The Comptroller presented the Departmental Estimates for the year 1904.

Which were ordered to be printed in the Minutes (see volume 3 of the Minutes).

The Mayor presented the following statement which he ordered placed on file:

The amount to be collected by taxation next year will be approximately \$1,000,000 less than was collected under the Budget made in 1901. It will be about \$9,500,000 in excess of the amount collected this year, of which approximately \$3,500,000 will be offset by the increase of taxable property and by the gain in the City's revenues. The rest of the increase, amounting to \$6,000,000, comes from the demands for Redemption of City Debt, for interest and for installments on account of new debt. The last item is not unduly large—less than \$400,000. The amount included for Redemption of City Debt includes \$3,700,000 of Special Revenue Bonds in excess of last year, most of which have been issued on account of the Street and Park Opening Fund. In this sum is an item of more than \$1,000,000, necessitated by the payment of the awards for the Riverside Drive extension, an improvement begun in Mayor Strong's time. There is a large increase in the amount of interest due on account of Revenue Bonds issued in anticipation of taxes; also on account of the high rates of interest now ruling, and because of a change in the method of financing adopted by the Comptroller.

The tax rate next year is likely to be 1.53, as against 1.41 this year; but even that is a lower rate than last year, apart from any change in assessed valuations, notwithstanding the great growth of the City and the many improvements that have been made. To put it in another way: on taxable resources, next year (at least \$450,000,000 in excess of last year), the amount of money to be raised by taxation will be \$1,000,000 less. For several years the Tax Budget has approximately been almost stationary. It has really increased every year, but the increase has been offset, until now, by a constant diminution in the State tax. The State tax, both this year and next year, is as low as it can be under the State Constitution, which calls for the collection of 15 mills each year on account of the canal debt. Every increase in City expenses therefore, from now on, will show without any offset, except as items like the issue of Special Revenue Bonds for Street and Park Openings, and the interest account may vary from year to year.

The increases allowed this year for the departments, including the Borough Presidents, have been kept within \$3,500,000—the estimated increase in the revenues of the City.

In reply to the Mayor's reference to the change in the method of financing the Comptroller made the following statement:

The change in the financing which the Mayor refers to is simply that the Comptroller has refused to continue the practice of selling Corporate Stock in advance of requirements, in order to make use for the time being of the proceeds for current expenses of the City, a practice which has always prevailed heretofore and which is not clearly authorized by law. It makes comparatively a slight difference in the cost of interest, but it is the only policy which can lawfully be adopted. That makes a small

difference. I cannot vote for that statement, but I have no objection to it going on the record. I cannot say what the tax rate is going to be.

The Secretary presented the following resolution and budget for the year 1904:

BUDGET FOR 1904.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the unanimous vote of all of the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and four, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State Taxes; and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and six million, six hundred and seventy-four thousand, nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and nine cents (\$106,674,955.09).

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts and disbursements from public money separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

All appropriations for Supplies and Contingencies, made in the foregoing Budget are subject to transfer of such proportionate amounts that may be necessary to provide for one or more telephone contracts for general use, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment determines to enter into such general contracts.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

When called upon to vote, the Comptroller made the following statement:

As far as I am concerned, I did my utmost to keep this Budget at the lowest possible figure. The largest item of increase is the sum necessary to replenish the Fund for Street and Park Openings. The sum necessary is imposed by taxation according to the terms of the Charter, but is intended for present use, and to be collected hereafter by assessment. I regard the law as very defective in this respect, and I believe the City ought to at once propose an amendment to allow the issue of Assessment Bonds instead of Special Revenue Bonds, and so prevent such an increase in taxation. Such Assessment Bonds could be redeemed out of the assessments levied.

So far as this Board is concerned, this item of increase is mandatory upon it. The only option which there was in the matter was with the Corporation Counsel, who has proceeded, I think, faster than his client could afford. If, instead of closing so many of these proceedings this year, he had closed a few more last year, a few less this year and reserved some for next year, there would have been no such increase in taxation. I vote aye because it is necessary to reach a settlement on this Budget.

The Mayor—There should be added to that statement that in this sum for Street and Park Openings there is included more than \$1,000,000 for the Riverside drive extension, an improvement which was begun under Mayor Strong.

