

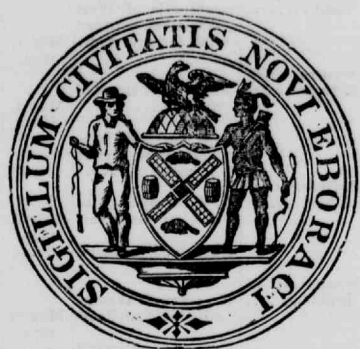

ANNUAL MEETING.

MONDAY, July 5, 1880, 12 o'clock, M.

Whereupon the President made the following order:

The tax and assessment rolls having been finally submitted to the Board of Supervisors on the first Monday in July, being July 5, 1880, the undersigned, in the name of the Board of Supervisors, and as one of its acts, and by due virtue of law, authorizes and directs the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, by themselves, and such clerical assistance at their disposal, but without expense to the city or county, to cause to be properly estimated and computed, the taxes under and by virtue of said rolls, and to cause the said estimation and computation to be prepared, set down and extended in the tax books, as required by section 25 of chapter 120 of the Laws of 1850, and to cause the items of

said taxes to be carefully added, and to set down the amount of the same in the said books. This order to take effect after the expiration of the fifteen days mentioned in section 9 of chapter 269, Laws of 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1879, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, to wit: the sum of twenty-eight million one hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York."

FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1880.

Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1879.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1879, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1879, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1879; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

The expense of laying such crosswalks will not be great, and they can be relaid by the Commissioner of Public Works at the time the street is paved, and be paid for out of the appropriation for repairs to pavements.

The Commissioner of Public Works informs me that he has transmitted to the Common Council a form of ordinance which the Counsel to the Corporation advises him should be used to avoid difficulties in relation to assessments for paving. I recommend that ordinances for paving be passed hereafter in the form suggested by the Commissioner.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, July 5, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted June 15, 1880, authorizing the "Prall New York Heating Company" to lay mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places in the City of New York.

No evidence, as far as I am informed, has been offered to show the basis upon which the company is organized, or that the scheme proposed to be authorized will be of any practical utility. The public should not be exposed to the inconvenience of having the pavements taken up and travel obstructed unless it shall be clearly shown that some substantial public benefit will result, nor in any case except under rigorous conditions of supervision and control. The right of taking up and replacing the pavements at the cost of the parties interested should be reserved to the city, and the amount estimated by the city authorities as the cost of any such work should be deposited by them with the city, in advance.

The resolution contains no provisions to secure the public against unreasonable or exorbitant charges for the service to be rendered in case the scheme shall prove successful. A reasonable compensation to the city for the privileges granted should also be secured. This is not secured by the provision for the payment of three cents per lineal foot of streets occupied, or about \$150 per mile. The maximum amount to be paid under the provision is fixed at \$200,000, while under no circumstances would the payments to the city, at the rate specified, reach any such sum. It would seem as though this amount was inserted merely to convey a groundless impression that the city would receive that amount from the grant.

The proposition to pay the city "the next three per cent." earned in any one year "over ten per cent. on the capital" will probably prove illusory, as there is no limitation in the amount at which the nominal capital may be fixed.

EDWARD COOPER, Mayor.

Resolved, That the "Prall New York Heating Company" be and is hereby empowered to lay mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places of the City of New York, for the purpose of supplying heat and power to the inhabitants, by means of hot water or steam, under the following conditions and restrictions:

First—That in all cases where the pavements are to be disturbed for the purpose of laying or repairing said pipes a permit therefor shall first be obtained from the Commissioner of Public Works, and before taking out such a permit said company shall file with the Chamberlain of the city a bond for \$50,000, with sufficient and adequate security, to be approved by the Comptroller, to be renewed from time to time as the Comptroller may require, as a guarantee that the pavements and sidewalks of the streets shall be restored in as good condition as they were found at the time they were disturbed to lay said steam or hot-water pipes, and entirely to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and unless this be fully complied with the proper authorities shall be fully empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond for the amount which it may have cost the city to restore said pavements in good condition.

The pipes shall be laid under such regulations as the Commissioner of Public Works may from time to time establish, and under such part of roadway or sidewalk as he may prescribe on the permit.

