty-nine, six hundred and eighty-five and eight hundred and ninety-six of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the local and special laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this act contained shall interfere with or prevent the payment by the comptroller of the city of New York of any expenditures heretofore incurred by the commissioner of public works of said city, in pursuance of said chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, and the unexpended balance of the appropriations heretofore made for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said act shall be applicable to the payment of such expenditures as may become necessary in order to reconnect the said reservoir with the water pipes and to make the same useful and efficient for the purposes of the water supply of said city.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 419.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and eighty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act for the relief of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley and Thomas S. Kirkpatrick."

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Chapter four hundred and eighty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act for the relief of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley and Thomas Kirkpatrick," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. The comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized to audit, and if in his judgment the said claims are just and proper, to pay the claims of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley, and Thomas Kirkpatrick, against the city of New York, for merchandise furnished to the board of aldermen and the board of assistant aldermen of the city of New York, and the board of supervisors of the county of New York, prior to the year eighteen hundred and seventy-two, upon proof of the market value of the said merchandise at the time when furnished, and proof that the same was ordered by resolution of the said board of aldermen, assistant aldermen and supervisors respectively.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 420.

AN ACT to provide for the leasing of certain lands in the city of New York.

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are authorized and empowered, in their discretion, to lease for a term of years with renewals to the West Washington Market Company, any unoccupied lands now owned by said city or any land which may be hereafter acquired by said city for market purposes, on such terms, conditions, and stipulations, and for such rent as the said commissioners of the sinking fund may fix and determine.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 425.

AN ACT to provide for the construction and maintenance of four free public baths in the city of New York.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, by the commissioner of public works of said city, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain four new free public floating baths in said city, and said additional baths shall be constructed on such plans as the commissioner of public works shall deem proper, but the materials and labor necessary for such construction shall be procured by contracts made at public letting with the lowest bidder, pursuant to the provisions of the general laws and ordinances which regulate the procurement of materials and labor for said city, and the said baths shall be and remain under the exclusive control and management of the department of public works of said city.

Sec. 2. The board of estimate and apportionment of said city is hereby authorized to appropriate such sum as will be necessary to pay for the construction of the said four floating baths, and

the comptroller of said city shall certify the amount so appropriated to the board of aldermen, and such amount shall be included in the final estimate, and raised by taxation in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three. Said comptroller is hereby authorized to provide for the payment of the amount so appropriated, in anticipation of its collection by taxation, by the issue of revenue bonds, and such amount shall be paid, upon the certificate of the commissioner of public works, when the baths are completed.

Sec. 3. When the said four new public baths shall be completed and ready for public use, the commissioner of public works shall at once proceed to sell at public auction, after due advertisement, and in accordance with the provisions of law regulating the sale by auction of personal property of said city, the two oldest free public floating baths now owned by said city, and the proceeds of such sale shall be deposited with the chamberlain of said city, to the credit of the general fund.

Sec. 4. Such four new public floating baths shall be located at such available places along the water front of said city as the commissioner of public works may deem most suitable for the accommodation and convenience of the public, and the department of docks of said city shall, upon the request of the commissioner of public works, forthwith provide and designate, free of charge, such locations, at which the baths herein authorized to be constructed shall be permanently located and maintained, except when in winter quarters, and which location shall afford accessible, convenient and safe berths for said baths.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 426.

AN ACT relative to the office of the commissioner of jurors in the city and county of New York.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of estimate and apportionment shall annually include in its final estimate the sum of five thousand dollars for the salary of the commissioner of jurors of the city and county of New York as now fixed by law, and in addition thereto, such further sum as they shall deem necessary for the contingent expenses of the office of said commissioner, including the reasonable compensation of his assistants, clerks and messengers, and for necessary printing and advertising, and for books, stationery, and other necessary expenses for the convenient and proper discharge of the duties of the commissioner of jurors. And for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, the board of estimate and apportionment is hereby authorized and directed, on or before the date of the certificate of the comptroller of the city of New York, required by law to the board of supervisors of said city, to appropriate in addition to the amount heretofore appropriated in the final estimate for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three for such purposes such sum as they shall deem necessary in addition to the amount heretofore appropriated for said year, which amount shall be added to such final estimate and included in the tax levy in such year, and the said comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to pay the same when required after such appropriation shall have been made by the said board of estimate and apportionment.

