Communications Transmitted to His Honor the Mayor.

Calling attention to an appeal from the State Commission in Lunacy, published this day, urging the Governor to sign the bill transferring the insane of this county to the care of the State, and stating that the reasons given by said Commission do great injustice to the Commissioners of this Department, with the request that this communication be transmitted to the Governor with whatever words of approval the Mayor may decide to make.

June 12, 1895.

Secretary to call attention of General Superintendent of Insane to report of Lunacy Commission, published in daily papers, June 12, 1895, addressed to the Governor, praying that he sign the bill transferring the insane of this county to State care, and requesting him (General Superintendent) to report if the condition of the Asylums and their inmates justifies such wholesale denunciation as contained in the Commission's report.

June 13, 1895.

Secretary to notify Heads of Institutions that the Mayor of the City has declared Monday next, 17th inst., to be a holiday, in honor of the opening of the Harlem Canal, and that it be so observed.
June 14, 1895.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Committee on Charities be and he hereby is requested and authorized to examine into the condition and management of the Twenty-sixth street dock, and to make report to this Board on the subject ; and that he be and is further authorized to procure approximate estimate or estimates for such repairs or alterations as the report above called for may treat upon. Adopted.

Resolved, That the Medical Board governing the Out-door Poor Bureau of Medical and Surgical Relief be requested to recommend a physician to fill the position of Examining Physician recently held by Dr. A. M. Wallace, deceased. Adopted.

In view of certain facts, as set forth in a report made to the Board by Commissioner Faure, in relation to the management of, and the transaction of business on the Twenty-sixth street dock, the following resolutions were offered by said Commissioner:

1. Resolved, That the Supervising Engineer be relieved of all duties on the Twenty-sixth street dock and all other docks of this Department, and also of the direction of the movements of any of the steamboats, launches or boats of any description, the property of this Department, to take effect 15th June, 1895.

2. Resolved, That the position of Ticket Agent on Twenty-sixth street dock be and the same is hereby abolished, to take effect as soon as the necessary details can be arranged, and that such tickets as have been formerly sold on the dock be sold at the Central Office.

3. Resolved, That the position of Superintendent of Docks and Boats be and the same is hereby created, and that Major Solomon E. Japha be and he hereby is appointed to such position at a salary of one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, subject to Civil Service examination.

4. Resolved, That his duties shall be to manage, supervise and direct the business of this Department of all kinds, on the Twenty-sixth street dock, and to direct the movements of the various boats belonging to this Department. He shall be in authority over all employees of this Department who work on the Twenty-sixth street dock and boats, and shall be held responsible for the proper performance of their duties at all times. Adopted.

In regard to cleansing and improving the sanitary condition of the dock, Commissioner Faure recommends that the following changes be made:

1. That the small room used for storage purposes for rejected goods and rubbish be converted into a double water-closet for females, with entrances both from the passengers' and the patients' waiting-rooms.

2. That the present closet in the large waiting-room be removed to the westerly end of same room.

3. That the stoves and dilapidated zinc on which they stand be removed and stored elsewhere during the summer.

4. That new closets be supplied in the prisoners' rooms on the north side of the dock, to replace the filthy and offensive ones now in use.

5. That the use of the largest room on the north side, as a lodging-room for Workhouse men, be discontinued, and that the space now divided into three rooms be used for two, in order that additional and greatly needed room for provisions may be available.

To the end that the renovations and improvements above referred to may be carried out in the most economical manner possible, be it

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Committee on Charities be authorized and directed to consult with Warden O'Rourke, of Bellevue Hospital, and Superintendent Dunphy, of the Workhouse, that Department labor be used as far as possible, and that an amount not exceeding three hundred dollars be and hereby is appropriated for the purpose above described. Adopted.

By President Porter:

Resolved, That, in addition to approving the report and resolutions presented this day by Commissioner Faure, in regard to the reorganization of the dock and its surroundings at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street, and the general management of the steamboats and docks on the Island; it is further

Resolved, That the whole matter be referred to Commissioner Faure with full power, and to report to Board the result of his labors. Adopted.

Resolved, That the position of Supervising Engineer of this Department be abolished on and after the 15th day of this month, and so notify John J. Blair. Adopted.

By Commissioner Faure:

Resolved, That the Board of Visiting Physicians and Surgeons of Harlem Hospital, as the same is now constituted, be and the same hereby is abolished, and that this resolution shall take effect on and after Monday, July 1, 1895.

