Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1904.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York,
Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street,
August 26, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City Hall:

Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith the report of this Department for the quarter ended March 31, 1904, together with the reports of heads of institutions for the same period. In addition thereto the following matters may be noted:

To avoid a deficit in the salary account I was obliged at the outset to dismiss or demote forty persons, whose salaries aggregated \$12,785 per annum.

On January 18, 1904, the privilege of keeping the small store, where only non-alcoholic beverages are allowed to be sold, on Blackwell's Island, was granted to the widow of a man, who, at the time of his death, November 5, 1903, and for many years before, was Superintendent of one of the City hospitals.

On January 11 bids were opened for furnishing during the year 1904, groceries, provisions, flour, vegetables, fodder, ice, butter, eggs, yeast, etc.

On January 18 bids were opened for furnishing during the year 1904, crockery, glassware, dry goods and notions, hardware, Engineers' supplies and other miscellaneous supplies.

On February 4 the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Borough of Richmond, was restored to duty by order of the Court.

On February 21 the Superintendent, Joseph Schilling, of the City Hospital, died. No new appointment has been made to fill the position. As there is no Deputy Superintendent, the Steward acts as Superintendent.

On February 29 bids were opened for furnishing hospital supplies for the year.

On February 29, Mr. George Blair, Superintendent, Bureau of Dependent Adults, was removed, after a hearing at which he was represented by counsel, on charges preferred against him by my predecessor.

On March 1 an estimate of the amount of Corporate Stock required by this Department to be issued, with which to construct new buildings, and for extraordinary repairs to existing buildings, was submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as per their request of January 26, 1904.

March 1, 1904, a new Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults was appointed, in place of the one removed February 29, 1904, on charges. Said removal has since been upheld by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Hospitals Crowded.

Owing to several causes, among which may be mentioned the natural increase in the population, the severity of the winter, labor troubles, business depression, or perhaps the people are becoming educated to the fact that they can receive free hospital treatment when they are sick, by applying to this Department. All private hospitals were also overcrowded this same season of the year. Rather than turn sick people away, the Department has cared for many by putting beds on the floor in the wards, and sometimes in hallways. All this argues for more public hospital facilities.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT DIETITIAN FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1904.

Report of Department Dietitian for the Quarter ending March 31, 1904.

Hon. James H. Tully, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I beg to submit herewith my report for the first quarter of the current year.

Since the first of the year the improved quality of certain foods has been very noticeable. This is due to the improved specifications in the contracts for meats, poultry, eggs and milk. The results contribute to the comfort of all inmates of our institutions.

The improvement in the service of food in the large dining hall at the Tuberculosis Infirmary has been accomplished through the efforts of the Resident Dietitian and the Deputy Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital. This change consists in serving smaller portions of food, and second portions wherever wished. Considerable waste of food is thus avoided, as not infrequently the patient's appetite fails him for a day or two, and if he received his full portion it would be left untouched upon his plate. Also those whose appetites are unusually good can be satisfied without a larger supply of food than is actually necessary, being prepared.

The dietary at the Infirmary has been modified to the extent of egg noggs being distributed once each day instead of twice each day. This was done at the direction of the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital, as it appeared that many patients were not taking the egg noggs prescribed for them.

The new dietary for the various classes of inmates of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, which was approved in December last, has not yet been carried into effect, owing to insufficient funds.

Some difficulty in controlling the orders for food supplies was traced to the irregular increases in the orders for articles of special diet for patients in the general hospitals. In consequence it was decided to adopt the following regulations:

1. No article of extra diet may be ordered in addition to regular diet.
2. But one article of extra diet may be ordered in addition to any diet, other than the regular.
3. Either of the above rules may be modified or waived by the Superintendent

of the Hospital only upon a written order for the diet required being made upon an Emergency Diet form, and signed by the visiting doctor.

The teaching of classes in Domestic Science has been accomplished as follows during ten weeks of this quarter:

One section of thirteen pupils from the New York City Training School for Nurses; ten lessons in the Principles of Cookery.

One section of ten pupils from the Metropolitan Hospital Training School for Nurses; ten lessons in the Principles of Cookery.

Three sections of eight pupils each from the New York City Training School for Nurses in Bacteriology. In the work of teaching cookery I have had the assistance of Miss Kingsland and Miss George, dietitians of the Metropolitan and City Hospitals.

The regular work of visiting the various institutions and inspecting the preparation and serving of foods for all class of inmates has been done regularly.

I find that the field of the special diet kitchen increases steadily in the general hospitals, the supervision of the work there requiring a large portion of the time of the dietitian. The work of each special diet kitchen is done by a pupil nurse and one hospital helper. The articles of food prepared are of an excellent and uniform quality, and the dietitians are to be given great credit for having devised economical methods for the preparation of such appetizing articles of diet.

