PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
New York, September 23, 1873.

WHEREAS, On the 22d day of August last, a fiendish outrage was committed on the person of Mr. Walter Gibson, proprietor of the Harlem Local, by throwing a large quantity of vitriolic acid in his face, destroying the sight of the right eye, and endangering the sight of the other; and whereas active but unsuccessful efforts have been made to discover the perpetrators of the assault.

Now, I, W. F. Havemeyer, Mayor of the city of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the apprehension and conviction of the person or persons who were guilty of the offense; the said reward to be paid on their conviction and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

Resolutions.

Whereas, the Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board, that the building situated upon the lot No. 31 Washington street (rear brick extension of house), New York city, has become dangerous to life by reason of want of repair,

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated upon lot No. 31 Washington street (brick extension rear), New York city, be required to vacate said building on or before October 6th, 1873, at 12 o'clock, M., for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause the inspection of all cars used for the conveyance of passengers and drawn by horses within the city limits, and to report all cases of non-compliance with the requirements of Section 181 of the Sanitary Code.

That S. Davidson and W. Reynolds, foremen in the Disinfecting Corps, be retained in the service of this Department until further orders, with salaries at the rate of \$83 33 per month.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to make use of the members of the Disinfecting Corps as special inspectors whenever they are not actively employed as members of the Disinfecting Corps.

That the services of the following named special inspectors be dispensed with from and after this date:—Louis H. Landry, Louis T. Brennan, William Whollahan, Edward L. Bullock and Louis Franke.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS—CONDENSED STATEMENT OF MORTALITY—METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS, ETC.

REPORTED MORTALITY (week ending September 27th,) AND THE ACTUAL MORTALITY (each day in the week, ending at noon, September 20th, 1873,) WITH AN ENUMERATION OF THE CHIEF CAUSES OF DEATH. E. HARRIS, M. D., Registrar.

Main data table containing mortality statistics, meteorological observations, and causes of death. Includes columns for Date, Barometer, Thermometers, Humidity, Wind, Rain, and a detailed list of causes of death such as Small Pox, Measles, and Typhoid Fever.

That the disinfection of streets, street-gutters and privies be discontinued from and after this date, and that the laborers temporarily employed in disinfection be discharged. Whereas, the party served with Order 3,338, Form 2, Current Series, relating to premises north side 70th street, 100 feet west of 8th avenue, before the execution thereof has been commenced has applied to this Board to have said order or its execution stayed or modified. Resolved, That said order be suspended until the further order of this Board, and that the party served therewith be allowed a reasonable and fair opportunity to present facts and proofs, and to report the same in accordance with the rules of this Board for such further action as may seem just and reasonable. That a copy of the affidavit of Special Inspector Sheehan, on operations of C. Dick, night scavenger, be forwarded to his Honor, the Mayor. That all goods stored upon Hanover Square be removed therefrom, and the use of said square for the storage of goods be prohibited. That the Attorney be directed to commence actions against all parties who have violated the Sanitary Code by the use of Hanover Square. That the President be directed to inform Mr. Peter Dolan that the previous orders of the Board, relating to the rear building Nos. 5, 7 and 9 Mulberry street, will be enforced.

That the President be directed to inform Dr. Randolph that the orders of this Board in respect to his premises on 3d avenue, between 49th and 50th streets, will be enforced. That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to execute the orders of this Board, which requires that the following named premises be vacated and not occupied as human habitations. Record of the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Sept. 20, 1873: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,014, as follows: 7 public buildings, 722 tenement houses, 369 private dwellings, 157 other dwellings, 23 manufactories and workshops, 68 stores and warehouses, 55 stables, 23 slaughter

houses, 7 fat houses, 3 gut cleaning establishments, 3 manure dumps, 1 brewery, 1 vessel, 6 public sewers and drains 31 sunken and vacant lots, 56 yards, courts and areas, 130 cellars and basements, 44 waste pipes and drains, 75 privies and water-closets, 194 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cess-pools, 32 other nuisances. The number of reports received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 714. During the week 44 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 25 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 25 houses, 25 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c. In addition to the regular duties performed by the Disinfecting Corps, have been 20 1/2 miles of street gutters, 758 privies, 73 yards and 45 cellars were disinfected. During the week 106 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy vaults. 106 permits have been issued during the week ending Sept. 20, 1873, to consignees of vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. The following number of cases of contagious

diseases were reported for the week ending Sept. 20, 1873: Typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 4; scarlet fever, 27; measles, 1, and diphtheria, 34. One case of fever was removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps. The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending Sept. 20th, 1873, was: sheep, 6; lambs, 2; beef, 925 pounds; veal, 78 pounds; mutton, 74 pounds; poultry, 448 pounds; ham, 102 pounds; and fish, 500 pounds. 332 loads of night soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city. SEALED PROPOSALS WILL BE RECEIVED at the office of the Department of Public Parks until Saturday, the 11th day of October, 1873, at 4 o'clock P. M., for the construction and erection of the iron, carpenters' and painters' work, for an arch upon the Central Park, known as the "outset arch," in accordance with the drawings and specifications for the same, which may now be seen at the office of Design and Superintendence (architect's room), as above.

To be completed on or before May 15, 1874. The proposals will be publicly opened by the Commissioners at the office of the Department, as above, on Wednesday, the 15th day of October, 1873, at the hour of 9:30 o'clock A. M.

No proposal will be considered unless accompanied by a consent in writing of two responsible householders or freeholders of the City of New York, their respective places of business or residences being named, to the effect that they will become bound as sureties in the sum of six thousand dollars for the faithful performance of the contract, should it be awarded upon that proposal.

Each proposal must state the name and place of residence of the person making the same; the names of all persons interested with him therein, that it is made without collusion with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that no member of the Common Council or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in any portion of the profits thereof.

The Department reserves the right to reject any or all proposals. Proposed sureties must verify their consent before a Judge of a Court of Record in the County of New York.

Forms of proposals may be obtained, and the terms of the contract (settled as required by law), seen at the office of the secretary as above.
