

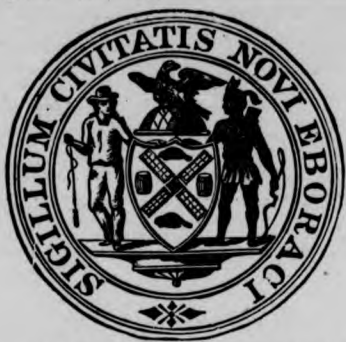
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REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS ON THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

A Detailed Statement and a Report of an Examination made by the Commissioners of Accounts of the Finance Department.

First.—Schedule "A," being an examination of all warrants and vouchers for year ending November 30, 1874.

Second.—Schedule "B," an examination of the Chamberlain's office for year ending November 30, 1874.

Third.—Schedule "C," an examination of the bonded debt as at the close of business December 31, 1874, together with a statement of the securities held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Fourth.—Schedule "D," a statement of judgments obtained against the city between December 12, 1871, and January 1, 1875.

Fifth.—Schedule "E," statement showing amounts appropriated and expended for interest for three years ending December 31, 1874.

Sixth.—Schedule "F," a statement of unexpended balances of appropriations for three years ending December 31, 1874, with the expenditures for the same period.

Acting pursuant to the Charter of 1873, the undersigned, Commissioners of Accounts, would respectfully report, that they have made an examination of the books and accounts of the Finance Department, and as the result of this examination have the honor to report:

First.—That we have carefully examined all warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Chamberlain, with the vouchers appertaining to the same, and herewith submit Schedule "A," showing the amount for which warrants were drawn against the several appropriations—Special and Trust Accounts—for the twelve months ending November 30, 1874.

Second.—That we have also examined the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury during the year ending November 30, 1874, and submit herewith Schedule "B."

Third.—That we have examined all the bonds canceled during the year ending December 31, 1874, and submit herewith a statement (Schedule "C") of the Bonded Debt, as at the close of business on that day, classified under the title of each separate issue, and rate per cent. of interest; together with a statement of the stocks and bonds held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. We are also preparing a statement of the Bonded Debt to June 30, 1875, which will be published in a few days.

Fourth.—We have prepared a statement (Schedule "D") showing the amount of judgments obtained against the city from December 12, 1871, down to January 1, 1875. This statement is based upon an examination of the judgments docketed (1) in the County Clerk's office, and (2) the amount docketed in the several courts, of which no transcripts were filed with the County Clerk, and a comparison of the present condition of these judgments as appear on the records in the office of the Counsel to the Corporation, so far as these matters could be traced through the books or records examined.

We are unable to find, from any record in the office of the Counsel to the Corporation, any evidence of the payment of these judgments, and are informed that the Comptroller has never notified this office when such judgments have been satisfied, although repeatedly requested to do so.

We also find that in many instances judgments have been paid or satisfied in the respective courts in which they were obtained, and no transcript of such satisfaction has been filed in the County Clerk's office, although the original judgment is still unsatisfied on its record.

The practice of the Finance Department is, that when a judgment is obtained against the city, such portion of said judgment as represented the original sum of the claim is taken out of any unexpended balance of appropriation, applicable in the first instance for this purpose, and the costs and interest are charged against Judgment Account only; but provided there is no unexpended balance, in the estimation of the Finance Department, such judgment is paid entirely out of Judgment Account. In one instance that has been brought to our attention, the books of the Finance Department show that there was and is now an unexpended balance to the credit of an Appropriation Account. That the claimants were refused payment on the ground of the want of an appropriation, and that they sued and recovered judgments, and their claims when paid were charged up against Judgment Account. This schedule of judgments is made up exclusive of any mandamuses that have been obtained against the county, which operate virtually as judgments carrying costs; and is also independent of a large number of suits that have been settled, after an action has been commenced against the city.

Fifth.—By section 91, of the Charter of 1873, it is provided that "Whenever any work is necessary to be done to complete or perfect a particular job, or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, which work or job is to be undertaken or supply furnished for the Corporation, and the several parts of the said work or supply shall together involve the expenditure of more than one thousand dollars, the same shall be by contract unless otherwise ordered by a three-fourths vote of the Common Council . . . and all such contracts when given, shall be given to the lowest bidder . . . and who shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, and the adequacy and sufficiency of this security shall, in addition to the justification and acknowledgment, be approved by the Comptroller." These provisions and restrictions of the Charter have been continuously evaded or set aside by the Departments of Charities and Correction, Docks, Parks, and Fire Department, prior to January 1, 1875, in that these Departments made large purchases of supplies in excess, in value of one thousand dollars, and these bills for supplies, so purchased, have been transmitted to the Finance Department, and paid.