It is much to be desired that the salary paid to the waitresses in the general hospitals of this Department should be increased to twenty (\$20) dollars in every case. At present it is found that women employed as waitresses at a lower salary are ignorant and untaught, and after much time and effort have been spent in teaching them and training them for their special duties, they reward these efforts by leaving for positions giving higher salary. The total number of positions open to this class of help are few, and if filled by competent trained waitresses at a higher and uniform salary the Department would be benefited by greater satisfaction resulting from superior service of food and the proper care of the dining room equipment, and the probable abolishing of a few underpaid positions. Also the grade of cooks, waitresses and all kitchen and dining room employees would be improved and the services correspondingly improved if uniform regulations existed and were enforced in all of our institutions providing for increase of salary with length of service, this to be compensated for by the deduction from the salary for breakage of, or injury to, kitchen or dining room equipment, and for absence from duty without leave, and by prohibiting the employment in any institution of any kitchen or dining room employees having been employed in another institution of the Department within the preceding six months, except by permission from the Central Office.

As a result of my experience in this Department I am convinced that greater satisfaction in the distribution of meats to the institutions would result from a central butchering establishment. At present the hospitals which require a larger proportion of the sort of meat needed for beef juice, beef tea and scraped beef receive the same proportion of this meat as do those institutions which require the largest proportion of coarser meat to be used in regular diet for inmates actively employed. The proportion of the different grades of employees and other inmates varies so considerably in the different institutions that it is practically impossible to preserve uniform dietaries for the same classes in different institutions, unless this distribution of meat can be so regulated from a central point.

In January of this year Miss Rushmore, Dietitian at the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, was compelled by ill health to tender her resignation.

Miss Josephine Finley, Pupil Dietitian at the Metropolitan Hospital, was called away suddenly by serious illness of her mother.

REPORT OF THE EMPLOYMENT AGENT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1904.

April 22, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I herewith respectfully submit the following report, which is a summary of the work performed by me from January 1, 1904, to March 31, inclusive, during which period the number of personal applications made direct to this office has greatly increased in excess of the number applying during the preceding three months. From personal investigation I find that the majority of personal applications made direct to this office are not as a rule the most desirable to place as helpers in the various hospitals and institutions and asylums under the Department of Public Charities. A fair percentage, however, after a superficial investigation as to their previous occupation, record, etc., have been placed in positions where they might render the best service.

From the present date until the month of October, I usually find it the most difficult period of the year to secure desirable helpers for the hospitals and institutions, owing to the great demand for domestic service at the various seaside resorts and country boarding houses. However, with the number of employment bureaus, organizations, societies and institutions with which I keep in constant touch, I have been able to meet all the demands. We have recently had some difficulty in securing the necessary number of Nurses and Attendants for the Almshouse on Blackwell's Island, owing to the fact that quite a few applicants which have been referred to me from various sources have preferred positions in the Tuberculosis Infirmary, as the salary attached to the latter position is twenty-five dollars per month.

Complaints with regard to the laborious work on Blackwell's Island and Randall's Island have considerably decreased, and I have not been obliged to make many transfers as in the previous months.

Regarding the additional work for Bellevue Hospital, I would state that I have received frequent requests from Bellevue Hospital, all of which I have endeavored to fill, after supplying the several orders received from the various hospitals, institutions and asylums under your supervision, giving them the precedent.

Through the Department of Health, requests for Ward Helpers and Laundresses have been received from Riverside and Willard Parker Hospitals, which requests have been filled according to your recent directions.

The request for a telephone, which you very kindly granted, has been of great service, and has greatly facilitated my work.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department Public Charities:

Dear Sir—In forwarding the report of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1904, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

There have been 2,882 applicants sent to hospitals for adults; 243 children sent to the institutions for children on Randall's Island; 675 persons to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

Transportation has been afforded to 167 sick and destitute persons to reach their homes, thereby preventing them from becoming charges upon the City and County of New York.

There have been 145 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse for care, awaiting transportation.

There have been 445 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging House, and 96 destitute aliens returned to the office of the Commissioner of Immigration.

There have also been sent from this Bureau 20 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics; 5 to the Syracuse State Institution for Feeble Minded Children; 3 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble Minded Women; 27 deaf mutes sent to institutions; 162 men and 161 women sent to Bellevue Hospital for examination as to sanity, making a total of 5,031 cases handled by this Bureau during the quarter ending March 31, 1904.

In addition this Department has examined 6,051 sick and destitute persons to be cared for in hospitals and homes other than our own, at the expense of the City, of which 957 were rejected as improper charges, thus showing that the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York has cared for, at the expense of the City, 5,094 persons in institutions other than our own, besides 5,031 in our own institutions, making a total of 10,125 cases disposed of in this Bureau during the quarter ending March 31, 1904.

