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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A regular meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held on Friday, January 9, 1903, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon, in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall.

After considering financial matters, the Board took up the consideration of public improvements.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. Seth Low, presided.

CHANGE OF LINES OF BROOKLYN APPROACH TO BRIDGE NO. 3.

In the matter of the proposed change of lines of the Brooklyn approach to the Manhattan Bridge (No. 3), and change of grades, etc., of intersecting streets, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing.

The Mayor moved that a hearing be fixed for January 23 at 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon, at which the two plans submitted would be considered, which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15.

LAYING OUT APPROACH TO WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE, MANHATTAN.

On motion of the Mayor, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a hearing be given on Friday, January 23, 1903, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon, in the matter of laying out an approach to the Williamsburg Bridge on the Manhattan side, and that at such hearing all plans submitted will be considered, both for the approach and for an outlet west of the Bowery.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15.

LAYING OUT APPROACH TO ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-EIGHTH STREET BRIDGE, BRONX.

In the matter of laying out an approach to the bridge over the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and changing the lines and grades of Exterior street and East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in said borough, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

After hearing Mr. Niles, Mr. Truman H. Baldwin and Mr. Pressinger in favor of considering the entire proposition as an approach to the bridge, on motion of the Mayor, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 12th day of December, 1902, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an approach to the East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street Bridge over the Harlem river by changing the lines and grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street between the New York and Harlem Railroad and the United States Pier and Bulkhead Line, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 9th day

of January, 1903, at 2.30 o'clock p. m., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the "City Record" for ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 9th day of January, 1903; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 9th day of January, 1903; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an approach to the East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street Bridge over the Harlem river by changing the lines and grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between the New York and Harlem Railroad and the United States Pier and Bulkhead Line, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out the aforesaid approach as follows:

I.

Beginning at the intersection of the western line of Exterior street, as shown on section 7 of the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, with the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street;

1. Thence southerly along the western line of Exterior street for 51.67 feet;
2. Thence westerly, deflecting 104 degrees 36 minutes to the right for 181.47 feet;
3. Thence still westerly, deflecting 9 degrees 55 minutes 1 second to the left, for 82.98 feet to the eastern United States Pier Head Line of the Harlem river;
4. Thence northerly, deflecting 71 degrees 55 minutes 43 seconds to the right, along said Pierhead Line, for 52.6 feet to the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street;
5. Thence easterly along the southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street for 103.63 feet to an angle point;
6. Thence still easterly along the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street for 172.79 feet to the point of beginning.

II.

Beginning at the intersection of the western line of Mott avenue with the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street;

1. Thence southerly along the westerly line of Mott avenue for 32.66 feet;
2. Thence westerly, deflecting 87 degrees 12 minutes 38 seconds to the right, for 356.30 feet to the eastern line of Exterior street;
3. Thence northerly, deflecting 78 degrees 11 minutes 22 seconds to the right, along the eastern line of Exterior street for 51.66 feet to the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street;
4. Thence easterly along the southern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street for 368.90 feet to the point of beginning.

Description of Changes of Grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Between Harlem River and the New York and Harlem Railroad.

1. Beginning at the United States Pier and Bulkhead Line, the elevation to be 6.0 feet above mean high water datum, as heretofore;
2. Thence easterly to the intersection of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Exterior street, the elevation to be 18.0 feet above mean high water datum;
3. Thence easterly to the intersection of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Mott avenue, the elevation to be 12.0 feet above mean high water datum;
4. Thence easterly to the intersection with New York and Harlem Railroad, the elevation to be 8.5 feet above mean high water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to the mean high water as established in the Borough of The Bronx.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out the aforesaid approach adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—13.

CHANGE OF LINES AND GRADES OF EXTERIOR STREET AND EAST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH STREET, BRONX.

In connection with the foregoing resolution, on motion of the Comptroller, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 12th day of December, 1902, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the lines of Exterior street, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and changing the grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Exterior street between Park avenue and Cheever place, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 9th day of January, 1903, at 2.30 o'clock p. m., at which meeting such proposed change of lines and grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed change of lines and grades would be considered, to be published in the "City Record" for ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 9th day of January, 1903; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 9th day of January, 1903; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of lines and grades who have appeared, and such proposed change of lines and grades was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the lines of Exterior street, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and changing the grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Exterior street, between Park avenue and Cheever place, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the lines and grades of the aforesaid streets as follows:

Exterior street, south of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, to be reduced in width from 100 feet to 80 feet, and that portion of Exterior street between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and lying west of the 80-foot street, to be discontinued and closed.

