The sum of \$487,125 of the total increase asked for the year 1904 for salaries is for the cost of strengthening the Uniformed Force in order that more time may be afforded its members for purposes of rest and recreation; for promotions and for

advancements in grade and pay by operation of law; for the expense of providing an adequate working force for the new companies to be organized and the single companies to be reorganized as double companies; for the salaries of one additional Deputy Chief of Department and two Chiefs of Battalion, and for the salary of a Chief of Battalion (an existing position), which was asked but not allowed in the Budget for 1903.

The major part of the remaining \$27,102.80 is necessary to provide for additions to the staff of employees in various bureaus and branches to keep pace with the growth of the Department; a limited portion being for deserved increases of compensation to a small number of specially worthy subordinates.

Due to the pressing demand for funds to procure new apparatus for the companies to be established and those single companies to be reorganized as double companies, as well as for replacing that which, after long years of use, has deteriorated in effectiveness and calls for more or less extensive renovation, and also for incidental repair work; to the urgent need of an increased amount for repairing the houses of the Department so that they may be in proper condition, sanitary and otherwise, for occupancy by the uniformed force; to the necessity for adequate provision for fuel for the land engines, fireboats and company quarters, and forage for the horses, the cost of both of which items will probably be larger than under ordinary market conditions; to the requirement that an adequate supply of hose shall be obtainable to meet the wants of new companies, as also to supersede that no longer suitable for fire extinguishing purposes, and also for indispensable repair work; to a moderate increase in the amount required to pay the rental of leased premises; to the fact that a larger sum must be expended next year for telegraph supplies and repairs to maintain the fire alarm system at a high standard of efficiency, and, finally, to the imperative need of having an increased allowance at hand for the making of repairs to the existing fleet of fireboats.

Duties correspond with those of the position of the same title in other boroughs, and the incumbent will be responsible to his superior officer for the proper conduct of the business of the office and the employees assigned thereto.

This number is required so that there may be three hours of duty daily with two operators assigned to each.

One to care for the batteries in the Central Office and each fire company's local batteries over part of the North Shore, and one to care for the renewing of the latter and for the batteries of the automatic systems in New Dorp and Tottenville. Two of this number will be required for the North Shore and Edgewater systems, one for night and one for day duty, and the third Lineman will be needed in connection with the New Dorp and Tottenville automatic systems.

It is estimated that there will be required one trunk line to the Central Office, one wire to the Chief Operator's house and one wire each to the respective houses of the Chiefs of the North Shore and of the Edgewater Fire Departments.

This amount will be necessary to provide material for the maintenance of the batteries and general repairs to the system of lines.

This amount is deemed necessary to provide for additional boxes to meet the probable public demand.

This amount is considered a conservative estimate of the expense of constructing the new lines which will probably be required in connection with the location of the new boxes above referred to.

This amount is regarded as necessary to provide for the emergency liable to be occasioned by a breakdown in the small amount of cable in use.

Based upon the data furnished by the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, it is assumed that during the coming year at least two destructive storms may be looked for, and in view of the length of circuits and the difficulties of transportation the amount asked is thought moderate.

One buggy and one work wagon will be needed by Linemen and trouble hunters; an outfit of harness will also be required. For these purposes, as also for repairs that may become necessary, the sum specified is regarded as fair and reasonable.

It is estimated that for the carfares of Linemen, trouble hunters, etc., stabling for horses and other incidental expenses, the sum asked will prove no more than sufficient.

The new fire alarm telegraph system for this borough, which, since the early part of the year has been in process of construction, will be completed and ready for service by the 1st of October, 1903, with the central office located at New Brighton.

It had been estimated that \$3,425 would be required for salaries and \$575 for incidental expenses for the last quarter of the current year, and under date of July 29, 1903, an application was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the authorization of the issue of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$4,000, the proceeds to be applied to these purposes, but the same was denied for want of power to grant it.

The increase is explained as follows:

Three single companies (now organized) will be made double companies the early part of 1904. This accounts for the increase in apparatus, fuel, hose, horses, forage and shoeing. The increase in General Supplies account is for the purpose of furnishing these three companies with equipments, beds, bedding, etc.

The increase in the Telegraph account is due to the necessity of purchasing more fire alarm signal boxes and instruments, to replace those now worn out and unreliable; also for telegraph wire to rebuild and extend the aerial system.

Owing to the increase in the price of coal during the current year, it was necessary to use for this purpose the money set aside for many repairs to buildings. The amount asked for 1904 only covers the repairs anticipated in 1903 and those that have since become necessary.

The appropriation for 1903, did not permit the purchase of engines, hook and ladder trucks, hose wagons, water tower and fire hose that was actually required. The purchase of one engine, one hook and ladder truck, eleven Chief Officers' wagons and a small amount of hose was all the appropriation permitted.

—and the following resolutions of the Park Board, adopted on the 2d day of July, 1903, and on the day of , 1903, assenting to, authorizing and approving this contract, of which the following are copies:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond be and he hereby is authorized to cause plans and specifications to be prepared for the following named works on parks in the Borough of Manhattan, and when the same shall have been prepared and forms of the several proposed contracts approved by the Corporation Counsel to publish advertisements inviting proposals for doing the works:

1. For furnishing and erecting two-rail pipe fence in the small park on the East river, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets.
2. For paving with rock asphalt mastic the walk in Central Park adjacent to Fifth avenue, between Ninetieth and Ninety-eighth streets.
3. For constructing a walk pavement of Portland cement mortar on the Esplanade, adjacent to the sea wall along the water front of the extension of East River Park.
4. Repaving West Seventy-second street, from Central Park West to Riverside Park.
5. Resurfacing the Harlem River Driveway.
6. Relaying the walks and doing other work around the Sherman statue.
7. For the general improvement of Manhattan square.
8. For the general improvement of St. Nicholas Park.
9. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances from the mineral springs in Central Park to the City sewer.
10. For general repairs to the pavements of walks in the Central and City Parks.
11. For erecting a temporary comfort station on the Harlem River Driveway near High Bridge.
12. For the construction of new asphalt gutters in Central Park where the same will be necessary owing to general reconstruction of drives.

—and the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 16, 1903:

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond has presented to this Board a form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications" for furnishing and setting new curbstones and paving with asphalt blocks, sheet asphalt, or bituminous macadam the carriageway of West Seventy-second street, between Central Park West and Riverside Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York; and

Whereas, In clause 52 of the specifications of said contract and relating to "roadway pavement," it is provided as follows:

"The bidder may, at his option, offer to lay the roadway pavement in one or other of the following three methods, separately described and designated herein, as indicated.

Method A—Pavement of asphalt blocks three inches in thickness, with a base of Portland cement concrete and mortar three inches in thickness.

Method B—Pavement of sheet asphalt two inches in thickness, with a bituminous concrete binder one inch and a Portland cement concrete base three inches in thickness.

Method C—The Warren patent bitulithic pavement two inches in thickness, with a base of bituminous concrete four inches in thickness."

And Whereas, The specifications following the said clause, separately describe and designate the said three kinds of pavement in detail, the said Warren patent bitulithic pavement being a patented pavement;

Resolved, That the Park Board be and it hereby is authorized to advertise for bids for furnishing and setting new curbstones and paving with asphalt blocks, sheet asphalt or bituminous macadam, the carriage way of West Seventy-second street, between Central Park West and Riverside Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, in accordance with the said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," this Board being of the opinion that the conditions set forth in said form of contract and specifications will secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition between the pavement known as the Warren Brothers bituminous macadam waterproof pavement, a patented pavement, and other noiseless pavements, and accordingly this Board prescribes that the conditions set forth in said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," shall be the conditions under which the said patented pavement shall be advertised for.

Resolved, further, That a copy of said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," as presented to this Board, be annexed to and form a part of this resolution.

Witnesseth, That the parties to these presents, each in consideration of the agreements on the part of the other herein contained, have mutually agreed, and hereby mutually agree, the party of the first part for itself and its successors, and the party of the second part for itself or himself and his executors and administrators, as follows:

Covenant.

(A) Wherever in this agreement the word "Contractor," or a pronoun in the place thereof is used, the same shall mean and intend the party of the second part.

Parties described.

(B) Wherever the words "The City" or the word "Commissioner" is used in the specifications or in this contract it refers to and designates The City of New York, party of the first part, or the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond acting for the Park Board and The City of New York within the authority and powers expressly conferred upon the Commissioner.

(C) Whenever the word "Engineer" is used in the specifications or in this contract, it refers to and designates the Engineer who may, by the Commissioner of Parks, be appointed regularly or for the time being, to have charge of the construction of the work herein specified, limited to the particular duties intrusted to him.

Meaning of the word "Engineer."

