

A resolution of which the following is a copy, was adopted by the Common Council, December 15, 1885, and approved by the Mayor, December 17, 1885, viz.:

"Resolved, That the public offices of this city (except those specially by law required to be kept open) be closed for the transaction of business on Saturday, the 26th day of December, 1885, and Saturday, the 2d day of January, 1886, being the days succeeding Christmas and New-Year's Day, respectively, so that such public offices will be so closed from Thursday in each week until the following Monday." To the Armory Board, New York City:

GENTLEMEN-The iron-work of the new building (Twelfth Regiment Armory) Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, corner Ninth avenue, New York, has progressed to entitle the contractors, Messrs. A. R. Whitney & Co., to the amount of their second payment, viz., nine thousand five hundred and ninety dollars, in accordance with the terms of the articles of agreement, being thirty-five per cent. of the amount of contract.
