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DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith quarterly report of the operations and finances of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for the three months ending March 31, 1902.

The Department gardeners perform most of the work of pruning during the first quarter of the year, but owing to frequent heavy falls of snow, this work was not finished this year by the last of March. The most important pruning had to be done in the Central Park. On February 28, after a heavy rainfall, the temperature fell to a marked degree, freezing a heavy coating of ice upon the trees and shrubbery. A heavy wind then set in which caused the most appalling destruction of trees in the parks in the history of the Department. Every available gardener was without delay placed at work clearing away the ruin, and extra emergency men were employed. Over 700 loads of shattered limbs were removed from the parks within two weeks, and it will be a long time before the traces of the damage will be obliterated. Much of the damage can only be repaired gradually, and many beautiful landmarks are irreparably damaged.

The gardening forces were also employed in the removal of refuse from the lawns and the fertilizing of them after they were prepared for it. Many of the weak lawns and the vegetation generally suffered from the extremely cold weather of the winter and will have to be replaced, the destruction of evergreens being particularly marked.

The work of the Entomologist was also hindered by the extreme weather of the winter. His force, however, has been actively engaged in clearing away the cocoons and egg masses left by the unusual number of Tussock moths and other pests with which the parks were infested last season.

Several flower shows were held in the Conservatory, beginning with the Christmas show, which extended well into the month of January. A second show was begun the latter part of February, and a third just prior to Easter. All of these exhibitions were very well attended by very appreciative visitors. The number of visitors to the Conservatory during the quarter exceeded 300,000.

In addition to the above, the gardening forces were employed in the propagation of plants for bedding in the parks, in assisting in the removal of snow, removing refuse from the lawns and the general gardening work.

The usual maintenance work, such as keeping the drives in condition and cleaning the paths and roadways under the control of the Department, was attended to. In removing the snow an effort was made to perform such work without hiring additional men and, with very few exceptions, this was accomplished.

From January 15 to about the middle of February the skate ponds were open to the public when the ice was sufficiently strong. Great crowds of people took advantage of the opportunity presented for enjoying this sport without having to journey to the suburbs and it was a gratification for the department to be able to furnish accommodations for so many days enjoyment in this direction. During the last few years the weather has permitted the use of the ice on comparatively few days each winter, and during some winters there has been no skating at all in the Central Park. Owing to the character of the lakes and their sheltered locations, it requires a continued period of very cold weather to produce ice sufficiently strong to support the immense crowds that always gather in the Central Park and when thick ice is to be found a few miles out of the city, there will be little or no ice in the Central Park lakes.

About 1,000 cubic yards of trap-rock screenings were used in repairing the drives, especial attention being given to the roadway of Riverside Drive, including the approaches to the new Ninety-sixth street Viaduct.

The usual winter overhauling of the rolling stock of the department took place during the quarter and in the latter part of March the usual setting out of settees and other work preparatory to opening the lawns in the spring for games, etc., was undertaken. Several hundred permits for the storage of miniature boats, snowshoeing, photography, sketching, delivering goods on restricted parkways, etc., were issued.

The carpenters, painters, masons, etc., started with the usual spring repairs and it is believed that the parks will, the coming spring, present an unusually attractive appearance.

The Central Park Menagerie and the Battery Park Aquarium were open as usual and were visited by hundreds of thousands of enthusiastic persons. Work of constructing a new roof for the Aquarium was begun and when completed will supply a long needed improvement to the Aquarium building.

The use of the bridle paths in Central and Riverside Parks was on a large scale during the quarter and the picture of life and enjoyment to be seen on any clear day there is one of the most attractive sights of the city.

The work of the Engineering Corps during the first quarter of the year is largely, because of the prevailing weather, limited to the preparation of plans specifications, etc., but some construction work is possible during the milder winter weather. The work actually accomplished is given below in detail.

The Architectural Department, connected with the Engineering Bureau, has had charge of the supervision and inspection of the work embraced in the erection of the New York Public Library Building, the preparation of plans, specifications and form of contract for new roof for the Aquarium Building, the plans, etc., for new public comfort station at the Mineral Springs Building, Central Park; plans, specifications, etc., for marble mosaic work in the American Museum of Natural History Building, and plans, etc., for alterations proposed for certain of the buildings in the Central Park Menagerie.

The architect is also engaged in generally inspecting work on outstanding contracts, the preparation of reports on per cent. payments for work performed, calculations on proposed projections on buildings and minor details in connection with maintenance and construction work of an architectural character in the Department.

The New York Public Library Building.

Contract for removal of reservoir, etc. No work accomplished during quarter because of weather conditions.

Contract No. 2—Repairs to sheet piling have been made and plumbing work, such as the laying of water and sewer pipes, has been done and the operating of the necessary pumps.

