The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply (Deputy Commissioner Haslin), the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges (Deputy Commissioner York), the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens, the President of the Borough of Richmond and the President of the Board.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.
The minutes of the meeting of January 16, 1901, were approved as printed.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF HUGHES AVENUE, ETC., BRONX.

In accordance with the resolution of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx (Minutes, January 3, 1901, page 75), the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in Hughes avenue and Belmont avenue, between East One Hundred and Eightieth street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Crotona avenue and Arthur avenue, and in Oak Tree place, between Hughes avenue and Arthur avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

"A."—Hughes Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Hughes avenue and East One Hundred and Eightieth street, the elevation to be 83.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to the intersection with East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, the elevation to be 84.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection with Oak Tree place, the elevation to be 87.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence northerly to the intersection with East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, the elevation to be as previously filed.

"B."—Belmont Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Belmont avenue and East One Hundred and Eightieth street, the elevation to be 81.8 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to the intersection with East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, the elevation to be 91.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection with East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, the elevation to be as previously filed.

"C."—One Hundred and Eighty-first Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Crotona avenue, the elevation to be 83.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence westerly to the intersection with Belmont avenue, the elevation to be 91.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence westerly to the intersection with Hughes avenue, the elevation to be 84.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence westerly to the intersection with Arthur avenue, the elevation to be 86.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

"D."—Oak Tree Place.

Beginning at the intersection of Oak Tree place and Hughes avenue, the elevation to be 87.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence westerly to a point 110.0 feet easterly from the southeast curb intersection of Arthur avenue, the elevation to be 88.1 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence westerly to the intersection with Arthur avenue, the elevation to be 87.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established in the Borough of The Bronx.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared, for submission to this Board, three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting, open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 13th day of February, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby, that the proposed change of grades of the above named streets will be considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 13th day of February, 1901.

This would, however, be a comparatively simple piece of work.

I transmit a plan of the section of the viaduct in the vicinity of One Hundred and Tenth street and Park avenue, showing in light blue color the masonry to be removed, and, in red, showing the masonry to be removed and rebuilt.

The tracks of the railroad, as shown on the plan, are supported by three longitudinal girders resting on capstones built into the masonry. Under the north capstone of the centre arch the entrance to the waiting-room is located. This entrance could be retained after the arch is removed.

The estimated cost of removing the stone arch over the roadway at One Hundred and Tenth street and Park avenue, and rebuilding the section of masonry shown in red on the plan, is \$8,500. It seems to me that this should be done by the railroad company. However, if it should be decided that the work must be done by this Department, a special appropriation would be necessary, as this Department has no fund from which the expense of the work could be paid.

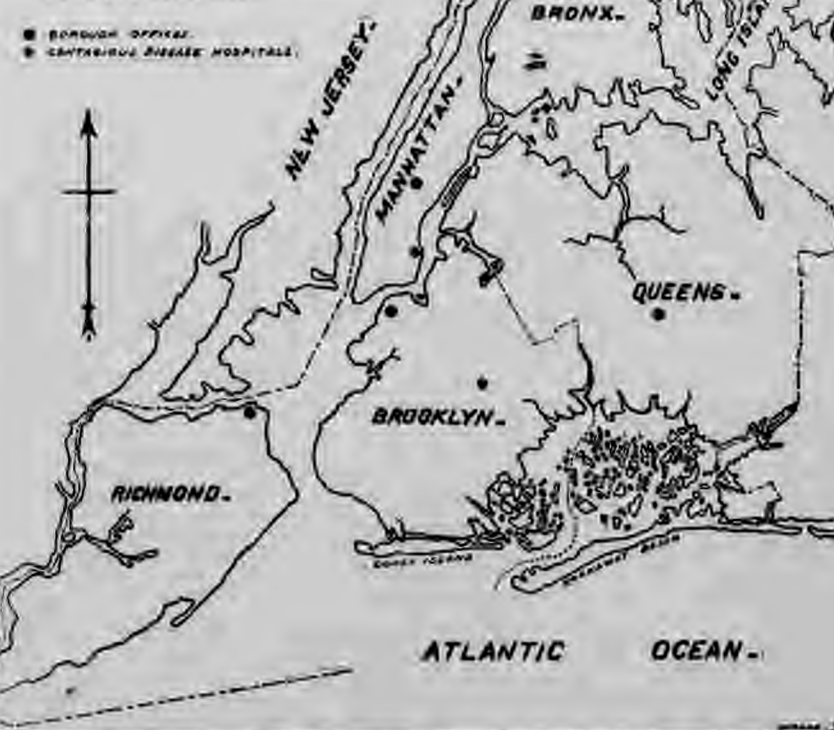

The letter of the Secretary, dated December 20, 1900, written to the Crystal Water Company of Edgewater, pursuant to a vote of the Local Board passed on the 19th day of December, 1900, requesting the company to explain the difference in rates and charges for water furnished to different consumers, was read, as was also the letter in reply thereto of the Crystal Water Company of Edgewater, dated December 21, 1900.

Both the letters of the Crystal Water Company, dated December 21, 1900, and of Commissioner Dalton, dated January 11, 1901, were ordered on file.

Mr. Michael Meehan, Mrs. J. Kissinger, and Mrs. George Whigelt appeared before the board and made complaint against the Crystal Water Company for excessive charges made by said company for water furnished.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, it was voted that the Secretary communicate with the president of the company, calling his attention to the facts stated by Mr. Michael Meehan and Mrs. J. Kissinger.
