tion results in a loss, the amount of such loss shall be paid by the City to the proper person or corporation operating the said ferries, and the City shall also be responsible and pay the person or corporation operating said ferry any loss that said person or corporation may be called upon to pay resulting from accident, provided such accident and loss does not result from any negligence or fault of the person or corporation so operating the ferry, his or its servants or agents.

I do hereby recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution in accordance with the foregoing, authorizing me to enter into such an agreement, the same to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.

The following resolution prepared by the Corporation Counsel was then offered for adoption:

Whereas, The City of New York is the owner and proprietor of the ferries across the East River to and from various points in the Borough of Manhattan from and to various points in the Borough of Brooklyn, and of the right or franchise to operate the same; and

Whereas, The right or franchise to operate certain of these ferries was heretofore granted by The City of New York to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company and assigned by that Company to the Brooklyn Ferry Company, which said ferries run across the East River from various points in the Borough of Manhattan to and from various points in the Borough of Brooklyn, which said ferries are described as follows:

(1) A ferry from and to the foot of Roosevelt street to and from the foot of Broadway.

(2) A ferry from and to the north side of the foot of Grand street to and from Broadway.

(3) A ferry from and to the foot of Grand street to and from the foot of Grand street.

(4) A ferry from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street to and from Broadway; and

Whereas, It is alleged that the said ferries cannot at the present time be run at a profit, but only at a loss, and there is great danger that the operation of the said ferries may cease, to the great loss and inconvenience of the public interests and to a large number of private individuals; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Docks, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of The Greater New York Charter, has recommended that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchises of the said ferries in the manner provided in said section 826;

Now, therefore, Be it by unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 826 of the Greater New York Charter,

Resolved, That the franchise of the aforementioned ferries be leased by private agreement for a term not exceeding six months, and under the following conditions which, in the judgment of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, will best protect and further the interests of the City and the traveling public, to wit:

The said agreement shall provide for the maintenance and operation of the said ferries for the period of not more than six months, and in substantially the same manner as at present, except that the fare may be increased by the Commissioner of Docks and the number of boats and trips decreased, if he deems it advisable so to do.

The said agreement shall also provide that an account in detail of all receipts and disbursements shall be kept by the person or corporation operating the said ferries, which account shall be open at all times to the inspection of the City or its authorized representatives.

The said agreement shall also provide that if it shall appear that said operation of the ferries results in a loss, the amount of such loss shall be paid by the City to the proper person or corporation operating the ferries, and that the City shall also be responsible for and pay to the person or corporation operating said ferries any loss that he or it may be compelled to pay resulting from fire or accident, provided such accident and loss shall not result from any negligence or fault of the person or corporation so operating the said ferry, his or its servants or agents. Insurance against fire to be taken out and premiums charged to operating expenses. Interest on the underlying bonds on the terminal properties, not exceeding the principal amount of one million dollars, to be included in operating expenses.

The Corporation Counsel is directed to prepare and approve as to form an agreement in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.
