DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, June 24, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held June 17, 1898, were approved.

The following communications were tabled for one week :

From the White Star Line—In relation to dredging required in the slip on the south side of Pier, new 38, North river.

From the Atlantic Transportation Company—In relation to its application for a lease of the Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street.

From the New England Railroad Company—Requesting a return of overpaid rental for Pier, old 40, North river.

The communication from Augustin Walsh protesting against the withholding of money due him on his contract for building a bulkhead wall along the easterly side of the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the Corporation Counsel.

The communication from the American Sugar Refining Company, requesting permission to construct a pile platform between South Second and South Fifth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the President.

The communication from William Turner requesting renewal of permit to use and occupy the Pier at the foot of East Thirty-fifth street, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer :

From Henry Rothschild—Requesting a renewal of permit to use and occupy the land under water north of East Seventy-fourth street.

Meyer Brothers, requesting a renewal of permit to use and occupy the new-made land in the rear of the marginal street between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river.

From James Moss—Requesting a renewal of permit to maintain boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, Harlem river.

The communication from F. A. Boning requesting a renewal of permit to maintain watchman's house on Pier, new 32, East river, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board :

Metropolitan Street Railway Company, to maintain tracks on the bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, south of the southerly line of Christopher street, North river, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the former permit.

Glasco Ice Company, to use and occupy the land under water covered by ice platform in front of the bulkhead between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, North river, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the former permit.

George Grossman, to maintain steam derrick on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, N. R.

J. M. Ceballos & Co., to use and occupy the land under water covered by the widening of Pier 10, East river, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the former permit.

James Shewan & Sons, to use and occupy the new made land between Piers 61 and 62, East river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Thomas O. Horton, to maintain dumping-board on the bulkhead foot of East Fortieth street, the consent of the lessee having been obtained.

Thomas Bevan, to maintain float at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$4 per month, payable monthly to the Dockmaster.

Mrs. Parker Lawless, to maintain small float at the north side of Coney Island creek, foot of West Twelfth street, Borough of Brooklyn, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief :

George B. Murphy, to connect service pipe with water-main at the pier foot of West Twentieth street, the work of taking up and relaying the pavement to be done by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of the permittee.

Homer Ramsdell Transportation Company, to place two ring bolts at the outer end of pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river.

The Bridgeport Steamboat Company, to repair the outer end of Pier 39, East river, and to drive fender and bearing piles thereat, the work to be kept within existing lines.

M. C. Vandervoort, to drive fender piles near the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-first street Harlem river, the consent of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company having been obtained ; the work to be kept within existing lines.

T. L. Arnold, Agent Bay Ridge Yacht Basin, to dredge the outer basin at the foot of Fifty-sixth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file :

From the Board of Aldermen—In relation to repairs required to the bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From the Department of Finance—Requesting information in relation to the action of William O'Brien Walker against The City of New York to recover salary for services rendered as Dock Superintendent. Secretary directed to furnish same.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Advising that this Board has authority to permit the Harlem Transfer Company to make certain improvements along the water front, between the Mott Haven canal and Railroad avenue, Harlem River, and that no rights of the City will be infringed thereby.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Harlem Transfer Company to erect and maintain a transfer bridge and crib bulkhead on the northerly side of the Harlem river, on the block bounded by One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Railroad avenue, Harlem river and Mott Haven canal, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department in accordance with plans submitted.

2d. Advising that no further action is necessary on the part of this Board in relation to transcript of judgment in the case of Goldsborough Banyer, et al., against the City.

3d. Stating that the running of the boat by the American Committee of the Statue of Liberty between the Battery Landing and Liberty Island, constitutes a ferry and that a franchise should be obtained therefor. Secretary directed to notify said Committee that unless the running of said boat is discontinued until such time as a franchise is obtained therefor an application for an injunction will be made to the Court.

