DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

IN BOARD OF BUILDINGS, APRIL 3, 1901.

Present—Commissioners Wallace, Guilfoyle and Campbell.

A communication was received from his Honor the Mayor, announcing the appointment of James G. Wallace, as Commissioner of Buildings of The City of New York, in place of Thomas J. Brady, resigned, for the unexpired portion of a term of six years, which commenced January 1, 1898, and until his successor shall be appointed and has qualified. The said Commissioner is designated to be the President of the Board of Buildings, and the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx are specified as the boroughs in which the said Commissioner of Buildings is to have administrative jurisdiction. Which was ordered on file.

The minutes of the meeting of March 27, 1901, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 235, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow walls on the third story to be built 12 inches instead of 16 inches; walls will be 51 feet 3 inches in height, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fifth street, 249 feet east of Amsterdam avenue. Petitioner, M. V. B. Ferdon. Approved.

Plan 362, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow one-story building to be erected to be used as an ice plant and roof of same to be constructed of steel trusses with galvanized-iron ventilators on top; also to allow building to be erected non-fireproof, all as stated in petition; Nos. 315 to 325 East Ninety-seventh street. Petitioner, Franz Wolfgang. Referred to President for examination and report.

Plan 364, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow 7-foot courts to the street on both sides of building to be omitted, as stated in petition; Nos. 153 and 155 East Eighty-sixth street. Petitioners, James E. Ware & Son. Referred to Commissioner Campbell for examination and report.

Plan 436, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow hard wooden posts to be used for foundation instead of brick or stone, as stated in petition; northwest corner Boston road and Third avenue. Petitioner, William M. Rouzee. Denied.

Plan 487, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow 12-inch walls to be built to a height of 52 feet 6 inches; walls in first story will be laid in cement mortar, as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Eighty-second street, 175 feet east of Eleventh avenue. Petitioner, John P. Leo. Approved.

Plan 325, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow studios to be built over auditorium, as shown on drawings; walls, partitions, roof, floor, etc., will be constructed of fireproof materials; also to allow columns supporting the different tiers of auditorium to be cast iron, without making same fireproof, all as stated in petition; No. 1564 Broadway and Nos. 164 to 170 West Forty-seventh street. Petitioners, J. B. McElpatrick & Son. Referred to Commissioner Guilfoyle for examination and report.

Plan 1322, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow hose shaft in first story to be built of angles, metal lath, and plastered inside and outside with Portland and Keen's cement; second and third stories to be built of 3-inch thick terra cotta and plastered on inside and outside as in first story; also to allow fireproof partitions to be built of 2-inch solid Portland and Keen's cement on metal lath and channels; also to allow hose loft to be built of frame construction, filled in between studs with terra-cotta blocks and covered on outside with tin, all as stated in petition; west side Jerome avenue, 50 feet north of One Hundred and Eighty-third street. Petitioner, Manly N. Cutter. Approved.

Plan 1940, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow west wall of building, also west wall of proposed addition to be built 12 inches to a height of 52½ feet, as stated in petition; No. 8 East Fifty-third street. Petitioner, Charles P. H. Gilbert. Approved on condition that walls in first story be laid in cement mortar.

Plan 529, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow superstructure on roof to be built for use of janitor; walls will be raised where necessary, and the rest to be constructed of I beam uprights, filled in with fireproof blocks and covered with corrugated iron, as stated in petition; No. 771 Madison avenue. Petitioner, William C. Somerfield. Approved.

Plan 564, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow an additional story to be built with 12-inch thick walls, as stated in petition; No. 100 Pearl street. Petitioners, Cleverdon & Pytzel. Referred to President for examination and report.

Plan 288, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow rear bay window, four stories high, to be constructed of angle iron and terra-cotta blocks, covered with galvanized iron, in place of existing wooden window, as stated in petition; No. 23 West Fifty-sixth street. Petitioner, Ernest Lowerbein. Approved.

Application No. 1130, New Buildings, 1901, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of the Building Code so as to allow the erection of a frame shed in the fire limits greater than the legal area; premises, one building, south side of Butler street, 150 feet east of Nevins street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioners, W. Bradley & Son. Approved.

Application No. 858, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of the Building Code so as to allow the addition of extension to building whereby the structure will occupy a greater area and with walls of less thickness than required by law; premises, one building, southwest corner Ninth avenue and Nineteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioner, Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company. Referred to Commissioner Guilfoyle for examination and report.