This Bureau has also taken 83 depositions of complaint and abandonment; 64 non-support; 60 bastardy, all of which have been sent to Court. There have been 151 abandonment cases and 6 bastardy cases settled in this office. The result from these cases has been a collection of \$24,996.50 for the support of these persons during said quarter, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of the City and County of New York.

This Bureau has also the charge of the City Morgue, where 2,897 bodies were received during the quarter ending March 31, 1904, of which but 1,199 were buried by friends.

This Bureau has also issued 10,000 passes to visitors and given 525 meals to destitute persons awaiting disposition, and there have been 501 calls for the sick wagon.

From this report may be deduced the fact that the work and business transacted are constantly increasing.

I regret to say that the applications for admission to the several State institutions, to wit, the Craig Colony for Epileptics, Rome State Custodial Asylum for Un-teachable Idiots, Syracuse State Institution for Feeble Minded Children, State Custodial Asylum for Feeble Minded Women and the New York State Woman's Relief Corps Home are on file in this office, and are largely in excess of the number admitted. This is due to the fact that the State has, for reasons unknown to this Department, failed to provide sufficient quarters for the reception and care of such patients suitable for them.

In conclusion I would say that the work is energetically and expeditiously performed through the thorough organization of the force under my supervision. One fact I should not forget to mention here, namely, that there is a dire necessity of additional clerical help in this Bureau.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL LODGING HOUSE FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1904.

Dear Sir—I beg to submit herewith the report of the operations of the Municipal Lodging House for quarter ending March 31, 1904.

In addition to tabulated statistics, I take great pleasure in calling your attention to the fact that this institution is and has been for a long time in as perfect condition in every detail as it is possible to make it, taking into consideration the size and style of the building we occupy. Therefore it required but the ordinary repairs, etc., during this quarter to keep it in said condition.

Precaution Against Fire.

As is usual, employees are being continually schooled as to their duties in case of fire. All fire extinguishers, fire hose and other fire appliances throughout the institution are inspected and tested at regular intervals.

Supplies.

Supplies of all kinds received during this quarter from the Storehouse, Meat Department and Bakery were of very good quality.

Requisitions.

Requisitions for supplies, repairs, etc., have been acted upon promptly and in a very satisfactory manner by the officials having charge of same at the Central Office.

Disposition of Inmates.

Reports, etc., as to the disposition of such inmates, referred to the Bureau of Dependent Adults and the Bureau of Dependent Children have been received, as usual, without delay.

Charitable Societies.

All communications, requests, etc., to and from all charitable organizations and interested individuals have been acted upon promptly and courteously.

Conduct of Employees.

Taken into consideration the fact that we fed, lodged, bathed, fumigated clothing and rendered medical and surgical aid (when needed) to 22,754 men, women and children of all nationalities and creeds during this quarter, I think I have every reason to feel proud of the conduct on the whole of the officers and employees of this institution (about 66 per cent. of the employees are unpaid).

Overflow.

I beg to state that on 22 different occasions during this quarter we were unable to properly provide for in this building owing to our limited number of beds (300) all who applied for lodging, etc., but were compelled after feeding the same to shelter them (1,999 men) in two large rooms (heated) on Twenty-sixth Street Dock. These men, under the circumstances, do not have an opportunity of receiving a bath or having their clothing fumigated.

This same state of affairs have existed since 1896 and will without doubt continue to exist until such time as the City feels it their duty to provide us with a building, such as suggested in my letter to you under date of February 11, 1904, from which I beg to quote the following:

I would respectfully recommend:

"That the City purchase or provide sufficient land and erect thereon a building about 50 feet front by 80 feet deep, five stories and basement, for men, with an annex

about 25 feet front by 50 feet deep, two stories and basement, for women and children; the balance of the depth of the lot, 30 feet, in the rear of the annex, to be utilized in building thereon an airtight vault for the purpose of fumigating clothing, hats, shoes, etc., with Formaldehyde gas."

In conclusion, Commissioner, I beg to thank you very much for your very kind and prompt approval of my recommendations for new buildings, etc., and forwarding the same with your approval to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, whom I sincerely trust will weigh the subject up in as careful and intelligent manner as did yourself, and grant you speedy, favorable action on the same.

One Nurse was restored to the roll, 3 resigned, 4 Probationers dropped and 5 Pupil Nurses graduated.

During the quarter there were 8 Nurses dropped from the roll for illness. Four of these were cases of typhoid, which had developed at Harlem Hospital. An investigation was made of these cases and no satisfactory result was obtained as to the cause. It was supposed that it might have developed from drinking the water from the faucets, as the Nurses were obliged to do from time to time when on duty. As the Nurses had the same food as the rest of the Training School, and no other cases had developed, it seemed reasonable to suppose that it might be due to this. The Nurses all made good recoveries, and have since been restored to the roll.