Changes of Grades of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Exterior Street, Between Park Avenue and Cheever Place.

1. Beginning at the intersection of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Park avenue, the elevation to be 9.0 feet above mean high water datum, as heretofore;
2. Thence northerly along the eastern curb line of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to an angle point, the elevation to be 7.8 feet above mean high water datum;
3. Thence northerly to the intersection of Exterior street and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, the elevation to be 18.0 feet above mean high water datum;
4. Thence northerly along the western curb line of Exterior street to an angle point, the elevation to be 15.5 feet above mean high water datum;
5. Thence northerly to the intersection of Exterior street and Cheever place, the elevation to be 17.0 feet above mean high water datum, as heretofore.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the lines and grades of aforesaid streets, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—14.

AMENDING SECTIONS 29, 30 AND 31 OF THE FINAL MAPS OF THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed alterations and amendments to sections 29, 30 and 31 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, showing the street system east of the Bronx river, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matters had been duly advertised.

After hearing Mr. Dunn and Mr. F. H. Denman, Secretary The Winifred-Masterson Burke Relief Foundation, in opposition to the proposed changes, and Mr. Peter A. Shiel, Mr. Wm. A. Dobbs, Mr. Meyerhoff, Mr. Lucius W. Haw, President of the Bronxville Park Improvement League, and Mr. Stillwell in favor of the proposed changes, on motion of the Comptroller the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the matter be laid over for final consideration and action until two weeks from to-day, and that meanwhile the Chief Engineer be requested to examine and report in detail.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—15.

The following petition and protests were placed on file:

To Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The undersigned property owners and freeholders in that part of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx river and south of the Bronx and Pelham parkway, respectfully show to your Honorable Board:

That the part of The Bronx above mentioned, with other territory, was annexed to The City of New York on the 6th day of June, 1895, by virtue of chapter 934 of the Laws of 1895;

That thereafter the Commissioner of Street Improvements, duly authorized by law to prepare a map or plan of a system of streets, avenues, parks, etc., and establish grades and a general system of drainage and sewerage, obtained appropriations for the years 1896 and 1897 for the purpose of preparing such map or plan;

That thereafter and during the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901 the late Board of Public Improvements was authorized and empowered by law to continue such work and obtained large appropriations therefor;

That thereafter and during the year 1902 the continuation of such work devolved upon the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and a large appropriation was made to him for that purpose;

That in October, 1895, the then Commissioner of Street Improvements informed the then Board of Estimate that the completion of said map would require about three years and an expenditure of about \$150,000;

That the expenditure of public money for that purpose up to the present time is believed to exceed \$500,000, and seven years have elapsed; that the net result to date is that sections of the final maps have been adopted for nearly all of the district north of the parkway and practically none south of the parkway, or, in other words, not half the work is completed;

That in the opinion of your petitioners it is desirable that the map be completed south of the parkway before any more time and money are expended upon changes in sections already adopted;

That it is the duty of the President of the Borough of The Bronx to complete such maps, but that during the year 1902 not even one new section has been submitted by him to this Board according to law;

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that, pursuant to section 440 of the Charter of The City of New York, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the approval of the Mayor, require the President of the Borough of The Bronx to complete the map or plan of the territory within the Borough of The Bronx for which the map or plan has not been heretofore duly established and adopted, and to report the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within a reasonable time, to be fixed and specified by said Board.

IN THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

In the Matter of Altering the Map or Plan of The City of New York, by Amending Sections 29, 30 and 31 of the Final Maps Showing the Street System in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

The petition of the Adeo Syndicate objecting to the changes proposed in sections 29, 30 and 31 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx of The City of New York respectfully shows to this Honorable Board:

First—That it is a corporation organized and existing under the Laws of the State of New York and a taxpayer in The City of New York, in the Borough of The Bronx thereof, owning a tract of land affected by the proposed changes.

Second—That it objects to the changes proposed in said sections 29, 30 and 31 upon the ground that the present system has met with general public approval, was first adopted by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, after public hearings in December, 1897, was later adopted upon the tentative map approved by the Board of Public Improvements after public hearings in July, 1898, and was finally adopted and approved in sectional form by the said Board of Public Improvements during the year 1901, and that at no time has there been any public demand for the changes contemplated.

Third—That it objects to the method of making changes by adopting an amended

map of an entire section, upon the ground that such a course contemplates wholesale and radical changes in different localities which cannot be carefully scrutinized in such form.

Fourth—It objects to the changes proposed upon the ground that it would establish a precedent for future wholesale changes and thereby unsettle and depreciate the value of real property in the territory affected and prevent its proper development and improvement.