(D) Wherever it is provided that anything is to be, or to be done, if or as or when or where "approved," "required," "directed," "specified," "designated" or "deemed necessary," it shall be taken, unless otherwise expressed, to mean and intend approved, required, directed, specified, designated, or deemed necessary, as the case may be, by the Engineer.

(E) The Contractor will, at his or their own cost and expense, furnish and provide all the necessary materials and labor for the purpose, and in a good, firm and

substantial manner, and strictly in accordance with the specifications herein contained or hereto annexed:

FURNISH AND SET NEW CURBSTONES, AND PAVE WITH ASPHALT, BLOCKS, SHEET ASPHALT OR BITUMINOUS MACADAM THE CARRIAGEWAY OF WEST SEVENTH SECOND STREET, BETWEEN CENTRAL PARK WEST AND RIVERSIDE PARK, IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, THE CITY OF NEW YORK, AND MAINTAIN THE ROADWAY PAVEMENT IN GOOD REPAIR FOR THE PERIOD OF FIVE YEARS.

Work described.

(F) The material and labor so to be furnished shall in every respect strictly conform to the hereinafter contained specifications and the plans and drawings therein mentioned; which specifications, plans and drawings, each and every part of them, the advertisement, the proposal for bids or estimate and the bid or estimate of the Contractor are hereby made a part and parcel of this agreement.

Parts of contract.

(G) The specifications and plans and drawings are intended to mutually explain each other, and anything which is shown on any of the plans or drawings and not mentioned or referred to in the specifications, or which is referred to in the specifications and not shown on the plans and drawings, shall be considered as being both so shown and mentioned or referred to, and shall be done and performed accordingly.

Specifications and plans to agree.

(H) The Contractor shall build, construct, and finish and fully complete the whole of the work in a manner described and shown in the specifications and by the plans and drawings, and in accordance with such further details and instructions as the Department by its Engineer may from time to time furnish or issue for the purpose of insuring the thorough completion of the work in the most efficient manner.

Further instructions.

(I) The Commissioner shall be and is hereby authorized to appoint such inspectors or other persons as the Department shall deem necessary to inspect the materials and labor furnished and done under this agreement, and to see that the same correspond with the specifications, plans and drawings, and the terms and intent thereof.

Inspectors.

(J) The Contractor, upon receiving from the Engineer written notice so to do, will forthwith remove from the site all materials, whether finished or unfinished, which the Engineer shall judge to be imperfect or improper, or not corresponding with the plans or drawings and specifications, and with the terms of this contract, and will, within a reasonable time, furnish in place thereof proper materials, and in case any work shall be condemned by the Engineer as defective or improperly done, such defective work shall be remedied and corrected as he may direct, after notice as aforesaid, and if the Contractor refuse or neglect to remove such materials and to replace them with proper materials, or to remedy and correct such defective work as aforesaid, the Commissioner may proceed immediately to remove the material or to remedy and correct the work, and to complete the same in a proper manner at the Contractor's expense.

Defective work and materials.

(K) The Contractor admits and agrees that the plans and drawings and the specifications as aforesaid exhibit the purpose and intent of the Department and the Engineer in regard to the work, but that they are not complete in every detail, and that they are to be construed as showing the purpose and intent only, and that material and labor for any detail which is clearly necessary to carry out the purpose and intent of the plans, drawings and specifications will be furnished by him as a part of his contract and without extra charge therefor.

Plans and specifications.

(L) The Contractor shall not and will not at any time hereafter dispute or complain that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the materials to be furnished or the work to be done, and he covenants and agrees that he will complete the entire work in substantial accordance with the contract, specifications, plans and drawings herein mentioned, and to the satisfaction of the Engineer, and that he will not ask, demand, sue for or attempt to recover for the entire work any extra compensation beyond the amount hereinafter stated as payable for the different works, except as there shall be a further written agreement made by the Commissioner, the Engineer and the Contractor, fixing and agreeing upon the amount of such extra work to be done and the compensation to be paid therefor.

No extras unless ordered in writing.

(M) To prevent all disputes and litigations the Engineer shall in all cases determine the amount or the quality of the several kinds of work which are to be paid for under this contract, and he shall determine all questions in relation to the work, and the construction thereof, and he shall in all cases decide every question which may arise relative to the execution of this contract on the part of the Contractor, and his estimate and decision shall be final and conclusive; and such estimate and decision, in case any questions shall arise, shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to any money under this agreement.

Engineer to decide.

(Charter, sections 453-455.)

(N) The Engineer shall inspect the materials furnished and the work done under this agreement, and see that the same strictly correspond with the specifications hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Engineer to inspect.

(O) The quantities of work to be done and the materials to be furnished under this contract, which are estimated or stated in the specifications, are approximate only; that neither the Commissioner nor The City is to be held responsible for any of them strictly obtaining in the construction of the work, and that the Contractor has judged for himself as to such quantities, and each of them, as to the other circumstances affecting the cost of the performance by him of this contract.

Quantities approximate.

(P) This contract and the specifications herein contained, and the plans herein referred to, may be modified and changed from time to time as may previously be agreed in writing between the parties hereto, in a manner not materially affecting the substance hereof, or increasing the price to be paid, in order to carry out and complete more fully and perfectly the work herein agreed to be done and performed.

Modification of contract, etc.

See chapter, sections 413-426.

No claim for extra work or materials shall be made by or allowed to the Contractor, unless before the performance of such extra work the Commissioner shall have first authorized the same in writing, and the price or prices to be paid therefor shall first have been agreed upon in writing between the Commissioner and the Contractor, and the same shall have been done or furnished under a written order from the Commissioner given before the performance of such extra work or the furnishing of such extra materials. The aggregate price to be paid for extra work or materials so authorized or ordered shall not exceed five per cent. (5 per cent.) of the contract price or total cost of the work and materials.

Extra work.

All claims for extra work or materials in any month shall be made to the Engineer, in writing, before the 15th day of the following month, and failing to make such claim within the time required, the rights of the Contractor to extra pay for such extra work or materials shall be deemed to have been waived and forfeited, provided, that where the Contractor, although the lowest bidder in the gross calculation, is to receive unusual or extraordinary prices for any of the different items of the work, when considered separately, nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the right of the Commissioner to determine the amount that may be due from time to time, not necessarily by the prices agreed upon in this contract, but by causing an estimate to be made of the value of the work done, taking as a basis of the calculations the whole amount of money that will have become due, according to the terms of this contract, when the whole work shall be completed.

(Q) If the execution and completion of the work shall require work or material in greater amounts or quantities than those mentioned and set forth in the Engineer's estimate, then the time allowed for the completion of the work shall be increased as much as the Commissioner shall deem just and reasonable, and fairly proportioned to the amount of said increase.

Time of completion, extension of.

(R) The Contractor will begin the work herein agreed to be performed on such date as the Commissioner shall notify him to begin. The time hereinafter fixed for the completion of the work shall begin to run on and from the date so notified. The place where the work is to be begun will either be stated in said

notice or designated on the ground by the Engineer. The commencement of work by the Contractor shall be deemed and taken to be a waiver of notice on his part.

Work to commence.

(S) The Contractor will carry on the work with such force and in such manner and order, and at such times and seasons as may be directed by the Engineer. He will execute all the work, in every respect, in a thorough and workmanlike manner; and he will fully and entirely perform this contract on his part before the expiration of sixty (60) consecutive working days. In the computation of the number of consecutive working days, the length of time (expressed in days or parts of days) during which the work or any part thereof has been delayed in consequence of the condition of the weather, or by any act or omission of the City (all of which shall be determined by the Commissioner, who shall certify to the same in writing, and whose determination and certificate thereof shall be binding and conclusive upon the Contractor), shall be allowed to the Contractor and excluded from said computation. Sundays, and also all holidays on which no work was done, shall also be and shall be deemed to have been excluded from said computation. No demand by the Contractor that the Commissioner determine and certify the matters aforesaid shall be of any effect whatsoever unless the same be made in writing and duly served upon the Commissioner prior to the filing in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York of the final certificate of the completion and acceptance of the work.

Time of completion.

Ordinances, section 354.

(T) In case the Contractor shall fail to complete the work hereunder in accordance with the specifications and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner and Engineer within the time aforesaid, the Contractor shall and will pay to the City the sum of twenty-five (25) dollars for each and every day the time consumed in said performance and completion may exceed the time hereinbefore allowed for that purpose; which said sum, in view of the difficulty of ascertaining the loss which the City will suffer by reason of delay in the performance of the work hereunder is hereby agreed upon, fixed and determined by the parties hereto as the liquidated damages that the City will suffer by reason of said delay and default, and not as a penalty; and the City shall and may deduct and retain the amount of such liquidated damages out of the moneys which may be due or become due to the Contractor under this agreement.

(U) No extension of time, for any reason, beyond the date fixed herein for the completion of the contract, nor the doing and acceptance of any work or materials called for by the contract, shall be deemed to be a waiver by the Commissioner of the right to abrogate this contract for abandonment or delay in the manner herein provided, nor shall it be a waiver of the right to enforce any of the provisions of this contract.

