By reference to the report for the quarter ending June 30, 1875, it will be seen that there has been a marked decrease in the number of lodgings, and especially so in the number afforded to males—a decrease of 19,585. This is partially accounted for however, by the fact that this report covers the warmer summer months, during which the habitual Station-house lodger finds in the country, or in the parks and unfinished buildings of the city, better sleeping accommodations than the Station-houses afford.

The report for the quarter ending September 30, 1874, shows that 7,883 lodgings were furnished to males; thus making an increase of 2,343 for the corresponding quarter this year.