Fifth—It objects to the proposed amendments on the ground that, while a change may at times be deemed advisable in such maps, this Board should not act in that respect except upon the petition of property owners asking for such specific change.

Sixth—It objects specifically to the changes designated by the Nos. 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 21 and 22 in the technical description of the alterations and amendments of section 31, as published in the "City Record," upon the ground that such changes are not to the advantage of The City of New York or the general public, and are greatly injurious to your petitioner and other property owners in that locality.

Seventh—It objects to the proposed changes upon the ground that the same were in fact initiated by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and maps thereof prepared prior to the 30th day of November, 1902, all of which was illegal; that upon the publication by him of notice that he had prepared maps showing changes in those sections, your petitioner instituted an action in The City of New York to restrain any further changes upon his part, and to compel restitution to The City of New York of public funds theretofore expended for such purposes. That on the 9th day of December, 1902, the summons and complaint in that action and an order of Mr. Justice Fitzgerald requiring him to show cause on the 11th day of December, 1902, why an injunction should not issue pending the trial of the action, were served upon the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and said motion for injunction was argued on said 11th day of December, 1902, and decision reserved by Mr. Justice Leventritt; that, notwithstanding such motion, resolutions were passed by this Board on the 12th day of December, 1902, directing said President of the Borough of The Bronx to prepare maps showing certain changes which, as your petitioner is informed and believes, are the same changes shown upon the maps previously prepared by him and now before your Board for action; that since those resolutions were passed an injunction has been issued out of the Supreme Court restraining the President of the Borough of The Bronx from making any further changes in the map or plan of The City of New York, except when authorized so to do by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that your petitioner therefore respectfully requests that no action in the way of changing maps be taken except upon petition of the property owners for individual contemplated amendments.

Eighth—That the stockholders in the corporation above named, your petitioner, the Adeo Syndicate, are Charles T. Adeo, Jennie Adeo, Frank N. Glover, Howard N. Glover, Emile A. Hall, W. H. A. Horsfall, E. V. A. Kennedy and L. F. W. Wallace, and that there are no other persons whatever stockholders in said company.

Ninth—That your petitioner believes the best interests of The City of New York will be served by withholding any action for the purpose of changing the sections already adopted, and directing the President of the Borough of The Bronx to complete the map or plan of the Borough of The Bronx for the reason that the territory east of the Bronx river has been annexed to The City of New York for the past seven years, and that, notwithstanding ample appropriations in each of those years, less than half of that territory has been mapped out; that there has been expended since June, 1895, for the surveying and mapping of the annexed district nearly six hundred thousand dollars; that the entire territory, exclusive of parks, in that district is about six thousand acres, and that consequently up to the present time it has cost The City of New York one hundred dollars per acre in round numbers, or over six dollars per standard City lot, and yet with this large expenditure more than half of the entire district still remains without filed maps.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that your Honorable Board will rescind the three several resolutions adopted on the 12th day of December, 1902, which propose alterations of sections 29, 30 and 31 of the final maps, and that this Board will authorize and direct the President of the Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to the provisions of section 440 of the Greater New York Charter, to complete the map or plan of the Borough of The Bronx and submit the same to your Board at a fixed and specified time.

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned owners of property lying in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, having been informed that a petition is to come before your Board to discontinue the plan of street improvement, and to change the maps, most respectfully show that by such change the work already performed in preparing said map and the cost relating thereto will be practically thrown away and will retard the growth of the district at least four years. We therefore earnestly protest against any such change, and ask your Board to deny the petition and to allow the system heretofore adopted to stand.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

We, the undersigned, owners of property located in the Borough of The Bronx, east of the Bronx river, believing that the "general design for a system of streets, avenues, public squares and places," etc., as shown upon map dated July 13, 1898, is inimical to the interests of the borough at large, presenting, as is done, a street system crossing the natural line of traffic (which would follow a northerly and not a northwesterly direction), that it is wasteful of the property of private owners (in some cases taking from them for streets, parks, etc., nearly one-half of the land), do respectfully petition your Honorable Board to initiate proceedings, under section 442, Greater New York Charter, to revise the general plan as shown upon the above-mentioned map and maps heretofore filed, and to present for consideration a new or revised plan which shall give proper access to and thoroughfare over the various sections of the Borough; which shall, by aiding natural tendencies, contribute to the up-building of the Borough, and which shall meet with the approval, as far as possible, of owners of property locally affected.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment deems it for the public interest that the map or plan of The City of New York, so far as it has been finally adopted and filed affecting the territory lying east of the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, should be altered so as to show such changes as will result in greater economy in the amount of land to be acquired for streets and public places, and as will cause the completed map thus changed to result in a harmonious system in connection with that portion of the map of said territory yet to be adopted; therefore be it

