DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

Report of Transactions, February 14 to February 20, 1910.

Communications Received.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Circular letter in regard to the working days of City employees, etc. "In order to establish a record of the faithful performance of the work," time records are to be kept for each employee, indicating hours of service and character of work performed. These records will be used at Central Office of the Department, at Storehouse, Blackwells Island and at Central Stables. Daily records and time books have been carefully kept since creation of the Department of Correction, January 1, 1896, at all institutions. These records seem to cover all points required in new sheets, and it is thought wise to continue the system now in use at institutions.

From Bureau of Weights and Measures—Asking for a list of places where scales, weights and measures are kept, for verifying purchases made by the Department. List of institutions where scales, etc., are kept sent to Bureau of Weights and Measures.

From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Secretary transmits copy of resolution, calling on heads of City Departments, etc., to furnish information as to all improved or unimproved land under the jurisdiction of their Departments; whether unimproved land is to be used, etc. Information furnished. All land in use, or soon to be used. Pamphlet giving list of all real estate under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction, transmitted to the Sinking Fund Commission.

From Civil Service Commission—Transmitting eligible list for position of Keeper. All notified to call at this office on February 14, 1910. First two on list appointed.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that the request of the Department of Public Charities for transfer of Burton Gliddon, Jr., Clerk, from Department of Correction to Charities, can not be approved, as such change and the increase from \$480 to \$600 would involve promotion, which requires examination. On file.

From the Comptroller—Transmitting receipts for security deposits, as follows: (1) Proposals for supplies for manufacturing purposes, proposals for supplies for miscellaneous purposes, opened February 10, 1910. (2) Proposals for plumbing, etc., for City Prison, Manhattan, and (3) for groceries and dry goods, opened February 17, 1910. All on file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From the Comptroller—Referring to voucher in favor of Albert Winternitz for \$4,292.50 for installing new Croton pressure system, new salt water line, alterations and repairs to laundry equipment, additions to steam lines, etc., Harts Island, contract of November 24, 1909, which work was charged to "Special Fund, chapter 173, Laws of 1905, City Prisons, Penitentiaries and Correctional Buildings, S. 12." The Comptroller does not consider the work on Harts Island, as set forth above, a proper charge against this special fund. Section 7 of chapter 173 of Laws of 1905, gives the Commissioner authority to disburse this fund at his discretion, and it was so used. The Department of Finance acquiesced in this, when the Comptroller placed his certificate on the contract.

From the Comptroller (Division of Inspection)—Asking that increase in price of corn and rattan brooms, supplied to Department of Street Cleaning, be explained. Last bill made was at \$4.25 per dozen; present price is \$5.62 per dozen. Full explanation given. Last year's bids on broom corn were from \$120 to \$160 per ton. Lowest bid on present contract was \$238 per ton.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Calling attention to the fact that substation on Blackwells Island supplies electric power to the City at a very low rate, and asking if the intention of the former Commissioner of Correc-

tion will be carried out, and the service of the Edison Company used at the Workhouse, instead of current from the Department plant. Notify the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that I am in hearty accord with the proposition, and ask that the Workhouse and Penitentiary be connected with the Edison system at the earliest possible moment. Work will be done by the Department of Correction, under the supervision of Engineers of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

From Department of Docks and Ferries—Confirming letter of January 15, 1910, to former Commissioner, in stating that the Department of Docks and Ferries has no funds for repairing docks of other City Departments. The Commissioner, however, recognizes the necessity for the immediate repair of the Workhouse Dock, and has ordered such repairs made; bill for which will be sent to the Department of Correction, Acknowledged, and referred to Auditor.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending February 12, 1910, agreed with specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending February 12, 1910. On file.

From Steamboats—John W. Sullivan Company states that weather conditions have been such that men could not work on new steamboat being built for the Department of Correction. Contractors will be required to live up to terms of their contract.