Sixth.—The Board of Apportionment and Audit, as organized in the year 1872, consisted of the Mayor, Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, President of the Department of Parks, and, on May 1, 1872, met and passed upon the estimate for the expenses of conducting the city and county government for that year; in which estimate they authorized, and by two transfers appropriated for interest on the City and County Debt, \$8,678,259.58, of which amount there was only required and expended for that year, \$6,913,498.38—leaving an unexpended balance of \$1,764,761.20. On the 30th day of November, 1872, the same gentlemen, comprising a Board especially designated by an act to amend an act entitled an "Act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 5, 1870, being chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, met and agreed upon an estimate for the year 1873, of the various sums of money to defray all the various expenses necessary for conducting the various Boards, Commissions, and Departments,

whether executive, judicial, legislative, or administrative of the city government, and also for paying the interest on the City Debt, and the principal of said debt falling due, in which estimate was appropriated \$6,072,637.74 for interest on the City Debt.

On November 23, 1872, the Mayor, Comptroller, and County Treasurer, comprising another Board, organized under chapter 573, Laws of 1871, met and agreed upon an estimate, for the purpose of defraying all necessary expenses for the county government for the year 1873, and appropriated \$2,412,670 for interest on the County Debt, thus making the entire amount appropriated by the two Boards for interest \$8,485,307.74, as being the amount required for the year 1873. At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as appointed or created in pursuance of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and, with the exception of the present Comptroller, comprised of new members, there was appropriated, on the 26th of June, 1873, for the year 1873, \$6,500,000, for interest on the City and County Debt, being a revision of the estimates previously made (by the preceding Boards heretofore referred to, in 1872), and an amount much less than was required by the Comptroller for interest for that year.

At the close of 1873 the Comptroller had paid as interest \$1,246,109.44 in excess of the amount authorized by the revision of the estimates by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The same Board, on June 29, 1874, in revising the estimate previously made in December, 1873, for 1874, appropriated \$8,300,000 for interest on the City Debt, including all accrued interest on the debt heretofore designated as County Debt, to April 30, 1874, and interest on the debt of annexed territory of Westchester County; and at a meeting held October 15, 1874, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the request of the Comptroller, authorized the transfer of \$90,000 from various appropriations to the credit of "Interest on the City Debt for 1874," as in the resolution offered by the Comptroller asking for this transfer, it was stated that the amount previously appropriated (\$8,300,000) was insufficient, and at the close of 1874 the Comptroller had paid on account of interest \$479,345.84 in excess of the amount as authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Hereto annexed you will find Schedule "E," showing the amounts appropriated for interest, by transfer or otherwise, and the payments on account of the same, from January 1, 1872, to January 1, 1875.

Prior to the accession of the present Comptroller (as shown by the published reports and also by the several accounts in the ledgers of the Finance Department), it was the custom in calculating the interest for the coming year to stipulate the amount required on each specific kind of stock and upon revenue bonds, and such stock as might be issued, or was supposed would be issued, an amount was appropriated under the head of Interest Generally.

There can be no question that the majority of the stocks and bonds have a long period to run, and that on making up the estimate for the interest required for each year an amount can be estimated at a sum more specific than any amount heretofore appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, if they only have the necessary information placed before them for action.

Seventh.—On June 29, 1874, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized in the revised estimate an appropriation of \$250,000 for Salaries—Department of Finance, and \$20,000 for Special Services of Accountant in "relation to claims at the instance of and against the city, arising out of frauds of late officers and others." This was intended as a special account, separate from the Salaries—Department of Finance, but in the ledger of the Department is merged into that account, while in the ledger of the Chamberlain's office it is a separate account, as it was evidently intended it should be. The warrants drawn by the Comptroller were drawn against it as a special account, and are charged as so drawn in the Chamberlain's books, and from August 8, 1874, to December 19, the amount so drawn was \$7,883.30. Upon December 30, 1874, the Comptroller, by a letter addressed to the Chamberlain recognizing therein that it was a separate account, authorized him to transfer \$5,450.04 of the unexpended balance from this account to Salaries—Department of Finance, on the pretext that this amount had been paid out for these special services, and charged to Salaries—Department of Finance prior to August 1, 1874. The Chamberlain made the entry as requested without any resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the letter authorizing this transfer cannot be found in the Chamberlain's office, the entry made in the Chamberlain's books being based upon the existence of such letter, properly numbered, but now absent from the files and not there accounted for.

Eighth.—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in revising the estimates of 1873, appropriated \$140,000 for election expenses for that year. It would appear, from the records of the Department, that the Finance Department paid claims in the aggregate exceeding the amount appropriated, and that, in 1874, at several meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by a series of resolutions offered by the Comptroller, several transfers, amounting in the aggregate to a large sum, was transferred to the credit of other exhausted appropriation accounts from election expenses of 1873, which, the records show, was exhausted by the legitimate expenses of that year.

