

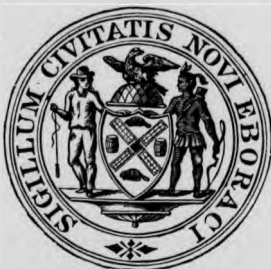

APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That the ordinance heretofore passed for regulating and grading One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Willis avenue to Brown place, and setting curb-stones and flagging the sidewalks therein, adopted by the Board of Aldermen September 8, 1886, and approved by the Mayor September 25, 1886, be amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from the easterly curb-line of Willis avenue to the easterly house-line of Brown place, be regulated and graded, and that the curb and flag-stones, where not on the established lines or grades, be taken up and reset and relaid, and new curb-stones be set, and new flag-stones, four feet in width, be laid along and on each sidewalk, where not already done, and that crosswalks be laid at the intersection of said street with Brown place, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 22, 1887.

Approved by the Mayor, April 5, 1887.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on south side of One Hundred and Twenty-second street, commencing about one hundred and seventy-four feet west Seventh avenue, and extending about four hundred and ninety-eight feet toward Eighth avenue, be fenced in, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the carriageway of Madison avenue, from the crosswalk at or near the north-easterly intersection of One Hundred and Thirty-third street to the northerly curb-line of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street (the entrance to the Madison Avenue Bridge), be paved with granite-block pavement, except that crosswalks of two courses of blue stone be laid across said avenue at the northerly and southerly intersections of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth, and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, parallel and within the lines of the sidewalk on each of said intersecting streets, and that crosswalks of two courses of blue stone be laid at the intersecting and terminating avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

SIR—There were 762 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 2, 1887, which is an increase of 65, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 36 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending March 26, 1887, was 744, which is 10.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.31 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,470,508.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage, caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owners of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made in favor of the owner of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that this requirement of compliance with the law, and that extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