Sec. 2. The commissioner of jurors shall from time to time, as he may determine, fix the salaries to be paid to his assistants, clerks and messengers, subject to the approval of the board of estimate and apportionment, and such salaries shall be paid monthly by the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York.

Sec. 3. The fees known as jurors' fees or fines shall be paid monthly into the city treasury for the benefit of the sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt.

Sec. 4. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 427.

AN ACT to authorize and direct the comptroller of the city of New York to pay the salary of James E. McVeany, as one of the assistant aldermen of the city of New York.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The comptroller of the city of New York be and he is hereby authorized to pay unto James E. McVeany, of the city of New York, the sum of two thousand dollars, the salary fixed by law, and belonging to the said McVeany, as assistant alderman of the ninth assembly and assistant aldermanic district of the city of New York, from the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, until the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, withheld from said McVeany, pending his contest for said office, and while it was wrongfully occupied by one Peter Culkin, who has since been adjudged by the courts to have usurped said office; and that said comptroller pay the lawful interest upon said claim from the said first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine.

Sec. 2. The said comptroller is authorized to pay the same out of any unexpended appropriation in his hands, and, if necessary, that he cause the same to be inserted in the tax-levy for the following year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 428.

AN ACT to enable the commissioners of public charities and corrections of the city of New York to purchase land outside of the county of New York for the purpose of furnishing additional facilities for the care and maintenance of the inmates of the institutions under the control of said commissioners, and to regulate the control thereof.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of public charities and corrections of the city of New York are hereby authorized and empowered to expend the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, heretofore appropriated for that purpose by the board of estimate and apportionment of said city, and such further sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the said board for the same purpose, in the purchase of and taking title, in the name of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, to such land or lands situated outside the county of New York as may in the opinion of such commissioners be suitable for the purpose of providing additional and improved facilities for the care and maintenance of such inmates of the institutions under the control of said commissioners as are now or may hereafter be committed to their charge.

Sec. 2. Such land or lands when so purchased shall be deemed to be and shall be under the control of the said commissioners of public charities and corrections, and may be improved and used by them for the purpose aforesaid. All laws applicable to the powers and jurisdiction and control of the said commissioners of public charities and corrections which are applicable to the other premises, buildings and institutions under their charge shall be deemed to apply to said land or lands, and to all buildings and erections which may for said purpose be placed and maintained by said commissioners thereon.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 430.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York."

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sections five hundred and sixty-two, five hundred and sixty-three, five hundred and sixty-four and five hundred and sixty-five of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the City of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 562. Whenever, in the opinion of the board of health, the protection of the public health requires the drainage of any lands in said city, by means other than sewers, such board may adopt a resolution, describing the location of such lands, and directing the proper drainage thereof, and the construction of drains therefor, by the commissioner or commissioners of the department of said

city having jurisdiction to construct sewers in that part of said city where such drainage is required. Such board of health shall thereupon cause a map to be made, whereon shall be shown the location of such proposed drains, and the lands required for the construction thereof. Such resolution shall be entered at length in the record of such board of health, and such map shall be filed in such health department. A copy thereof shall be filed in the office of the register of the city and county of New York. Such board of health shall cause another copy of said map, together with a copy of such resolution, to be delivered to the commissioner or commissioners of the department of said city, who shall by such resolution be required to construct such drains, and the said commissioner or commissioners of said department with whom a copy of the said map and resolution shall be so filed, shall immediately thereafter have the power, and they are hereby directed to make and adopt proper and suitable plans for the construction of such drains.

§ 563. It shall be the duty of such commissioner or commissioners, upon the receipt of such map and resolution, and immediately after they have made and adopted suitable plans for such drains, through the counsel to the corporation to said city, to take immediate and proper proceedings for the acquirement of a right of way over, under or through the lands shown upon said map to be necessary for such drains, and it shall be the duty of such counsel to the corporation immediately to take such proceedings and conduct them to a speedy determination.