Contract No. 3—Owing to the weather conditions only a small amount of brick work was attempted.

Contract No. 1A—Work on this contract was begun February 20, 1902. About 33 per cent. of the drilling has been completed.

Viaduct Over Ninety-sixth Street, Riverside Drive.

Sea Wall Along Extension of East River Park.

Work on this contract was continued until February 15, 1902, when it was suspended by order of the Department because of the weather, etc. The work done was in connection with the construction of a coffer dam in connection with the completion of the wall.

Hudson Park.

The work of partially reconstructing this park under contract was suspended in the fall of 1901, and no progress was made during the first quarter of this year.

Thomas Jefferson Park.

A contract for furnishing and laying new and relaying old bluestone flagging, removing curb and pavements, regulating and grading, building basin and connection, etc., was let in October, 1901. The work was suspended January 9, 1902, and resumed March 25, and the amount accomplished during the quarter was:

1,000 cubic yards of clean earth filling in place.

4,000 square feet of flagstone taken up, redressed and reset.

De Witt Clinton Park.

It was found necessary to take up and relay a defective sidewalk on the northerly side of Fifty-second street, the southern side of this park, and the Department forces were employed for the purpose.

The Engineer Corps was also engaged during the quarter upon the following: Topographical survey and plan preliminary to the construction of a permanent entrance to the Central Park at Seventh avenue and Fifty-ninth street.

Topographical survey and plan for improving grounds east of new east wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Plans and specification regarding the transplanting of certain trees from Broadway to Seward Park.

Survey to define boundary lines of Thomas Jefferson and William H. Seward parks, and map in each case.

Map and profile of West Seventy-second street parkway.

Survey and preliminary estimate for proposed sewer from Mineral Springs to Central Park West.

Survey and location of houses and material on property north and south of dock lines, Ninety-sixth street and Seventy-ninth street and the North river.

Estimate of cost of improvement of Riverside Park, west of viaduct and north of Ninety-seventh street and south of Ninety-fifth street.

Specifications for repairing asphalt walks of Central Park.

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED DURING QUARTER.

Crotona Park.

Two scrapers were at work on lake daily during skating season.
 Total attendance during thirty-nine days of skating was 72,100.
 Several large stone walls were removed and large rocks blasted; all used for filling swamps on the west side; 1,000 yards of earth filling placed over same.
 New drive and path made from Wendover avenue to Crotona avenue; sod used for other parks; earth used for planting trees on Crotona Park South.
 Drives, walks and gutters repaired.
 One hundred and twenty dead trees cut down.

Claremont Park.

Repairs made to office building.
 Lawns covered with fertilizer.
 Thirteen trees removed.

Echo Park.

This park being just placed under the charge of this Department, necessitated its being laid out in walks and terraces.
 Eighty-one dead trees were removed.
 Thirty-nine trees planted at curb.
 Rock blasted and filling done.

Pelham Bay Park.

Eastern Boulevard repaired from Pelham Bridge to Hunter Island.
 Part of telford road laid for new approach to City Island Bridge.

Pelham Parkway.

Washout repaired.

Contract for "Constructing a bridge over the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad—Harlem River Branch—at the crossing of The Bronx and Pelham Parkway." John G. Tait, Contractor.
 The work on this bridge has proceeded to the point of completion of the abutments, but a change of the superstructure, consented to by this Department, from the plate girder style to that of the truss, on account of the extreme size of the former, has delayed the work very materially.

Contract for "Constructing and improving a portion of The Bronx and Pelham Parkway, from the westerly terminus of the improved portion of said Parkway—400 feet westerly of the Bear Swamp road—to a point 1,275 feet westerly of said terminus, in Bronx Park in The City of New York."

This work will probably be completed during the coming month.

Contract for "Regulating and grading portions of The Bronx and Pelham Parkway, in The City of New York." John B. McDonald, Contractor.
 The work is still in progress and is nearing completion.

Bronx Park.

Macadam roads repaired.
 Lawns fertilized.
 Six stalls erected in basement of work-shop, which saves time coming to and from Claremont Park stables.

Two hundred seed boxes were made.
 30 dead trees removed.

43,000 plants started and are now in thriving condition for planting in the various parks.

Contract for "Grading Grounds, Constructing, Regulating, Grading and Paving Walks and Roads, Furnishing and Laying Iron Water Pipe, Setting Hydrants, etc., in the Botanical Garden in Bronx Park, in The City of New York." John H. Devlin Contractor.

The work is now in progress, but, estimating from present conditions, will not be completed much before the end of the coming quarter.

Contract for "Furnishing all the Labor and Materials for the Erection and Completion of a House for Primates in the New York Zoological Garden in Bronx Park, in The City of New York." Thomas Cockerill & Son, Contractors.

