### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Tuesday, December 23, 1913, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

The public hearing advertised on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Bureau of Public Works in each Borough," the following:

"Chief Engineer of Sewers and Highways, Queens," was adjourned for one week.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Competitive Class, Part 6 (the Attendance Service), the title "Watchman." Mr. Stephen Kelley, Appointment Clerk in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and Mr. Edward F. Cadley, Chief Clerk in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from Part 9 (the Prison Service) of the Competitive Class, the following: Grade 3, Deputy Warden, so that the same shall read:

Part 9, The Prison Service—"Grade 1, Keeper; Grade 2, Head Keeper; Grade 3, Warden."

Honorable Patrick A. Whitney, Commissioner of the Department of Correction, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Labor Class, Part 2, the title "Carriage Trimmer." Mr. Charles Demarest, Chief of the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies of the Fire Department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Mr. Frank Smith, Chief Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, and Dr. Max G. Schlapp, Medical Examiner in the Court of Special Sessions, appeared in favor of the application of the Court of Special Sessions for the classification in the Exempt Class of 3 Medical Examiners for the Children's Court, which matter had been ordered continued on the calendar at a previous meeting. George T. Keyes, Esq., Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the granting of the application. The Secretary presented a communication dated December 22, from the Sub-Committee on Children's Courts of the Charity Organization Society, opposing the granting of the application.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held December 17 were approved.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Competitive Class, Part 6 (the Attendance Service), the title "Watchman," was ordered continued on the calendar.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Competitive Class, Part 9, the Prison Service, the following

"Grade 3, Deputy Warden," so that the same shall read: "Part 9, the Prison Service—Grade 1, Keeper; grade 2, Head Keeper; grade 3, Warden."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in Part 2 of the Labor Class the following title: Carriage Trimmer.

On motion, the application of the Court of Special Sessions for the classification in the Exempt Class of 3 Medical Examiners for the Children's Court was denied.

The Secretary was instructed to continue the disqualification appearing against the candidate's name on the eligible list until such time as he complied with the instructions of the Bureau of Investigation.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the proposed transfer of Joseph M. Jenks from the position of Inspector of Tenements in the Tenement House Department to that of Sanitary Inspector in the Department of Health was disapproved for the reason that he was not a permanent employee.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Reinstatements, the reinstatement of William J. Kehoe in the position of Assistant Foreman in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, at \$4 per day, was approved under rule 13.

The reinstatement of James E. J. Scully, in the position of Patrolman of the sixth grade, in the Police Department, with back pay from February 19, 1913, under order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, was noted on the records.

On the recommendation of the Labor Clerk the appeal of Louis Corio, of 909 E. 229th st., New York City, that his name be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City service was granted.

On the recommendation of the Labor Clerk the Commission denied the appeal of Sam Schwartz, of 107 Rivington street, New York City, that he be given a physical examination for Sweeper, for the reason that he had been notified to appear for such examination and the notice, which the candidate claimed not to have received, had not been returned to the Commission.

mending the certification to the Commissioner of Public Charities of the eligible list of Physician, third grade, for the Examination of Mentally Defective Children, as an appropriate list from which to appoint two Physicians at \$1,200 per annum each and one Psychologist at \$1,000 per annum in the Clearing House for Mental Defectives. The recommendation was approved and the Secretary was instructed to make certification through the regular channel.

A report dated December 18 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, stating that his Bureau had discovered that an error had been made in the computation of the percentage of Edward S. Mooney, of 1396 Gates avenue, Queens, N. Y., a candidate in the examination for promotion to Sergeant, Police Department, held March 14, 1913, and that the candidate had been given a final average of 81.25 instead of 80.75. It was ordered that the error be corrected and the eligible list amended in accordance with the provisions of clause 5 of rule 19.

A report dated December 18 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner recommending that the Commission deny the request of the Secretary of the Board of Education for certain promotion examinations for his Department for the reason that the same had not been made previous to October 31, 1913, the final date set for the receipt of such applications. The recommendation was adopted.