In January, 16 applicants came up for examination. Of these, 15 were taken in as Probationers, 8 finally being appointed as Pupil Nurses in the School.

In March the second class of the year was taken in; 14 came up for examination and passed and are at present doing very well in their course.

The building of the north wing, which was begun in October, has gone on steadily during the quarter. In spite of the cold weather the builders have made excellent progress, and we are hoping that nothing will prevent the completion of the work on time.

The question of our dining pavilion came up in this quarter, was approved and, without alteration of the plans, advertised for.

A number of repairs have been carried out in Schuyler Hall, notably the lighting facilities have been improved by the addition of argand lamps in the Nurses' rooms.

The landings of City Hospital, where the Nurses do most of the ward writing at night, have also been furnished with them, an improvement which is much appreciated.

During this quarter a requisition of furniture for the Superintendent's sitting-room was allowed. This is the first requisition that has been allowed for the Superintendent of the School in eight years. The improvement was quite marked, and very much appreciated.

The work of the educational course of the School has gone on steadily, the first lectures of the third year being given this year. The improvement in the course of bacteriology was also quite marked, owing to the fact that a number of necessities had been received, which allowed us to use our own material instead of borrowing from City Hospital, or using the City Hospital laboratory.

The work has gone on from every standpoint, the only drawbacks being those impossible to avoid, due to the very unsettled condition of the grounds and the entrances to the buildings, on account of the building going on on the grounds. This discomfort, however, has been reduced to a minimum owing to the kindness and consideration of the contractors, Messrs. Walter Reid & Co., who have done everything they could to carry on the work as rapidly as possible and yet disturb the inmates as little as possible.

In February, the death of the Superintendent of City Hospital, the Hon. Joseph Schilling, was a severe blow to the School. Although a very quiet, unpretentious man, he seemed to have gained a remarkable hold over everyone who came in contact with him. His loss was sincerely mourned.

During the quarter the former friends of the School have remembered us with many donations in the form of money, flowers and other little things for the comfort of the sick Nurses, as well as the patients of City Hospital. Mrs. Cadwalader Jones has also been unremitting in her attentions and interest in the welfare of the School, and it is due to her helpful suggestions and approval that many of our rough places have been made smooth.

In submitting this report I would thank the Commissioner, Hon. James H. Tully, and his colleagues for their kind consideration of all our needs; also the officials of City Hospital, including the Medical Board, for courtesies too numerous to mention.

On the 31st day of March, 1904, our pay-roll numbered 191, the following changes being made during the quarter:
Four (4) Orderlies' positions abolished, at \$150 per annum.
Nurses and Orderlies (39), all told, were transferred to the Training School pay-roll.
One (1) Hospital Helper, "extra," at \$300 per annum, Wheelwright, and one (1) Hospital Helper, "extra," at \$120 per annum, as Assistant Waiter in employees' dining-room.
Per capita cost, per diem, for entire maintenance of institution for quarter ending March 31, 1904, was \$0.8027.

Improvements During the Quarter.

The completion of a new system of plumbing in the annex was one of the most important under the improvements this quarter, as it gave us better sanitary conditions in the female dormitory.

The furnishing of the new laundry was begun.

The Painters painted over forty rooms in the Home and Infirmary.

The Plasterers did a great amount of patching of old ceilings and walls in Home, in Hospital and in Infirmary. The old walls here are constantly falling.

The Carpenters did much work in the line of building cases, cabinets, clothes closets, medicine closets, partitions and doors, and a number of other small repairs.

The Sewing Room did an unusual amount of work this quarter. The demands on the Sewing Room this quarter were very heavy, owing to the greatly increased census due to the opening of new wards.

The Engineer's Department were hard worked, owing to the fact that they had three separate boiler-houses, or heating plants, to run; two of them temporary, owing to the cutting off from the main heating plant of the Infirmary and the Male Medical Building.

The interior telephone system was extended to outlying buildings and central switchboard enlarged.

The male Nurses and Orderlies were transferred to the Training School pay-roll—another step in the reclassification of employees.

The death of Mrs. Mulloy, 22 years an employee in the Department, part of the time as Nurse, and for the last few years as Matron at the Metropolitan Hospital, removed one of the most faithful employees in the Department.

A few important improvements were made in the Drug Department of the institution, as follows:

Repainting the Drug Store, adding new shelving, new shop bottles.

Stock room was put in good condition.

A liquor rack was built in the store room, greatly lessening the labor of handling liquors, as heretofore they were kept on the second floor.

The supplies were sent to the wards promptly.

Dilutions were made for the first time in the Drug Store.

