SIR,—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 20th inst., 598 deaths were reported in this city. The mortality from diarrhoeal disorder continued to decrease, but there was an increase in the number of deaths by inflammatory and constitutional causes. The extreme range of temperature in the early part of the week was followed by the death of numerous invalids that had survived in the warmer weather of previous weeks. The temperature on Saturday, the 13th, was at 76° Fahr., at 4 p.m., and at midnight on Sunday was at 49°, and next daybreak it was at 44°. Infant mortality decreased slightly, and the number of deaths from diphtheria was 10 less than in the previous week, 30 deaths by this disease being reported last week. There were only 5 deaths from typhus and typhoid fevers. No death from small-pox has occurred during the last five weeks. This unprecedented exemption from the scourge that drove the people to vaccination more thorough and universal than ever before witnessed in the United States, bears its own testimony to the sanitary value of Jenner's discovery. In the first quarter of the year, 67 deaths were caused by small-pox; in the second quarter, ending June 30th, 36 deaths; in the succeeding seven weeks, 4 deaths, and the last five weeks, none.

The death rate last week is equivalent to the annual rate of 30.77 per 1,000 inhabitants, and in the previous week, to 30.47 per 1,000.

Other Cities.—In London, for the first week in September, the death rate was equal to 20 per 1,000 yearly; in the 21 chief towns and cities of Great Britain it was equal to 24 per 1,000; in Liverpool, 28; Manchester, 29; Leeds, 30, and Birmingham, 33. In Paris, it was equal to 23; in Brussels, the last week in August, 26; in Berlin, 43; and in Vienna, 60. In the cities of the Northern and Middle States of our own country, no epidemic diseases are reported, but in numer. Northern and Middle States of our own country, no epidemic diseases are reported, but in numerous villages in Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri, cholera lingers and reappears in a very fatal manner. The progress of yellow fever in the South proves that the boon of sanitary protection against that scourge is too important to be neglected by any city that is within the range of its occasional visits. The Board of Health at New Orleans and the Howards in the various cities now suffering are doing what they can to mitigate suffering and danger. mitigate suffering and danger.

The city continues to be free from every kind of epidemic disease except diphtheria. Typhoid fever, which was last week charged with 17 deaths, appears to be more localized than diphtheria, which caused 28 deaths. Diarrhocal maladies caused 93 deaths last week, and 112 in the previous week.

The Health Department can now present a record of public protection against small-pox that is unexampled in the history of the city: Not a death from this disease has occurred in all this million of inhabitants during the past six weeks.

The death rate last week was equivalent to a yearly mortality of 27½ in 1,000 inhabitants.

Other Cities.—London, in the second week of September, had a death rate equal to 21 per 1,000 yearly; and, with 20 other large cities and towns of Great Britain, the average rate was equal to 24 per 1,000; Manchester and Leeds had each a mortality equal to 31, and Liverpool, 24 per 1,000. Paris reported a rate equal to 27 per 1,000 yearly; Brussels, 25; Berlin, 43; Vienna, in the previous week, 65 per 1,000—413 out of 777 deaths being caused by cholera. In Rome, the first week of September, the rate was equal to 28.5 per 1,000; in Amsterdam it was 41; and in Copenhagen, 28 per 1,000, yearly rate.

Cities of the United States.—Only in the cities of the Gulf coast and the Mississippi Valley is there any unusual mortality by epidemics. The President of the Louisiana Board of Health writes, under date of Sept. 26th: "The Shrieve-port fever is simply yellow fever, killing from 50 to 75 out of the 100. Memphis has more actual fever than New Orleans; Pensacola vastly more."

From the towns that have been visited by cholera in the South-west, the testimony which reaches us daily is signally uniform in regard to the connection of its prevalence with positive neglect of cleansing and the maintenance of a suitable sanitary supervision of the towns th
