The Board met in their chamber, No. 15 City Hall.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Cooper—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to the Board for amendment the ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the killing of dogs in the City of New York," passed May 27, 1874.

The President *pro tem* put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Ottendorfer—

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the north side of One Hundred and Eleventh street, between Second and Third avenues, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Cooper—

Whereas, Each and every company of the Seventy-first Regiment of the National Guard of the State of New York, organized under the provisions of the Act of March 17, 1870, being chapter 80 of the Laws of 1870, has reached the minimum number of non-commissioned officers, musicians, and privates, established by section twelve of the said act, and the captain or commandant of each of said companies has made a demand in writing, countersigned by the commandant of the regiment to which the said companies belong, that a suitable and convenient armory, drill-room, and place of deposit for the safe keeping of the arms, uniforms, equipments, accoutrements, and camp equipage furnished under the provisions of the said act, be rented and provided within the bounds of the County of New York for the use of each of said companies, together with the certificate of the Adjutant-General that each and every of such companies comprises at least the minimum number of non-commissioned officers, musicians, and privates, who, as appears by the certificate of the commandant of the said regiment to which such companies are attached, regularly attend the drills and parades of such companies, which said demand of said companies, and certificate of the Adjutant-General, and certificate of the said commandant of said regiment, dated April 29, 1874, were filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on April 30, 1874, and are now on file in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen;

And whereas, The Inspector-General, as appears by his certificate, also dated April 29, 1874, and filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on April 30, 1874, and now on file in the

said office of the said Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, deem expedient, and this Board also deem expedient, that a regimental armory be rented and provided, to be used by the several companies of the said regiment;

And whereas, The said companies of the said regiment have, since the first day of May, 1874, remained in possession of and used as a regimental armory the premises hereinafter mentioned:

Resolved, That the second story of the building situated on the block of ground bounded by Broadway, Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, in the City and County of New York, being the same premises heretofore hired and rented by the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York, by and in pursuance of resolutions approved February 15 and April 20, 1869, and occupied and used as a regimental armory by the several companies of the Thirty-seventh and Seventy-first Regiments of the National Guard of the State of New York, during the term of five years from May 1, 1869, be and the same hereby are hired and rented for the further term of five years from the first day of May, 1874, at the yearly rent of twenty thousand dollars, payable quarterly, to be occupied and used by the several companies of the Seventy-first Regiment of the National Guard of the State of New York as a Regimental Armory; and that the Clerk of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute a lease of the said premises in accordance with this resolution, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to affix thereto the seal of the said Corporation, and to attest the same; and that the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to pay said rent quarterly from the appropriation for Armories and Drill-rooms.

By Alderman Flanagan—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James E. Fitzgerald to place two lamps inside of the stoop line in front of No. 221 Sixth avenue, the gas to be supplied from his own meter, and the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President *pro tem* put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Pursuant to a request of the Board, his Honor the Mayor here returned an ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance for the killing of dogs in the City of New York," passed May 27, 1874.

Whereupon, the President *pro tem* presented the following:

(G. O. 562.)

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance to provide for the killing of dogs in the City of New York," passed May 27, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following: "And the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits aforesaid, for recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance, such penalty, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of the City of New York, and, upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance."

SEC. 2. Section 2 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

§ 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most expedient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance, and for that purpose is hereby further authorized and empowered to appoint two or more persons, each of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, in each of the Assembly Districts in the City of New York, to seize and capture all such dogs found running loose, or at large, and to pay such persons so appointed, for every such dog so captured and delivered, at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor, while engaged in seizing or capturing, and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any other duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five, nor more than one hundred dollars, for every offence, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council, on complaint of the person so hindered or molested; the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance; and the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed in this ordinance to be protected from hindrance or molestation. Every dog mentioned in this ordinance, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of that time, be killed and destroyed, in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner, or other person, who may claim any such dog, shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. Section 3 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by adding after the word "paid" before the words "until otherwise ordered," the words "and all other expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance."

Sec. 4. Section 4 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. Sections 5, 6, and 7 of the above-entitled ordinance shall hereafter be numbered respectively 4, 5, and 6.

Sec. 6. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances,

inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The said ordinance, when so amended, shall read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad, loose, or at large, and the Commissioner of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance; such penalty, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of said city, and upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint two or more persons, each of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, in each of the Assembly Districts in the City of New York, to seize and capture all such dogs found running loose or at large, and to pay such persons so appointed for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor while engaged in seizing or capturing and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for every offence, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council, on complaint of the person so hindered or molested, the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated as provided in section 1 of this ordinance. The Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and required to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed by this ordinance, to be protected from hindrance or molestation. Every dog mentioned in this ordinance, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of this city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, and the other expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for City Contingencies.

Sec. 4. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

Sec. 5. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take immediately.

The President *pro tem.* put the question whether the Board would agree with said ordinance.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

And the same was directed to be sent to the Board of Assistant Aldermen for concurrence.

MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

NEW YORK, July 10, 1874.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution of your Honorable Body, assigning the room at present occupied by the Special Term of the Supreme Court to the Marine Court of the City of New York.

I am reliably informed that the taking away of the said room from the Supreme Court would seriously interfere with its business, and deprive the Court of its equity branch; that the room adjoining it, to which reference is made in the resolution, is occupied by the General Term of the Supreme Court, which is generally in session concurrently with the Special Term. And I am further informed that the present accommodations of the Supreme Court, even as now existing, are inadequate to a proper transaction of the business of the Court.