Plan 110, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Queens and Richmond—Petition to allow 10 feet space at rear of building to be omitted, and build same with 20 feet space in front of lot, as stated in petition; northeast corner Jamaica and Greenwich avenues, in the Borough of Queens. Petitioner, Howard J. Cullingford. Denied.

On motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle, the recommendation of the Municipal Assembly that the offices of the several departments of the City Government be closed on Good Friday, April 5, 1901, was approved and adopted.

A communication was received from Walter Doberentz, General Manager, The New Patent Supply Company, asking for the return of the papers submitted to the Board of Buildings with his application for official approval of the device of Mr. Otto Poppe, which the Secretary was instructed to answer.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 474, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow a seven-story building to be erected non-fireproof, to cover more than 8,000 square feet of area; to be occupied

by four families on each floor, as stated in petition; south side Ninety-ninth street, 275 feet west of West End avenue. Petitioner, Henri Fouchoux. Approved.

Plan 293, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow non-fireproof building to be erected to cover more than 8,000 square feet of area; building having separate apartments, same being entirely inclosed with brick walls; the main staircases and halls being fireproof and are shut off from private halls by fireproof doors, as stated in petition; west side Convent avenue, north of One Hundred and Forty-seventh street centre line. Petitioner, Henri Fouchoux. Approved.

Plan 136, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow building to cover more than 8,000 square feet of area; all apartments will be inclosed with brick walls separately, and fireproof double-swinging self-closing doors will be placed between all private halls and main fireproof hall, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fortieth street, 272 feet east of Seventh avenue. Petitioner, Henry Fouchoux. Approved.

Plan 516, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow wooden structure to be built for use of coal, with bins and platform and with open court yard in centre, as stated in petition; southeast corner of First avenue and Sixty-second street. Petitioner, Charles E. Miller. Denied.

Plan 729, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow one-story structure to be erected in centre portion on roof of each building, columns and girder to be carried up to support roof of same; outer framework will be constructed of 4-inch by 4-inch light steel T bars, filled in with hollow fireproof blocks, all covered on outside with galvanized sheet-iron, and to be plastered on the inside, as stated in petition; west side Central Park, West, from Ninetieth to Ninety-first streets. Petitioners, Neville & Bagge. Approved.

Plan 395, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow Gustavino arches to be used for floor construction, as stated in petition; northeast corner of Fifty-first street and Fifth avenue. Petitioner, Cass Gilbert. Referred to President for examination and report.

Plan 344, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow a floor and roof to be built between two buildings, with show-windows and store-door in front and door and window in rear; also to allow frame building No. 2935 to be connected by doors, all as stated in petition; No. 2935 Third avenue. Petitioner, Louis Falk. Referred to President for examination and report.

Plan 385, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow frame building of three stories with a brick and stone cellar to be erected; cellar to be kept partly below and partly above sidewalk level; building will be 40 feet high from curb level to roof beams, as stated in petition; No. 1775 Weeks avenue. SIR—I have the honor to inclose herewith the quarterly report of the operations and financial condition of the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, required by the Charter, for the three months ending December 31, 1900.

The planting of bulbs by the gardening force was commenced in October, about 150,000 bulbs being used. In the Ramble and other parts of the Central Park this planting is permanent in character, the plants coming up yearly. A large number of herbaceous plants were set in the Ramble, and generally in the borders of the Central Park. The dead trees in the parks were replaced with young healthy trees, and the shrubs also received attention of this character. The work of planting in Riverside Park had to be suspended during the quarter owing to the failure of the Municipal Assembly to take action on the appropriations for the purpose. This delay involves a loss of at least one year's growth in the development of these plantations, which is most unfortunate, as it delays the improvement of the park, and prevents the public from enjoying features that would have been in existence much sooner than is now possible. This improvement in Riverside Park includes the planting of trees to serve as a protection from the strong winds that sweep over this park from the river, and every planting season that intervenes between the date of the appropriation of funds for the purpose and the action on the part of the Municipal Assembly to make the funds available, involves a serious delay in the development of the park.

Along the westerly slopes of the Harlem River Driveway an improvement has been accomplished, the utility and artistic effect of which is apparent to visitors there. The fertile spots among the rocks between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and High Bridge have been graded and sodded, the grass growing among the rocks producing a very beautiful effect, and serving to prevent the washouts heretofore prevalent along the slope.

