

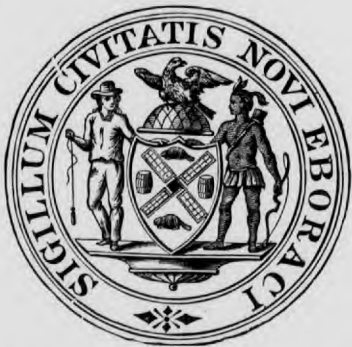

SPECIAL SESSION.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

MONDAY, November 30, 1885,
1 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in special session, in their chamber, Room No. 16 City Hall, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1886.

On motion of Alderman Hartman, the Board went into Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1886, being number 519 on the list of General Orders.

And the President called Vice-President Jaehne to the chair.

After some time spent therein, the Committee, on motion of President Sanger, arose, and the President resumed the chair.

Vice-President Jaehne, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows:

The Committee of the Whole, having had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for conducting the public business of the City and County of New York for the year 1886, have made thereto the following amendments, which I am instructed to report to the Board for adoption, viz.:

COMMON COUNCIL.

City Contingencies—Bartholdi Statue Celebration reduced to \$2,500.
New item—For Purchase of Portrait of Gen. Grant, \$2,500.
Clerks and Officers, Board of Aldermen (section 79, New York City Consolidation Act of 1882), including \$5,000 for Commencing and Prosecuting during the year 1886, the work of Duplicating the Manuscript Records of the City Government from 1652 to 1830, inclusive, increase from \$20,000 to \$22,500.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

Add For Special Counsel in Matter of Equalizing State Taxes, \$3,000.
Corporation Attorney—

Salaries—Clerks, Messengers and Janitor, increase from \$6,300 to \$7,148.

Three Process Servers, increase from \$3,000 to \$4,500.

For Procuring and Presenting Evidence of Frauds previous to 1872, \$6,000. Item stricken out.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Free Floating Baths, increase from \$15,000 to \$35,000.
Lamps and Gas and Electric Lighting, increase from \$718,800 to \$743,800, \$25,000 to be applied for lighting streets on west side of the city leading to the several ferries, \$743,800.
Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc., increase from \$131,500 to \$175,000.
Repairing Streets and Avenues (chapter 476, Laws of 1875), increase from \$200,000 to \$485,000.
Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading, \$238,000, increase to \$285,000.
Add Special Appliances to Prevent Waste of Water, \$50,000.
Street Signs on Buildings and Lamps, increase from \$5,000 to \$10,000.
Salaries—Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc., increase from \$43,500 to \$71,900.
Salaries—Repairs and Renewal of Pavements and Regrading, increase from \$12,000 to \$15,000.
Salaries—Repaving Streets and Avenues (chapter 476, Laws of 1875), increase from \$8,000 to \$15,000.
Salaries—Department of Public Works—Officers, Engineers, Superintendents, Inspectors, Clerks, and all other salaried officers of the Department, increase from \$85,000 to \$118,500.
Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs, increase from \$50,000 to \$50,500, increase to be applied to constructing twenty new doors to Washington Market.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

For Construction of New Buildings—System of ventilation and heating, Bellevue Hospital, increase from \$10,000 to \$20,000.
For Distribution of Coal to Out-door Poor, increase from \$20,000 to \$35,000.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Health Fund, increase from \$150,000 to \$205,258.

For twenty Sanitary Inspectors (chapter 508, Laws of 1885), increase from \$20,000 to \$24,000.

STREET CLEANING DEPARTMENT.

Add Removing debris from Budensick buildings, \$380.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Add For Site and School Building in upper part of Twenty-second Ward, as follows: For site, \$50,000; for new building, \$100,000.
Sites, increase from \$100,000 to \$150,000.
Buildings, increase from \$900,000 to \$1,000,000.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

Add To reimburse A. V. Davidson, Sheriff, for expenses in defending himself before the Governor, etc., \$38,395.68.
Preserving Records in Office of Surrogate, increase from \$5,000 to \$8,400.
Fund for Local Improvements (chapter 174, Laws of 1880)—For Department of Public Parks, \$250,000, \$25,000 of which shall be devoted to the completion of the Riverside Drive.
Add Toward the Erection of New Armory for the Eighth Regiment on the site bought for that purpose, \$150,000.