Work completed February 26, 1902, and final estimate forwarded February 28, 1902.

Contract for "Grading Grounds, Constructing, Regulating, Grading and Paving Walks and Roads, Furnishing and laying Iron Water Pipes, Constructing Basin for Statuary Fountain, Erecting Garden Fountain and Drinking Fountain, Constructing Stone Seats, etc., in front of the Museum Building, and Cornice and Roof Ornaments on the Botanical Museum in the Botanical Garden in Bronx Park, in The City of New York." The Wilson & Baillie Manufacturing Company, Contractors.

Owing to a clause in the contract prohibiting any mason work and laying of drain pipes or pavements between December 1 and April 15, the work has been retarded to a considerable extent since the last report.

Contract for "Furnishing all Labor and Furnishing and Erecting all the Materials necessary to Erect and Complete the Range of Horticultural Buildings in the Botanical Garden in Bronx Park, in The City of New York." John R. Sheehan & Co., Contractors.

Work completed January 30, 1902, and final estimate forwarded February 1, 1902.

Contract for "Furnishing all the Labor and Materials for the Erection and Completion of a Lion House in the New York Zoological Gardens in Bronx Park, in The City of New York." Thomas Cockerill & Son, Contractors.

This work has been in a practical state of suspension on account of winter weather, but is now being pushed with vigor.

Cedar Park.

A large portion of the easterly side of this park was destroyed by heavy storms, which necessitated the rebuilding of the slope, requiring heavy blasting, filling and sodding.

Construction of drain and connecting same with sewer.

St. Mary's Park.

Seventy trees planted in good mold.

St. Augustine's and Fulton Parks.

Terraces resodded.

Moshulu Parkway.

Banks either side sodded and drains cleared.

New path made on north side.

121 dead or crooked trees removed.

1,000 feet of sod laid.

Van Cortlandt Park.

There were thirty-nine days of skating in this park, during which the total attendance was 171,500 persons. Three scrapers were at work daily cleaning lake.

New road built and macadamized.

New paved gutters made.

200 feet of screenings on roadways.

Repairs to wagon shed completed.

156 trees removed.

Spuyten Duyvil Parkway.

For entire length, gutters cleared and screenings placed on roadway where needed.

MISCELLANEOUS.

During the snow storms all walks and crossings of various parks, the steps of the Municipal Building and approaches thereto, steps of the Washington Park approaches to the bridge, were promptly cleaned.

Fifteen team and three single sprinklers were taken apart, repaired and painted.

One hundred and fifteen benches painted and distributed.

Signs made.

Steam roller and tools repaired.

Several tennis courts and baseball diamonds repaired.

The February sleet storm damaged a very large number of trees, requiring concentration of force to cut limbs and clear parks.

Trees and shrubs in all Parks and Parkways pruned.

Under contract with The Coldwell Lawn Mower Company of February 26, 1901, the Company has returned sixty-six lawn mowers repaired and in good condition.

The contract work in Bronx Park and Bronx and Pelham Parkway has been supervised by the Chief Engineer and staff. They have also been engaged in preparing plans, strain sheets and surveys for the following, viz:

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, FROM JANUARY 1 TO MARCH 31, INCLUSIVE, 1902.

General Work.

Severe weather set in early in the season, with heavy snowstorms and much ice, necessitating a great deal of labor in keeping the roads and parks open for public use.

Although a majority of the park employees were put on half time early in the season, the unusual demand for winter labor made necessary the restoration of many of them to full time to meet the demands of the work required. We were enabled to clear the park sidewalks in all the thickly populated sections of the city, and open all the thoroughfares under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks with little delay, in spite of the unusually deep snow.

In January and February there were eighteen days of skating, rendering it necessary to clean the lake every day, which required the services of all the laborers available.

On Saturday and Sunday, February 22 and 23, Brooklyn was visited by the most severe ice storm within the recollection of anyone now living, and all the surrounding country suffered severely, but the full force of the storm fell upon Prospect Park. From the weight of small branches coated with ice it was computed that the weight of ice on some of the large trees must have reached nearly a hundred tons. The destruction was terrible, many of our finest trees being ruined, and a conservative estimate is that one-third of them are permanently injured.

The work of repairing the damage as far as possible was entered upon at once, and over two thousand two hundred (2,200) truckloads of wood and broken branches were removed. Much wood was carried away by people allowed to come and take it and of this no account was kept.

One hundred tons of Canadian hard wood ashes, reserved from last season, were spread upon the grass of the Parade Ground, where the material was urgently needed, and two thousand seven hundred and fifty (2,750) cubic yards of composted fertilizer were spread over the lawns in Prospect Park.