It was ordered that Examiner Fuld be directed to examine the efficiency records referred to and to confer with the President of the Board of Education if they were not kept in accordance with the Civil Service Law and rules.

The action of the Secretary on December 22 in adopting the above recommendations was approved.

"The work involved in this position has to do with the Borough Survey. It requires a man who is able to adjust triangulation observations by least squares, using the method of correlates. The computations for geographical position are based on Clark's Spheroid of 1866. The man must also be familiar with searching the records of old streets and adjusting the same to physical conditions. He must be familiar with the surplus or deficiency of block lengths, and be able to adjust the same to agree with filed distances, thereby avoiding numerous suits against the City. He should also be familiar with substructures in Manhattan and the methods in use by the various corporations operating substructures in Manhattan. He should also be familiar with sewer and highway methods in Manhattan.

"I have personally examined the above applicants, and find the following:

"Mr. Francis S. Peck is not familiar with the least squares, the method of correlates and Clark's Spheroid.

"Mr. Arthur V. Ruggles says he understands least squares, but is not familiar with the method of correlates and Clark's Spheroid, neither is he familiar with the adjustment of the surplus or deficiency in block lengths with filed distances.

"Mr. Martin Bernhardt does not understand least squares, the method of correlates or Clark's Spheroid, and he is not familiar with substructures in Manhattan.

"I therefore, request a further certification from any regular or preferred list."

"In view of the conditions set forth in Mr. Appleby's report, it is respectfully requested that you certify from the promotion list for the Bureau of Design and Survey a sufficient number of names from which to appoint an Assistant Engineer at \$1,800 per annum.

"It is understood that there are no further names appearing upon the preferred list at that salary."

The communication was referred to the Advisory Board of the Commission.

A communication dated December 18 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, reading as follows:

"In our budget for 1914, we have been allowed three (3) Trade Instructors at \$900 per annum each. ### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, December 9, 1913, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees; excused, Mr. Drummond.

The minutes of the meeting of November 25 were held as read and approved. Bills, amounting to \$19,943.80, were presented for approval and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: An application has been received from Dr. Hawkins, House Surgeon, on the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, for the position of Admitting Physician at Harlem Hospital, which becomes available on January 1.

Dr. Gillette, who completes his term of service at Fordham Hospital on December 31, is an applicant for the position of Admitting Physician at that hospital. The only other applicant at this time is Dr. Sheridan, who completed his course some time ago, and is now a Physician in the Out Patient Department. Dr. Gillette is recommended to the Board for Appointment.

Dr. DeJesus has applied for the position of Resident on the maternity service at Bellevue Hospital, which becomes available on January 1, when Dr. Boyd's term of service expires.

With the incoming class of probationers on the 15th of December, the Nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital will be greatly overcrowded. The additional Nurses allowed in the Budget will be ap-



pointed shortly after the first of January. The problem of providing accommodations for these Nurses is a serious one, and brings to attention the necessity of securing an appropriation for extending the Nurses' Home or of obtaining suitable quarters in Osborn Hall or some house in the vicinity.

It would also be very desirable to take some definite action on the plans for the proposed Gouverneur dispensary as soon as possible, as the matter seems to be at a standstill at present.

Requisitions have been received for the usual greens and decorations for the holiday season, and the estimates obtained amount to approximately \$500. Authority for this expenditure is requested.

The following letter has been received from Mr. White, Contract Clerk and Auditor, regarding the necessity of asking for additional special revenue bonds. The Board of Aldermen authorized special revenue bonds to the amount of \$45,400 for the use of this Department for deficiencies in the appropriations for supplies, etc., for the year 1913. This represented a reduction of \$23,263.50 from the amount of the request. The amount allowed is insufficient, in spite of the very careful supervision of requisitions and the denial of many requests for supplies, and an additional sum of approximately \$20,000 will be required to cover the deficiencies for the year 1913. It has been suggested that this Department ascertain if other Departments will have surpluses in 1913 appropriations transferable to the appropriations of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals that are at present and will be overencumbered. It is recommended that this suggestion be followed, and that at the same time the Board of Aldermen be informed that the amount of \$45,400 allowed on the request for \$68,663.50 is insufficient, and that as soon as the exact amount of the deficit can be determined, a request for additional special revenue bonds will be made, should the Department be unsuccessful in obtaining funds from other City Departments.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The nomination of Dr. Hawkins and the applications of Drs. Gillette and Sheridan were referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

The nomination of Dr. DeJesus was referred to the Bellevue Conference Committee.