From the Department of Parks—Stating that a fence will be erected by said Department along the southerly boundary of Corlears Hook Park, East River.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting this Department to drive the necessary piles for berthing the free floating bath in front of the bulkhead at Corlears Hook Park, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary arrangements for the berthing of said bath.

From the Secretary of State, advising that this Department will be notified of the time and

place of hearing in the matter of the application of Cornelius Poillon, et al. for confirmatory grant of land under water.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office, enclosing notices of applications of Margaret R. Bateman and Dorothea A. Dreier, for grants of land under water at Gravesend Bay, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that this Board is opposed to the granting of such applications.

From the American Surety Company of New York and the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, sureties, consenting to the extension of time to and including June 11, 1898, granted George W. Rogers, contractor, for the completion of Contract No. 624, for the extension of Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.

From George Grossman, accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted June 10, 1898, granting him a lease of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From R. H. Hood, contractor—Consenting to the opening of Pier, new 43, North river, as a recreation pier.

From Gordon & Dilworth—Protesting against the proposed sale of the half bulkhead adjoining Pier, new 39, North river.

From the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—Requesting this Department to drive spring piles on the southerly side of the Pier foot of West Twentieth street, to facilitate the berthing of its steamboats thereat, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the piles and report the cost thereof for collection from said company.

From Murray & Co.—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 623.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of furnishing and putting in place small cobble and rip-rap stones, under Contract No. 623, Murray & Co., contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including June 18, 1898, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the Metropolitan Street Railway Company—Requesting permission to make certain changes in the car stand at the foot of Chambers street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Metropolitan Street Railway Company to lay tracks and switches upon the newly-made land in front of the Pavonia Ferry, near the foot of Chambers street, as shown in the red lines upon the plan submitted, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department ; provided that said company shall file in this Department a written agreement :

First—That the said company shall at all times during the continuance of this permit maintain the pavement in good order and condition in an area between a line two feet northerly of the northernmost rail and a line two feet southerly of the southernmost rail of all tracks and switches that may be laid under this permit.

Second—That a grooved rail shall be used for all of the said tracks and switches.

Third—That said company shall pay for the privilege of maintaining the tracks hereby permitted, and the tracks adjoining thereto at a rate of compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Fourth—That said company shall remove said tracks and switches whenever directed to do so by the Board of Docks, and to restore the premises to proper and suitable condition for use.

Fifth—That said company will take up the present tracks in front of the freight shed near the foot of Duane street, and agree to pay this Department the cost of relaying the pavement thereat.

From William P. Youngs & Brothers—Requesting permission to build a new pier at the foot of Thirty-fifth street, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted William P. Youngs & Brothers to erect a temporary platform between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, East river, in accordance with plan submitted, as amended by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, the work to be done under his direction and supervision ; it being understood that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said William P. Youngs & Brothers shall file in this Department a written agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, agreeing to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water belonging to the City, covered by said platform, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum ; to remove said structure whenever so notified by the Board of Docks ; and also that in the event that the Board of Docks shall decide that the bulkhead between East Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, or the land under water covered by said platform is needed for the improvement of the water front, that then and in such case no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed by reason of the erection of said platform or of any structure thereon in any proceedings instituted for the acquisition of said property either by purchase or condemnation.

From the President—Recommending that the permit granted William M. Montgomery & Co., June 3, 1898, to maintain ice bridge, scales and tally-house on the Pier foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth street be revoked, and that they be notified to remove said structures, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department ; and that permission be granted said Montgomery & Co. to maintain the ice bridge, scales and tally-house on the Pier foot of East One Hundredth street, said privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—

1st. In relation to the application of Charles Mulford for a renewal of the permit to maintain ice bridge, scales, etc., on the southerly half of the bulkhead between Piers, new 21 and 22, North river.

2d. In relation to the application of Anthony E. Burke and John Fox, to use a portion of the bulkhead at the foot of East Ninety-ninth street.