The contractor for the new comfort house west of the main entrance to Prospect Park completed his work within the specified time, and the building will, in a very short time, be ready for public use.

The contract for resurfacing asphalt walks in Prospect Park, which was interrupted by severe weather early in the season, was resumed in the latter part of March. The work on the Bay Ridge Parkway, in sustaining the sand banks by boulders and top soil, was carried on as the weather permitted, and is being pushed as rapidly as possible with the small force available for the work.

On March 8 work was begun on the East Side Lands, which, for twenty years, had been a neglected dumping ground. Already the mounds on the Flatbush avenue side have been re-formed, fertilized and covered with top soil, and nearly half its length has been planted with trees and shrubs. The grading of the interior of the park is progressing in a satisfactory manner, many trees and flowering plants have been purchased and hauled in ready for planting, and it is the intention to push work vigorously to completion.

The Greenhouses in Prospect Park.

During the three months the force have been kept busy in propagating the thousands of plants required for use in the floral displays in the greenhouses, which displays are varied weekly. The Easter week display was particularly fine, a conserva-

tive estimate of the attendance on Easter Sunday being 15,000 persons. The Palm House was equally attractive, and the display of cacti proved very interesting to visitors.

Greenhouse on East Side Lands.

In the cold frames over 30,000 pansies and 2,500 perennial plants were cared for and over 32,000 bedding plants, including geraniums, coleus, salvia, sodeum, begonias, fuchsias, cannas, caladiums, etc., were potted for use in the flower gardens in Prospect Park and in the various smaller parks throughout the City.

Flower Garden in Prospect Park.

A number of crippled and condemned trees were removed and the pruning of other trees attended to as required. A number of shrubs were planted and the garden kept neat and clean.

Pansies were planted in the flower garden and at City Hall Park, and hyacinths were put in the large vases at the main entrance to Prospect Park.

Mechanical Work.

The workmen at the shops have been busy in repairing fences, wagons, trucks, and all the park implements, preparatory to spring work. They also repaired the furnace and plumbing at the flower garden shelter and papered and painted the interior of the same, and repaired the plumbing at the farm house, Willink entrance shelter, and the shelters at Red Hook, Highland, Bedford, Tompkins, Fort Greene, Carroll, Winthrop, City and Coney Island Parks.

They also made 96 orchid and 200 seed boxes; a rustic fence at the farm house; two comfort houses; two covers for steam rollers; drinking trough for elk; 400 settees and 30 picnic tables; 400 linear feet of sidewalk, four feet wide, on Miller avenue; 40 signs and 750 stakes; 6 hand carts; 3 wagon bodies and two saw horses; 4 sprinkling tanks and 2 small water tanks; built two new catch basins at Fort Hamilton avenue and Forty-second street; and laid concrete floor in the Litchfield mansion, Prospect Park. The painters painted, lettered, striped and varnished 25 sprinkling trucks, 2 wagons, one road scraper, 20 signs, roofs of palm house, show and orchid houses, and painted 150 settees, oiled tables at the picnic house, painted, scraped and cleaned the electric fountain, and glazed all the sash at the greenhouses.

The Smaller Parks.

All of the smaller parks throughout the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, including Tompkins, City, Brooklyn Heights, City Hall, Municipal, Bedford, Carroll, Bensonhurst, Cooper, Red Hook, Cuyler, Winthrop, Bushwick, Highland, Zindel, Underhill, Stuyvesant, Woodpoint, Cooper Gore, Saratoga Square, Irving Square, Lincoln Terrace, Kings Park (Jamaica), Flushing Park, and Long Island City Park and small gores, have all been kept clean and in good condition.

The walks, gutters, basins and shelters have been regularly attended to, and the snow and ice cleaned off the walks after each storm. The broken branches were carted away after the severe storm of February 22 and 23.

The pruning of the trees and shrubbery in these parks has been commenced, and will be carried on as rapidly as possible. Over 2,100 cubic yards of composted manure were spread on the lawns, which has since been raked off and cleaned up.

Carnarsie Beach, New Lots Playground and Dyker Beach.

These parks are open to the public and guarded, but no substantial improvements have yet been made in them.

Fort Greene Park.

In addition to the regular work of keeping the walks, gutters, basins and shelters clean and in good condition, the men have been kept busy in repairing the damage done by the severe storm on February 22 and 23.

Early in the year 175 truckloads of composted manure were received and spread on the lawns, which has since been raked off and carted away.

Forest Park.

As the men could be spared from the regular work of grading this park from fires and depredators, they have been engaged in repairing the damage done by the winter storms and fixing up the golf links preparatory to their opening in the early spring.

Sunset Park.

Only the work of guarding this park is being carried on at present.

Fort Hamilton Park.