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx, upon behalf of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed for the purposes of such changes

to examine the final map or plan and profiles of that part of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx river, in so far as the same has been legally adopted and filed, and to suggest and report to this Board proposed changes and amendments to such map so far as the same affects said territory, and said President of the Borough of The Bronx is hereby authorized and directed, for the purpose aforesaid, to prepare all necessary maps and plans showing such proposed changes and amendments to said map and to make and perform, or cause to be made and performed, the necessary calculations, surveys and other engineering work incidental to the preparation of said maps, and to report such maps, plans and profile drawings to this Board as soon as possible, and that the action heretofore taken by him in preparing such maps be approved.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

LAYING OUT PARK AT AVENUES I AND J, EAST THIRTY-EIGHTH AND EAST THIRTY-NINTH STREETS, BROOKLYN.

The following reports from the Chief Engineer and Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens were presented:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
December 22, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolutions of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on November 17, 1902, rescind a resolution adopted by the same Board on March 26, 1902, providing for acquiring title to the property in the block bounded by Avenues I and J and East Thirty-eighth and East Thirty-ninth streets, in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of a public park, and instead thereof proceedings are initiated to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out the same block as a public park, this action having been taken for the reason that the former resolution was premature, providing for acquiring a public park before the same had been laid out.

The Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens was requested to report to the Board as to the desirability of this particular plot of ground for a public park, and the Engineer of the Board was instructed to prepare a map showing the location of the proposed park with reference to other park reservations, and such map is herewith submitted. The report of the Park Commissioner is a favorable one, his conclusion being that the site is desirable and that the expense of adapting it to park purposes would be small, and that there is no other park within a mile and a half.

The assessed value of the block is \$7,800, though its actual value is undoubtedly very much greater. It will be seen by reference to the map that there is no proposed park in the vicinity nor within the limits of the Thirty-second Ward except one at Canarsie, and although this part of the City is devoted almost entirely to detached houses, the reservation of this plot for park purposes would probably be wise. A public hearing is therefore recommended.

Columbus avenue, between West Farms road and Bear Swamp road;
Grant avenue, between Garfield street and Unionport road; and in Jackson avenue, between Garfield street and Unionport road.

There has been no street plan or sewer plan formally approved for this district and the construction of temporary sewers is asked for under the provisions of section 394 of the Charter, which provides for building such temporary sewers upon the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and assessing the cost of the same upon the property benefited. The President of the Borough has submitted a plan showing the proposed sewers, giving their sizes and grades with the present elevation of the ground on each street.

No formal opening proceedings have ever been had for any of the streets named, inasmuch as no formal map has been adopted, but they are in the section known as Unionport, have been in use and cared for by the City for at least seven (7) years, while there are a large number of houses located upon them, which number is constantly increasing, and it would seem as though a sufficient easement had been acquired to permit the construction of sewers. It is therefore recommended that the plan submitted be approved by the Board as well as the resolution authorizing the carrying out of the improvement.

The approximate amount of work involved is as follows:

620 linear feet of 18-inch pipe sewer.
1,580 linear feet of 15-inch pipe sewer.
9,950 linear feet of 12-inch pipe sewer.
150 linear feet of 12-inch drain pipe.
140 linear feet of 3-inch pipe for flushing purposes.
122 manholes.

6 catch basins, with the necessary excavation.

The total estimated cost of the proposed improvement is \$47,450, and the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$386,730.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on June 19, 1902, providing for the construction of temporary sewers and appurtenances in Fourth avenue, between Fifteenth and Eighteenth streets; in Fifth avenue, between Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets; in Sixteenth street, between White Plains road and Fifth avenue, and in Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, between the summit west of Fourth avenue and Fifth avenue.

The map of the portion of the City in which these sewers are to be built has not yet been adopted, nor has a final sewerage plan been prepared and approved. Section 394 of the Charter, however, provides that

"Whenever it shall become necessary to construct a sewer or drain for the purpose of preventing damage to property or to abate a nuisance, and it shall be impracticable to proceed immediately to the construction of the same in accordance with any plan already adopted, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the President of the Borough within which such necessity arises shall have power to construct a temporary sewer or drain in such manner as to avoid such damage or to abate such nuisance, and the cost of such temporary sewer or drain shall be assessed upon the property draining into the same and benefited thereby."