Several improvements were made in the Dietary Department. A more liberal diet was given employees, a more competent chef employed in the staff kitchen, a better grade of assistants were secured for the main kitchen, and a closer supervision of the appropriations of foods. Summary.

During the quarter one hundred and seventy-nine (179) days were lost owing to illness; nine (9) vacations were granted; two (2) Nurses at the Infirmary resigned; six (6) Nurses were dropped temporarily owing to illness and six (6) were called home by illness; of these seven (7) were reappointed; four (4) Post-graduates and four (4) Pupil Nurses completed the course of training; four (4) Post-graduates, three (3) Pupils and eight (8) Nurses for the Infirmary were appointed.

On January 1 we received a class of eleven (11) probationers and undertook the instruction which during the previous quarter had been received with the class at the New York City Training School.

Owing to the lack of room and equipment at the Nurses' Home, we continued to send the class to the City Hospital for Miss Corbett's lectures in the "Principles of Cookery." The class was examined both in practice and theory at the end of the term, making a class average of 79 15-16 per cent.

In order to facilitate our clerical work, the permanent Nurses and Orderlies were transferred from the Hospital to the Training School pay-roll on January 1 and February 1, respectively.

When the Convalescent Hospital was opened for the Male Medical Service on December 14 we asked for seven (7) extra positions in order to supply Nurses for the service. An extra nurse was also recommended for Ward H, Genito-urinary, owing to an increase in census.

On January 20, we were notified that the positions had been abolished, owing to the lack of appropriation. Our work continued to increase owing to the overcrowded condition of the hospital, and on February 19 we were allowed three extra Nurses and two Orderlies. On March 14 the full number of positions were granted, as recommended in December.

At the "Home," the Nurses' rooms were painted, and supplied with wardrobes and washstands, thereby adding very much to their comfort.

Book-cases were received for the library, and text-books for the use of the preparatory class. The weekly classes in theory and practice continued under the instruction of Misses Corbett, Bollerman and Ward, and lectures were delivered to the graduating class by Doctors E. P. Swift, J. B. Mickle, P. C. Thomas and John Hutchinson.

We received a check from a member of the Board of Managers to be used for games for convalescent patients.

FIRST QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE KINGS COUNTY HOSPITAL, THE NEW YORK CITY HOME FOR THE AGED AND INFIRM, BROOKLYN DIVISION; CUMBERLAND STREET HOSPITAL, BRADFORD STREET HOSPITAL, RECEPTION HOSPITAL, CONEY ISLAND; ALSO TRAINING SCHOOLS AND OTHER BRANCHES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, NEW YORK, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner Public Charities, New York:

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the First Quarterly Report for the year 1904 of the public hospitals and institutions of the Department of Public Charities, boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Kings County Hospital.

The population of the Kings County Hospital December 31, 1903, was 535, and 2,218 were admitted during the quarter, making the total number under treatment 2,753; of this number 1,009 were discharged recovered, 616 were discharged improved, 74 unimproved, 212 were transferred to the State hospitals, 223 died, leaving under treatment in the hospital 619, March 31, 1904. The percentage of deaths was 8.10. There were 48 cases of confinement, 45 children were born alive and 3 still births.

The Visiting Staff made 387 visits during the quarter. The number of major operations performed was 64. The convalescent patients performed 5,369 days' labor. The average daily census was 603; as the total number of beds is only 578, it leaves apparently an average of 25 so-called floor beds; I say apparently, because in reality the number of floor beds exceeds frequently 100. This is due to the fact that the number of male patients admitted exceeds the women patients by over 100 per cent., with approximately the same amount of floor space, if we exclude the Home for Consumptives, which contains 67 beds.

The fact is that during the major portion of the year many male patients have to sleep on floor beds. This overcrowding can only be overcome by increasing the hospital accommodations, or removing from the premises the consumptives. This latter suggestion has been repeatedly made, as their presence on the premises is a constant menace to the health of the other patients, as the number of consumptives admitted frequently exceeds the capacity of the Home, and the overflow has to be cared for in the main hospital.

Kings County Hospital Dispensary.

In this Dispensary 812 cases were treated during the quarter, 619 of whom were males and 193 females. There were among these 348 new cases and 464 revisits.

Kings County Hospital Training School for Nurses.

There are in the Training School 57 Pupil Nurses, 55 of whom are employed at the Kings County Hospital and 2 at Bradford Street Hospital. One Probationer was accepted and 5 rejected during the quarter, 36 applications were received and 22 applications were rejected. The Probationers remaining March 31, 1904, were 10.

The New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division.

At this Home 1,313 inmates were on hand December 31, 1903; 648 cases were admitted, making a total of 1,961, of whom 1,203 were males and 758 females; 560 of these were discharged, 100 died, leaving the number of inmates remaining March 31, 1904, at 1,301.

Neurological Department.