This park has been cleaned up and grass seed sown in bare places. New tulip trees have been ordered to take the place of those that died, around the outside of the park.

Roads and Boulevards.

During the month of January the roads and boulevards were kept clean and in good condition for travel. The resurfacing of the bridle path on Ocean Parkway was commenced and the bridges and roadway were repaired in Dyker Beach Park and bad holes filled in.

In February a great deal of work was required to keep the drives in good condition for the use of the public. The broken branches on the parkways were cleared away after the severe storm, and heavy washouts on the Shore road, Fort Hamilton avenue, Ocean Parkway and Coney Island Concourse were repaired. A survey of Ocean avenue, from Flatbush avenue to Fort Hamilton avenue, was made, preparatory to advertising for bids for macadamizing the same.

In March the rolling and resurfacing of Fort Hamilton avenue for a distance of one thousand feet was commenced, and Ocean Parkway, Eastern Parkway, Glenmore avenue and Pitkin avenue were thoroughly cleaned and bad places repaired, and the various driveways were kept in good condition generally.

The Finances.

During the three months, from January 1 to March 31, inclusive, the sum of \$1,851.68 was turned over to the City Chamberlain for deposit to the credit of the Revenue Fund. This amount was received from the sale of park privileges and the rents of houses in the various parks under the jurisdiction of the Department, and on the Shore road.

Trial Balance Statements.

Trial balance statements were sent to the Mayor and Comptroller, in accordance with the usual custom, at the beginning of each month.

DEAR MR. ORR—I saw Comptroller Grout yesterday with Mr. Wickersham and he explained to us his position respecting the vault privileges in Forty-first street. Mr. Grout explained to us that while there was no desire on his part to invalidate the spirit of the understanding between ourselves and the Rapid Transit Commission, it was clear to him that the Commission was unaware of the practice which the City had been pursuing with regard to vault privileges under streets.

We feel that the Comptroller is in a position in this matter from which he cannot recede, as he is bound by the customs and practices of the City to impose an annual charge for these vault privileges. I am convinced, however, that he understands the situation thoroughly and will treat us fairly. We, therefore, accept the \$140,000 for the easement at Park avenue and Forty-second street, and will give the Comptroller an opportunity to try, as far as he can, to meet the Rapid Transit Commission's agreement with respect to the vaults, in dealing with us.

A contract to carry out this understanding will, therefore, be presented to you in the proper and official way.

SIR—I have the honor to report the entire destruction of the fire alarm cable system at One Hundred and Third street and Broadway, at 11:30 a. m. on the 30th inst. For a period of one hour 74 company apparatus houses and 279 fire alarm boxes were out of service, and more or less companies and boxes were still out of service for two hours and eighteen minutes while the repairs to the cable were completed. There is every indication to show that the cause of this interruption to the telegraph system, as has frequently heretofore been the case, was due to a total disregard of the interests of the Fire Department by the contractor's workmen excavating for the rapid transit tunnel. In this particular instance it is evident that the break was not the result of an accident, but on the contrary the pipe was deliberately thrown aside and cable broken to make way for the construction of a bridge over the excavation. I would recommend that the contractor be obliged to complete his contract for reconstruction of the fire alarm system without delay, as this is the only possible means of avoiding constant interruption to the system.

DEAR SIR—After receiving your telephone communication yesterday regarding a further injury to the cables of the Department by your workmen, in which communication you stated that the accident was unavoidable, and further that you were employing the most careful men and superintendents, and further requested me not to communicate the facts, by way of complaint, to the Rapid Transit Commission, I determined to wait until I received the official report on the subject. This has reached me this morning, and I regret to say does not confirm the view you put forward as the cause of the accident. The report clearly states that the injury in this instance was not the result of an accident, but, on the contrary, the pipe was deliberately thrown aside and the cable broken to make way for the construction of a bridge over the excavation.

In view of this statement, no plea of unavoidable accident can be considered. The destruction of our line was intentional, not from malicious purpose, but from absolute indifference on the part of your men to the interests of this Department and of the City. For a period of one hour 74 company apparatus houses and 279 fire alarm boxes were out of service, and many of them still out of service for between two and three hours. I therefore cannot refrain from placing these facts before the Commission.

DEAR SIR—I beg to submit to your Honorable Board the proposed certificate of incorporation of "Interborough Rapid Transit Company," a corporation which is in process of organization for the purpose of acquiring from Mr. John B. McDonald the contract for the construction and operation of a rapid transit railroad, and of completing, equipping and operating such railroad.

The statute passed at the last session of the Legislature (Laws of 1902, chapter 544) requires the approval, in writing, of your Board, in lieu of the certificate of public convenience and necessity required in the case of ordinary railroad corporations by section 59 of the Railroad Law; and this must be had before the articles are filed.