Extension of time not a waiver.

(V) The Contractor will give his personal attention constantly to the faithful prosecution of the work; he will not assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract, or his right, title or interest in or to the same or any part hereof, without the previous consent in writing of the Commissioner indorsed hereon or hereto attached; and he will not assign, by power of attorney or otherwise, any of the moneys to become due and payable under this contract, unless by and with the like consent signified in like manner. If the Contractor shall, without such previous written consent, assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract, or of his right, title or interest therein, or any of the moneys to become due under this contract to any other person, company or other corporation, this contract may, at the option of the Commissioner, be revoked and annulled and the City shall thereupon be relieved and discharged from any and all liability and obligations growing out of the same to the Contractor, and to his assignee or transferee; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder, prevent or affect an assignment by the Contractor for the benefit of his creditors, made pursuant to the statutes of the State of New York; and no right under this contract, or to any money to become due hereunder shall be asserted against the City, in law or in equity, by reason of any so-called assignment of this contract, or any part thereof, or of any moneys to grow due hereunder, unless authorized as aforesaid by the written consent of the Commissioner.

Personal attention.

Chapter 444, Laws of 1897.

Ordinances, section 347.

Chapter 415, Laws 1897.

(W) If at any time any overseer or workman who shall be employed by the Contractor shall be declared by the Engineer to be incompetent or unfaithful in executing the terms of this agreement, the Contractor, on receiving written notice, shall forthwith dismiss such person and shall not again employ him on any part of the work.

(X) If the work under this agreement shall be abandoned, or if at any time the Engineer shall be of the opinion and shall so certify in writing that the work, or any part thereof, is unnecessarily or unreasonably delayed, or that the Contractor is wilfully violating any of the conditions or covenants of this contract, or executing said contract in bad faith, or that the work is not being done or progressing according to the terms of this contract, or if the work be not fully completed in the time named in this contract for its completion, the Commissioner shall have the power to notify the Contractor to discontinue all work under this contract or any part of such work, by a written notice to be served upon the Contractor, either personally or by leaving said notice at his residence, or with his agent in charge of the work, and thereupon the Contractor shall discontinue the work, or part thereof; and the Commissioner shall thereupon have the power, in the manner prescribed by law, to contract for the completion of the contract or to place such and so many persons as he may deem advisable, by contract or otherwise, to work at and to complete the work herein described, or part thereof, or so much of the work, or part thereof, as the Commissioner may direct or may place under contract, and to use such materials as he may find upon the line of the work, and to procure, or cause to be procured, by contract or otherwise, all other materials for the completion of the same, and to charge the whole expense of the completion of the work, or part thereof, or the materials, to the Contractor; and the expense so charged shall be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as may be then due or may at any time thereafter grow due to the Contractor under and by virtue of this agreement or any part thereof; and in case such expense shall exceed the sum which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, he shall and will pay the amount of such excess to the City. And when any particular part of the work is being carried on by the Commissioner, by contract or otherwise, under the provisions of this clause of the contract, the Contractor agrees to continue the remainder of the work in conformity with the terms of this agreement, and in such manner as in nowise to hinder or interfere with the persons or workmen employed as above provided by the Commissioner, by contract or otherwise, to do any part of the work, or to complete the same under the provisions of this clause of the contract.

Contract may be declared annulled for violation, etc.

(Y) The work shall be performed in the best manner, and a sufficient number of persons shall be at all times employed to execute the work with due dispatch, the whole to be done to the satisfaction of the Commissioner and the Engineer; and any work done not satisfactory to the Commissioner and the Engineer shall immediately be made good by the Contractor; or if he shall neglect or refuse to remove the materials, or such work or materials as may be condemned by the Engineer, when notified so to do by the Commissioner, by a written notice to be served on the Contractor, either personally or by leaving it at his residence or with his agent in charge of the work, then the Commissioner may remove or cause the same to be removed and satisfactorily replaced, by contract or otherwise, as he may deem expedient, and charge the expense thereof to the Contractor, and the expense so charged shall be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as are or may become due under this agreement to the Contractor.

Work and material must agree with specifications.

(Z) If, before the completion of the work contemplated herein, it shall become necessary to do any other or further work than is provided for in this contract, the Contractor will not in any way interfere with or molest such other person or persons as the Commissioner may employ to do such work, and will suspend such part of the work herein specified, or will carry on the same in such manner as may be ordered by the Commissioner to afford all reasonable facilities for doing such work; and no other damage or claim by the Contractor therefor shall be allowed, except such ex-

tension of the time specified in this contract for the performance thereof as the Commissioner may deem reasonable, and shall so certify in writing.

Work of other contractors in connection with this.

(AA) The Contractor shall, during the period of five years after the acceptance of the work under this contract, lay and restore the pavements over trenches made for laying water and gas pipes, sewers, and for other purposes permitted by the Commissioner, at the contract price in accordance with the terms of these specifications, and when once so laid and restored he shall maintain the same in the same state of repair as agreed to for the other parts of the pavement.

Contractor to restore pavement over water, gas and sewer trenches.

(BB) The Contractor shall immediately repair and make good to the satisfaction of the Commissioner any bunches, holes, disintegration, cracks or settlement or any depression in the pavement which shall occur at any time during the period of five years from the date of acceptance of the whole work under this contract, when notified so to do by the Commissioner by a written notice to be served on him, either personally or by leaving said notice at his residence or with his agent in charge of the work; and in case of failure or neglect on his part so to do within forty-eight hours from the date of the service of the aforesaid notice, then the Commissioner shall have the right to purchase such materials as he may deem necessary, and to employ such person or persons as he shall deem proper, and to undertake and complete said repairs and to charge the expense thereof against any sum of money due to the Contractor or retained by the party of the first part as herein provided; and the Contractor shall pay all such expense to which the Commissioner may have been put by reason of the neglect of the said Contractor to make such repairs as aforesaid.

Contractor to make repairs.

By Commissioner if neglected.

(CC) Just previous to the expiration of the guarantee period the entire work shall be inspected, and any defect or failure in the pavement shall be immediately repaired upon the order of the Commissioner, by removing said pavement from the foundation and replacing it in the same manner as when originally laid. Whenever any defects are caused by the failure of the foundation, the pavement, including such foundation, shall be taken up and relaid in accordance with the specifications.

Repairs before final acceptance.

(DD) If the termination of the said period of maintenance shall fall within the months of December, January, February or March, then and in that case the said months of December, January, February and March, or such part thereof as the Commissioner may determine, shall not be included in the computation of the said period of five years during which the work is to be kept in repair by the Contractor as aforesaid, and also, in that case the payment to be made under the provisions of this contract shall not be made before the 1st of April next thereafter, unless otherwise specially permitted by the Commissioner.

Maintenance not to terminate in winter months. Charter, Sec. 423.

(EE) The period of maintenance shall be in force through the term of years aforesaid, irrespective of any changes that may occur in traffic conditions on or across said street, whether due to the widening of said roadway or to the construction, reconstruction or rearrangement of new or existing surface or sub-surface constructions thereon, or to any other cause.

(FF) The Contractor shall indemnify and save harmless the City against and from all suits and actions of every nature and description arising out of the claim or claims of any person or persons claiming to be patentees of any process connected with the work herein agreed to be performed, or of any materials used upon the work, and shall execute, with two sufficient sureties, the bond, in the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), attached to this agreement, for the indemnification of the City against and from all such suits and actions as aforesaid, as well as for the completion of this contract in accordance with the terms thereof.

(GG) The Contractor shall receive the following prices as full compensation for furnishing all the materials and performing all the labor which may be required in the prosecution of the whole of the work to be done under this agreement, and in all respects performing and completing the same, to wit:

1. For furnishing and setting six (6) inch fine-axed bluestone curbstones on a concrete foundation, including the cost of taking up and disposing of the existing curbstones, bridge stones and heading stones, the excavation of trenches for concrete foundation, furnishing and laying concrete foundation and backing, back-filling, resetting basin heads and restoring walk pavements, per linear foot, the sum of dollars (\$—).

2. For excavating and disposing of mud, gravel, shale, stone or any other material from the roadbed, including the cost of adjusting manhole frames and furnishing and setting noiseless covers upon manholes as specified, per cubic yard, the sum of dollars (\$—).

3. For furnishing materials for and laying roadway pavement complete under method* of the specifications, including every part of same above the sub-grade, per square yard, the sum of dollars (\$—).

*Fill in letter A, B or C.

Prices for work.