Resolved, That a "Medical Board of the Harlem Hospital," eight in number, be created in the same manner and by the same channels or functions as the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital was created, on May 12, 1882.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be and hereby is instructed to notify the four groups of Physicians composing the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, accordingly. Adopted.

Resolved, That in the matter of having this Board represented in the ceremonies of opening the Harlem Canal, on Monday next, 17th instant, be referred to Commissioner Faure, with full power. Adopted.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted: Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board, so far as practicable, to employ bands connected with regiments of the National Guard for giving concerts in the parks; therefore be it Resolved, That the contract for giving ten concerts in Paradise Park Tuesday evenings, beginning July 2, 1895, be awarded to the band attached to the Eighth Battalion, said band to consist of eighteen pieces, on the same terms as last year. Commissioner Haven submitted a bill of H. T. Vulte for \$50, for analysis of water in connection with the Aquarium, and recommended that the same be paid.

The following resolution was thereupon adopted: Resolved, That the bill of H. T. Vulte, amounting to fifty dollars, for services rendered in analyzing water in connection with the Aquarium, be and the same is hereby audited and approved and ordered transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, That permission be granted to the Fire Department to put up an ornamental fence in the rear of the new house and dock erected for the use of the fireboat "New Yorker," the same to remain during the pleasure of the Board of Park Commissioners.

Resolved, That the Engineering Force now engaged in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be discharged after April 30; that the Engineer-in-Charge be directed to report for duty at Arsenal Headquarters on the morning of May 1; that the Superintendent of Parks be directed to reorganize the working force for new roads and the general care of the property of the Department of Parks in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and that all further engineering work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards shall be done by the staff on duty at Arsenal Headquarters.

Commissioner Haven submitted an estimate of George A. Williams & Sons, for window guards at the Aquarium, and recommended the issue of an order for doing the work at the price named, viz, \$65. Approved and so ordered.

Shurtleff, has been for twenty-years connected with the Smithsonian Institution, and is now in the employ of the United States Fish Commission, and has a reputation second to none; therefore be it

Resolved, That Dr. Tarleton H. Bean be appointed Superintendent of the Aquarium from May 1.

Resolved, That all employees at the Aquarium of every description be placed under the direct charge of the Superintendent, and that they report to him regarding their several duties.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be directed to report to this Board what changes and what work is necessary to properly complete the Aquarium and put it in order for opening, together with

an approximate-estimate of the cost thereof and the time necessary to complete the work. Also what course would be necessary to properly stock the Aquarium, and the estimated cost of the same.

Resolved, That Julius F. Munckwitz, Jr., Architect, be directed to report to the Superintendent of the Aquarium and to assist him in drawing specifications and whatever other work the Superintendent may give him to attend to.

Commissioner Roosevelt reported progress in the matter of the selection of a site for the De Peyster statue.

William R. Stewart, on behalf of the Committee for the erection of the Washington Arch, presented invitations to the Commissioners to be present and assist at the dedication ceremonies.

The following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, That special police protection be given, day and night, to the Grand Stands in Washington Square now in course of erection by the Committee for the erection of the Washington Arch, until their removal.

Resolved, That on April 30, the date of the dedication of the arch and its transfer to the care of this Department, a sufficient force of police for the preservation of good order in the plaza around the arch be assigned to duty there; that Officers Bray, Livingston, O'Shea, McMurray, Brennan, Schneider and two others, be, on request of Mr. William R. Stewart, Treasurer of the Washington Arch Committee, detailed for his assistance on the stands, to report at 1.30 P. M., and that the Captain be instructed for that afternoon to assist Mr. Stewart in carrying out the arrangements of the Committee.

Commissioner Haven moved that when the Board adjourns, it adjourn to meet on Wednesday next, at 9.30 A. M., and that Wednesdays, at 9.30 A. M., of each week be made the regular meeting days of the Board until June 1. Carried.

F. A. Thayer was heard relative to acquiring additional lands for the approach to the Speedway at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street. He was informed that the Board would first approve the plans of the Landscape Architect, and would consider any proposition to acquire additional lands as a new matter. Mr. Thayer requested the return of the petition addressed to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, which he had handed to the President for the advisory consideration of the Board of Parks. The petition was ordered returned.

The 954 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.74, against 22.38 for the previous week and 26.08 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 179, 198, 38, 9 and 0, against 228, 251, 55, 8 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 424 against 542. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Fourteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Thirteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Sixteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Ward. Five of the 9 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 2 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
