Permanent Census Board.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1911.

April 24.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

Sir—I beg to submit the following statement of the work of the Permanent Census Board for the quarter ending March 31, 1911:

Twenty-six of the Police Enumerators were engaged in amending work in Manhattan and The Bronx during the month of January, and the remainder in taking the initial canvass in Brooklyn. Since that time the entire squad has been working in Brooklyn. The total actual working time was 3,845 days, in which an area of 5,257 blocks was covered, and 411,247 children were reported upon.

The following classification of children not attending school gives under each heading the number reported to the Compulsory Education Division of the Board of Education: Physically ill, 635; ille-

gally detained, 1,524; immigrants, 189; truants enrolled, 85; truants not enrolled, 25. No work certificates: Boys, 14-16, 879; girls, 14-16, 667; graduates, no certificates, 415; not in evening schools, 1,376; instructed at home, 98; evidence of age required, 100; poverty, 1—total, 5,994.

In addition, the following special reports were made of cases of contagious diseases (children and adults) referred to Department of Health, 146; cases of physically or mentally deficient children, referred to various agencies: Crippled children, 126; blind children or children with defective vision, 25; deaf children, 25; children mentally ill, 136; neglected children, 34; destitute children, 89.

The territory covered includes most of the following School Districts: 30th, 31st, 33d, 34th, 39th and 40th.

There remain six districts in Brooklyn in which the initial canvass will be completed by the end of June, 1911.

Any person, firm or corporation who sells, offers for sale, or gives away within The City of New York any weights, scales, beams, measures of any kind, or the tools, appliances or accessories connected with any and all instruments or mechanical devices for weighing or measuring, intended to be used for the purchase or sale of any commodity or article of merchandise, or for public weighing within The City of New York, that do not comply with the specifications and type submitted and approved by the Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, as provided in this section, shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each and every such offense.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Competitive Class by changing subdivision 22 of Rule XV. to read as follows:

"Whenever there are not more than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy in a graded position, and willing to compete therefor, an eligible nominated by the appointing officer may be promoted to the grade next higher upon a statement of the facts to the Commission, and on passing a non-competitive examination, similar in scope, subjects and preliminary conditions to such examination as would have been prescribed in case of competition."

—and by changing subdivision 23 of Rule XV. to read as follows:

"Any person in the competitive service who shall have passed an examination for either appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds, provided there are not more than two other persons in the same grade, and if not otherwise disqualified, shall be eligible for promotion or advancement to such higher grade or compensation without further examination under this rule, provided he has actually served at least one year in the bureau or other subdivision of the department in which the promotion is to be made."

Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held March 16 were approved.

On motion, the proposed amendment of subdivisions 22 and 23 of Rule XV. was laid over. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Rules and Classification be and the same hereby are amended, as follows:

1. By changing subdivision 1 of Rule II. (General Provisions) to read as follows:

"1. All appointments, promotions, *transfers*, *reinstatements* or selections for employment in the Classified Service shall be made according to the merit and fitness of candidates therefor, and in the manner prescribed by these rules."

2. By changing subdivision 4 of Rule III. (Organization and Powers of the Commission) to read as follows:

"4. In advance of any amendment of these rules, or in advance of any amendment of the Classification by which any position shall be subjected to, or exempted from competitive examination, public notice shall be given by the Commission, through advertisement in the City Record for not less than three days, and on the request of any interested party a public hearing shall be allowed."

3. By changing subdivision 2 of Rule VI. (The Competitive Class) to read as follows:

"2. For the purposes of such examinations, and of regulated promotion where practicable, the Competitive Class shall be subdivided as follows:

"Part I.—All positions, of whatever function, description or compensation, not included in any of the subdivisions following, to be known as 'The Ungraded Service.'"

"Part II.—Positions of a clerical nature to be known as 'The Clerical Service.'"

"Part III.—Positions requiring knowledge of civil engineering to be known as 'The Engineering Service.'"

"Part IV.—Positions as Supervisors of public work and conditions to be known as 'The Inspection Service.'"

"Part V.—Positions requiring a knowledge of the law to be known as 'The Legal Service.'"

"Part VI.—Positions to be known as 'The Attendance Service.'"

"Part VII.—The uniformed forces of the Police Department, excepting Door-men, Matrons and Surgeons, to be known as 'The Police Service.'"

"Part VIII.—The uniformed forces of the Fire Department to be known as 'The Fire Service.'"

"Part IX.—The uniformed forces of the Department of Correction to be known as 'The Prison Service.'"

"Part X.—The uniformed forces of the Department of Street Cleaning to be known as 'The Street Cleaning Service.'"

"Part XI.—Positions in the ferry service of the Department of Docks and Ferries to be known as 'The Ferry Service.'"