(HH) After the completion of the work, should the Engineer require it for his more perfect satisfaction, the Contractor shall make such openings; and to such extent through such part or parts of the work as the Engineer shall direct, and he shall make the same good again to the satisfaction of the Engineer. Should any work be found defective or improperly done, such defective or improper work shall be taken up and relaid or otherwise remedied to the satisfaction of the Engineer, and should the Contractor refuse or neglect to correct such defective work when notified to do so, or by a written notice to be served on the Contractor, either personally or by leaving it at his residence or with his agent in charge of the work, then the Commissioner shall employ the necessary men and materials to do the work, and the expenses thereof shall be deducted from any moneys that may be due the Contractor on account of this contract.

Examination.

(II) The Contractor shall not be entitled to demand or receive payment for any portion of the aforesaid work or materials, until the same shall be fully completed, in the manner set forth in this agreement, and such completion shall be duly certified by the Engineer in charge of the work, and until each and every of the stipulations hereinbefore mentioned are complied with, and the work completed to the satisfaction of the Engineer and the Commissioner, and accepted by them, and the certificate thereof of the Engineer and Commissioner has been filed with the Comptroller; whereupon the City will pay to the Contractor, in cash, on or before the expiration of thirty days from the time of the completion of the work and the acceptance of the same by the Commissioner, the whole of the moneys accruing to the Contractor, excepting fifteen per cent. of the whole sum accruing for roadway pavement and the balance of the moneys that may be due to the Contractor, as follows: Three per cent. of the whole amount of money accruing to the Contractor for roadway pavement on the expiration of the first year, and a further like sum of three per cent. at the expiration of each succeeding year thereafter until the whole or as much as may remain due of the contract price shall be paid, should the Contractor perform the work stipulated under Article (BB) of this agreement; but in order to enable the Contractor to prosecute the work advantageously, the Engineer shall, from time to time, as the work progresses, but not oftener than once a month, make, in writing, an estimate, such as in his opinion shall be just and fair, of the amount of the material furnished and delivered and work done by the Contractor in the performance of this contract on his part, and of the value thereof under and according to the terms of this contract. The first such estimate shall be of the amount of work done and materials furnished and delivered since the Contractor commenced the performance of this contract on his part, and every subsequent estimate, except the final one, shall be of the amount of work done and materials furnished and delivered since the last preceding estimate was made. Such estimates of amount and quantity shall not be required to be made by strict measurement, but they may be made by measurement or by estimation, or partly by one and partly by the other, and it shall be sufficient if they are approximate only and estimates strictly so called.

Payments, when made. Charter, section 423.

(JJ) Upon each such estimate being made and certified in writing the Commissioner will pay to the Contractor seventy per centum (70%) of the amount stated in such estimate or certificate to be the value of the materials therein certified to have been furnished and delivered, and work therein certified to have been done; provided, the value of the work certified in such estimate shall amount to thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000); and provided that the City may at all times reserve and retain out of said installments, or any of them, all such sum or sums as by the terms

hereof, or of any act of the Legislature of the State of New York, or of any ordinance of the City passed prior to the date hereof, they are or may be authorized to reserve or retain; and provided, that nothing herein contained be construed to affect the right hereby reserved of the Commissioner to reject and return or certificate of the Engineer or of any Inspectors having charge of the work, should such return or certificate be known by the Commissioner to be not in accordance with the facts of the case or the requirements of this agreement, or be otherwise improperly given, and to reject the whole or any portion of the work should the same or any part thereof not be in accordance with the requirements of this contract.

Seventy per cent. payments.

Ordinances, sections 353, 366.

Estimates and payments as above set forth shall be made only when the work is being prosecuted in conformity with the provisions of this contract and to the satisfaction of the Engineer; and the Contractor shall not be entitled to demand or receive payment for any portion of the aforesaid work or materials, except at the times and in the manner hereinbefore set forth, nor unless the Engineer or such other officer or officers as shall have been designated as aforesaid, for the purpose, shall have certified that said work has been done and said materials have been furnished in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement.

(KK) If at any time before or within thirty days after the whole work herein agreed to be performed has been completed and accepted by the City, any person or persons claiming to have performed any labor, or furnished any material toward the performance or completion of this contract, shall file with the Department, or with the Bureau having charge of the work, and with the Comptroller of the City, any such notice as is described in the ordinances of the City, the Lien Law or any Act of the Legislature of the State of New York, then and in every such case the City shall retain, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding, from the moneys under its control and due or to grow due under this agreement, so much of such moneys as shall be sufficient to pay off, satisfy and discharge the amount in such notice alleged or claimed to be due to the persons filing such notice, together with the reasonable costs of any action or actions brought to enforce such claims or the lien created by the filing of such notice. The moneys so retained shall be retained by the City until the lien thereon created by the said act and the filing of the said notice shall be discharged, pursuant to the provisions of the said act.

Claims for labor.

(LL) The Contractor shall furnish the Commissioner with satisfactory evidence that all persons who have done work or furnished materials under this agreement, and who may have given written notice to the Commissioner at any time within ten days after completion of the work aforesaid, that any balance for such work or materials is still due and unpaid, have been fully paid or satisfactorily secured such balance. And in case such evidence be not furnished as aforesaid, such amount as may be necessary to meet the claims of the persons aforesaid shall be retained from any moneys due the contractor under this agreement until the liabilities aforesaid shall be fully discharged or secured, or such notice be withdrawn.

Ordinances, section 354.

(MM) The Contractor shall place proper guards for the prevention of accidents and shall put up and keep at night suitable and sufficient lights where necessary, during the delivery of the materials or supplies to prevent accidents or injuries to the person or property of another, and he will indemnify and save harmless the City from all suits or actions and damages or costs of every name and description to which the City may be subjected or put by reason of injury to the person or property of another resulting from negligence or carelessness on the part of the Contractor, his servants or agents, in the delivery of the materials and supplies, or by or on account of any act or omission of the Contractor, his servants or agents, and the whole or so much of the moneys due, or to grow due, the Contractor under this agreement, as shall or may be considered necessary by the Comptroller of the City, shall or may be retained by the City until all such suits or claims for damages shall have been settled or otherwise disposed of, and evidence to that effect furnished to the satisfaction of the Comptroller.

Indemnification of City. Ordinances, section 355.

(NN) This contract is made with reference to the proposals for estimates for the above-described work, hereto annexed, which, together with the bid or estimate and the plans and drawings, are to be taken as part and parcel of these presents.

Parts of contract.

(OO) The action of the Engineer, by which the Contractor is to be bound and concluded according to the terms of this contract, shall be that evidenced by his final certificate; which final certificate may be made without notice to the Contractor thereof, and without furnishing the measurements upon which the same is based.

Contractor bound by final certificate only.

(PP) The City shall not, nor shall any Department or Officer thereof, be precluded or estopped by any return or certificate made or given by the Commissioner, any Engineer or other officer, agent or appointee of the City under any provision of this agreement from at any time (either before or after the final completion and acceptance of the work and payment therefor pursuant to any such return or certificate) showing the true and correct amount and character of the work done and materials furnished by the Contractor, or any other person under this agreement, or from showing at any time that any such return or certificate is untrue and incorrect, or improperly made in any particular, or that the work and materials, or any part thereof, do not in fact conform to the specifications; and the City shall not be precluded or estopped, notwithstanding any such return or certificate and payment in accordance therewith, from demanding and recovering from the Contractor such damages as it may sustain by reason of his failure to comply with the specifications.

Estoppel.

(QQ) The Contractor agrees that he will comply with the provisions of chapter 415 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, known as "The Labor Law" so far as they are constitutional and applicable to this contract. He further agrees that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the Contractor, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by the contract shall be required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property.

Labor Law.

(RR) This contract shall not be binding or of any force unless the Comptroller of the City shall endorse thereon his certificate that there remains unexpended and unapplied, as provided in the Greater New York Charter, a balance of the appropriation or fund applicable thereto sufficient to pay the estimated expense of executing this contract, as certified by the officers making the same.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR FURNISHING AND SETTING NEW CURBSTONES, AND PAVING WITH ASPHALT BLOCKS, SHEET ASPHALT OR BITUMINOUS MACADAM, THE CARRIAGEWAY OF WEST SEVENTY-SECOND STREET, BETWEEN CENTRAL PARK WEST AND RIVERSIDE PARK, IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

1. The work shall be done on West Seventy-second street, between Central Park West (Eighth avenue) and Riverside Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York.

Location.

2. The work and materials to be done and furnished will consist of (a) taking up the existing curbstones and crosswalks, and disposing of the same in the manner specified, and furnishing materials for and setting upon a concrete foundation new bluestone fine-axed curbstone, six (6) inches in thickness, together with all specified repairs to all adjacent walk pavements of whatever materials and character, and resetting to the established lines and grades all cover and gutter stones of receiving basins; (b) excavating and disposing of mud, gravel, shale, stone or any other material from the roadway, adjusting manhole frames and furnishing and setting

noiseless covers for manholes; (c) furnishing materials for and laying roadway pavement under Method A, B or C, as specified; (d) cleaning up and removing from the site of the work all excavated and surplus materials, sand, stone, dirt, rubbish, etc.