In accordance with the request made at the last meeting of your Board, I also hand you herewith the form of assignment which it is proposed to have executed by Mr. McDonald and which has been approved by him. I do not at present ask your approval of such assignment, but merely of the corporation, in order that the certificate may be filed and the corporation organized.

The certificate of incorporation has been signed by all of the incorporators except Messrs. Lane and Baldwin, who are absent from the city, but who will sign it during the present week, and in order to prevent another week's delay, I beg that you will approve the corporation and allow us to complete the execution after the approval is made.

The incorporators have, as you will observe by the certificate of incorporation, subscribed for only 1,500 shares of the company's stock, but when we apply to you for your consent to the assignment of the contract, we will submit to you a statement of the financial condition of the company and will then undertake to satisfy you as to the financial strength of the corporation.

The following letter of the Contractor, dated 16th April, as to method of laying track in the Rapid Transit Railroad was presented and read:

RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION COMPANY,

NEW YORK, April 16, 1902.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—I have to request the permission of your Board to make a change in the track to be laid for use of the Rapid Transit Railroad from that prescribed by the specifications of my contract (16—Track, page 104).

All of my engineers concur in the opinion that it is essential in order to have a satisfactory track that it be of such construction as will allow it to be spiked to gauge, lined and surfaced, and that this operation may be repeated whenever necessary during the life of the rail so that the rail be renewed quickly when worn out, and that no form of track that does not admit of convenient adjustment and renewal can be satisfactory.

They further agree that in the present state of the art a track laid with cross ties and ballast is the only one that meets these conditions. These reasons apply forcibly to the Rapid Transit Railroad because of its peculiar traffic and physical conditions. A large percentage of the line is to be on curves, some of which are of very short radius. The rail wear on these curves under our conditions of braking and acceleration will be rapid and rail renewals frequent. As guard rails must be used on these curves and must be kept in gauge carefully, a renewal of these will also be a serious question. The presence of numerous switches, cross-overs and yard connections will necessitate special treatment of an untried and therefore of an experimental kind on any new form of track.

The track construction proposed by the specifications of the contract contemplates a rigid track, which it has been thought will insure its permanency. All of my engineers believe that this result cannot be attained in practice and that rigidity is most objectionable from the standpoint of equipment maintenance. From an electrical standpoint there are also objections to the adoption of the forms of track proposed by the contract. We intend to use the track rails reinforced by feeders for our return circuit to the substations. This requires the track to be heavily bonded at the joints and these bonds must be so placed that they can be readily inspected and repaired from time to time. In addition to the track rails there will be numerous cross-connecting feeders, making quite a complicated system and one which it will be very difficult to lay and maintain in any form of track except one having loose ballast.

It may be said that trolley lines in streets meet these same problems satisfactorily, but the bonding and cross-connecting work for such railways is of a very much lighter character than that which will be needed for the heavier trains which will be operated in the subway, and the cases therefore are not parallel.

After seventy years of railroad building all over the world, the cross-tie ballasted track survives all experiment to devise a better one, and considering the physical and track traffic conditions and the difficulties attending track maintenance, it appears to me that the Rapid Transit Railroad is not a favorable place to try radical experiments involving the foundation construction over which we have to operate the railroad.

I beg therefore to ask the approval of your Board to a change in the character of track so that I may be authorized to lay the ordinary standard steam railway type of track with cross ties and ballast instead of that prescribed by the sixteenth specification of the contract.

I might add that this is recommended by the Chief Engineer, Mr. S. L. F. Deyo, who has had long experience as a railroad engineer, as well as by Mr. George Gibbs, our Consulting Engineer, and Mr. E. P. Bryan, the General Manager, who is to operate the railroad and who has been a practical railroad man all his life.

DEAR SIR—It is reported to me by the Chief Inspector of the Electrical Bureau of this Department, that in the construction of the underground Rapid Transit Tunnel, in the Borough of Manhattan, the contractors in charge of the work are daily installing conduits for electrical conductors, and this is done without the permission or authority of this Department.

I beg to be informed to what extent the Commission is engaged in the construction of electric mains, conduits, subways, or any apparatus, whatever its technical description, intended for the transmission of electric current for any purpose, and I should be

glad to be advised under what provisions of law such work proceeds in the absence of permission from this Department.

I do not wish to be construed as arrogating to this Department a jurisdiction which may, perhaps, belong to your Commission, but the broad language of sections 469, 525 and 526 of the Charter, is, I think, sufficient to show the propriety of this request. I am.

SIR—We return herewith the letter of Mr. Dougherty, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, which you referred to us with a request that we furnish you with a statement such as is desired by Mr. Dougherty.

