The 824 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.05, against 23.20 for the previous week and 24.08 for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 112, 79, 182, 10, 45 and 3, against 98, 78, 154, 11, 30 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 431 against 377. The increase of diphtheria was most marked in the Ninth, Eleventh, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh and Fifteenth Wards. There was a noticeable increase of measles in the Eighth, Eleventh and Twenty-thurd Wards, and a great decrease in the Twelfth, Fourteenth and Nineteenth Wards, Scatlet fever increased markedly in the Ninth, Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards, and decreased in the Sixteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards. 26 of the 45 cases of typhus fever were below Fourteenth street, and 10 of the remaining 19 were between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets, mostly on the east side.
