IMPORTANT **DATES & DEADLINES**

PRIMARY

- August 19
 Last day to register
 to vote in the primary
 (by mail and in person)
- September 13
 Primary Election

GENERAL

- October 12
 Last day to register
 to vote in the general
 (by mail and in person)
- November 6
 General Election

WHY REGISTERING MATTERS

- In the 2016 general election, only 52% of citizens who were of voting age showed up at the polls.
- Registration is the first step to voting and makes a real difference.

VOTER REGISTRATION DO'S AND DON'TS

DO

- Offer to help the applicant fill out the registration form.
- Let the applicant know you can accept their completed form or they can put it in the mail.
- Let the applicant know they will receive confirmation from the BOE in 2–4 weeks.
- Let the client know that voter forms are available in the following languages (but must be completed in English):
 - Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Bengali.

- Albanian, Arabic, French, Greek, Haitian-Creole, Italian, Polish, Russian, Tagalog, Urdu, and Yiddish (these forms are available online at **www.nyccfb.info/nyc-votes/registering**).

VOTER REGISTRATION **DO'S AND DON'TS**

DON'T

- Influence an applicant's party enrollment choice.
- Make statements supporting or opposing a political candidate, party, or PAC.
- Sign any voter registration form other than your own.



- Provide either a New York State ID number or the last 4 digits of your Social Security number.
- If you don't have either, check the third box. The first time you vote, you will need to present one of the following forms of identification at the poll site: (1) a photo ID or (2) a proof of address, such as an electric or gas bill that shows your name and address.

- You can choose one of the parties listed, write in the name of a party, or choose not to enroll in any party.
- You must enroll in one of the listed parties to vote in that party's primary elections, unless state party rules allow otherwise.
- You may change your party enrollment by completing this form before the general election registration deadline. The change will **not** take effect until the following year.



 If you will need to vote by Absentee Ballot, check the box to receive an application for an absentee ballot.

> You may also request an Absentee Ballot from the BOE after registering to vote, whether or not you check this box.



Please read the terms of the affidavit carefully before you sign and date to validate your form.

Someone can assist you with filling out the rest of the form, but **you must sign it yourself**.

HOW TO

- Congratulate the applicant on registering to vote.
- Offer to send their form to the BOE, or let them know they can drop it in the nearest mailbox.
- Let them know that they will receive a voter confirmation card and info about their poll site location in the mail in 2–4 weeks.

RECRUITING POLL WORKERS AND INTERPRETERS

- Poll workers and interpreters are needed across the city.
- Poll workers may earn up to \$575.
- Poll workers must be U.S. citizens, at least 18 years old, and registered to vote in NYC.
- Interpreters must be permanent U.S. residents, NYC residents, and fluent in English and Spanish, Chinese, or Korean.