The Comptroller—That only represents one-third of the increase, the other two-thirds are scattered all over the city.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1904, for consideration and action thereon in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT:

DEAR SIR—At the last meeting of the United Real Estate Owners' Associations a resolution was passed protesting on behalf of the taxpayers of The City of New York to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment against the high appropriations requested by the heads of the various Municipal Departments, as appearing in the Budget for 1904. We understand that the Budget amounts to almost \$115,000,000, being an increase of over \$16,000,000 over the preceding Budget.

We beg to call special attention to the appropriation asked for by the Health Department, which requests \$597,108.52 more than it received in 1903. This Department should receive less money this year than last, for the reason that owing to legislation at Albany during the past few winters a great many functions of this Department are transferred to and are now vested in the Tenement House Department.

The Tenement House Department received from the City for 1903 the sum of \$466,433.08, and is asking for 1904 the sum of \$795,650, or an increase of \$330,216.92, which money has been requested by the Department to engage 117 more Inspectors and Special Inspectors, 92 more Clerks and Junior Clerks, 34 more Typewriters and Stenographers and 26 more Policemen. We respectfully urge that the present force of employees in the Tenement House Department is sufficiently large, if the business of said Department were conducted in a more practical way than heretofore. As property owners who own houses which are in perfect sanitary condition and fit for human habitation in every way have in numerous instances been seriously annoyed by violations issued by that Department, which upon re-inspection have been either materially modified or dismissed, all of which has caused an unnecessary amount of labor at the expense of the City, we strongly protest against increased allowance for this Department.

The Police Department is asking \$1,319,261.93 more for 1904 than it received in 1903, and gives as a reason the necessity for employing more Policemen and Clerks, besides the contingent expense of the Department. We respectfully urge that the present Police Force is sufficiently large if properly handled. A large number of Policemen, not less than 1,660, are now doing detail duty, being stationed at the expense of the City at the New York Central depot and other railroad depots, at various docks, private institutions, and also in the various Municipal and Police Magistrate Courts, where the force can be reduced to one-half, and where the duties should be imposed upon the railroad companies and large corporations of defraying the expenses of this police surveillance out of their own pockets, the same as is being done by the Equitable Life Assurance Society and other large insurance companies as well as the large department stores in this City.

The Budget keeps on increasing notwithstanding the fact that we contributed much less to the State Treasury in City taxes than ever before. For instance, in 1901, the City contributed to the State Treasury the sum of \$6,959,037.12, while for 1903 the City contributed only \$550,157.28.

We respectfully call the attention of your Honorable Board to the fact that real estate to-day is assessed at a much higher valuation than in years past, owing to the new interpretations and rules adopted by the Tax Commissioners. Where real estate in this City has formerly been assessed at about 65 per cent. of its market value, the assessment to-day stands close to 100 per cent. and in some instances more than 100 per cent. This of itself heavily increases the burdens of owners of real estate in The City of New York, and it is therefore of the greatest importance that the Budget for 1904 should be smaller and not larger than in preceding years.

If your Honorable Board should grant the large increase of appropriations asked for in the recitations of the various heads of the Departments, and this practice be continued, the tax rate will, in the course of a few years, be at the same figure as it was before real estate was assessed at its full value, which means that the taxes on a parcel of real estate in dollars and cents will amount to 50 per cent. more than hitherto. It can hardly be maintained that such an enormous increase within such a few years is justified from any standpoint.

SIR—I have received your letter dated April 28, 1903, in reference to certain bonds which were issued in order to obtain money for repaving streets.

These bonds were issued in each of the years between 1889 and 1897, inclusive, and under these statutes:

- Laws of 1889, chapter 346.
- Laws of 1892, chapter 35.
- Laws of 1895, chapter 475.
- Laws of 1897, chapter 87.

It appears that bonds to the amount of \$11,000,000 were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be issued and contracts were awarded by former Commissioners of Public Works for repaving streets, involving in the aggregate the expenditure of \$10,810,000, leaving a balance, including premiums, of about \$420,000, free of all obligations. You request me to advise if this balance is at present available for repaving streets.

