

VOTING IS A FUNDAMENTAL RIGHT

We need to make sure every eligible New Yorker has the power to make a difference on the issues they care about. Thanks for helping and encouraging more New Yorkers to participate in our democracy!

To register to vote in NYC, you must:

- Be a US citizen.
- Be an NYC resident for at least 30 days.
- Be 18 years old by the end of the calendar year (you must be 18 on Election Day to vote).
- Not be currently serving time for a felony. (If you are serving time for a misdemeanor, you can still vote or register to vote).*
- Not be considered mentally incompetent by a court.
- Not claim the right to vote anywhere outside of NYC.

 If you are on parole, you have the right to vote as long as you have been pardoned by the governor. Check on the status of your pardon at <u>www.doccs.ny.gov/ParoleeLookup/Lookup.aspx</u> (look for the Voting Restoration Pardon indicator).

ONLINE

If you have a valid NY state ID, you can register on the Department of Motor Vehicles website at <u>dmv.ny.gov/more-info/electronic-voter-registration-application.</u>

BY MAIL

Request a voter registration form (call 212-VOTE-NYC or print one from <u>voting.nyc</u>), fill it out, and mail it to the main Board of Elections office at 32 Broadway, 7th Fl, New York, NY 10004. Your form must be delivered or mailed at least 25 days before the next election for it to be effective for that election.

You can also obtain registration forms from libraries, post offices, and most NYC government agencies.

IN PERSON

You may register to vote at any city BOE office (see back cover for locations and hours).

You should receive a registration confirmation card from the BOE within 20 days after submitting your form. If you don't, call the BOE to verify that your application was received and processed.

To register, you can provide your DMV number (driver's license or non-driver ID) or the last four digits of your Social Security number. If you don't have either of those, you can use a valid photo ID, current utility bill, paycheck, government check, or another government document that shows your name and address.


ENROLLING IN A POLITICAL PARTY:

Enrolling in a party is optional, but in order to vote in a party's primary elections, you must be enrolled in that party.

ADDRESS:

- Use your home address to register to vote.
 If you move, you should also notify the Board of Elections of your new address by using a new registration form.
- For homeless New Yorkers: When filling out your voter registration form, write a location where you can be found, such as "Bench on Central Park on 86th Street" and an address where you can receive mail, such as a shelter or a P.O. Box.

STATE VOTER REGISTRATION FORM

| 1 You must be a citizen to register to vote. |
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| Your name must match the name on your ID. Writing your phone number and/or email allows the BOE to contact you if there are any problems with your registration form. It is not |
| required. |
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| 10 If you are updating your voter registration, this information will help the BOE locate your voting record. It is not required. |
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| Provide either a New York State ID number or the last 4 digits of your social security number. |
| If you don't have either, check the third box. The first time you vote, you will need to present identification at the poll site: (1) a photo ID or (2) a proof of address, such as an electric or gas bill that shows your name and address. |
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| Please read the terms of the affidavit carefully before you sign and date to validate your form. |
| Someone can assist you with filling out the rest of the form, but <u>you must sign it yourself</u> . |