SUPERIOR COURT.

Add For Crier for Superior Court, \$2,000.

SALARIES—SURROGATE'S OFFICE.

Increase salary of Probate Clerk from \$2,000 to \$3,000, and add \$500 to the salary of the Surrogate's Stenographer, increase from \$900 to \$1,400; adding to the amount for Salaries \$1,500, and making the total \$74,800; also add \$1,000 for Contingencies.

Alderman Hartman moved to disagree with the report of the Committee, and to reduce the appropriation for Municipal Service Examining Boards from \$20,050 to \$5,000.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Hartman, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Cleary, Cowie, De Lacy, Hall, Hartman, Kenney, Kerwin, Mulry, Murray, McGinnis, Quinn, Reilly, and Walsh—13.

Negative—The President, Vice-President Jaehne, Aldermen Brown, Finck, Masterson, Morgan, O'Dwyer, Rothman, and Van Rensselaer—9.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said report of the Committee of the Whole, as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Resolved, That, since the Honorable President of this Board has voted upon the question of certain increase in the Department of Public Works Budget for 1886, for the more complete care and maintenance of our streets and roadways, the protection of our water supply, and other necessities consequent upon the growing exigencies of our City, he be requested to maintain, and that it is the sense of this Board that he should maintain in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the position by him here taken.

From J. N. Briggs—Requesting permission to place on Pier at East Eleventh street, East river, four coal-hoppers and two derricks, as per accompanying diagram.

From Police Department—Reporting that there is a washout at bulkhead, Pier 51, East River. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From F. P. Eastman—Requesting permission to use north side of old pier foot of Bogart street, North river, to locate a dumping-board at, and agreeing to pay \$15 per week for the use thereof.

From J. Muller & Son—Requesting permission to erect derrick for the purpose of discharging coal on the various piers used by them for that purpose whenever they may desire. Referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report, and the President directed to notify J. Muller & Son that they must in all cases give the pier or bulkhead on which they desire to erect a derrick.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to and stating that the amount of material encumbering Pier at West Fifty-fifth street, North river, prevents a proper cleaning of the said pier.

From Canda & Kane—Protesting against the penalty imposed upon them for violation of Rule 4, and requesting that it be remitted. Application, denied, and unless paid within the prescribed time, claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

From Richard Cronin—Accepting contract for repairing Piers at Little West Twelfth street and West Seventeenth street, North river.

From John Spence—Accepting contract for plumbing for a building on Pier A, North river.

From W. S. Thorn, President Second Avenue Railroad Company—In reference to calling on the President respecting repairs to Pier between Ninety-first and Ninety-second streets, East river. 2d. In reference to the case of Edward G. Ames. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

From Moody & Bracken—Accepting contract for gas-fitting for building on Pier A, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending November 22, 1885.

3d. Reporting that repairs ordered to north side of Pier, old 33, North river, have not been made by the New York, West Shore and Buffalo Railway Company, as ordered by the Board, and recommending that the premises be fenced off if repairs are not made by the said company. The President directed to notify the said company that unless repairs are made to the premises forthwith the pier will be fenced off by this Department.

4th. Reporting the repairs required to Pier 51, East River. The President directed to notify the owners and lessees to repair the said pier within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4836, that the removal of tally-house from Pier 7 to Pier 11, East river, had been done under his supervision and direction.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4821, that he had superintended and directed the removal of about twenty-nine feet of backing-log on the northerly side of Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, and the sheathing of the deck thereat.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4849, that he had replaced fence at bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4850, that he had replaced mooring-cleats on the new bulkhead between Piers, new 35 and 43, North river.

It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