And if at any time the Commissioner of Public Works shall direct any changes to be made in the location or arrangement of said pipes, for the purpose of the laying, altering, or removing city water-pipes or sewers, or doing any other public work, such changes shall be made by said company at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and in no case shall the city be liable for any injury or damage to the said pipes; and the company shall in no wise interfere with any sewers, water-pipes, or other pipes theretofore laid, without the consent of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Second—Said company shall supply all the steam or hot water required by the city for any purpose in the streets or the parts thereof in which the pipes are laid, or for heating public buildings located therein, at 25 per cent. less rates than steam or hot water is furnished by them to their most favored customer. And the company shall authorize the city to use for public purposes, without royalty, any of their patented appliances or apparatus for use in public buildings for steam or hot water supplied by the company which said company shall authorize or license any person to use.

Third—Said company, whenever requested by the proper authorities having charge of such matters, shall furnish hot water or steam for the purpose of cleaning the streets, through which the pipes are laid, from snow and ice, and also to supply hot water or steam for the use of the fire engines, at reasonable rates.

Fourth—That said company shall provide taps for connecting fire-hydrants along the line of their mains, whenever required to do so by the proper authorities, and shall supply hot water from their mains under sufficient pressure to rise through stand-pipes to the top of the highest buildings, and at a cost which shall be reasonable.

Fifth—Said company shall pay into the Sinking Fund, for the benefit of the City of New York, the sum of three cents per lineal foot of street-way in which their mains are laid until such payments shall have amounted to \$200,000, after which said payments shall cease and terminate.

And in addition to said three cents for each lineal foot of street way, in each year in which the company's net earnings shall exceed ten per cent. on the capital, the next three per cent. earned in the same year over ten per cent. on the capital shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund, for the Redemption of the City Debt; that the work of laying pipes is to begin within one year, and that within three years three miles of pipes is to be laid or the franchise will be forfeited.

M. and 4 P. M. every day.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor:

SIR—You have referred to me a resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen on the 15th inst., which is as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby required to keep a full head or pressure of water in the distributing reservoir at Forty-second street and Fifth avenue, by causing it to be filled to its utmost capacity of thirty-four feet, and kept in full action, in order to supply the lower part of this city with water; also that free access be given the public to the said reservoir between the hours of 8 A. M. and 4 P. M., every day."

Under the charter (chapter 335, Laws of 1873) it is expressly provided that the Department of Public Works "shall have cognizance and control of all structures and property connected with the supply and distribution of Croton water."

By the Law of 1870, chapter 137, it was provided that all the powers previously possessed by the Croton Aqueduct Board should thereafter be exercised by the Department of Public Works.

Section four of "An act to create the Croton Aqueduct Board, passed April 11, 1849," is as follows:

"The Croton Aqueduct Board, in addition to the matters charged upon them by said amended charter, are hereby charged with the preservation of the Croton lake and waters, with the execution of such measures as may be necessary to preserve and increase the quantity and keep it pure, with the management, preservation, and repairs of the dam, gates, aqueduct, High Bridge, reservoirs, mains, pipes, pipe-yard, and property of every description belonging to the water-works, etc."

The regulation and management of the supply and delivery of Croton water being thus vested in the Department of Public Works, it is not within the jurisdiction of the Board of Aldermen to pass the resolution above quoted.

With regard to the present supply of water, I have to state that the Croton aqueduct is delivering a supply up to its maximum capacity, and that the total amount thus received is delivered daily through pipes and mains to consumers throughout all parts of the city. There is a large district of the city lying north as well as south of Forty-second street, and it is impracticable with the present amount of water daily received in the city to fulfill the requirements of the resolution, and, at the same time, keep up a supply to all parts of the city.

The largely increased use of water during the warm and dry weather of the past two months has diminished the pressure six or seven pounds per square inch, and the height to which the water would rise about fifteen feet. The friction in the pipes is increased by large drafts of water and the pressure is proportionately reduced.

The two measures which the Department has recently inaugurated will increase the supply of water and materially improve the pressure, viz., the new conduit from the Bronx and Byram rivers, and the extension of the meter system, so as to cover every place of business in the city as provided by law. These measures should be pressed forward to the earliest possible completion. The new conduit is a work of time (about three years), but meters are now being placed in considerable numbers, and this work should be prosecuted with all possible dispatch, the good results being already quite appreciable.

As to keeping the Forty-second street reservoir open to the public, the Department for some years past has not deemed it advisable to do so, as the waters might be defiled, and it would entail an expense for watchmen for which no appropriation has been made.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

The entire work will be required to be finished within twenty (20) days after the date of the contract.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the penal sum of an amount equal to one-half of the amount of the bid.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 22d day of June, 1880, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 190 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 190. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet from any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removal from the stables shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 8 o'clock A. M. and 11 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board, regulating such removal within said hours.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such

payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
