SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received at the Comptroller's office, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

Queens County Court House—Carpentry: Made and put up storm sash; repaired hand rail on stoop stairs; took down partition; repaired and put on door checks; cleaned old partition and put up same in new location; closed top of partition in storeroom; put up iron cage and put Yale night latch on iron door; made boxes for materials and put up shelving in plumber shop; repaired locks and bolts; eased doors; put up picture moulding and repaired furniture. Tinsmithing: Made temporary repairs on roof; made galvanized iron leader pipes, galvanized iron blueprint tank, galvanized iron drip pans for laboratory and elevator shaft; pointed up tile on roof and copper flashings with roof cement; repaired ash cans, pails, boiler room utensils and made galvanized iron ice pails. Electrical Work: Repaired button and wire in County Judge's room; installed new receptacle for desk light in County Court room; repaired vacuum carpet cleaners; installed new bell in Janitor's quarters and bell wire to elevator shaft; removed and installed light in Sheriff's office; cleaned and repaired elevator machinery. 


