

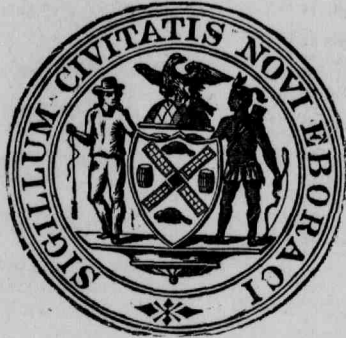

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

NOTE.—On Wednesday, April 11, 1894, no quorum being present, the meeting stood adjourned.

*Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Thursday, April 12, 1894, at 3 o'clock P.M.*

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following, received from the Acting Chief Engineer, and recommended approval of his action:

NEW YORK, April 12, 1894.

*To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:*

GENTLEMEN—I have to report that G. Bonanno, who was granted a three months' leave of absence, without pay, returned this morning and was assigned by me to duty.

I am, respectfully,

E. WEGMANN, Jr., Acting Chief Engineer.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the recommendation was approved.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Acting Chief Engineer, the following bills are hereby approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment, viz. :

1st. Of Henry S. Bailey, for use of horse and wagon for inspection work, hauling tools, etc., in abating nuisances near Croton Dam, amounting to four dollars.

2d. Of J. E. Crow, for use of sleigh for season, amounting to ten dollars.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution :

Whereas, Application has been made by Coldwell-Wilcox Company, contractors, for an extension of time to May 1, 1894, for the completion of their contract for furnishing and delivering cast-iron pipe and special castings for the New Croton Dam (Cornell Site), in the Town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, New York, and the Acting Chief Engineer having recommended that such extension of time be granted: therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners hereby grant to Coldwell-Wilcox Company, contractors, an extension of time to May 1, 1864, in which to complete the contract above referred to.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution :

Whereas, The Acting Chief Engineer of this Commission has certified in writing, under date of April 12, 1894, that Coldwell-Wilcox Company have completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made by them with this Commission on the 8th of November, 1893, for furnishing six gates with their hoisting apparatus and other appurtenances, to be set in the gate-house of Titicus Dam, near Purdy's Station, New York, and has stated from actual measurements the



whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said contract, and of the true value thereof; therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Coldwell-Wilcox Company, under the contract above referred to, and direct that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following resolution, adopted on March 21, 1894, be and hereby is amended to read "Town of Greenburgh" instead of "Town of Elmsford":

"Resolved, That the accompanying bill for taxes due the Town of Elmsford, Westchester County, N. Y., School District No. 9, amounting to seventeen dollars and twenty-two cents, is hereby approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment."

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

M.

The increase of 29 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 8 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 29 from phthisis, of 31 from diseases of the nervous system, and of 6 from pneumonia, partially offset by a decrease of 7 in the deaths from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 9 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria and measles were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