3d. In relation to the application of the National Steamship Company for a lease of the half bulkheads adjoining Pier, new 39, North river.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Mary Claffey for the privilege of maintaining bath-houses on the south side of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$150 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the North and East River Steamboat Company for the privilege of landing the steamer "Shady Side" at the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street, be fixed at the rate of \$50 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer, commencing from the time said company begins to land thereat. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the New York and Norwalk Steamboat Company for the privilege of landing at the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street, be fixed at the rate of \$50 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing from the time said company begins to land thereat. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Curtis & Blaisdell for the land under water occupied by them in the vicinity of Fifty-sixth street, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable as heretofore. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that permission be granted the Metropolitan Rowing Club to maintain boat-house at the foot of Lexington avenue, Harlem river, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master, commencing June 1, 1898. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that permission be granted the Audubon Yacht Club to maintain boat-house and float on private property at the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-third street, North river, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that the Secretary be directed to advertise for estimates for furnishing timber.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief June 17, 1898, for furnishing sawed yellow pine timber, be and are hereby approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

From Commissioner Meyer—

1st. In relation to the application of Patrick Hollywood and others, for paving in the vicinity of West Eightieth street, North river, and recommending that the Treasurer be authorized to make arrangements for laying the necessary pavement thereat. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted Peter J. Moran to maintain bath-house, etc., at the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that permission be granted William S. Brown to maintain bath-houses west of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company's tracks, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, North river, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer—

1st. In relation to the application of the Norwich and New York Transportation Company for permission to use Pier, new 1, North river.

2d. Recommending that renewals of existing permits be granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, the privileges to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the original permits. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that renewals of existing permits be granted the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, the privileges to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the original permits. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that renewals of existing permits be granted the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, the privileges to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the original permits. Recommendation adopted.

From the Chief Clerk—Submitting report of differences in accounts between the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Department of Finance, and stating that he had the accounts compared from the organization of the Department of Docks to December 31, 1897, showing differences aggregating \$7,098.50, and asking authority to make correcting entries upon the books of the Department.

On motion, the Chief Clerk was authorized to make such entries as are necessary to rectify the discrepancies referred to in his report.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending June 18, 1898.

From Dock Master Harrison—Reporting repairs required to Pier 3, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owners to make the necessary repairs thereto, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Dock Master Clark—Reporting repairs required to the sheathing on Pier 62, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From Dock Master Woolley—Reporting repairs required to the sheathing on the decks of the Piers foot of East Ninety-fifth and East Ninety-sixth streets. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From Dock Master Powers—Reporting repairs required to the pier adjoining the bulkhead on the south side of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river. Secretary directed to notify the owners and occupants to make the necessary repairs thereto, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending June 18, 1898.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of removing the Cold Storage Warehouse between Jane and Horatio Streets, North river, June 18, 1898.

3d. Reporting the completion of Contract No. 623, June 18, 1898.

4th. Recommending that the New Jersey Steamboat Company be notified that unless the platform and shed on the bulkhead northerly of Pier, old 40, North river, are put in proper repair at once, this Department will fence off the premises from use. Recommendation adopted.

5th. In relation to the dangerous condition of the premises foot of East Ninety-third street, and recommending that he be directed to fence off same from public use. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting damage to the Battery Landing by transfer Boat No. 6, owned by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and recommending that repairs be made thereto, the cost thereof to be collected from said company. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Reporting damage to extension to Pier foot of West Twentieth street by the tug-boat "Arrow," owned by Robert Rogers, and recommending that repairs be made thereto the cost thereof to be collected from said Rogers. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that repairs be made to the outer southerly corner of Pier, new 1, North river, Pier foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and to the Pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 18208, in relation to the application of John Monks & Son, for an extension of time on Contract No. 627.