I am informed by the Comptroller that a part of this balance, amounting to \$291,171.05, consists of "cash," as it is denominated in the Finance Department. That is to say, bonds have been actually issued and sold under these statutes, and the money received, amounting to \$291,171.05, is now in the City Treasury and a part of this balance. The remainder of the balance has not been actually obtained, but bonds have been authorized to be issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a part of the \$11,000,000 which might be sold at the present time, and the money obtained therefor, if such action is legal and advisable.

The course to be followed in this anomalous case has not been clearly and definitely laid down in the statutes, and should therefore be determined largely by the exercise of good judgment on the part of the City's officers.

It was no doubt contemplated by the Legislature in passing the statutes referred to that all of the money resulting from the sale of bonds of the face value of \$11,000,000 would be used for repaving the streets in the old City of New York, and no limit was prescribed as to the time within which the contracts should be made for the doing of the work.

I see no impropriety in using the cash balance of this fund for repaving streets in the Borough of Manhattan under contracts to be made in the immediate future, and the provisions of section 187 of the Charter as to special funds are in harmony with this view, although they may not, strictly speaking, apply in terms to this case. The simplest method of procedure that I can suggest is for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize a transfer of the cash balance to the present fund for repaving streets in the Borough of Manhattan. It could then be expended like other moneys in that fund.

In view of the technical difficulties in the way it seems hardly advisable to issue now the unissued balance of the bonds.

It might also be thought best to revoke the authorization for their issue by a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, so that the whole subject may be formally closed upon the books of the Department of Finance.

I have taken a similar position in my letter to the Comptroller of this date and after consultation with him.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board held September 9, 1903, a resolution was adopted assenting to and approving of a proposed contract or agreement, submitted by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, between The City of New York and the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company, for a supply of water in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, at the rate of \$65 per million gallons, said contract being for one year from the date thereof.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Charter, it is incumbent upon the Mayor and Comptroller to separately indorse their assents upon the contract, and when this was presented to me an examination of the same revealed the fact that there was no provision in the agreement affecting the right of the City to condemn the franchise, plant and property of the water company, and also nothing barring the company from exclusive rights or privileges to lay mains and pipes in the borough.

I did not feel that the City's interests would be fully protected unless covenants covering each of the above points should be inserted in the contract, and in accordance therewith a new paragraph has been added to the contract, numbered "Fifteenth," in which ample provision is made to protect the City's rights.

The form of contract has been again approved by the Corporation Counsel, and in its amended form I recommend that it be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The resolution adopted by the Board on September 3, 1903, should be rescinded and a new resolution adopted.

SIR—You have before you for your approval, in accordance with section 471 of the Greater New York Charter, a proposed agreement between this company and The City of New York for a supply of water to Long Island City, at the rate of sixty-five dollars per million gallons. This proposed contract does not, as I am informed by you, contain the clause which you desire to have inserted in all contracts under section 471, and which clause, as I understand, reads in substance as follows:

Nothing in this agreement shall be so construed as to give to the company any exclusive right or privilege to lay mains and pipes and to erect hydrants and to maintain the same and other apparatus in the Borough of Queens or to supply water to the City or the inhabitants thereof or to limit the right of the City, as hereinbefore provided, to establish and maintain its own water supply system and apparatus within the Borough of Queens or the district within which the mains of the company are now laid or may hereafter be laid. This agreement shall not bar or in any manner affect the rights of the City to acquire the franchises, assets and property of the company or any part thereof by condemnation proceedings or otherwise at any time, and shall not be taken to enhance the value of or add to the company's stock, franchises, assets and property, but on the contrary the stock, assets, franchises and property of the company shall be valued in any proceeding to condemn the same without enhancement by reason of any provision of this agreement being considered or allowed.

After careful deliberation this company has duly decided to waive, and hereby waives any rights which it now has or may hereafter have by reason of the omission of such clause from the said contract, and in consideration of your approving said contract as it now reads, and in consideration of the approval of the same by the Mayor and the due execution of the contract by the City and the making of the same a binding obligation of the City, this company agrees that the City shall have the same rights under said contract as it would have in case such clause were inserted therein; and it is understood that this letter may be read in evidence in behalf of the City in any proceeding to condemn the stock, assets, franchises and property of this company, or any part thereof, or in any other legal proceeding in relation to said agreement.

Resolved, That in conducting examinations for Patrolman and Fireman, the Board of Examiners be and are hereby instructed to set ten questions in localities, divided according to boroughs, as follows:

—and that candidates be required to answer all questions.