Work to be done.

3. The Engineer's estimate of materials and work to be furnished and done, by which the bids or estimates will be tested, is as follows:

- (1) 5,700 linear feet of fine-axed bluestone curbstones, six (6) inches in thickness, to be furnished and set upon a concrete foundation;
- (2) _____ cubic yards of excavation of all kinds for the roadway pavement;
- (3) 16,100 square yards of roadway pavement to furnish and lay.

Engineer's estimate.

4. All shall be done in conformity with the dimensions shown upon the plan of the work now on file in the Department and as designated upon the ground by the Engineer and to his entire satisfaction.

General Provisions.

5. The Contractor shall pay constant and personal attention to the work. The work shall be done under the supervision of the Engineer duly appointed to take charge of the work. The Engineer shall have full access at all times to the work and have power of inspecting and rejecting materials or work. Any material or work so rejected shall be removed and replaced in the manner hereinafter provided.

Supervision.

6. Any doubt as to the meaning of the specifications, or any obscurity as to the wording of them, will be explained by the Engineer, and all directions and explanations requisite, proper or necessary to complete or make more definite any of the provisions of the specifications, and give them due effect, will be given by the Engineer.

Engineer to explain specifications.

7. Whenever the Contractor is not present on any part of the work where it may be necessary to give directions, orders will be given by the Engineer and his assistants to and be received and obeyed by the superintendent and overseers who may have immediate charge of the men employed on the particular work in relation to which the orders may be given.

When Contractor is not present orders given to Superintendent or overseer.

8. The Contractor shall provide all necessary assistance for the Engineer when required.

Contractor to provide assistance.

9. The Contractor will be held responsible for the general care, control and good order in all operations pertaining to the work herein specified until it is completed and accepted.

Contractor to be responsible for good order, etc.

10. The Contractor will be required to preserve all stakes and benchmarks made or established on the site of the work, until duly authorized to remove the same.

Preservation of stakes, etc.

11. The Contractor shall, when required to do so by the Engineer, remove from the work any overseer, superintendent, laborer or other person employed on the work, who shall refuse or neglect to obey the directions of the Engineer, his assistants, or the Inspectors under him, in anything relating to the work, or who shall perform his work in a manner contrary to the specifications and directions of the Engineer, who shall be deemed by the Engineer to be incompetent or unfaithful, or who shall commit any trespass on public or private property in the vicinity of the work, or for any improper conduct.

Incompetent or vicious persons to be removed.

12. The Contractor will be responsible for all damage which may be done to property or injuries to workmen employed by him, or to any other person or persons, arising through his carelessness or through that of the men.

Responsible for damages.

13. The Contractor must provide and furnish at his own cost and charge, all transportation, and good, sufficient and safe tools, implements, plankings, runs, scaffolding, horses, derricks, lifts, machines and appliances of every description necessary or desirable for executing and completing in the best and most thorough manner the several kinds, and the whole of the work stipulated herein or intended to be done.

Transportation, tools, etc., to be furnished by Contractor.

14. All labor and materials of every kind and description used or intended to be used in any and all of the work must be the best of their respective kinds and be fully approved by the Commissioner and the Engineer, who shall be afforded every facility for ascertaining and determining the skill and competency of such labor, and of examining, inspecting and testing such material as they may deem necessary.

Labor and materials of best quality.

15. All materials furnished, and all work done, which, in the opinion of the Commissioner, shall not be in accordance with these specifications, shall be immediately removed and other materials furnished and work done that shall be in accordance therewith.

Improper material and work.

16. The work under this agreement is to be prosecuted at and from as many different points, at such times and in such part or parts of the site of the work, and with such force as the Department, by its Engineer, may, from time to time, during the progress of the work, determine; at each of which points an Inspector may be placed to supervise the same on the day designated for the commencement of the work thereat.

Prosecution of work.

17. Should postponement or delay be occasioned by the precedence of other work or contracts on or contiguous to the site of the work herein provided, either by the Department or other City authority, no claim for damages therefor shall be made or allowed. No work will be paid for which is done before the day the Contractor is ordered to proceed.

Postponement or delay.

18. During the performance of the work proper guards shall be placed upon and around the same for the prevention of accidents, and at night suitable and sufficient lights shall be put up and kept lighted from sunset to sunrise by the Contractor, who shall be liable for any and all damages that may arise from any negligence on the part of himself or agents.

Guards and lights.

19. Any incumbrances or obstructions which may be upon the site of the work when it is begun, or may thereafter be placed there, shall, if directed by the Engineer, be removed by the Contractor at his own expense.

Incumbrances or obstructions.

20. All the work in setting, resetting curb, laying and relaying bridgestones and paving, laying concrete, asphalt and masonry shall cease from the 1st of December to the 1st of April, unless otherwise ordered by the Commissioner, and then it shall be continued only for such times as may be designated, subject, however, to its sooner termination, if the Commissioner shall so order. Provided, that the time hereinafter stipulated for the completion of the work shall not be extended by this covenant, but shall be computed as if this covenant had not been made.

When work shall be suspended.

21. During the progress of the work, or upon its suspension, all the materials shall be piled closely at the points directed by the Commissioner or Engineer, so as not to impede travel on walks or roadways. Or when directed, all materials, including surplus materials and rubbish, shall be removed from the site of the work. The work will not be accepted until said materials and rubbish have been removed to the satisfaction of the Engineer, and the Inspector will be retained on the work until this provision has been complied with.

Walks and roadway left safe for travel.

Materials removed.

22. All loss or damage arising from the nature of the work to be done under this agreement, or for any unforeseen or unusual obstructions or difficulties which may be encountered in the prosecution of the same, or from the action of the elements, shall be sustained by the Contractor.

Loss or damage from nature of work.

23. No work shall be considered as accepted which may be defective in its construction, or deficient in any of the requirements of these specifications, in conse-

quence of any negligence of any Inspector or subordinate Engineer to point out said defect or deficiency during construction; and the Contractor will be required to correct any imperfect work, whenever discovered, before the final acceptance of the work.

Defective work not accepted.

24. The Contractor shall clean off surplus materials, sand, dirt and rubbish from the said work within twelve days after the same shall have been completed. The work will not be accepted until the said sand, dirt or rubbish have been removed to the satisfaction of the Engineer. The Inspectors will be retained on the work until all such rubbish and surplus materials shall be removed from the work.

Removal of surplus materials, rubbish, etc.

25. Upon the full completion of the work embraced in this agreement the Contractor will be required to file in the office of the Department a certificate signed by the Engineer, to the effect that the stipulations relative to the removal of all surplus materials, earth, sand, rock and rubbish from the line of the work above named have been faithfully complied with.

Certificate of removal of surplus material.

26. All quantities of work and materials to be paid for shall be measured and determined by the Engineer and his assistants, according to the working lines that may be given and the specifications, when the work comes up to such lines. No allowance will be made for any excess above the quantities required by such lines and specifications on any part of the work (except when specially authorized by the Commissioner). Should the dimensions of any part of the work or of the materials be less than those required by the direction of the Engineer, the actual quantities only will be allowed in measurement.

Measurement of work and material.

27. All the damage done to the trees, shrubbery, ground or structures or other work or property of the park by the Contractor, or by persons or teams in his employ, shall be made good by the Contractor at his own expense, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, or if not so made good within ten days from the time written notice shall be given him to that effect by the Commissioner, the amount of such damage, as estimated by the Commissioner, shall be deducted and reserved out of any moneys that become due to the Contractor for performing the work, or any part thereof, herein referred to.

Damage to public property made good by Contractor.

Curbstones.

28. The present straight curbstones (and the circular corners at the intersecting avenues if directed) and the present heading stones and bridge stones shall be taken up by the Contractor and disposed of as specified.

Present curb taken up and disposed of.

29. All stones which are taken up shall be hauled by the Contractor to the Department storage yard in Central Park, near Ninety-seventh street, and shall be there deposited by him as directed.

How disposed of.

30. The new curb will be set upon a concrete foundation, for which purpose there shall be excavated a trench of at least fifteen inches in width and a depth, in earth, sufficient to permit of the laying of concrete to the minimum depth of eight (8) inches under the curb when same shall be in place and to the proper grade. If rock be encountered before such depth is reached, the same shall be stripped and wedged, benched or stepped off, as the Engineer shall direct, to form a bed for the concrete. The trench shall be excavated to the lines given by the Engineer and shall extend for the whole length of the curb to be set.

Excavation for concrete foundation.

31. The concrete foundation for the curb shall be not less than fifteen (15) inches in width and of a minimum thickness of eight (8) inches when bedded upon earth; if bedded upon rock the thickness of foundation shall be as determined by the Engineer.

Dimensions of trench.

