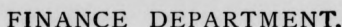

We are of the opinion that the representatives of the United Labor Party, who were sworn in by the Chief of the Bureau of Elections, are being deprived of their legal rights.

That the act of Legislature, providing for a fifth Inspector, was designed to apply to that organization, and they have just cause to complain of injustice.

This Board has already declared that the action of the Chief of the Bureau of Elections was unwarranted and has reversed that action, but the action was only what we believe the Labor candidates for inspectors would have been entitled to had this Board done its duty.

We are on the eve of election; the whole subject is before the Courts for determination; to try and punish the officer whom the injured party naturally regard as seeking to give them their rights would add to their sense of wrong and just resentment.

We do not think this the proper time to consider the question of justification of the Chief of the Bureau of Elections and therefore vote to postpone the resolution until after the 8th day of November.