There are a number of houses in this section, and their number is being rapidly increased, while they are entirely without house drainage, and it seems perfectly proper that temporary sewers be built. It has seemed to me wise, however, that some plan for these temporary sewers be placed before the Board and approved by it, as section 446 of the Charter declares it to be unlawful to construct any sewer unless it shall be in accordance with a plan which shall have been properly approved. The Borough President has therefore furnished the plan herewith submitted, which is designed as a contract plan, showing the depths and grades of the sewer and the present surface of the ground, and it is recommended that this be approved by the Board as well as the resolution providing for the construction of the sewers.

The streets referred to have never been opened by regular proceedings, but they are all shown as 50-foot streets on the maps of the village of Wakefield filed in the office of the Register of Westchester County on September 10, 1855, and there seems no doubt that the public has acquired a sufficient easement in the streets to permit of the construction of sewers.

The approximate amount of work involved is as follows:

280 linear feet of 15-inch pipe sewer.
3,770 linear feet of 12-inch pipe sewer.
1,170 linear feet of 8-inch pipe sewer.
50 linear feet of 6-inch to 18-inch drain pipe.
41 manholes, with the required amount of excavation.

The total estimated cost of the work is \$16,035 and the assessed valuation of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$79,843.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on October 20, 1902, initiating proceedings for the construction of a storm sewer in Greenpoint avenue, between Bradley avenue and Newtown creek, in the First Ward.

This improvement comprises a length of three blocks between Calvary Cemetery and the creek, the two easterly ones of which have been thickly built up with stores and flats, and maintaining a large population. The resolution is accompanied by the affidavits of Andrew McGarry and James F. Hughes, certifying that the street has been in public use for more than thirty years, and that the dedication to such use has

been accepted by the City. I find that the roadway has been paved with cobble and partly curbed; that the gas lamps which were at one time in use have been capped, and that the street is now lit by electricity and occupied by trolley tracks.

The sewer map has been approved, but owing to the inability to discharge sewage into the outlet proposed this drain has not been built. The accumulation of storm water, for which there is now no ready means for removal, is the object of the work now proposed, it being the intention at a later date to provide a separate system for house drainage, the same to be conveyed to a pumping station and thence to the East river. The evidences of dedication being satisfactory and the improvement being, in my judgment, a desirable one, favorable action upon this resolution is recommended.

The work to be done comprises

560 linear feet of 15-inch pipe sewer.

560 linear feet of 18-inch pipe sewer.

8 manholes.

6 receiving basins.

The estimated cost of this work is \$4,365 and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$270,550.

Proceedings to open this street are now in progress, and I would recommend that the Corporation Counsel be advised of the acceptance of affidavits establishing an easement in the street between the limits covered by the resolution.

Third—That pursuant to the notice heretofore given when we filed our estimate of damage, the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom, with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Franklin avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; running thence northwesterly along the last mentioned parallel line and its prolongation northwesterly to its intersection with the northwesterly side of Crotona Park South; thence southerly along the northwesterly side of Crotona Park South to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Crotona avenue and distant 400 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of Crotona Park North and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line and its prolongation northwesterly to its intersection with the southwesterly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Arthur avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said southwesterly prolongation and parallel line to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; thence northwesterly to the intersection of the southeasterly side of Arthur avenue with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence southeasterly along said parallel line to the southeasterly side of Hughes avenue; thence northwesterly along said southeasterly side of Hughes avenue to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Belmont avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line and its prolongation northwesterly to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence southeasterly along said parallel line and easterly along a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Beaumont avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northwesterly side of Cambreleng avenue and distant 100 feet north-

westerly therefrom; thence northeasterly along said parallel line and its prolongation northwesterly to its intersection with the southwesterly boundary line of the Botanical Gardens; thence southeasterly along said southwesterly boundary line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of the Southern Boulevard and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to its intersection with the southeasterly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said southeasterly prolongation and parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southeasterly side of Prospect avenue and distant 100 feet southeasterly therefrom; thence southwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southeasterly side of Clinton avenue and distant 100 feet southeasterly therefrom; thence southwesterly along said parallel line and its prolongation southwesterly to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southeasterly side of Prospect avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence southeasterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southeasterly side of Prospect avenue and distant 100 feet southeasterly therefrom; thence southwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southeasterly side of Boston road and distant 100 feet southeasterly therefrom; thence southwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southwesterly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street and distant 100 feet southwesterly therefrom; thence northwesterly along said parallel line to the point or place of beginning, as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened as such area is shown upon our benefit maps, deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our supplemental and amended report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III, to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 16th day of April, 1903, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the resresentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