The lawns of the Central Park were many of them renovated and reseeded in October, and preliminary grading was done to the grounds around the Conservatory. Pruning in all of the parks was carried on as large a scale as the force would permit, and this work will be taken up again early in 1901.

A Chrysanthemum Exhibition was held in the Conservatory in November and December and proved a great success. The interest shown in this exhibit is indicated by the fact that over one hundred thousand persons attended.

The propagation of bedding plants for use in the spring was begun during this quarter and excellent results are looked for. Plans for the improvement of Jefferson and Seward Parks, for Manhattan square and the parks of Staten Island have received attention during the quarter, as well as plans for minor improvements to the various parks in the Borough of Manhattan.

The laboring force was engaged during the quarter in the regular work of caring for the drives, walks, lawns, basins, rolling stock, etc. During the quarter 1,141 loads of refuse were removed from the parks to the dumps. The lawns of the Central and Mount Morris Parks were kept open to the public for games until December 1.

At the Harlem River Driveway the macadam stretch of roadway was repaired with trap rock and the soft roadway, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to Dyckman street, was resurfaced with loam. The construction of new equestrian and pedestrian entrance to the Central Park at Sixty-sixth street and Central Park, West, was begun and temporary entrances for equestrians were made at Fifty-ninth street and Seventh and Eighth avenues. These latter entrances were made necessary by the chaotic condition of the Circle at Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, owing to the Rapid Transit Subway construction at that point.

The Carpenters, Masons and other mechanics have been employed in repairing the buildings, fences, etc., in the parks and in putting up the skate-house, Central Park, building an engine-house, Jefferson Park, and repairing and constructing settees, scrapers, signs, rolling stock, etc. The bow bridge, Central Park, was painted during the quarter and the rolling stock, fences, etc., also received attention at the hands of the painting force. The basins and sewers were repaired and the necessary attention was given to the steam-heating plants in park buildings.

The Central Park Menagerie and the Aquarium, Battery Park, were kept open daily to the public, as usual, and the attendance at both places was unusually large for the season of the year, the mild weather bringing to the Menagerie especially thousands of visitors. The collections in both of these institutions are in splendid condition, the mortality having been very low.

The Engineering Corps of the Department has been employed during the quarter in supervising the several works of construction and in the routine work incident to that bureau.

The sewer from the Swedish school-house to that in Manhattan square was completed and the building thrown open to public use. The park wall where taken down in connection with this work was rebuilt, the pavement of Eighth avenue relaid and the trench within the park refilled and resodded.

The old walks around the Arsenal building to the extent of some 16,732 square feet were taken up and new asphalt laid.

The following work was done in connection with the removal of the Forty-second Street Reservoir and the building of the foundations for the New York Public Library building :

- 2,965 cubic yards of old reservoir removed.
- 19,573 cubic yards of excavation of earth.
- 47,250 cubic feet of concrete laid.
- 207,795 cubic feet of rubble masonry laid.
- 282 cubic yards of rock excavation.

The construction of the Ninety-sixth street viaduct at Riverside drive has progressed, as follows :

Division A.

- 1,829 cubic yards of excavation of all kinds.
- 355 cubic yards of foundation concrete in place.
- 64 cubic feet of pedestal pincaps set.
- 89 linear feet of vitrified drain-pipe laid.

Division D.

- 1,295 cubic yards of excavation for wall's, etc.
- 475 cubic yards foundation concrete laid.
- 60 cubic yards walls on Ninety-sixth street built.
- In connection with the viaduct work it was found necessary to remove city sewer between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, Riverside drive, and to construct a new sewer with house connections. The work done under this contract is
- 1,058 cubic yards of excavation of all kinds.
- 430 linear feet of sewer, etc. built.
- In regulating and grading Thomas Jefferson Park work was done to the extent of :
- 18,500 cubic yards of excavation of all kinds.
- 20,000 cubic yards of filling in place.
- The corps also gave grades and lines for the new Soldiers and Sailors' Monument erection, made plans for reconstruction of Riverside Park where disturbed by the erection of approach to Viaduct at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, made plans, etc., for proposed widening of roadway of Fifty-ninth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenue, and made topographical surveys, prepared specifications, estimates, etc., for a number of other improvements in the parks,

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS DURING THE THREE MONTHS FROM OCTOBER 1 TO DECEMBER 31, INCLUSIVE, 1900.