It would be necessary to refer to the Chief Engineer, William Barclay Parsons, Esq., for any precise specification of the extent to which electric mains, conduits, subways and other apparatus for the transmission of electric current are now in process of construction under the auspices of the Rapid Transit Board. We may say, however, that such construction is, of course, confined to necessities of the Rapid Transit Railroad now building for The City of New York under the contract made between the City, acting by the Rapid Transit Board, and John B. McDonald, and dated the 21st day of February, 1900. We are informed by the Chief Engineer that construction thus far has been solely along the line of the Rapid Transit Railroad. But under the contract there will need to be constructed proper mains and conduits for the connection of the main line with the power house or power houses to be constructed by the contractor. The right of the contractor in such construction will, under the Rapid Transit Statute, be precisely the same as his right in the construction along the main line.

All of this work is done under the rapid transit contract, to which we have referred and pursuant to the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, being chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 as amended, and more particularly as amended by chapters 528 and 752 of the Laws of 1894, chapter 519 of the Laws of 1895, and chapter 729 of the Laws of 1896. Under these laws, as we have repeatedly advised the Commission, advice to the soundness of which the present or late Corporation Counsel has repeatedly given his assent, the rapid transit construction is not subject to restraint or supervision by the various departments of the City Government, except only that under section 33 of the Rapid Transit Act the replacement of pipes, sewers, subways or underground conduits or ways if not made underneath the street, highway or public place from which they have been removed, must be made underneath such other street, highway or public place as may be approved by the head of the Department of Public Works of the City, and except also that under section 6 of the act when rapid transit construction interferes with, disturbs or endangers any sewer, water pipe, gas pipe or other duly authorized subsurface structure, the work of construction should be conducted in accordance with the reasonable requirements of the Commissioner of Public Works of the City. Neither of these exceptions applies to the construction spoken of by Commissioner Dougherty.

It will, perhaps, be convenient to remind Commissioner Dougherty that the Rapid Transit Board exercises power derived directly from the statute and has not taken out permits from the various City Departments; but also that, as a practical matter where the rapid transit work interferes or threatens interference with other public work, there has been no difficulty in adjusting the matter to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Board and the head of the Municipal Department the work of which has been thus interfered with or in danger of such interference.

The Secretary reported that the Chief Engineer had reported on the matter of the letter of the Women's Health Protective Association, and a copy of his report had been forwarded to the Mayor and the President of the Borough of Manhattan, as follows:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,
CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, April 25, 1902.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—I return you herewith the request of the Women's Health Protective Association received from the President of the Borough through the Mayor's office, asking that the water closets of the Rapid Transit stations be converted into public comfort stations, by giving access direct to them without requiring a fare to be paid.

I appreciate thoroughly the efforts of this association to secure proper, convenient and inoffensive public comfort stations in various parts of the city, but I think that the effort to convert the Rapid Transit stations into such would be wholly objectionable. There is bound to be very large congestion of people entering the stations; if, in addition to this congestion, there were to be added those who would use the public comfort stations, the result, I am sure, would be serious. However, I doubt if the contract would permit such an arrangement. It may interest the members of the association to note that the plans for the stations contemplate not only the ordinary free places, but, also, superior closets, properly cared for by attendants, for which a small extra charge will be made.

As undoubtedly the Rapid Transit Railway will be used by a large number of people, the existence of convenient and well cleaned closets will go a long way in itself to meeting the object of the Women's Association.

Communications from the North Side Board of Trade and the Harlem Board of Commerce favoring the proposed new east side route were presented.

The Mayor then brought up the matter of the congestion at the Manhattan terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge. He said the problem could be considered from two points of view, to wit: As to temporary relief, with which he thought the Rapid Transit Board should not concern itself; and permanent relief, and as to the problem of permanent relief he thought a solution could best be reached through the Rapid Transit Board. He presented the three reports on the subject referred to at the last meeting. Commissioner of Bridges Gustav Lindenthal then explained to the Board his views on the subject as set forth in his pamphlet entitled, "Plans for Stations, Approaches and Connections for the Four East River Bridges in New York City," dated April 21, 1902.

Mr. Herman Ridder, of the "New Yorker Staats-Zeitung," informed the Board that that corporation, which owns the building at the bridge entrance, No. 3 Tryon row, would not stand in the way of any permanent solution of the bridge problem if it involved the taking of their property.

It was decided to give a hearing on the following Thursday at 3 p. m.

The following report of counsel as to application of the Consolidated Gas Company was presented and read:

30th April, 1902.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, City:

SIR—The Board at its meeting held on the 24th ultimo referred to us the letter of Mr. Colin C. Simpson, the General Superintendent of Mains of the Consolidated Gas Company, addressed to the Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Board.