It was resolved to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to obtain a lease of a floor of Osborn Hall.

The plans for the Gouverneur dispensary building were discussed, and the matter was continued in the hands of the Building Committee for report at a future meeting.

The expenditure of \$500 for the purchase of the usual decorations for the holiday season was approved.

It was resolved to ascertain from the other City Departments whether they will have surplus funds in their 1913 appropriations, which could be transferred to the appropriations of this Department to meet the probable deficit; and it was further

Resolved, To communicate with the Board of Aldermen to the effect that the amount of revenue bonds allowed this Department to apply on its anticipated deficit is insufficient, and that a request for additional revenue bonds will be necessary if funds cannot be transferred from the appropriations of other Departments.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in the help at Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals for the month of November, and as these had already been reviewed by the Committee of the Month at each hospital.

Resolved, Upon the separate recommendation of each committee that they be approved.

#### Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported on an estimate dated November 15, from the Luke A. Burke & Sons Company amounting to \$7,245, for providing a new tile roof, canopy, awnings and iron fence on the Nurses' Residence at Harlem Hospital, and recommended the rejection of this estimate on account of the high cost. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the recommendation of the Committee.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on the letter from R. F. Almirall, dated November 17, transmitting an offer from the Luke A. Burke & Sons Company, to allow a credit of \$200 for omitting the electrical connections from the Nurses' Residence to the power house at Harlem Hospital. In accordance with their recommendation, it was

Resolved, To refuse this offer and to insist upon the completion of the contract in accordance with the specifications.

The Building Committee reported on the communication dated November 24, from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting an estimate from the John H. Parker Com-

pany offering to allow a credit of \$50 for permission to substitute wooden shutters for steel shutters in three dark rooms of Pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects, this credit estimate was accepted.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on a letter from McKim, Mead & White dated November 24, transmitting an offer from John T. Brady & Co. to allow a credit of \$200 for omitting wooden floor slats on the roof of Pavilions L and M. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, this credit estimate was accepted.

The Building Committee reported on the letter of McKim, Mead & White of October 28, stating that the contractor for the roof wards of Pavilions A and B is willing to substitute a plastic linoleum base for a steel base without additional expense. In accordance with the recommendation of the architects, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this change was approved.

The Building Committee reported that the architects, McKim, Mead & White, had prepared plans for the new hospital at Seaside Park, Rockaway, in accordance with the outline presented by Dr. S. S. Goldwater in his letter to the Trustees of June 23, and that no further action was necessary on the part of the Trustees. This report was approved.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on the communications from Dr. Goldwater under date of February 1, and March 29, and from Dr. Gar-side under date of January 31, relative to the Pathological Department in the proposed northerly extension of Fordham Hospital, and recommended that the letters be placed on file pending the receipt of funds for the enlargement of that hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Building Committee reported that they had made an inspection of the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital on December 8th, and that except for the electrical connection to the power house, the building was ready for acceptance by the City. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept the building, but to withhold part of the final payment pending the completion of the electrical connection between the power house and the Nurses' residence.

The Building Committee and the President reported that they had considered the preliminary plans and specifications prepared by J. H. Freedlander for the alterations to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, and recommended their acceptance. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these plans and specifications were approved.

The Fordham Conference Committee reported on the request of the Medical Board for the appointment of two additional Internes for a one-year service on the house staff of that hospital. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was denied, as in the opinion of the Trustees, the number on the house staff at that hospital is large enough to care properly for the service. The subject of differently dividing the surgical service of Fordham Hospital was discussed, and it was moved, seconded and carried, to make no change for the present.

