Whereas, The opening of the Harlem Ship Canal is to be fittingly observed on Monday, June 17, 1895, by a public celebration; and

Whereas, This event, with its great historical significance, should be made a day of rejoicing; therefore be it

Resolved, That the heads of the several Departments of the City Government be and they are hereby requested to close their respective offices on Monday, June 17, 1895, and that all other offices not by law required to be kept open for the transaction of public business be closed on that day.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 11, 1895, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof. Approved by the Mayor, June 12, 1895.

carted or carried through the streets except it be covered so as to protect it from dust or dirt, and no meat or poultry shall be hung or exposed for sale outside of any shop or store in this city.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING, NEW YORK, May 31, 1895.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of May, 1895, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 32 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 32. That no meat or dead animal above the size of a rabbit shall be taken to any public or private market for food until the same shall have fully cooled after killing, nor until the entrails, head and feet (except of poultry and game, and except the head and feet of swine) shall have been removed; nor shall the body, or any part thereof, of any animal which is to be used as food be carted or carried through the streets, except it be covered so as to protect it from dust or dirt, and no meat or poultry shall be hung or exposed for sale outside of any shop or store in this city.
