NYC Sanitation Hiring Summer Interns

Nearly 60 Paid Internships Available Including Opportunities in Operations & Waste Management, Recycling and Sustainability, Information Technology and Legal Affairs, Among Others

The New York City Department of Sanitation is now accepting applications for its summer internship program. Nearly 60 positions are available in bureaus throughout the Department, including Operations, Waste Management, Recycling and Sustainability, Information Technology and Legal Affairs, among others. Applicants should be enrolled in college or be a recent college graduate.

While the Department's full-time uniform employees handle the crucial physical work of keeping the city healthy, safe and clean, a host of "civilian" workers help keep the Department running. From Human Resources, to Information Technology, all bureaus have a part to play. The Department's summer interns assist in this crucial work while gaining experience in the day-to-day operations of a large City agency.

About the New York City Department of Sanitation

The Department of Sanitation (DSNY) keeps New York City healthy, safe and clean by collecting, recycling and disposing of waste, cleaning streets and vacant lots, and clearing snow and ice. The Department operates 59 district garages and manages a fleet of more than 2,000 rear-loading collection trucks, 450 mechanical brooms and 705 salt spreaders. The Department clears litter, snow and ice from approximately 6,500 miles of City streets and removes debris from vacant lots as well as abandoned vehicles from City streets. The Department runs a portfolio of programs and facilities to help New Yorkers more sustainably manage waste.