#### Communications.

A letter dated November 28, was presented from R. F. Almirall, transmitting an estimate of \$12,437 from the Luke A. Burke & Sons Company for furnishing a wooden slat roof, together with canopy, and iron railing on the Nurses' Residence at Fordham Hospital. On the recommendation of the Chairman of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to decline to accept this proposal, and to make no change in the roof of this building at the present time.

A letter dated November 26, was presented from R. F. Almirall, transmitting drawings and specifications for lighting fixtures for the Nurses' Residence at Harlem Hospital at an estimated cost of \$8,000. It was moved, seconded and carried, to reject these plans and specifications, and to instruct the architect to confer with the Building Committee with a view to designing lighting fixtures of a lower cost.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead & White, under date of December 5, recommending the acceptance of an estimate from Pierson & Goodrich for extending the dumbwaiter of Pavilions A and B to the roof ward. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead & White, under date of December 5, transmitting estimates from the John H. Parker Company for erecting two flights of stairs in the amphitheatre of Pavilions I and K. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these were referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated December 5, was presented from McKim, Mead & White, stating that Pavilions L and M were completed and ready to be turned over to the

City, and requesting that arrangements be made to provide temporary current until the permanent current is installed. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated November 25, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of two resolutions adopted November 20, (1) approving of the issue of \$45,400 special revenue bonds for the purpose of replenishing the 1913 accounts for food, fuel, and medical and surgical supplies, and (2) revising the schedules for 1913, to include this amount. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated December 4, was presented from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler, recommending the appointment of Dr. George Stiebel and Dr. Harvey E. Fountaine as Assistant Visiting Dentists to Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved, and Dr. Stiebel and Dr. Fountaine appointed accordingly.

#### New Business.

The Chairman of the Building Committee referred to the advisability of installing gas ranges for cooking purposes on the top floor of Harlem Hospital, the plans for the alteration of which are under consideration, and it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the architect accordingly.

The President referred to the small iron fence in front of the Nurses' Residence at Harlem Hospital, and to the desirability of continuing the high fence now enclosing the hospital in a straight line in front of the Nurses' Residence, and providing grass plots between the wall of the building and this fence. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to obtain estimates for making this change.

Mr. Stern presented a letter dated December 7, from the Supervising Nurse of Fordham Hospital, relative to the tardiness in the attendance of the doctors in the Out Patient Department of that hospital. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To instruct the General Medical Superintendent to direct the Superintendents of all the hospitals to render to the Trustees every month a report of the attendance of the Physicians to the Out Patient Department, setting forth the time of their arrival and departure, and to send a copy of these reports to each member of the Board of Trustees.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held December 16, 1913, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of December 9 were held as read and approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is recommended that permission be requested from the Board of Aldermen for the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables in the open market at approximately \$12,000.

Estimates are being received for a motor ambulance, permission for the purchase of which, without public letting, was recently granted. It is requested that the selection of a car be approved by a committee at as early a date as possible, so that the order can be placed.

Many requests are being received for information regarding the dates of examinations for positions on the interne staff of the different hospitals. It will be recalled that last year the Trustees discussed the advisability of endeavoring to have these examinations held at the same time, and at a later date than in the past.

The position of Pathological Chemist in the department becomes available on January 1. Dr. Norris desires to appoint Dr. E. Butterfield, formerly of the Rockefeller Institute, who has been developing and organizing the chemical floor of the Department. It will be necessary to ask the Civil Service Commission to approve of the appointment of Dr. Butterfield, either by a non-competitive examination or by making the position exempt. Approval is requested.

The contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Company expires on December 31. It would be desirable to renew the existing arrangement with this company, or to secure the services of some other inspector, so that the hospitals may be properly protected after January 1.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Aldermen for permission to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables in the open

market during the year 1914, to an amount not exceeding \$1,200.