§ 564. The right of way over, under or through the lands so required for such drains shall be taken and acquired in the manner required by law for acquiring title to lands in said city to be used as public streets. Provided, however, that the time or times provided in such law for the giving or publication of any notice shall, for the purposes of this section, be reduced one-half, and the time for the sitting of the commissioners of estimate and assessment to hear objections to their report is, for the purposes of this act, hereby made two days in the place of ten days. Any maps, plans or surveys that may be required for the use of the commissioners of estimate and assessment to be appointed in such proceeding, shall be furnished by the department charged with the construction of the drains and shall be prepared and made by surveyors in the regular and stated employment of such department; neither the expense of such surveys, nor any other expenses other than the fees of the commissioners of estimate and assessment, attending the proceeding, and their necessary disbursements for clerical services in carrying out the provisions of this act, which clerical expenses shall not exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, and also for advertising, printing or posting any notices required by law, and for any other necessary incidental expense, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, shall be included in the assessment that may be made by such commissioners of estimate and assessment. The counsel to the corporation shall not be entitled to any compensation for services to be rendered by him in such proceeding other than his stated salary. The commissioners shall each be entitled to receive the following rates as compensation for their services in full: Where the drain to be constructed is five hundred feet or under in length, the sum of twenty-five dollars; where the drain exceeds five hundred feet in length, twenty-five dollars, and in addition thereto five cents per foot for each running foot of drain in excess of five hundred feet, but the compensation of each commissioner shall in no case exceed two hundred and fifty dollars.

§ 565. Upon the confirmation of the report of the commissioners of estimate and assessment by the court, the commissioner or commissioners of the department in said city having the charge of the construction of such drains, as herein proposed, shall have the power, and they are hereby directed to immediately make and construct said drains. The necessary cost of such drains, together with necessary expenses of levying the assessment therefor, shall be levied, assessed and collected in the same manner as is authorized by law for the construction of sewers in said city.

CHAPTER 431.

AN ACT authorizing the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York to release certain lands in said city.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York are hereby authorized, by and with the approval and assent of the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York, to release to Gerard Beekman and James W. Beekman all the right, title and interest, if any, of said corporation in and to a certain triangular strip of land situate in said city, bounded northerly by the southerly line of Sixty-fifth street, westerly by the easterly line of Fourth avenue, and southerly by a line indicated as the northerly boundary line of lands formerly of William Beekman and Abraham K. Beekman, deceased, on a certain map thereof bearing date the twenty-first day of July, eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, and filed in the office of the register of the city and county of New York in case number two hundred and five.

Sec. 2. Upon a certificate in writing being made by the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York, that it is just and fair that such release should be given, and approving of the same, it shall be the duty of the mayor of the city and the clerk of the common council to execute and deliver to the said Gerard Beekman and James W. Beekman, at their expense, a proper conveyance or deed of release of said premises (but without covenants of title), under their hands and the seal of the city.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 435.

AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and forty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to regulate the use of slips, wharves, and piers in the city of New York."

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section three of chapter two hundred and forty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to regulate the use of slips, wharves, and piers in the city of New York," passed May sixth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 3. It shall not be lawful to interfere with the free public use as now enjoyed, or to permit the use as a dumping ground of any wharf, pier or slip, or bulkhead adjacent thereto, in the navigable waters of the East river, in the city of New York, which has heretofore been used for the loading and discharging of sailing vessels regularly employed in foreign commerce, and having a draft of more than eighteen feet of water, and the provisions of this act shall not apply to any such wharf, pier or slip; provided, however, that nothing in this section contained shall apply to any wharf, pier, slip, or bulkhead now covered by an existing shed permitted by said department of docks, or reserved for a special use by any existing law, or which has for a period of ten years prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five been used or occupied by any person, corporation, line or association engaged in the business of steam transportation between this state and any other of the United States.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 4, 1883, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Beck & Co. to place and keep bay-windows on each of the corner houses about to be erected by them on Madison avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, as shown on the accompanying diagram, the work to be done at their own expense under the direction of the Commissioners of the Fire Department; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

NOTICE

IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS.

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS,
NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE,
NEW YORK, June 1, 1883.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