32. If the Engineer shall so direct the concrete foundation shall be deposited in two layers.

In two layers if directed.

33. The curbstones shall be set true to line and grade upon the green concrete, with joints not more than one-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of an inch in thickness, and with the front face on a batter of one inch to a foot.

How curb is set.

34. After the curb is in place, concrete shall be deposited in the rear, to the width, depth and form shown upon the plan.

Concrete backing.

35. After the concrete has set the curb shall be back-filled with clean, gritty earth, thoroughly rammed.

Back-filling.

36. The concrete shall be of the materials and proportion and made, mixed and deposited, in all respects in the manner described in paragraphs 102 to 110 of the specifications.

Concrete, how made.

37. The curbstones shall be of blue stone, of quality equal to the best North river blue stone, sound and durable, of uniform color, free from imperfections.

Curbstones—quality.

38. They shall be in lengths of not less than three and one-half nor more than eight feet each, except where special lengths are ordered, twenty inches in depth for the entire length of the stone and six inches in thickness for the full depth of the stone.

Dimensions.

39. The top of the curb shall be cut to a bevel of five-eighths of an inch and to a uniform thickness of six inches, and to be fine axed; the edge or arris of the back and ends shall be sharp and perfect, and the arris of the top of the face of the curb shall be rounded off in the manner shown upon the plan.

40. The front or side facing the roadway, when set, shall be cut true to the line and without winding, and fine-axed to a depth of fourteen inches from the top, and the back to be dressed parallel to the front to the depth of two inches from the top, the bottom to be rough pointed off parallel to the top to the full thickness of the stone, which in no case is to be less than six inches.

41. The ends, from bottom to top, and for at least half the thickness of the stone from the face, shall be dressed true and even and truly squared, so that when laid they will make joints not exceeding one-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of an inch.

Dressing.

42. The curb at the corners of the avenues shall be circular or curved, the stones to be in lengths of two feet seven and one-half inches, measured on the curved face (unless otherwise directed by the Engineer), twenty inches in depth and six inches thick at the joints.

43. The front or outer face shall be dressed to a curve of five feet radius, six inches thick at the joints, and straight on the back, unless otherwise directed, and to be in all other respects the same as the curbstones heretofore specified.

Circular corners.

44. All walk pavements of whatever character or material, adjacent to the curb which shall become broken, cracked or otherwise damaged in taking up the old curbstones or in setting the new or which shall be injured in consequence of the storing upon them, by the Contractor, of curb, granite blocks, bridge stones, heading stones or other material, or which do not conform to the grades established for this work, shall be taken up, to the extent directed by the Engineer or shown upon the plan and relaid, by the Contractor who shall furnish at his own cost and expense all materials and labor for the purpose, and the pavements so relaid shall be constructed of materials and in a manner similar and equal in all respects to the original pavements, and the flags of blue stone or cement shall be trimmed in the manner directed by the Engineer. All blue stone flags reset at a higher grade shall be set on sand which must be furnished by the Contractor.

45. The Contractor shall, without special compensation, reset the cover and gutter stones of all receiving basins which do not conform to the grades established for this work, the cost of which is to be included in the price bid for furnishing and setting curb.

Walk pavements to be restored.

46. The price bid for furnishing and setting curbstones shall be in full for furnishing and setting same complete as specified, including the cost of the excavation and removal and final disposition of the existing curb and bridge stones, the ex-

cavation of trench for foundation, the furnishing and laying concrete foundation for curb, the back-filling, resetting basin heads and the restoration of walk pavements. Price to cover.

Excavation for Roadway.

47. A subgrade for the roadway pavement shall be prepared by excavating from the present roadway all mud, shale, gravel, stone and other materials to the levels, grades and crowns shown upon the plan and designated upon the ground by the Engineer, which will be six inches below the finished grade.

Excavation.

48. The roadbed shall be thoroughly rolled with a heavy steam roller until the surface of the subgrade is solid and parallel to the finished surface of the roadway.

Rolling.

Soft and springy places not affording a firm foundation shall be excavated to the extent and depth directed and be refilled with the excavated gravel. The extra excavation will be measured and paid for.

Soft places to be excavated.

49. All excavated material (except what is used for refilling) shall be removed by the Contractor from the site of the work as fast as directed.

Disposing of excavated material.

50. The Contractor shall without special compensation adjust all frames and heads for sewer manholes, Croton stop cocks and manhole heads for subways, to the level of the new pavement, and shall furnish and set new noiseless covers complete for sewer manholes, and Croton stop cocks of a design approved by the Commissioner, the cost of which must be included in the price bid for excavation.

Manholes adjusted.

51. The price bid for excavation (which item includes excavation in the roadway only and does not apply to the excavation for curbstones, etc.), shall cover the whole cost of the excavation and final disposition of materials of every character found in the roadway, and shall include the cost of regulating and rolling the subgrade, the adjustment of manhole frames to grade and the furnishing and setting of noiseless covers for manholes as specified.

Price to cover.

Roadway Pavement.

52. The bidder may, at his option, offer to lay the roadway pavement in one or other of the following three methods separately described and designated herein as indicated:

Method A. Pavement of asphalt blocks three inches in thickness, with a base of Portland cement, concrete and mortar three inches in thickness.

Method B. Pavement of sheet asphalt two inches in thickness, with a bituminous concrete binder one inch and a Portland cement concrete base three inches in thickness.

Method C. The Warren patent bitulithic pavement, two inches in thickness, with a base of bituminous concrete four inches in thickness.

Method A—Pavement of Asphalt Blocks.

53. Upon the sub-grade above described there shall be placed a bed of cement concrete which, after compaction by ramming, shall be in no place less than two and one-half ($2\frac{1}{2}$) inches in thickness, and whose upper surface shall be exactly parallel to and three and one-half ($3\frac{1}{2}$) inches below the finished grade of the pavement.

Concrete face.

54. The concrete shall be made and laid as described in paragraphs 102 to 110. Concrete, composition of.

55. On the concrete surface after the same has been swept and made wet, shall be spread a layer of cement mortar of such thickness that when struck to a surface three (3) inches below and exactly parallel to the grade of the completed pavement its depth shall be nowhere less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an inch. The mortar shall consist of one (1) part of slow setting Portland cement of approved quality, mixed with four (4) parts of clean, sharp sand, and it shall be spread and surfaced as follows:

Mortar bed.

56. On the surface of the concrete shall be set strips of wood four (4) inches wide by one-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) inch thick, or strips of steel four (4) inches wide by not less than one-eighth ($\frac{1}{8}$) inch thick, and of the greatest length convenient for handling. These strips shall be carefully set parallel and about eight (8) or ten (10) feet apart, running from curb to curb, and be imbedded in mortar throughout their length, so that the top surface shall be three (3) inches below and parallel to the grade of the finished pavement. The space between two strips having been filled with mortar, a true and even top surface shall be struck by using an ironshod straight edge on the strips as a guide, and as soon as the bed has been struck, the strip which would interfere with laying the blocks shall be removed and its place carefully filled with mortar with a trowel.

57. If the width of the roadway be such that the laying of blocks on a complete section cannot be completed before the mortar takes its initial set, the strips may be placed parallel to the curb and templates, cut to the curve of the desired crown, shall be used on these strips to strike the bed.

How mortar is laid.

58. The size of the asphalt blocks used must be four (4) inches wide, three (3) inches deep and twelve (12) inches long, and a variation of one-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of an inch from these dimensions will be sufficient ground for rejecting any block.

Wearing surface; size of blocks.

59. The blocks must be composed of crushed trap-rock, pulverized carbonate of lime and asphaltic cement, mixed in the following proportions, by weight, and no change from such proportions shall be made without the permission of the Engineer:

Asphaltic cement	6 to 11 parts
Crushed trap-rock	89 to 74 parts
Pulverized carbonate of lime	5 to 15 parts

Proportions of materials.

60. The asphaltic cement shall be composed of commercially refined asphalt and heavy petroleum oil or refined liquid asphalt. The refined asphalt and the flux shall be mixed in such proportion that will produce an asphaltic cement of a consistency and quality as approved by the Engineer. The heavy petroleum oil shall be freed from impurities and brought to a specific gravity of from 18 to 22 degrees Beaume, and a fire test of not less than 350 degrees Fahrenheit. It shall contain no appreciable amount of light oils or matter volatile under 250 degrees Fahrenheit. The distillate at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 hours shall be less than 10 per cent. The refined liquid asphalt, if used as a substitute for the heavy petroleum oil, shall also fulfill the above tests, except for specific gravity.

Asphaltic cement.

61. The blocks furnished will be subject to the approval of the Engineer and shall withstand such tests for specific gravity, abrasion, tensile and crushing strength as he may prescribe. Whatever the character of the asphalt used, the block shall yield when extracted with bisulphide of carbon and after the evaporation of the solvent not less than five and one-half ($5\frac{1}{2}$) nor more than seven and one-half ($7\frac{1}{2}$) per cent. of bituminous matter, except when other percentages are specially permitted by the said Engineer.