The President presented a communication from Examiner Crandall, to whom had been referred for rating the amended records of William T. This appointment was made for a period not to exceed three months, under the provisions of Rule 33, at a time when the Commission had ordered an examination for Interpreter with knowledge of French, German, Spanish, Italian, Hebrew and Bohemian, and pending the establishment of the eligible list. The Secretary presented the report of the Engineer Examiners upon conferences held by them with representatives of "Eccentric Association of Engineers No. 2," together with a letter from the association, requesting another conference.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Chief Examiner.

The Secretary presented the application of James F. Dowling, No. 1727 Second avenue, for the position of Fireman, together with a report of the Chief Examiner, showing that though the applicant stated that he had never before filed an application for the position of Fireman, the records showed that he had, and that he had failed in the examination taken under such previous application.

On motion, the application was rejected.

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, announcing that its next meeting would be held at the Manhattan Hotel, New York, on Friday, November 27. The letter was ordered filed.

The Secretary stated that during the progress of the meeting of the Commission held November 18, he had received a telephonic message from Fire Commissioner Sturgis, subsequently confirmed by a letter from the Fire Commissioner, requesting that an examination be held for promotion to the position of Chief of Department, and that thereupon he had scheduled and advertised a competitive examination for such promotion, to be held November 30, applications therefor to be presented on or before November 25. The following resolution was thereupon adopted:

Inasmuch as Rule 38 requires that "on receiving the notification of an appointing officer that a vacancy exists which is to be filled by promotion," the Municipal Commission shall make arrangements for an examination, and as an examination has been advertised for promotion from Deputy Chief to Chief of the Fire Department, and the Municipal Commission has not been informed that any vacancy exists in the office of Chief.

Resolved, That the notice of said examination for Chief of the Fire Department, for November 30, be withdrawn, and said examination be not held until further order of the Commission.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting the Commission to pass the payrolls of Robert Ivey, Peter Dougherty and G. Urcinola, Laborers in the Bureau of Highways, from which the certificate of the Commission had been withheld on the ground that the employees affected had not been reassigned to duty in the manner provided by section 1543 of the Charter. The President of the Borough stated that he had not received the ruling of the Commission with reference to such matters at the time that these reassignments were made, and that since its receipt it had been carefully followed.

On motion, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, requesting that an eligible list be certified from which he might appoint a "Millwright and Sawyer," and setting forth the needs of the services of such an employee in his department. The title not being included in the classification, and there being no appropriate eligible list from which certification could be made, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Labor Class be amended by adding thereto the following title:

Purroy as Chief of the Fire Department, which carries with it the cessation of his membership in this Board of Examiners, the members of the Board hereby place on record their high appreciation of the services rendered by him during his membership in arriving at wise and just conclusions on the many and difficult appeal questions submitted to this Board, the solution of which the Charter Law evidently intended and expected would be all the better reached when it provided that the Chief of the Fire Department shall be, ex officio, a member of the Board, and the record shows that in not a single instance has the approval or disapproval of this Board been given contrary to the opinion and judgment of Chief Purroy during his term of office.

This Board extends to him its best wishes in his voluntary retirement for his happiness, prosperity and long life.

The Clerk was instructed to forward a copy of this minute to the Commissioner of the Fire Department as well as to Mr. Purroy.

Appeal No. 224 (referred back to Fire Department for further information).

On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was approved on condition that shutters be placed on the two (2) rear window openings on second story of extension.

Appeal No. 229. On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was approved.

Appeal No. 230 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 44 of 1903, premises No. 78 Barrow street, Manhattan; Corporation of Trinity Church, appellant.

On motion, referred to Chief Kruger for examination and report.

Appeal No. 231 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 45 of 1903, premises Nos. 14 and 16 Wooster street, Manhattan; W. G. Piqueron, architect and appellant.

On motion, referred to Chief Kruger for examination and report.

Appeal No. 232 of 1903, New Building No. 414 of 1903, southeast corner Stanton and Pitt streets, Manhattan; A. E. Badt, architect and appellant.