From Steamboats—Report of Captain F. W. Parkinson, of inspections made of Department boats now being built at yards of Waters-Colver Company, on Staten Island. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Report of fines received during week ending February 12, 1910: From Court of Special Sessions, \$10; from City Magistrates' Court, \$26. Total, \$36. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received, week ending February 12, 1910: From City Magistrates' Courts, \$781. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—List of prisoners received during week ending February 12, 1910: Men, 40; woman, 1. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Warden transmits certificate of Prison Physician in the case of Michael D'Ambrosio, a prisoner who is supposed to be insane, and asks that steps be taken to have Examiners in Lunacy appointed to inquire into the mental condition of said prisoner. The Corporation Counsel requested to ask a Judge of the Supreme Court to appoint Examiners.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—From the James Curran Manufacturing Company, stating that work on its contract for laundry has been delayed by labor conditions not yet settled. Notify the Curran Company to do all that can possibly be done to complete the contract as soon as conditions permit.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Reporting that fines paid at the Workhouse during week ending February 12, 1910, amounted to \$576. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Death, on February 14, 1910, of George Edwards, aged 54 years. Friends notified. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—From Workhouse Hospitals: Medical and surgical reports for month of January, 1910. On file.

From City Cemetery, Harts Island—List of internments during week ending February 12, 1910. On file.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—Report of fines received during week ending February 12, 1910: From City Magistrates' Courts, \$10. On file.

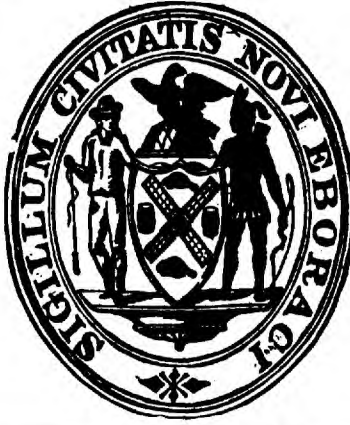

FIFTY-EIGHTH STREET—SEWER, between Eighth and Fort Hamilton avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of Fifty-eighth street, between Eighth and Fort Hamilton avenues.

SIXTIETH STREET—SEWER, between Eighth and Ninth avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of Sixtieth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

SIXTIETH STREET SEWER, between Fifteenth avenue and New Utrecht avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Sixtieth street, between Fifteenth and New Utrecht avenues, and south side of Fourteenth avenue, between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets.

THIRTIETH WARD, SECTION 18.

BASINS at the east and south corners of FIRST AVENUE AND SEVENTY-THIRD STREET. Area of assessment: Both sides of Seventy-third street, from Ridge boulevard (Second avenue) to Colonial road (First avenue), including Lot No. 1 of Block 5916.

FOURTH AVENUE—SEWER, east side, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets. Area of assessment: East side of Fourth avenue, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets.

THIRTIETH WARD, SECTION 19.

BASINS on the north corner of TWENTY-THIRD AVENUE AND EIGHTY-THIRD STREET, and on the south corner of One Hundredth street and Fort Hamilton avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Eighty-third and

And the proper coupon for that purpose, attached to any such permit, when issued, shall be preserved and returned to this Department, as its regulations may require, by the proper officer or person on each boat or vessel, and by the proper person in charge of any train of cars or vehicle on which any such body may be carried from said city. Provided, however, that the same effect shall be given,

under this section, to transit permits issued severally by boards of health of cities, towns or villages in the state of New York, or by boards of health that may be hereafter organized, pursuant to laws of the state of New York, or when issued by the health officer of any such city, town or village, as to a transit permit issued from this board, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in the city, town or village from which such permit shall have been issued. And provided that the same effect shall be given under this section to a transit permit issued under the laws of the states of Maine, Connecticut or New Jersey, as to a transit permit issued by this board; subject, nevertheless, in every case to all the care, precautions and diligence prescribed by the rules and regulations of the board or department of health of the city of New York.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him, and of no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact also, that it is made without any collusion with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and shall be a true and correct statement of the facts and figures, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, a clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be so become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