On motion, the communication from John Monks & Son requesting that the time for the completion of said contract be extended to July 26, 1898, was ordered on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of repairing and extending the Pier at the foot of West Fiftieth street, North river, under Contract No. 627, be and hereby is extended to July 26, 1898, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

In accordance with the notice of June 17, 1898, on motion of Commissioner Meyer, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 2 of article 1 of the by-laws be and hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 2. A public meeting shall be held on Friday of each week at 2 o'clock P. M., except during the months of July, August and September, when the meeting shall be held on Friday of each week at 11 o'clock A. M."

The action of the President, in transmitting complaint to the Department of Health, in relation to the unsanitary condition of the slip on the south side of pier foot of West Forty-third street, was approved, and the Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to push the condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said pier.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to push the condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the 125 feet of bulkhead rights lying immediately north of Watts street, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to readvertise for estimates for the construction of a crib bulkhead, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, North river, under Contract No. 630.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following permits be and hereby are renewed, to take effect June 1, 1898, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained in the original permits:

New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, to use and occupy land under water for platform, at bulkheads between Piers 6 and 8, North river, 7,901 square feet.

Central Railroad of New Jersey, to use and occupy land under water for platform on south side of Pier 8, North river, 4,059 square feet.

Cromwell Steamship Company, to use and occupy land under water for extension to platform, between Piers 8 and 9, North river, 8,535 square feet.

William Cruikshank, Agent, to use and occupy land under water for extension to Pier 9, North river, 4,455 square feet.

Cromwell Steamship Company, to use and occupy land under water for further extension to Pier 9, North river, 2,274 square feet.

Eastmans Company, to maintain extension to railroad track along the bulkhead between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, North river.

John J. Hopper, to use and occupy the crib bulkhead at the foot of the southerly half of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, North river.

A number of changes have been made in this street. It was laid down on the Town Survey Map, filed in 1874, as 100 feet in width, from Caton avenue to Coney Island avenue, the adjacent streets being 50 feet in width. Previous to the annexation of the Town of Flatbush to the City of Brooklyn this street was closed from Avenue D to Coney Island avenue, and also reduced to 60 feet in width between Avenue B and Avenue C, and from Avenue C to Avenue D. This change would appear to have been made by competent authority, although the assessment maps show the street as 100 feet in width from Caton avenue to Albemarle road or Avenue A, and as having been narrowed to 60 feet from Albemarle road to Avenue C.

In view of the changes which have been made in other parts of the street, I can see no objection to narrowing the portion from Caton avenue to Avenue C, as requested in the accompanying petitions, but as the records are confusing I would suggest that one resolution be passed covering the entire distance from Caton avenue to Avenue D, so there will be no question in the future as to the proper width of the street.

This street has never been opened, and no awards have been paid the property-owners for any portion of area included within the lines laid down on the map.

The principal and interest on said stock are payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness, pursuant to a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted June 9, 1898.

CONDITIONS OF SALE

provided by section 182 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897:

No proposal for bonds or stock shall be accepted for less than the par value of the same.

Every bidder, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of his proposal, shall deposit with the Comptroller, in money, or by a certified check drawn to the order of said Comptroller upon one of the State or National Banks of the said city, TWO PER CENT. of the par value of the bonds or stock bid for in said proposal.

No proposal will be received or considered which is not accompanied by such deposit.

All such deposits shall be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the decision has been rendered as to who is or are the highest bidder or bidders, except the deposit made by the highest bidder or bidders.

If said highest bidder or bidders shall refuse or neglect, within five days after service of written notice of the award to him or them, to pay to the City Chamberlain the amount of the stock or bonds awarded to him or them at their par value, together with the premium thereon, less the amount deposited by him or them, the amount or amounts of deposit thus made shall be forfeited to and retained by said City as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal, and shall thereafter be paid into the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt.

The Comptroller shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted, and upon the payment into the City Treasury of the amounts due by the persons whose bids are accepted, respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them as authorized by law.

The proposals, together with the security deposits, should be inclosed in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Proposals for Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York," and then inclosed in a sealed envelope, addressed to the Comptroller of The City of New York.