62. The Engineer shall further have the right to make tests and examinations at the Contractor's works of the materials proposed to be used, and to reject any or all such materials as he may consider not to be in compliance with these specifications.

Testing of blocks.

63. The blocks will be carefully inspected after they are brought on the line of work, and all blocks which in quality and dimensions do not conform strictly to the requirements will be rejected and must be immediately removed from the line of work.

Inspection.

64. On the fresh mortar bed applied to the concrete face the blocks are to be laid in courses at right angles to the line of the road, except in special cases, when they shall be laid diagonally or as shall be directed.

Laying on mortar bed.

65. Nothing but whole blocks shall be used except in starting a course or in such other cases as shall be specially permitted by the Engineer, and in no case shall less than half a block be used in breaking joints. Closures shall be carefully cut and trimmed by experienced men, the portion of the block to be used to be

free from check or fracture and the cut end to have a surface normal to the top of the block and be cut at the proper angle to give a close, tight joint.

Cutting closures.

66. Each course of blocks shall be of uniform width and depth, with all joints close and the end joints broken by a lap of at least four (4) inches, and while laying, the pavers must stand on those already laid. Any lack of uniformity in the surface or unevenness in the blocks must be immediately corrected by taking up and relaying the blocks, and blocks fractured or broken shall be replaced with perfect ones before any sand is spread over the surface.

Laying.

67. When laid, the blocks shall be covered with clean, fine sand, entirely free from loam or earthy matter, perfectly dry and screened through a sieve having not less than twenty (20) meshes per linear inch, the sand to be swept and brushed into the joints and left on the surface until such time when, if required by the Engineer, the pavement shall be swept clean for final inspection, and any defects then noted shall be remedied.

Sand joints and covering.

68. Where this pavement abuts a stone block pavement as shown upon plan the Contractor shall put down bluestone heading-stone four and one-half (4½) inches thick, at least three (3) feet long and one (1) foot deep, dressed square on top, ends and sides, and set on a foundation of six (6) inches of concrete of the quality described in paragraphs 102 and 110. These heading-stones shall be maintained by the Contractor and they will be paid for as roadway pavement.

Heading-stones.

69. The price bid for roadway pavement under Method A (asphalt block pavement) shall be in full for furnishing all labor and materials required to complete the same as specified, including concrete and mortar base, asphalt block wearing surface, heading-stones, and the maintenance of the pavement in good order for the period of five years.

Price bid.

Method B—Sheet Asphalt Pavement.

70. After the sub-grade has been prepared as described in paragraphs 47 to 50, it shall be swept so as to remove all loose particles, and then covered with cement concrete in quantity sufficient to give a depth, after completion, of not less than three (3) inches.

Concrete base.

71. The concrete shall be of the materials and composition, and mixed, deposited and compacted as described in paragraphs 102 to 110.

72. The upper surface of the concrete shall be left parallel to and three (3) inches below the finished grade of the pavement.

Composition of concrete.

73. The concrete will not be measured and paid for as such. Compensation for furnishing and laying it must be included in the price bid for the pavement under Method B.

74. Upon the concrete base prepared and laid as above described, there shall be laid the sheet asphalt roadway pavement proper, consisting of one (1) inch of bituminous concrete binder and two (2) inches of sheet asphalt wearing surface.

Wearing surface and binder.

75. Before laying the binder, the surface of the concrete shall be thoroughly swept and all loose particles removed.

76. The binder shall be composed of clean broken stone not exceeding three-quarter (¾) inch in their largest dimensions, thoroughly screened, and coal for residuum, commonly known as No. 4 paving composition.

77. The stone must be heated by passing through revolving heaters, and thoroughly mixed by machinery with the paving composition in the proportion of one (1) gallon of paving composition to one (1) cubic foot of stone.

78. The binder must be hauled to the work and spread with hot iron rakes to such thickness that after being thoroughly compacted by tamping and hand-rolling the surface shall have a uniform grade and cross-section, and the thickness of the binder at any point shall not be less than one inch. No binder shall be laid during a rain nor shall any binder be laid that is too cold to be manipulated easily. Over-heated binder shall be taken entirely off the work.

79. The upper surface shall be exactly parallel with the surface of the pavement to be laid.

80. Upon this binder must be laid the wearing surface or paving proper, the basis of which or paving cement must be pure asphaltum, unmixed with any of the products of coal tar.

81. The wearing surface will be composed of:

(1) Refined asphaltum.

(2) Heavy petroleum oil.

(3) Fine sand, containing not more than one per centum of hydro-silicate of alumina.

(4) Fine powder of carbonate of lime, granite or quartz.

82. The asphaltum used must be equal in quality and in all other respects to that mixed from the "Pitch Lake," on the Island of Trinidad, or to California Alcatraz—and must be specially refined and brought to a uniform standard of purity and gravity, of a quality to be approved by the Commissioner.

83. The heavy petroleum oil must be freed from all impurities and brought to a specific gravity of from 18 to 22 degrees Beaume, and a fire-test of 250 degrees Fahrenheit, or if the formula of Contractor requires it, the powdered carbonate of lime may be omitted and heavy petroleum oil may be replaced by sufficiently fluid natural bitumen.

84. From these two hydro-carbons shall be manufactured an asphaltic cement which shall have a fire-test of 250 degrees Fahrenheit, and at a temperature of 60 degrees Fahrenheit shall have a specific gravity of 1.19, said cement to be composed of 100 parts of pure asphalt, and from 15 to 20 parts of heavy petroleum oil.

85. The asphaltic cement being made in the manner above described, the pavement mixture must be formed of the following materials, and in the proportion stated:

Asphaltic cement from 12 to 15
Sand from 83 to 70
Pulverized carbonate of lime from 5 to 15

86. The sand and asphaltic cement shall be heated separately to about three hundred degrees Fahrenheit. The pulverized carbonate of lime, while cold, shall be mixed with the hot sand in the required proportions, and then mixed with the asphaltic cement at the required temperature, and in the proper proportions, in a suitable apparatus, which will effect a perfect mixture.

87. The pavement mixture, prepared in the manner thus indicated, must be brought to the ground in carts at a temperature of about two hundred and fifty degrees Fahrenheit, and if the temperature of the air is less than fifty degrees, iron carts, with heating apparatus, shall be used in order to maintain the proper temperature of the mixture; it shall then be carefully spread, by means of hot iron rakes, in such manner as to give a uniform and regular grade. The surface shall then be compressed by hand-rollers, after which a small amount of hydraulic cement shall be swept over it, and it shall then be thoroughly compressed by a steam roller weighing not less than two hundred and fifty pounds to the inch run, the rolling to be continued for not less than five hours for every one thousand yards of surface. After having received its ultimate compression the pavement must have a thickness of not less than two inches.

88. The powdered carbonate of lime shall be of such degree of fineness that five to fifteen per centum by weight of the entire mixture for the pavement shall be of an impalpable powder of limestone, and the whole of it shall pass a No. 26 screen. The sand shall be of such size that none of it shall pass a No. 80 screen, and the whole of it shall pass a No. 10 screen.

89. Where the new asphalt pavement abuts a stone block or macadamized pavement, the Contractor shall put down bluestone heading-stone four and one-half (4½) inches thick, at least three (3) feet long and one (1) foot deep, dressed square on top, ends and sides, and set on a foundation of six (6) inches of concrete of the quality specified in paragraphs 102 to 110. The roadway pavement which is broken, cracked, or torn up in laying said heading stones shall be replaced of materials, construction and workmanship identical with the present pavements. The heading stones shall be maintained by the Contractor as part of the asphalt pavement and will be measured and paid for as such.

Heading stones.

90. In order to make the same impervious to water a strip of the wearing sur-

face twelve (12) inches in width next to the gutters shall be coated with hot, pure asphalt and smoothed with hot smoothing irons, which operation must saturate the pavement to a certain depth with an excess of asphalt.

91. The price bid for roadway pavement under Method B (sheet asphalt pavement) shall be in full for furnishing and laying concrete base, binder, wearing surface, and heading stones, including relaying pavements adjacent to heading stones, and for maintaining the pavements in good order for the period of five years after the acceptance of the whole work by the Department of Parks.

Price to cover.

Method C—Warren's Patent Bitulithic Pavement.

92. On top of the sub-grade shall be spread to a depth of four inches a layer of hard crushed stone, passing a three-inch ring and caught on a one-inch ring, which shall then be compressed with a heavy steam roller. On this shall be scattered three-fourths to one-inch stone for the purpose of filling up the spaces in the surface of the coarse stone but not in such a quantity as to increase the depth of the base course. After again rolling, this shall be coated with a thin layer of Warren's No. 1 Puritan brand semi-liquid (bituminous) cement, or No. 1 bitulithic cement, said bitumen to be sufficiently flexible to unite freely with the cold stone.

