

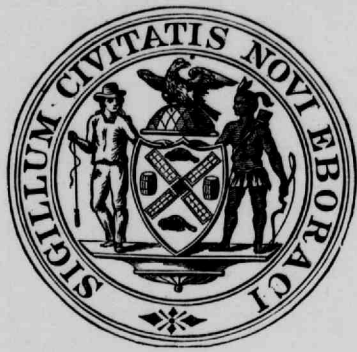

The Board of Health met this day.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 27, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,764, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 887 tenement houses, 99 private dwellings, 64 other dwellings, 20 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 1 garbage box, 2 manure dumps, 1 fundry, 1 lodging house, 1 bone and rag house, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public sewer, 67 yards, courts, and areas, 72 cellars and basements, 104 waste pipes and drains, 141 privies and water-closets, 54 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 45 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 19 other nuisances, together with 68 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 681.

During the past week 89 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 42 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

106 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 67 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 62 houses, 62 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 588 births, 41 still-births, 121 marriages, and 543 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 27, 1880. This shows an increase of 67 births, 2 still-births, and 32 deaths, and a decrease of 29 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 52 births, 8 marriages, and 14 deaths, and an increase of 1 still-birth. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 4; diphtheria, 12; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; bronchitis, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 3; premature and preterm births, 11; while the deaths from measles increased 2; croup, 6; whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 4; malarial fevers, 9; puerperal diseases, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; pneumonia, 8; heart diseases, 6; convulsions, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from erysipelas, inanition, aneurism, marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, meningitis and encephalitis, and gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 111 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 159 under two years; 219 under five years, and 41 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 1 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 40.33 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 103 were in institutions, 208 in tenement houses, 130 in houses containing 3 families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 153 on the second, 100 on the third, 47 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 541 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 56 were stated to be single, 155 married, 61 widowed, and the condition of 271 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 543; still-births, 41; bodies in transit, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 53 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 588 births, 121 marriages, 41 still-births, 543 deaths, 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 38 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 19 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 27, 1880, was 35.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.902, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,709, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.38 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 515 deaths and still-births, or 88.18 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 6; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 241; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 52; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran, (undenominational), 77; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 25; Evergreen (undenominational), 30; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending March 20, 1880, was 527; this is 63 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 36 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,107,895.

The certificates of 484 births, 47 still-births, 164 marriages, and 519 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 3, 1880; this shows a decrease of 104 births and 24 deaths, and an increase of 6 still-births and 43 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 156 births and 38 deaths, and an increase of 7 still-births and 35 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping cough decreased 3; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 7; puerperal diseases, 7; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 13; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 7; drowning, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 6; diphtheria, 8; croup, 4; erysipelas, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; alcoholism, 1; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from measles, diarrhoeal diseases, cancer, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and surgical operations, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 274 in tenement houses, 132 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 103 on the first, 147 on the second, 81 on the third, 53 on the fourth, 17 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 515 were stated to be residents of New York city, and 4 non-residents, 69 were stated to be single, 126 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 256 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 519; still-births, 47; bodies in transitu, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 55 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 484 births, 164 marriages, 47 still-births, 519 deaths, 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 41 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 3, 1880, was 40.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.816, the mean humidity was 77, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,246, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.64 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 500 deaths and still-births, or 88.34 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 230; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 38; Greenwood (undenominational), 47; Lutheran (undenominational), 72; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 7; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending March 27, 1880, was 527; this is 31 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 18.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,108,170.

Abstract of Proceedings for week ending April 10, 1880.

MEETING HELD WEDNESDAY, APRIL 7, 1880.

Regular Meeting, 9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Wenman, President Conover, Lane, and Green.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Mayor, notifying the Department of the appointment of Andrew H. Green as a Commissioner of Parks. Filed.

From General L. P. de Cesnola, thanking the Commissioners of Parks, on behalf of the Trustees of the Art Museum, for their co-operation and assistance in helping them to successfully establish the Art Building. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, recommending the appointment of a chainman. Matthew Nolan appointed at \$2.50 per day.

From the American Museum of Natural History, asking that the requisition for a safe be cancelled, and that new case be furnished, and hydrant ordered be placed near the entrance to the Museum. Laid over.

From the American Museum of Natural History, submitting a copy of its eleventh annual report. Filed.

From the Superintending Architect, reporting on the cost of erecting a platform on the roof of the Arsenal. Work to be done under the direction of the Superintending Architect.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting relative to the condition of the Harlem and Bronx river bridges, whereupon he was directed to report which one of the bridges across the Bronx river is necessary to be rebuilt first, and prepare plans and specifications for rebuilding the same, as well as an estimate of the cost for repairing each of the other bridges.

From the carpenters employed by the Department, petitioning for an increase of pay. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, submitting the final estimate for work done on contract for Brook avenue sewer with Jones & McQuade. Referred to the Auditing Committee.

Commissioner Wenman, to whom was referred at the last meeting the subject of music on the Central Park, submitted propositions from Messrs. Grafulla and Dodworth for furnishing the same at five dollars for each musician and fifteen dollars for the leader. Whereupon the subject of music on Central Park during the coming season was referred to the President with power, the expense not to exceed \$4,000, and terminable at the pleasure of the Board.

Proposals were received and opened for building a sea wall at East River Park, whereupon the Engineer of Construction was requested to report upon the plans and specifications for a sea-wall at East River Park.

The Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare plans for construction of a new iron bridge to replace the one known as Central Bridge, over the Harlem River, and submit the same to the Board and lay before the Board at his earliest convenience a plan for the construction of the suspension bridge over the Harlem River directed to be built by chapter 534 of the Laws of 1871, but not more than half a mile from High Bridge and to report his opinion as soon as practicable whether the bridge at that point would be more advantageous if made a pier bridge, and to report at the next meeting of the Board what work is necessary to put the Central Bridge in safe condition.

The Topographical Engineer was directed to examine and determine what changes in the grades of Jerome avenue, the Williams Bridge road, and Berrian avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, may be made without detriment to the public interest, and so as to facilitate the construction of the rapid transit branch road from Jerome Park station to Jerome Park, and to report at once to this Board the extent of such changes.

The President was directed to report to the Board a statement showing the appropriations under each head of account for this year, 1880, and the expenditures out of said appropriations up to the date of his report, and whether at the present rate of expenditure the appropriations are sufficient to carry on the business of the Department for the remainder of the year.

The President was directed to furnish to the Board a list showing the names of every person employed by the Board, the occupation of each of said persons, and the rate of his compensation, and whether in his judgment any reductions can be made in the number of employees other than mechanics and laborers or in their compensation.

The President was directed to report to the Board what contracts for regulating and grading or constructing sewers have been made and completed from 1875 to this date, also what contracts of this character are still in progress and not completed.

The President appointed Commissioner Green to consider the propriety of amending the by-laws with reference to the Engineer of Construction, Topographical Engineer, and Superintending Architect.

The President was directed to report to the Board at the next meeting a detailed statement of existing licenses, leases or privileges that have been granted by the Department, to whom granted, when they expire, and the price obtained therefor.