We have already expressed the opinion that in shifting gas pipes or other subsurface structures, there is no reason why they should not be placed under any part of the street that is convenient. The City has, as we understand, a perfect right to place subsurface structures under either the central part of the street or under the side portions of the street; and although the shifting of subsurface structures may be incidental to rapid transit construction, the limits upon the location of the rapid transit tunnel are not applicable to such subsurface structures for they are not part of the Rapid Transit Railroad after their location is shifted than they were before.

It seems to us that it is not an unreasonable request of the Consolidated Gas Company that the Board should adopt a formal resolution approving the location of the thirty-inch main referred to by Mr. Simpson. Such a resolution is no more than an

authoritative expression of the fact already existing that the Board approves what has in this matter been done by its Chief Engineer. The resolution would not give to the Gas Company a right as against the City or any of its departments other than such right, if any, as the Consolidated Company had with respect to its main, in the location from which it was removed for purposes of rapid transit construction. We submit for the consideration of the Board a form of resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That the Board approve the location as prescribed by the Chief Engineer of the thirty-inch gas main of the Consolidated Gas Company within the curb-line on the east side of Elm street, and also of its thirty and thirty-six inch gas-mains 'under the sidewalks on the east and west sides of Broadway at Sixty-sixth street.'

If the Board shall adopt this resolution it will, we suppose, be proper for the Secretary to transmit to Mr. Simpson a certified copy of the resolution.

Preamble and resolutions recommended to be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February, 1902:

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, constituted pursuant to the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1894, and the acts amendatory thereof, has duly determined that the routes and general plans adopted by said Board on the 14th day of January, 1897, and the 4th day of February, 1897, should be modified by adding to the said routes or extending the same from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly to One Hundred and Fiftieth street; and thereafter did transmit to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York a copy of said plans and conclusions as adopted, which plans and conclusions thus adopted were received by said Board of Aldermen on the 30th day of January, 1902, at 2 o'clock p.m., at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, duly convened on such day at such hour; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen did, by resolution duly adopted at said meeting, fix a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions, for the consideration thereof, to wit, this 6th day of February, 1902, at 2 o'clock p.m.; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen on this 6th day of February, 1902, has proceeded with the consideration of such plans and conclusions; and

Whereas, The plans and conclusions and modifications are duly set forth in the resolutions of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, as follows:

"Resolved, That subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit:

"And also extending from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly under Lenox avenue to a point at or near its intersection with the street known as "Exterior street," including connections by necessary and suitable switches and tracks or otherwise with abutting properties used as terminal or storage grounds.

"The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby added shall be by tunnel in the same manner as provided in the routes and general plan for the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad under the portion of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and Forty-second street. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track, in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

"A station and station approaches may also be built at the intersection of one of the streets intersecting Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and Exterior streets, as the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may decide."

"In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

"Resolved, That, whereas, this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said modifications of routes and general plan shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.

2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or if such consent cannot be obtained, then in lieu thereof of the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by said Appellate Division.

4. The consent of the said John B. McDonald, Contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company; The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company; The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia; American Surety Company of New York; National Surety Company, and Perry Belmont.

It is further

"Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered 'one' as showing the modifications or extension hereby adopted."

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby does, by a majority vote of all its members, approve such plans and conclusions and modification, and does consent to the construction of a railway or railways, in accordance therewith, and that The City of New York does hereby approve of all such plans and conclusions and modification and consents to such construction.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 28, 1902.

Approved by the Mayor April 28, 1902.
The Chief Engineer reported that he had issued Permits Nos. 55, 56 and 57 for work in connection with the power house at Fifty-ninth street.

It is intended, as soon as practicable, to comply with the requirement of section 722 of the Charter, in relation to extending the paid Fire Department over the Borough of Richmond, and, preliminary thereto, there is urgent demand for the establishment of an effective fire alarm telegraph system therein, the borough embracing within its territorial limits an area of 57 1/4 square miles, with a present population of 67,250. There are 48 engine, hook and ladder and hose companies located at various points in the borough, to none of which is it possible to communicate the need for their services (aside from verbal and telephonic notification which, of course, is not practicable save in isolated instances) in any other way than by resort to the primitive method of blowing steam whistles or ringing fire bells. Furthermore, the absence of proper facilities for promptly sending alarms for fire results in the annual destruction of much valuable property, which could in large measure be prevented by the introduction of an appropriate modern system of telegraphic communication, such as will be furnished the people of this important and growing part of the Greater New York, if provision for the purpose, as herein requested, shall be made.

The foregoing estimate, amounting to fifty thousand three hundred dollars (\$50,300), is adopted as the sum of money which will be required for establishing a fire alarm telegraph system and providing for the equipment and maintenance thereof, in the Borough of Richmond, for the year 1902.