The selection of a motor ambulance was referred to a committee composed of Mr. Farley and Mr. Robbins.

The subject of having examinations for internship in the hospitals of the City at a later date than in the past was referred to the President.

The appointment of Dr. E. Butterfield as Pathological Chemist from January 1, 1914, was approved, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to request the Municipal Civil Service Commission to grant Dr. Butterfield a non-competitive examination or to classify the position in the exempt class.

It was Resolved, To renew the contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Company for six months, on the same terms and conditions as during the past half year, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to have a contract prepared accordingly.

#### Reports of Committees.

The Secretary reported that bids had been opened on Monday, December 15, for the following supplies for the year 1914: (1) food supplies, (2) forage, (3) coal, (4) general drug supplies, (5) laundry, cleaning and disinfecting supplies, (6) refrigerating supplies, and (7) wearing apparel. The Committee on Supplies recommended that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders on the following lines: 1 to 8 inclusive (fresh meats); 9 and 10 (fresh Kosher meats); 11, 12, 14, 15, 16 and 17 (dried and smoked meats); 18 to 20 inclusive (poultry); 21 to 26 inclusive (fresh fish); 29 to 36 inclusive (fresh stock vegetables); 51 to 55 inclusive (bread and rolls); 80 (butter); 86 to 88 inclusive (milk and cream); 100 to 102 inclusive (fresh stock fruits); 181 to 189, 191, 193, 194 and 195 (fuel). The Committee on Supplies also recommended that the following bids be rejected: Lines 190, 192 and 196 for fuel, all bids for forage, line 261 for ice, and line 13 for smoked beef; and that action be deferred on the bids received on all other lines. The Committee further recommended that a re-advertisement be authorized for smoked beef (line 13), for an eight months' supply of forage, and a three months' supply of ice; and that bids for stove coal (lines 190, 192 and 196) and for ice for the remainder of the year 1914 be advertised for during March. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Committee on Supplies was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on an estimate received from Pierson and Goodrich for \$987 for extending the dumbwaiter to the roof of pavilions A and B, and on the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects, this bid was accepted.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had made an inspection of pavilions L and M on December 11, and that in his opinion the building was ready to be accepted by the City. He further reported that provision should be made for the appointment of a Watchman for the care of the building, as well as for the installation of a permanent electric current, as recommended by the architects in their letter of December 5. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To accept the building, and to direct the General Medical Superintendent to appoint a Watchman for its protection and to provide permanent current.

The Building Committee reported that they had considered the type of exhaust fans and motors for the ventilating system of pavilions I and K suggested by the architects, and also those preferred by the Supervising Engineer of the Department in his letter of December 9, and recommended the acceptance of those selected by McKim, Mead and White, as set forth in their letters of November 13 and December 15. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that the Committee had conferred with J. M. Knopp in regard to his contract for the construction of additional balconies on pavilions A and B, and had considered his letter of October 25, as well as a communication from McKim, Mead and White under date of November 17. The Committee reported that after careful inquiry into the delay they had found that this contract was delayed by act or omission on the part of the City to the extent of sixty-nine days, and that the excess overtime for which liquidated damages should be charged amounted to twelve days. In accordance with the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals certify that there were twelve days overtime, which determination was made pursuant to clause R of the contract of J. M. Knopp, and it was further

Resolved, That a certificate of overtime be attached to and made part of the certificate of the completion and acceptance of the work of this contractor, to be filed



in the office of the Comptroller of the City.

Mr. Sachs reported that, as a result of a conference, Dr. Abraham Flexner had consented to undertake the study of the medical administration of Bellevue Hospital, which he wished to conduct in conjunction with the Board of Estimate Committee on Inquiry into the Departments of Health, Charities, and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and that Dr. Flexner had already begun a preliminary investigation. This report was approved.