The number of inmates remaining December 31, 1903, were 119; 65 were admitted, 31 were discharged improved, leaving the number remaining March 31, 1904, at 132; 52,071 days' labor were performed by inmates of the Home for Aged and Infirm between December 21, 1903, and March 31, 1904. The daily average census of the Home was 1,372 inmates.

Cumberland Street Hospital.

There remained at the Cumberland Street Hospital December 31, 1903, 158 patients; 602 were admitted, making the total number under treatment 760. Of these 418 were discharged recovered, 99 improved, 3 unimproved, 78 died, leaving at the Hospital March 31, 1904, 162. The percentage of death was 10.26. The average daily population was 170.

The same conditions prevailed at this Hospital regarding overcrowding that prevails at the Kings County Hospital. For the past six months there has been practically constantly a number of patients sleeping on floor beds. This is due again to the fact that there are more male patients admitted to this hospital than females, with practically the same facilities for caring for each sex.

The Visiting Staff made 339 visits and performed 56 major operations. During the quarter there were 1,456 days' labor performed by convalescent patients.

Cumberland Street Hospital Dispensary.

At this Dispensary 3,156 cases were treated during the quarter, 1,705 of which were males and 1,451 females; 848 were new and 2,308 were revisits.

Cumberland Street Hospital Training School for Nurses.

There are 23 Nurses employed in this school. The number of applications received were 15, number of applications rejected 12, Probationers accepted 1, remaining March 31, 1904, 1.

Bradford Street Hospital.

The number of patients remaining in this hospital December 31, 1903, was one; admitted during the quarter 28 men and 9 women, making a total under treatment 38; of these 17 were discharged recovered, 12 were improved, 5 died and 4 remained March 31, 1904. Number of visits made by visiting staff 7, number of major operations performed 4.

Number of days labor by convalescent patients 91, average daily census 3.

Bradford Street Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 1,298 males were treated and 794 females, making a total of 2,092. Of these 424 were new cases and 1,568 revisits.

Remarks.

In connection with the contract work at the Kings County Hospital and Cumberland Street Hospital, would say that the work has been progressing as the weather conditions permitted.

The new stable is nearly completed, and will be very acceptable in view of the condition of the old one. In the new domestic building work has progressed so far that the interior plastering is practically complete, excepting the first floor. The wainscoting is being placed in position, the corridor connecting the domestic building with the main hospital is rapidly approaching completion, the new storehouse is inclosed and work of installing the fireproof flooring is under way.

The work on the exterior balconies, the fireproofing and the external repairs to the Cumberland Street Hospital are completed.

Supplemental to this report will be found statistical tables giving in detail the operations of the different departments, including the financial operations of this hospital and institutions, all of which is submitted.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to herewith submit my report for the three months ending March 31, 1904.

Owing to the increasing population of this borough, the number of applications for commitment of children to institutions and families have been increasing very fast. I have had every application thoroughly investigated, and in no instance has a child been committed unless the parents were unable to care for said child, or could pay part-board when able.

When application has been made for the discharge of children, before the children have been discharged, I have had the cases investigated, and if the parents did not have a proper home, the application was disapproved.

In reference to the abandonment and bastardy proceedings brought before the "Courts," I have had a representative of the Corporation Counsel's office prosecute these cases vigorously.

The admission of patients to the two hospitals in this borough have been investigated, and where the patient was able to pay, he was compelled to do so, thus relieving the City of that burden.

ART COMMISSION.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF ART COMMISSION, HELD AT ITS OFFICE, ROOM 21, CITY HALL, ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 1904, AT 4 O'CLOCK, P. M.

Present—President Warner, presiding; Commissioners Healy, Rhinelander, Proctor, Crimmins, Farragut, Marshall and Hon. George E. Best, Commissioner of Bridges, in respect to the designs for the Manhattan Bridge.

On communications from Commissioners Beckwith and Bigelow, explaining their absence, it was excused.

Minutes of August 9 were read and approved.

The President's report was presented, stating that the following submissions had been referred to Committees since the last meeting, August 9:

Submission 262.

Stable, Street Cleaning Department—Commissioners Marshall, Chairman; Crimmins and Farragut. Appointed August 11, 1904.

Submission 263.

Hall of Records Sculptures—Commissioners Proctor, Chairman; Healy and Farragut. Appointed August 31, 1904.

Submission 264.

Bedford Park Comfort Station—Commissioners Healy, Chairman; Marshall and Crimmins. Appointed September 12, 1904.

Submission 265.

Forest Park Shelter—Commissioners Healy, Chairman; Marshall and Crimmins. Appointed September 12, 1904.

Submission 266.

Skene Monument—Commissioners Proctor, Chairman; Healy and Rhinelander. Appointed September 12, 1904.

