

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 24, 1888:

There were 5,836 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 506 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 325 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 25 permits.

The certificates of 698 births, 65 still-births, 213 marriages and 861 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 24, 1888. This shows an increase of 137 births, 6 still-births, 13 marriages and 61 deaths,

when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1887 there was an increase of 143 births, 1 still-birth and 164 deaths, and a decrease of 1 marriage. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles 5; scarlatina, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; malarial fevers, 5; rheumatism and gout, 6; bronchitis, 18; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convolisions, 1; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 4; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 9; croup, 3; whooping-cough, 7; erysipelas, 6; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhead diseases, 1; inantion, 3; cancer, 2; phthiss pulmonalis, 6; pneumonal, 10; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 8; surgical operations, 5; and suicides, 3. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, alcoholism, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 223 were in institutions, 448 in tenement-houses, 153 in houses containing three families or less, 19 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 118 on the first, 201 on the second, 140 on the third, 111 on the fourth, 39 on the fifth, 5 on the sixth; 829 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 32 non-resident; 124 were stated to be single, 212 warried, 108 widowed, and the condition of 417 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 861; still-births, 65; bodies in transitu, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 106 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 668 births, 213 marriages, 65 still-births, 861 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 145 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 110 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 24, 1888, was 30.0 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.881; the mean humidity was 92, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,717, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0,79 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Gentlemen—I must make an earnest protest against converting any of the property shown on enclosed diagram into a park. Two new houses are completed and being occupied by the owners and I would close the contract to build six more within the coming month or perhaps within one week if this terror of a park did not hang over me. I have the sewer nearly completed to the Harlem river and the Croton water brought and gas provided for. I have expended many hundred dollars in improvements and very much prefer to build my six houses than to sell the lots at \$1,500 each. Four of them are already sold at \$1,500 each, but I have added all the improvements since they were sold. All the adjoining streets are valuable for cheap homes because they are the only lots that can be sewered into the Harlem river, hence they are available at once and convertible into choice economical homes, and with Manhattan Island less than a mile wide at this point it seems wrong to deprive the public of any part of it. By inclined elevators the whole Harlem river front, with the government improvements will be valuable. Mr. W. W. Green, to my positive knowledge, has regulated \$60,000 for about twelve lots adjoining mine on Tenth avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-third and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets, with one-third of the lots in the rear not fronting on Tenth avenue. I must repeat my earnest and solemn protest against any park at this point.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to tecome dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.