It is respectfully requested that the provisions of the Building Code be modified so far as to allow the omission of the brick partition bearing wall in centre of the building on the second and upper floors, to provide, and 16-inch walls would make the kitchens too small in the width, therefore it is proposed to provide instead 4-inch brick-filled fireproof partitions separating each apartment, formed by filling in between the studs with brick and covering said partitions with 3/8-inch metal lath, securely fastened to each stud with long staples, said partitions to be plastered three good coats of plaster on both sides; these partitions will be carried on each floor by steel girders, which will also carry the wooden floor beams.

Mr. G. L. Wills appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over, pending amendment and the filing of plans.

Appeal No. 233, New Building No. 812 of 1903, northwest corner Park avenue and Fifty-first street, Manhattan; George A. O'Rourke, architect and appellant.

The Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan having disapproved of the application No. 812 New Building of 1903, with the following objection, viz.: Proposed frame structure within fire limits is unlawful. Section 143 of the Code.

This appeal from the decision of such Superintendent is made on the ground that section 143 of the Code refers to frame buildings in fire limits intended for permanent use; this is not the case in the building proposed, is fully permissible in section 144 of the Code: For builders' use: Temporary one-story frame buildings may be erected, etc.

The question which the appellant desires to have passed upon is as follows:

That the structure is but a temporary one-story frame building to be used as shown on the accompanying plans, to be removed at the completion of the Grand Central terminal.

The appellant's reasons for desiring a favorable decision on the question to be passed upon are as follows: In that the section 144 already referred to gives every builder or contractor the right to erect, etc. This contract being an unusually large one, it is desired to have stable, etc., combined to aid in the rapid removal of materials.

The amount involved in this appeal exceeds \$1,000.

Mr. Charles A. Millner appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Appeal No. 234 of 1903, Alteration No. 502 of 1903, No. 641 East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, The Bronx; C. F. Lohse, architect and appellant.

The Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of The Bronx having disapproved of the application No. 502 Alteration of 1903 with the following objection, viz.:

No. 1. No frame building inside the fire limit shall be lawful to increase in height, and extension shall not be over two stories and basement in height, section 142 of the Code.

This appeal from the decision of such Superintendent is made on the ground that the said building proposed to be raised and extended adjoining a three-story frame building on easterly side occupied it is said, in section 142 of Building Code that if a building is situated in a row of frame buildings the same may be increased in height to conform to the height of adjoining buildings, as there is over ninety per cent. frame buildings on the block between One Hundred and Sixty-first street and between Melrose and Courtlandt avenue, and the first story throughout will be of brick 12 inches thick, and the height of said building will be only 2 feet more in height as at present. The gentlemen of the Board should be kindly in favor as to approval of said alteration and modify section 142 of Code.

The question which the appellant desires to have passed upon is as follows: Present two-story frame structure proposed to be raised 2 feet and extend present basement wall 2 feet more in height with 12-inch brick wall to increase ceiling in height for store purposes. Also it is proposed to extend building in rear 15 feet the same height, and of same material as present when raised.

The appellant's reasons for desiring a favorable decision on the question to be passed upon are as follows:

The owner is to provide a store in said building and improve upper floors, present ceiling would not be proper in height and would spoil the front view of the house, also to erect extension lower than main building; there would be a trap of floor and a stoop to be provided to rear portion which will be inconvenient and dangerous.

Mr. Chris. F. Lohse appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

The Chairman presented and read a communication from N. Taylor Phillips, Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copy of resolution approving of the renewal of lease of rooms occupied by the Board for a term of one year from January 1, 1904.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE New York and Long Island Traction Company the right of franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway in, upon and along certain streets and highways and bridges in The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York and Long Island Traction Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track street surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully

employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets and highways and bridges, all situated in the boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn, City and State of New York, set forth in the following descriptions of routes:

First—Beginning at a point on Fulton street (otherwise known as the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike), at the easterly line of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, running thence northwesterly on and along said Fulton street to the intersection of said Fulton street and the Jericho turnpike at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens.