The President further reported that communications from the Municipal Art Society, and from the Board of Directors and Committee on Franchises and Transportation of the Merchants' Association, relative to the Manhattan Bridge submission, had been received and referred to the Committee on such submission.

Submission 259.

The Committee on St. George Ferry Terminal, Staten Island, presented the following report upon designs submitted (on request of the Mayor) by Mr. John M. Carrere, architect:

"Your Committee on the St. George Ferry Terminal advise the Commission to approve the designs submitted."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Certificate 274.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of the St. George ferry terminal, Staten Island, represented by Exhibits "138A," "138B," "138C," "138E," "138F," "138G," "138H," "138I," "138J," "138K" and "138L," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Mr. John M. Carrere, architect. The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 260.

The Committee on Pan Statue presented the following report upon designs (of a new work of art) submitted by Hon. John J. Pallas, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond:

"Your Committee on Pan Statue begs to recommend the approval of the designs and location as submitted."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Certificate 275.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs of the statue of the god "Pan" for the proposed location, represented by Exhibits "125H,"

"125I" and "125J," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. John J. Pallas, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was directed to inform Commissioner Pallas that the Commission considered the proposed site inappropriate for the statue, and that the action just taken was not an expression of adverse criticism upon the statue itself. The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 261.

The Committee on Beecher Statue Relocation recommended that it be disapproved, owing to the inadequacy of the proposed site.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate 276.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the proposed relocation of the Beecher statue in City Hall Park, Brooklyn, represented by Exhibits "139A" and "139B," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Michael J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was directed to inform Commissioner Kennedy that in view of the present conditions in the immediate neighborhood, the proposed site was considered inadequate.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 258.

On motion, and at the request of the Committee on Manhattan Bridge, a hearing was granted the representatives of the Merchants' Association.

Mr. S. C. Mead, Secretary, appeared on behalf of the association, and presented a statement of its position. The communication was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, Mr. O. F. Nichols, Chief Engineer of the Department of Bridges, was granted an opportunity to reply to the statement of the Merchants' Association.

The Committee on Manhattan Bridge then submitted the following report upon designs (of a public structure exceeding \$1,000,000 in cost), submitted by Hon. George E. Best, Commissioner of Bridges:

"Your Committee begs to report that it has had before it the designs for the Manhattan Bridge, submitted by Commissioner Best, and the papers from various sources relevant thereto, all of which have been considered with care.

"As to the letters and other communications from individuals and societies, it appears that they agree in asking this Commission to request the Mayor to appoint a Commission of Engineers of eminence to report upon the structural merits of the proposed bridge, and ask that, pending the receipt of such a report, this Commission withhold approval of the designs for this bridge, now before it, irrespective of the merit of the design.

"Inasmuch as the Commissioner of Bridges, and not the Art Commission, must be responsible for the stability and economical construction of the bridge, which has been duly authorized by law, it appears to your Committee that this Commission does not require for the exercise of its own functions in this regard further information in reference to the said questions of stability and economy, and that it is not called upon to express itself in relation to the question whether the appointment of such a Commission of Engineers would be, or would not be, advisable.

"The designs for the bridge itself have received close study by your Committee, and, in its opinion, are fully worthy of approval. Your Committee therefore begs to advise the Commission to approve of the designs as presented by Commissioner Best, in connection with his submission, as amended by his subsequent letter of September 14, 1904, herewith reported."

"September 14, 1904.

To the Art Commission of The City of New York:

Dear Sirs—I am in due receipt of a communication bearing date 13 September, from Milo R. Maltbie, Assistant Secretary of your Honorable Commission, inclosing a resolution which he states was adopted at a meeting of the Committee having under consideration the Manhattan Bridge matters passed on the date mentioned and directed by that Committee to be transmitted to me.

The resolution is in the following terms:

"Resolved, That the 'extent to which approval is now requested' being only of 'the aesthetic features of the design of the bridge from anchorage to anchorage, inclusive,' in the opinion of the Committee, the words 'the aesthetic features of the design of the bridge from anchorage to anchorage, inclusive,' are not a sufficient designation of the precise matters submitted for our approval to comply with the requirements of the law."

In answer to this communication, I have to say that the form of submission was adopted from that submitted February 14, 1903, to your Honorable Commission in reference to the same bridge and on which your Honorable Commission acted and approved the design submitted therewith, as per Certificate No. 96, dated March 10, 1903.

I assumed, therefore, that this form of submission was acceptable to your Commission.

However this may be, to prevent any misunderstanding or delay in this important matter, I desire to state to you that the words "aesthetic features of the design" are intended by me to comprehend all the matters which, under section 637 of the Charter, can be passed upon by your Honorable Commission as the "design" of the bridge.

