Alteration 2780, of 1901, appeal No. 1, of 1902—Nos. 62 and 64 Greene street, Manhattan, Robert T. Lyon, architect and appellant: "To construct and erect elevator shaft in accordance with the formula of the Norman Construction Company." Mr. Norman appeared and explained the appeal to the Board. Motion being lost, the appeal was denied.

New building 1684, of 1901, appeal No. 2, of 1902, South side of Twenty-seventh street, 225 feet east of Eleventh avenue, C. H. Caldwell, architect and appellant—"To

omit an interior staircase in a six-story non-fireproof factory building and substitute for the same an outside iron stairway." On motion, laid over to the next meeting. New building 1553, of 1901, appeals No. 3 and No. 4, of 1902, No. 43 West Forty-fourth street and Nos. 44 to 50 West Forty-fifth street, Seaboard Realty Co., per Ludlow & Valentine, architects and appellants. 