Second—Beginning at the intersection of said Fulton street and Springfield road (at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens), running thence southwesterly on and along said Springfield road to a road known as Old Country road; thence generally westerly on and along said Old Country road past the intersection of said Old Country road and South street to a point on said Old Country road about opposite Bryan avenue, in Hollis Park; thence generally westerly on and along private property to Bryan avenue, in Hollis Park, at its intersection with Farmer avenue; thence westerly on and along said Bryan avenue to its intersection with South street; thence westerly on and along South street to Puntine street, in Jamaica; thence northwesterly on and along Puntine street to Linden street; thence westerly on and along Linden street to New York avenue; thence northwesterly on and along New York avenue to a point on New York avenue about opposite to Centre street; thence westerly on and over private property crossing Union Hall street at a point nearly opposite Centre street; thence westerly on and along Centre street to Washington street, crossing Washington street and private property to Prospect street; thence northwesterly on and along Prospect street to and across the bridge over the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Fleet street; thence running easterly on and along Fleet street to Washington street; thence westerly on and along Fleet street to Twombly place; thence westerly on and along Twombly place to Division street; thence northwesterly on and along Division street to Fulton street, in Jamaica. Also, from the intersection of Twombly place and Church street, running thence northwesterly on and along Church street to Fulton street.

Third—Beginning at a point at the boundary line between The City of New York and the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, on private property contiguous to and lying north of the conduit of the Brooklyn City Water Works in the Borough of Queens; running thence westerly on and along private property contiguous to and adjoining the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works on the northerly side thereof; crossing Ocean avenue (otherwise known as the road to Wright's Mill), Rosedale avenue, Foster's Meadow road, the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works, known as Conduit Branch, Springfield road, Farmer's avenue and New York avenue to the Rockaway turnpike; running thence northwesterly on and along said Rockaway turnpike to the junction of said Rockaway turnpike and the Rockaway road (formerly known as the Rockaway Plank road); running thence northwesterly on and along said Rockaway road (formerly known as the Rockaway Plank road) to Broadway; running thence westerly on and along Broadway to Liberty avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with a branch line from the intersection of said Rockaway road (formerly known as the Rockaway Plank road) and Water street; running thence westerly on and along Water street to and across Spruce street; also with a branch line from the intersection of said Rockaway road (formerly known as the Rockaway Plank road) and the Rockaway turnpike; running thence northwesterly on and along said Rockaway turnpike to Fulton street, in Jamaica.

Fourth—Beginning at a point on the Jericho turnpike at the extreme easterly boundary line of The City of New York and the Town of North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, and running thence westerly on and along said Jericho turnpike to a point at the intersection of said Jericho turnpike and the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike (otherwise known as Fulton street), all in the Borough of Queens.

And with the right or franchise to cross such other streets and highways and bridges (named and unnamed) as may be encountered in said routes.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent, in writing, of the owners of half in value of the property bounded or said streets and highways and bridges to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller, or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority, shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, and of the land in private ownership upon which the said railway shall be operated or the easements of right-of-way or other necessary easements in such lands, as the case may be, including power-house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. The valuation shall be based upon a fair appraisal of the property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value

shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, provided that in the valuation of the land in private ownership, on which such railway is constructed, or the easements affecting such land, as the case may be, their value shall not be fixed at an amount in excess of the original cost thereof, to the grantee of said franchise, its successors or assigns. A sworn statement of such cost executed by such grantee and verified by the affidavit of one of its officers, shall be filed with the Comptroller of The City of New York before any act is done by the grantee, or its successors or assigns, in the construction or operation of the railway upon any route hereinbefore mentioned, which includes private property.

Fourth—The New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts derived from passenger and freight traffic, within the limits of The City of New York, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$2,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$2,000.

In computing the amount of the gross receipts derived from passenger traffic and above referred to, the routes hereinbefore mentioned shall be considered, and the persons who are upon the cars of the company at any point upon such routes shall be deemed to have paid the fare provided to be paid by the ordinance granting the franchise aforesaid, whether they enter or leave the car upon such route or upon any other route upon which the grantee, or its successors or assigns, operates its cars.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse-power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successors or assigns, one year's notice, in writing, may require it or them to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially according to the system now in use on the railways in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and highways and bridges of The City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents within the limits of The City of New York; the said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as much oftener as the

reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within The City of New York between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and five o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be used or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptance of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do, may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments and shall complete the construction of at least six miles of single track railway on or before January 1, 1905, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon any of the routes above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1906, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such routes, or parts of routes, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expenses of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in Section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York and Long Island Transportation Company, within thirty days after the said

company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of three thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
