DEAR SIR—I have your letter of the 4th instant, calling my attention to the action of the Board of Armory Commissioners upon a communication from the Clerk of the Works of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, in which he says that by the specifications and on sectional plans the concrete shall be twelve inches thick on the top of the arches under main drill-room floor; that the work is now being done and that there is only room left for four inches of concrete, and that the work is not being done according to plans and specifications.

In answer, I have to say that the plans are laid out for a thickness of twelve inches of masonry, including the brick arches, upon which the locust sleepers and concrete filling are to be placed. The dead load which the arched trusses are to sustain—as marked on the plan of iron work—is 155 pounds per square foot, which is the weight of the twelve inches of brick and concrete together with the locust sleepers, concrete filling and flooring, although they would sustain a load somewhat greater than this. The iron beams between the trusses, upon which the brick arches rest, are calculated to sustain a load in excess of this in addition to the live load of 135 pounds, as indicated by the drawings. All of the drawings and calculations agree with this—with the slight exception of a clerical error on one drawing—as an examination of them by any competent person would at once show. Such a thickness as 12 inches of concrete added to the brick arches would be useless, and the ironwork is not designed or constructed to sustain such load. This portion of the work has not yet been commenced, but the orders I have given in connection with it are in keeping with the plans and specifications as I interpret them and in accordance with my calculations when they were prepared.

The estimate of the contractor as certified to by me for work done during the month of January does not in any respect refer to this matter, as no work has been done on these arches.

The Architect, Mr. Thomas, appeared and stated that the whole matter arose from a misinterpretation of the plans, in consequence of a clerical error made at his office in the preparation of the plans, and demonstrated such error by the plans. The error would in no manner affect the efficiency of the work, and that it would be corrected on the plans.

Mr. Guy appeared before the Board and stated that, notwithstanding the twelve inches of concrete as called for in the plans and specifications, he considered that such a thickness would be unnecessary and a disadvantage to the work.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments called up the affidavit and application of P. Gallagher for payment to him of \$13,498, on account of his contract for the erection of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, with the architect's certificate that the work had been performed in accordance with the terms of the contract and specifications, which was laid over at the last meeting, and offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to P. Gallagher the sum of thirteen thousand four hundred and ninety-eight dollars, as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for the erection of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

In reply, I beg to call your attention to the fact that, under section 62 of the Military Code, Laws of 1883, chapter 299, as amended by Laws of 1884, chapter 91, "alterations, enlargements, and furnishing of armories" must be made by the Armory Board, this Department being required only to make repairs to armories as in the case of other public buildings.

DEAR SIR—I have spent an hour nearly every day on the "New Hampshire" since I last saw you, and I have come to the conclusion that if I could employ one of the ship carpenters that I have to do our steamboat work, that I could go ahead much faster with the alterations to the division-rooms on the lower gun deck. My frequent inspections there show me that I can do it much cheaper than by including these small alterations in the general contract. There will not be nearly as much to do as I thought at first, and I also find that there is plenty of material in the old compartments, which have to be taken down, to use for new bulkheads, etc. Another very important point is that I could put a couple of men to work there right away and have the divisional rooms ready for drills inside of two weeks. The contract for the plumbing and other work would then be a much simpler one to make, as the repairs to be made would be more definite, and it is almost impossible for a bidder to make a cheap bid on repairs and alterations to old bulkheads.

Could you therefore arrange that I could spend up to \$1,000 out of the \$16,000 on alterations to the divisional rooms and ward-room. The repairs I speak of doing are included under the following clause of my letter to you of January 31, namely, "Repairs to joiner work, altering crew's quarters, including making four division-rooms on lower gun deck, altering closets, changing bulkheads, etc., \$1,700."

The 866 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.25, against 23.82 for the previous week, and 26.43 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The mortality varied little from that of the previous week. There was an increase of 10 in the deaths from phthisis, of 24 from pneumonia, and of 19 from congenital debility, and a decrease of 6 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 11 from typhus fever, of 7 from heart diseases and of 15 from diseases of the digestive organs.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from measles in the Fourteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward.

CHAPTER 65, LAWS OF 1893.

AN ACT authorizing the investment of trust funds in stocks or bonds of any of the cities of this State.

Approved by the Governor, March 14, 1893. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for executors, administrators, guardians and trustees and others holding trust funds for investment to invest the funds so held by them in trust in bonds or stocks of any of the cities of this State, issued pursuant to the authority of any law of this State.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water,

from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