Prospect Park.

In addition to the regular work of keeping the walks, shelters, drives, basins and gutters clean and in good condition, the force (which was put on half-time beginning November 17) has been employed in raking the old leaves off the lawns and meadows, sodding the borders along the walks and drives, protecting the small evergreens and half-hardy plants and shrubs, erecting wire guards, spreading fertilizers and manure, and preparing the grounds for spring planting. Over three thousand shrubs and one thousand running roses have been planted, the flower beds have been dug over and bulbs have been planted for spring display. The trees and shrubs have been pruned, as the weather permitted, and old and diseased trees have been taken up.

In addition to the regular work on the various roads in the park, the East drive, from Valley Grove to the Ocean parkway entrance, has been resurfaced with gravel, after having been carefully picked with steam roller, graded and stones removed.

The annual flower shows in the greenhouse were inaugurated with a most successful exhibition of chrysanthemums in November, all the flowers being raised by this Department. Other flower shows will follow during the season. These exhibitions entail much additional care and oversight; and work for the gardeners; but nothing in the Department gives more general satisfaction, while tending to increase education and culture among the people.

Mechanical Work.

The mechanical force has been kept busy in general repairs to shelters, fences, trucks, watering carts, wagons, bridges, etc., throughout the entire park system. They have built two propagating houses, a new area and a coal chute at the greenhouses, and have thatched two shelters and made the various buildings in readiness for the winter.

East Side Lands.

One thousand one hundred and seventy-six cubic yards of top soil have been received at the East Side Lands during the three months, for use in the building of the mounds.

The Outside Parks.

Tompkins, Fort Greene, Red Hook, City, Winthrop, Bushwick, Bensonhurst, Underhill, Highland, Carroll, Zindel, Bedford, Long Island City, Flushing, Kings (Jamaica), College Point, Municipal, Woodpoint, Dyker, Beach, Lincoln Terrace, Linton, Stuyvesant, City Hall, Brooklyn Heights, Canarsie, Cooper, Cuyler, Cooper Gore and Irving and Saratoga Squares have all been kept clean and in good order.

The flower beds in the various parks have been dug over, the leaves and rubbish raked up, the trees and shrubbery trimmed and the parks put in good order for the winter. Over 152,000 bulbs, for spring flowering, have been planted in the finished parks.

Forest and Sunset Parks.

Only the regular work of guarding these parks from fires and depredations has been carried on.

Fort Hamilton Park.

The work of grading Fort Hamilton Park has been commenced and carried on as the men could be spared from the regular work.

A large, smooth-bore gun, weighing fifty-two tons, was presented to the Department by the War Department, and will be placed in Fort Hamilton Park.

Ocean Parkway.

The work of resurfacing the main drive was carried on as far as Avenue C, at which point the work was suspended owing to the frost. About 11,550 square yards were covered with Marcellus shale and trap-rock screenings.

The westerly traffic road received attention, and all low and muddy places in the roadbed were picked up and refilled with trap-rock and screenings.

The bridle road was partly recoated with clean gravel, and the southerly portion of the main drive, from Kings Highway to Coney Island, was treated in the same manner. Over four hundred Golden Willow and Carolina Poplar trees were planted on Ocean parkway, below Coney Island creek.

Eastern Parkway.

Repairs on Eastern parkway were continued from Albany to Ralph avenue. Owing to the heavy traffic (which during the early morning hours encroaches upon the macadam and gravel part of the parkway), it is extremely difficult to keep the driveway in a satisfactory condition.

Stone Avenue.

Portions of Stone avenue were repaired and the remainder cleaned and put in good condition.

Glenmore Avenue.

The resurfacing of Glenmore avenue was continued until stopped by the cold weather. The improvement now extends as far as Sherman street.

Bay Parkway (Twenty-second Avenue).

Only the regular work of keeping the parkway clean and in good order has been attended to during the quarter.

Fort Hamilton Avenue.

The repaving of Fort Hamilton avenue, between the Park circle and Ocean avenue, has been completed. The new macadam pavement measures 11,400 square yards, with 811 square yards of granite-block gutters.

Bay Ridge Parkway (Shore Drive).

Work upon the extension of the Bay Ridge parkway continued while the weather permitted. The work performed by Thomas Monahan to date, under contract, is as follows:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stocks of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