Ninth.—The same Board, in revising the estimates of 1873, also appropriated \$100,000 for armories and drill-rooms. It would appear from the records that this appropriation was exceeded in the payment of claims of 1873, and without any resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the transfer to this account of unexpended balances from other appropriations.

Tenth.—We submit Schedule "F," showing the unexpended balances at the close of 1871, 1872, 1873, and 1874, with the total appropriations each year, including the unexpended balances and the expenditures for the same period. By the present system, when the appropriations are made, the amount of the appropriations are credited to the several appropriation accounts as they stand on the ledger, or, in other words, are credited to one continuous account under the same title. These yearly appropriations are added to the old balances, and when payments are made (of whatever year they may be chargeable to), they are charged to said appropriation account, so that it is not possible to tell the balance of any of the appropriations for any particular year by the accounts in the Appropriation Ledger. An examination into the condition of the various appropriations would be an extremely laborious undertaking, and would have to extend over a period of years, without arriving at any very satisfactory result.

The appropriation accounts for each year should be kept separate, and the payments made should be charged to the appropriation accounts to which the payments relate. Then the Appropriation Ledger would show the balances of each appropriation for each year.

Eleventh.—Section 29 of the Charter of 1873 provides that all payments by or on behalf of the Corporation shall be made through the proper disbursing officer of the Department of Finance, by means of warrants drawn on the Chamberlain by the Comptroller and countersigned by the Mayor. A distinction appears to be made in the manner of paying the salaries of the Department of Parks, in that the Comptroller disburses all moneys for labor and police pay-rolls through an officer styled "Disbursing Clerk," in the Department of Parks. This officer is in no manner an officer of the Department of Finance, and has given bonds to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, under date of February 1, 1871, for the faithful performance of his duty. This bond was called for and given to the old Board, comprising the Department of Parks, for their protection, they then disbursing their own money; and in the reorganization of the Department, on the retirement from office of that Board, the employees, including Disbursing Clerk, were reappointed, and under the law this bond should have been renewed.

Twelfth.—It is provided by chapter 757 of the Laws of 1873 (being an act passed June 13, 1873, to amend chapter 335, of the Laws of that year), that any balances of appropriations remaining unexpended, after allowing sufficient to satisfy all claims payable therefrom, may, at any time after the expiration of the year for which they were made, be transferred by the Comptroller, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the General Fund of the city and applied to the reduction of taxation.

Upon May 19, 1874, the Comptroller, in a communication to the Chamberlain, notified him that he had canceled, on May 1, 1874, warrants amounting in the aggregate to \$18,806.24, and credited the same to the General Fund, in which communication he makes the following explanation: "As the amount of said warrants were credited when canceled to General Fund and not to the several accounts to which they were originally charged, it is necessary, in order that our balances may agree, that an entry be made on your books charging the several accounts with the several amounts as stated above and crediting General Fund with the aggregate."

By the terms of instructions contained in the above letter, the several appropriations accounts which went towards making up this aggregate still remained charged as drawn against, and thereby the several appropriations were reduced. The warrants so drawn and charged had been duly registered in the Finance Department, and were signed by the Mayor and Comptroller, and published in quarterly reports to the Supervisors as having been paid to the respective claimants. It is exceedingly doubtful if, under the terms of the law above quoted, this cancellation of these warrants was legal except by a vote of authorization from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as the effect of this cancellation was virtually transferring unexpended balances of appropriation to the General Fund.

In numerous instances other than that above referred to, the Finance Department has issued warrants for claims that have been duly audited. The warrants have been signed by the Mayor and Comptroller, and duly registered on the books of the Finance Department, published, likewise, in the official quarterly reports as having been paid to the respective claimants, and then finally canceled by orders of the Comptroller.

We submit herewith a statement, showing taxes and assessments collected and uncollected in 1872, 1873, and 1874, as exhibited in the books of the Finance Department:

It would seem that by proper management a large portion of these securities, issued during the last few years, might have been marketed at a much lower rate of interest, particularly those for the State Sinking Fund Deficiency, issued about one year since, to an amount of \$3,899,494.86, and which are all at seven per cent.

Section 106 of the Charter of 1873, in defining the duties of the Commissioners of Accounts, provides that "they shall, from time to time, make an examination of the expenses of the several Departments and officers, and make such recommendations to the Board of Apportionment and other officers, with reference thereto, and particularly with reference to salaries and duties, as they deem advisable."

Pursuant to the above section, the undersigned would respectfully submit that the labors of the Finance Department have been unnecessarily magnified by additional forms or style of managing the accounts; and that by returning to more simple methods the working force of the Department can be materially reduced, and the expenses for salaries materially lessened.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist, or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