The Advisory Committee on Nursing reported that at a meeting on December 10, attention had been called to the lack of drinking water in the wards of Bellevue Hospital. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to see that water is properly distributed to the patients in the wards.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had considered the plans for the new building for the out patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, and recommended, in view of the fact that it would be necessary to modify the plans to come within the present appropriation or to secure additional funds, that the subject be referred to a special committee with power, to confer with Dr. Goldwater, the Department's Expert on Hospital Construction. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted, and the President, Mr. Paulding, and Mr. Farley were appointed a special committee for this purpose.

Communications.  
The President presented letters received from Dr. M. B. Parounagian and Dr. E. L. Keys, Jr., under date of December 8, relative to the advisability of permitting the administering of Salvarsan in the out patient department of Gouverneur Hospital.

Resolved, To limit the privilege of administering Salvarsan in the dispensaries of the Department to specially qualified men designated by the Trustees, and it was further

Resolved, To accord this privilege to Dr. Parounagian of Gouverneur Hospital.

The President referred to a letter he had received from Dr. Robert J. Carlisle in regard to the service of the Chief Record Clerk at Bellevue Hospital, and requested that the Trustees consider what could be done to obtain an increase in the salary of this employee. This was referred to the Committee of Officers and Employees for report at the first meeting in January.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital held on December 1 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignations of Dr. W. B. McLelland and Dr. Clarence S. Gardner from the house staff on November 7 and 13 respectively, were accepted; the creation of a second place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician to Gouverneur Hospital was approved; the nominations of Dr. Bancroft to the place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician, and of Drs. Newman and Scadron for appointment to the newly created place, were referred to the Conference Committee. The attitude of the Medical Board in regard to the resignations from the house staff and the granting of short term certificates was considered, but no action was taken thereon.

A letter dated December 1, was presented from Dr. J. H. Huddleston, requesting the establishment of the place of Assistant Director of Tuberculosis Clinics at Gouverneur Hospital, and nominating Dr. N. C. Seymour should the place be created. This communication was referred to the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for their recommendation, in order that action may be taken in the regular way.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for November 25 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nomination of Dr. L. Martocci-Pisculli as Assistant in the Gynecological Clinic and the application of Dr. William Somerville for the place of Assistant in the clinical laboratory were referred to the Conference Committee. The applications for the place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician were considered, and on the recommendation of the Conference Committee, it was

Resolved, To create an additional place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician, and to appoint Dr. Thomas H. Cherry and Dr. Arthur Stein.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for December 5 were presented. The resignation of Dr. Francis E. Butler as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (orthopedic clinic) was accepted; the granting of a diploma to Dr. J. A. McSweeney, together with a leave of absence from December 15 to 31, was approved; the appointment of Dr. Cudmore as a member of the house staff, as well as the recommendation to establish positions of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, was referred to the Conference Committee; the request that the man at present in charge of the morgue and laboratory be made a dienaar

directly under the Pathologist, and that another man be appointed in his place, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent; the nomination of Dr. Jacob Diner as Assistant Pathologist, and the reappointments, new appointments, and changes for the year 1914, were referred to the Conference Committee.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for December 10 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation of Dr. Mercer Blanchard as interne on the Second Division was accepted as of November 30, and the appointment of Dr. John B. Voor to serve from December 1, 1913, to December 31, 1914, in the place made vacant by this resignation was approved; the nominations of Dr. Thomas J. Gallon and Dr. Alexander Hofheimer as assistants in the out patient department were referred to the Conference Committee; the granting of diplomas to members of the house staff who have completed their service was approved; the recommendation that the visiting hours on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays be reduced by one hour each day was considered, and it was

Resolved, To restrict the visiting time to two hours, from 2 to 4 p. m., on three days of the week, but to allow visiting on Sundays, as heretofore, from 1 to 4 p. m.

A letter dated December 13 was presented from Lawrence Fay, transmitting a claim for \$78 for damages to his automobile, alleged to have been caused by one of the ambulances of Fordham Hospital. A report thereon dated December 12 was also presented from the Superintendent of Fordham Hospital. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to forward the claim to the Finance Department for adjustment.

