



DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, February 14, 1898.

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The Board met pursuant to notice. Present-Commissioners Nathan Straus; John B. Cosby, M. D.; William T. Jenkins, M. D., and the President of the Board of Police.

The following preamble and resolution presented by President Straus at the last meeting and

The following preamble and resolution presented by President Straus at the last meeting and laid on the table was taken up and, on motion, unanimously adopted : Whereas, Senate Bill No. 5, now before the Senate Committee on Cities, contains such radical changes in the methods now in operation, and involves such material restrictions in the character of the work now performed in the Department of Health; and Whereas, The passage of said bill would interfere with the continued progress and the successful administration of this Department, particularly in the following ways:

1st. By depriving the Board of Health of the services of the President of the Board of Police

Ist. By depriving the Board of Health of the services of the President of the Board of Police Commissioners, and thus rendering less intimate the important relations existing between the Police Department and the Department of Health. 2d. By prohibiting the production of vaccine virus. (In relation to this it may be said that vaccine virus is produced in every country of Europe and Great Britain, under governmental supervision. There is no other producer of vaccine virus in New York State, and it is believed that the virus now produced by this Department is superior to any produced in this country.) 3d. By prohibiting the production of diphtheria antitoxin and other antitoxins, and restricting scientific research. 4th. By limiting the work in the prevention of infectious discases, appecially of the prevent

scientific research. 4th. By limiting the work in the prevention of infectious diseases, especially at the present time, of tuberculosis, diphtheria, the septic diseases and tetanus in human beings, glanders in horses, and tuberculosis in the bovine species, and prospectively of all other infectious diseases for which antitoxins may be ultimately produced. 5th. By excluding from the list of "infectious, contagious and pestilential diseases" a number of diseases which now are classed by this Department of Health or by the health departments of other cities as dangerous to the public health, and included under this head—notably tuberculosis, relapsing fever, plague, puerperal fever, contagious influenza (grippe) and epidemic dysentery—the group of diseases excluded from the list causing on an average throughout the civilized world far more ceaths than those included, and concerning the infectious character of which there is now no reasonable donbt. reasonable doubt.

6th. By diminishing or removing safeguards for the prevention of diphtheria, small-pox and tuberculosis, which have resulted in the practical extinction of small-pox, in a diminution of nearly one-half in the death-rate from diphtheria within a period of four years, and in a diminution of the death-rate from tuberculosis of more rhan one-third since 1886; and

death-rate from tuberculosis of more rhan one-third since 1886; and Whereas, The administration of the Department of Health under existing laws has been successful to an unusual degree in improving the health of the City, and has brought about a reduction of the death-rate from preventable diseases during a period of ten years to about one-third of the previous rate, giving in 1897 the lowest general death-rate in the history of the city; and Whereas, The enactment of this bill would not in any respect tend to the improvement of the public health, nor be in the interest of the people of The City of New York; therefore Resolved, That in the opinion of this Board the provisions of this bill in the particulars named are inexpedient, unscientific and inhumane, and are calculated to deprive the citizens of New York City of such protection against serious forms of infectious disease as the Department was created to secure. We, therefore, respectfully petition your committee to give most careful consideration to this protest against the provisions of this bill. The Secretary was directed to forward a copy of said preamble and resolution with copies of all communcations received disapproving of the passage of Senate Bill No. 5 to the Senate Com-mittee on Cities.