The terms "from anchorage to anchorage, inclusive," are added in order to exclude the approaches, the plans for which have never been made, and which, as anticipated in section 637 of the Charter, I shall submit to you as a separate matter as soon as ready.

Trusting this explanation will remove any doubt as to the matters intended to be submitted, I am,

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

Commissioner Best then moved that he be permitted to amend the submission by striking out the words "aesthetic features of the," upon page 2 of the form, which request was granted by unanimous consent, and the submission under consideration considered as having been so amended.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Certificate 277.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of the Manhattan Bridge represented by Exhibits "63K," "63L," "63M," "63N," "63O," "63P," "63Q," "63R," "63S," "63T" and "63U," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. George E. Best, Commissioner of Bridges.

At the request of the President, his dissent was noted with the following statement of his reasons therefor:

"In the matter of the Manhattan Bridge, the law puts upon the Art Commission a most serious responsibility. As to our function, the Statute provides that 'every such structure which shall hereafter be erected or contracted for at an expense exceeding \$1,000,000' shall not 'become the property of The City of New York,' or be 'allowed to extend over or upon any street, avenue, square, common, park, municipal building or other public place belonging to the City,' unless its design with statement of the proposed location 'shall first have been submitted to and approved by the Commission.' Whatever the procedure adopted, upon the Commission, under the Statute, is put the responsibility for permitting or forbidding the execution of the designs submitted.

"Any depreciation of the competence of the Art Commission from an engineering standpoint, while of weight as bearing upon the procedure to be adopted, rather favors insistence by the Commission upon a procedure so adequate that the public as well as itself may properly rely upon it.

"The repeated submissions of the Manhattan Bridge design illustrate the need of some better system than we have, possibly the means by which this may be worked out, and the leaps in the dark, led by the Art Commission, that the City must take in default of such.

"During Mayor Van Wyck's administration designs for a wire cable suspension bridge, involving many months, if not several years, in preparation, were practically ready for submission, had the law then so provided. Upon the coming in of Mayor Low's administration, the new Bridge Commissioner discarded these designs and

prepared new ones, involving other months of work, providing for eye-bar instead of wire cable construction. These, on February 10, 1903, were submitted by Mayor Low to a select commission of expert engineers for their opinion, preparatory, in case they should approve such designs, to submitting them for approval by the Art Commission, which was shortly thereafter made. March 9 the engineering experts made a full and favorable report, whereupon, upon this and the report of its Committee, with special reference to aesthetic features, the Art Commission, on March 10, approved the designs thus submitted. Appropriation for their execution, however, not having been made, work thereunder was suspended. Meanwhile a new City administration, under which Mr. Best became Bridge Commissioner, came into office. He promptly discarded Commissioner Lindenthal's designs, which had been thus approved, and has now submitted new designs involving wire cable construction. In regard to these the Art Commission has received from Commissioner Best, as well as from engineering experts and public spirited bodies and individuals, communications which indicate this matter as one in which are involved great financial and professional interests as well as the adequacy of the design for the use proposed and the stability and safety of the bridge to be built—in addition to such decided and opposing conviction on the part of the successive Bridge Commissioners as—while not discrediting either—indicates how hard, as well as how important, is the problem proposed.

"In this connection, two propositions have been prominently mooted:

"First—That in such cases, the function of the Art Commission is only as to the aesthetic features of the designs submitted. To this there are two obvious answers:

"(a) Whether or not the statute be a prudent one, no one questions the power of the Art Commission by approval to permit the erection of the structure proposed, or, by disapproval, to prevent it. It is, therefore, responsible for the use of this power.

"(b) Whatever may be urged as to a work of art, whose sole utility is aesthetic—in such a case as this—where the design is directly related to the solution proposed for the engineering problems involved—it seems clear that no design should be approved that is not consistent with adequate and fitting solution of such problems.

"Second—That, as to other than aesthetic qualities, the Art Commission should accept the judgment of the Bridge Department submitting the design. The matter is not one of official etiquette, but rather of meeting the responsibility put upon the Commission as fully in the public interest, as, on behalf of a private owner, would a scrupulous trustee or employee a responsibility of equal importance, both financially and to the convenience and safety of such myriads of people.

"Whether the procedure of last year, had as a basis for the Commission's approval of the Lindenthal designs, was the best or sufficiently guarded, it was certainly not more thorough than such a problem deserved. It is submitted that the Art Commission should not permit a new design to be substituted without at least as satisfactory advice as that on which it approved the one now proposed to be discarded."

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 262.

The Committee on Stable, Street Cleaning Department, presented the following report upon designs submitted (on request of the Mayor) by Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

"Your Committee on Stable for the Street Cleaning Department advise the Commission to approve of the plans and general arrangement of the building, but disapprove of the designs for the exterior, which seem to your Committee to require very much more serious study than has been given to them."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Certificate 278.