A letter dated December 11 was presented from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting a complete set of final working drawings and specifications for the alterations to the power house and ambulance station of the new Harlem Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these were referred to the Building Committee.

A letter from J. H. Freedlander dated December 13 was also presented, requesting final contracts for services. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to have these contracts prepared.

A letter dated December 12 was presented from R. F. Almiral, enclosing five estimates from the Luke A. Burke and Sons Company for extra work in connection with the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these estimates were referred to the Building Committee.

A final report on pavilions L and M was presented from the General Inspector of Construction under date of December 13. This was referred to the Building Committee for their information.

A letter dated December 15 was presented from the John H. Parker Company, requesting permission to obtain steam from the boiler house for use in pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To sell steam to the John H. Parker Company on the same terms and conditions obtained from John T. Brady and Company.

A bill dated June 5 was presented, from J. M. Knopp for \$99 for extra work alleged to have been performed in the construction of the additional balconies of pavilions A and B. A letter from McKim, Mead and White under date of October 15 was also presented, stating that this work was included in the specifications. It was moved, seconded, and carried, to decline to approve this bill.

Letters were presented from the Commissioner of Public Works under date of November 25 and from McKim, Mead and White under date of December 6 and 10, relative to the sewerage facilities at 29th st. and 1st ave. These were referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated December 9 was presented from the Luke A. Burke and Sons Company, stating that the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital was completed and requesting the appointment of a watchman to take the place of their man. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to appoint a Watchman for the premises.

A letter was presented from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity dated December 9, stating that the preliminary type sheets for the fixtures for pavilions L and M would be approved in about a week or ten days. It was moved, seconded and carried, to send a copy to the architects for their information and to place the communication on file.

A communication dated December 10 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of four resolutions adopted on December 4 (1) transferring funds within the salary appropriations for 1913; (2) revising the 1913 salary schedules as of November 1; (3) transferring to the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation unencumbered balances in appropriations for 1909, 1910 and 1912; and (4) retransferring \$22 from

the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation to account 237 for general supplies, 1911. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on November 25 was presented, amending the resolution authorizing an issue of corporate stock for the construction of the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital so as to include equipment and furnishing. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resolution was ordered placed on file.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the recommendation of the Bellevue Executive Committee that a solicitor be appointed to obtain permission to perform autopsies from the friends or relatives of patients dying in the hospital, and it was moved, seconded and carried, to make no appointment for this purpose at the present time.

Consideration was given to the reports of inspections of the hospitals of the Department by the State Board of Charities, action upon which was deferred on October 28, and it was reported that some of the recommendations had already been carried out, and that others were impossible at the present time on account of lack of funds. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the reports were referred to the General Medical Superintendent to remedy as far as possible the needs set forth therein.

The President referred to the advisability of establishing prenatal clinics in all the dispensaries of the Department, in order to augment the obstetrical service of the hospitals. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the Medical Board of each hospital to make provision for the establishment of such a clinic, and to direct the General Medical Superintendent to supply the necessary space and equipment for this purpose.

The President referred to a request made by Dr. Walter H. Mytinger, who served on the house staff of Gouverneur Hospital for fifteen months and was compelled, for reasons for which he was in no way to blame, to discontinue his service, for a short term certificate covering the time he served at that hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to have a certificate prepared and issued to Dr. Mytinger.

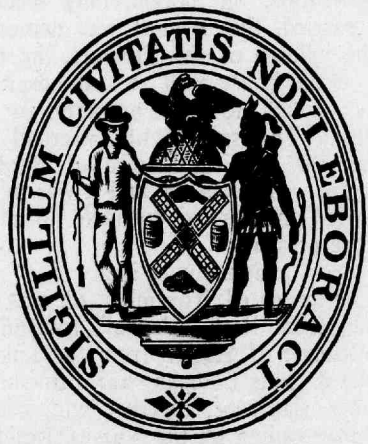
On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to have the automobile of the Department overhauled.

**TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.**

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary workmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.