Base.

93. On top of this No. 1 composition shall be spread a heavy coating of Warren's No. 24 Puritan brand hard bituminous cement or No. 24 bitulithic cement for the purpose of firmly binding the base together and making it readily unite with the bituminous concrete wearing surface. One gallon of the bituminous cement will be used to each square yard of surface. On this prepared base shall be laid the wearing surface or pavement proper, which shall be composed of carefully selected, sound, hard crushed stone, mixed with bitumen and laid as hereinafter specified.

94. After heating the stone in a rotary mechanical dryer, to a temperature of about 250 degrees Fahrenheit, it shall be elevated and passed through a rotary screen, having six or more sections with varying sized openings, the maximum of which shall be 1¾ inches and the minimum 1-10 inch in diameter. The several sizes of stone thus separated by the screen sections shall pass into a bin containing six sections or compartments. From this bin the stone shall be drawn into a weigh box, resting on a scale having seven beams. The stone from each bin is accurately weighed in the proportion which has been previously determined by laboratory tests to give the best results, that is, the most dense mixture of mineral aggregate, and one having inherent stability. From the weigh box each batch of mineral aggregate, composed of different sizes accurately weighed as above, shall pass into a "twin pug" or other approved form of mixture. In this mixture shall be added a sufficient quantity of Warren's No. 21 Puritan brand bituminous cement or No. 21 bitulithic cement, to thoroughly coat all the particles of stone and to fill all voids in the mixture. The bituminous cement shall, before mixing with the stone, be heated to between 200 degrees and 250 degrees Fahrenheit, the amount used in each batch shall be accurately weighed, and used in such proportion as has been previously determined by laboratory examination to give the best results and to fill the voids in the mineral aggregate. The mixing shall be continued until the combination is a uniform bituminous concrete. In this condition it shall be hauled to the street and there spread on the prepared foundation to such depth that, after thorough compression with a steam road roller, it shall have a thickness of two (2) inches. The proportioning of the varying sizes of stone and bituminous cement shall be such that the compressed mixture shall as closely as practicable have the solidity and density of solid stone.

Wearing surface.

95. After rolling the wearing surface there shall be spread over it a thin coating of Warren's quick drying bituminous flush coat composition, the purpose of this coating being to completely fill any unevenness or honeycomb which may appear in the surface of the mixture.

Surface finish.

96. There shall be then rolled into the surface a thin layer of stone chips for the purpose of presenting a gritty surface which will not be slippery.

97. Each layer of the work shall be kept as free as possible from dirt, so that it will unite with the succeeding layer.

General.

98. The bituminous composition or cement shall in each case be free from water, petroleum oil, water gas or process tars, and shall be especially refined, with a view to remove the light oil, naphthalene and other crystalline matter susceptible to atmospheric influences.

99. If the fine crushed stone used does not provide the best proportions of fine grained particles, they must be supplied by the use of not to exceed 15 per cent. hydraulic cement, pulverized stone or very fine sand.

100. Where this pavement abuts a stone block or macadam pavement, as shown upon the plan, the Contractor shall put down bluestone heading-stone four and a half (4½) inches thick, at least three (3) feet long and one (1) foot deep, dressed square on top, ends and sides, and set on a foundation of six (6) inches of concrete of the quality described in paragraphs 102 and 110. These heading-stones will be measured and paid for as roadway pavement.

Heading-stones.

101. The price bid per square yard for the pavement under Method C (Warren's patent bitulithic pavement) must include the laying, mixing and furnishing of all materials, labor and implements necessary to complete the base, wearing surface and heading-stones, and shall cover the cost of maintaining the pavement in good order for the period of five years.

Price to cover.

Note. The foregoing specifications under Method C are intended to describe the pavement manufactured by the Warren Brothers Company, and known as Warren Brothers' Bituminous Macadam Waterproof Pavement, a patented pavement, even if not complying therewith in every detail.

Cement Concrete.

102. All cement concrete used shall be made in the proportion of one part by measure of Portland cement of the quality specified in paragraphs 111 to 114, to two parts clean, sharp sand and five parts of broken stone.

Proportions.

103. The broken stone shall be of solid granite, trap or limestone of the size known as three-quarter-inch stone, and shall be entirely free from all dust and dirt, and shall be crushed and screened before being brought on the work.

Broken stone, quality of.

104. The cement, sand and broken stone shall be measured in the manner directed by the Engineer.

Measurement of constituents.

105. In mixing concrete, the cement and the sand shall be first mixed dry, then wet with only sufficient clean, fresh water to make a rather soft mortar, and worked. The stone having been washed, and while still wet, shall then be added and the mass shall then be turned three times with shovels. It shall be mixed in a suitable box and in no case upon the pavement or on the ground.

Mixing.

106. The concrete as soon as mixed shall be deposited where required and rammed with wooden or metal rammers, as shall be directed, until the mortar flushes to the surface.

Depositing.

107. No batch of concrete containing more than one barrel of cement will be mixed at one time.

108. When in place all wheeling, working, or walking on or over it must be prevented until it is sufficiently set.

109. When connection is to be made with any layer, set or partly set, the edges of such layer must be broken down, all loose materials entirely removed and the surface swept off and thoroughly wet so as to make the joints fresh and close.

110. No concrete shall be used or worked after it has begun to set.

Hydraulic Cement.

111. All cement must be of best quality of fresh-ground Portland cement of a well established brand, and approved by the Engineer, and shall have a tensile strength of three hundred pounds per square inch of section, when mixed pure and allowed a set of twenty-four hours in air and six days in water; it shall be ninety-five per cent. fine when tried with a sieve of twenty-five hundred meshes to the square inch. Each barrel of Portland cement shall weigh not less than three hundred and seventy-five pounds net.

112. All cement furnished by the Contractor will be subject to inspection and tests as recommended by the American Society of Civil Engineers before it is used, and if found of improper quality, must be immediately removed from the work; such samples of cement required by the Engineer for testing purposes shall be supplied by the Contractor without charge therefor. All cement must be delivered in well-coopered barrels, not in bags nor in bulk.

113. After the cement is brought upon the line of the work, the Contractor will be required to furnish the Engineer or Inspectors full facilities for examining, testing and keeping account of it.

114. When cement is accepted, if not immediately used, it must be protected from the weather and kept dry, and in no case will it be allowed to be placed upon the ground without blockings under the barrels.

To be protected.

Cleaning Up.

115. All surplus materials, earth, sand, rubbish and stones, etc., are to be removed from the line of the work as rapidly as the work progresses. At any time within one month after the completion of the entire work, if so required by the Commissioner, all such material shall be swept into heaps and immediately removed from the line of the work; and unless this be done by the Contractor within forty-eight hours after being notified so to do, by a written notice to be served upon the Contractor either personally or by leaving it at his residence, or with any of his agents in charge of the work or employees found on the work, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, the same shall be removed by the Commissioner, and the amount of the expense thereof shall be deducted out of any moneys due or to grow due to the Contractor under this agreement.

Removal of surplus material, rubbish, etc.

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond has presented to this Board a form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications" for furnishing and setting new curbstones and paving with asphalt blocks, sheet asphalt or bituminous macadam, the carriageway of West Seventy-second street, between Central Park West and Riverside Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York; and Whereas, In clause 52 of the specifications of said contract and relating to "Roadway Pavement," it is provided as follows:

"The bidder may, at his option, offer to lay the roadway pavement in one or other of the following three methods, separately described and designated herein, as indicated.

"Method A.—Pavement of asphalt blocks three inches in thickness with a base of Portland cement concrete and mortar three inches in thickness.

"Method B.—Pavement of sheet asphalt two inches in thickness with a bituminous concrete binder one inch and a Portland cement concrete base three inches in thickness.

"Method C.—The Warren patent bitulithic pavement two inches in thickness, with a base of bituminous concrete four inches in thickness"; and

Whereas, The specifications following the said clause separately describe and designate the said three kinds of pavement in detail, the said Warren patent bitulithic pavement being a patented pavement;

Resolved, That the Park Board be and it hereby is authorized to advertise for bids for furnishing and setting new curbstones and paving with asphalt blocks, sheet asphalt, or bituminous macadam, the carriageway of West Seventy-second street, between Central Park West and Riverside Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, in accordance with the said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," this Board being of the opinion that the conditions set forth in said form of contract and specifications will secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition between the pavement known as the Warren Brothers Bituminous Macadam Waterproof Pavement, a patented pavement, and other noiseless pavements, and accordingly this Board prescribes that the conditions set forth in said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," shall be the conditions under which the said patented pavement shall be advertised for.

Resolved, further, That a copy of said form of "Proposals for bids or estimates, bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications," as presented to this Board, be annexed to and form a part of this resolution.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