"Part XII.—Positions requiring a knowledge of medicine to be known as the 'Medical Service.'"

4. By changing the fourth paragraph of subdivision 4 of Rule XI. (Certification and Appointment) to read as follows:

"An eligible who has declined appointment by reason of the insufficiency of the compensation offered shall not be again certified for a position at the same or any less compensation *unless by order of the Commission*, and when such declaration results in the appointment of an eligible not originally entitled to certification, the compensation of such appointee shall not be increased within one year thereafter beyond the amount offered to any person so declining *unless the appointee is one of the first three upon the eligible list for the higher salary.*"

5. By changing subdivision 5 of Rule XI. (Certification and Appointment) to read as follows:

"5. No certification shall remain in force for a longer period than fifteen days, *nor in any case beyond the life of the eligible list from which certification is made.* Until such certification has been exhausted or terminated no new certification shall be made for the same position, but the names of the persons certified may be certified for any similar position."

6. By changing the second paragraph of subdivision 6 of Rule XI. (Certification and Appointment) to read as follows:

"If a person who is not entitled to certification is certified, upon due notification from the Commission to the appointing officer, his certification shall be revoked."

7. By changing subdivision 1 of Rule XII. (Temporary and Exceptional Appointments) to read as follows:

"1. When services are to be rendered of a temporary character, and for a limited period, the appointing officer shall inform the Commission, stating the duration of such period, the rate of compensation and other conditions of employment, and may select for such employment one of the first three persons on the appropriate eligible list who, after due notice of the conditions, are willing to accept certification therefor; but successive temporary appointments under this clause shall be permitted only upon the request of the appointing officer for reasons to be approved by the Commission, and in no case shall such appointments continue for a longer period than six months."

8. By changing subdivision 4 of Rule XII. (Temporary and Exceptional Appointments) to read as follows:

"4. Where there is a vacancy of an emergency character in a position in the Competitive Class, and it is not practicable either to secure a person by certification from an eligible list or to conduct a non-competitive examination in the absence of such a list in time to meet such emergency, an appointment may be made without certification or examination, subject to the subsequent approval of the Commission, for a period not exceeding fifteen days; and such appointment may be renewed for only one additional period of fifteen days, subject, however, to the approval of the Commission."

9. By inserting in Rule XII. (Temporary and Exceptional Appointments) the following, to be known as "Subdivision 8":

"8. The Commission may except from examination any person engaged in private business who shall render services of a professional, scientific, technical or expert nature of an occasional and exceptional character rendered under an agreement or contract to perform certain specified work, and who is not regularly or continuously employed by The City of New York, and where it appears that the work to be performed is of such a character that no definite estimate can be given as to limit of time or compensation."

—and by adding subdivision 9, now known as subdivision 8, as follows:

"9. All exceptions from competitive examination under this rule, with the circumstances thereof, shall be stated by the Commission in its annual report."

10. By changing subdivision 2 of Rule XIII. (Suspension and Reinstatement) to read as follows:

"2. The provisions of the foregoing clause shall not apply to any person who resigns his position or who is suspended or removed therefrom for any reason other than those therein specified. Leave of absence without pay may be granted by an appointing officer, without conflict with such provisions, where such absence does not exceed thirty days, or, in case of sickness, six months; but the Commission, in exceptional cases, the circumstances of which shall be stated in its minutes and in its annual report, may extend such periods. Absence without leave for a period of five days, unless it be subsequently shown that such absence was unavoidable, shall be construed as a resignation."

11. By changing Rule XIV. (Transfer) to read as follows:

"1. A person who has been permanently appointed to a position in the Competitive Class may be transferred without examination to a similar position in such class, or to a position within the same grade thereof, if it be in a graded service, in any other department, office or institution; provided, that for original entrance to the position proposed to be filled by transfer there is not required by these rules, in the judgment of the Commission, an examination involving tests or qualifications essentially different from or higher than those required in an examination for original entrance to the position from which transfer is sought; and provided further that, if such person entered the service without competitive examination, he shall have served with fidelity for at least three years in the position held by him, or in a similar position."

"2. A person who has been permanently appointed to a position in the graded service of the Competitive Class may be transferred without examination to a similar position of higher grade, in any other department, office or institution; provided, that no persons are eligible for promotion or reinstatement in the department, office or institution to which transfer is to be made; and provided further, that the person to be transferred shall have served with fidelity in the same or a similar position for at least three years, and shall have passed an examination for either appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds."

"3. A person may be transferred from an exempt or non-competitive position to a competitive position, or from a position in the Competitive Class to a position in a different group of such class, only when the person transferred has qualified in an open competitive examination and is eligible for certification and appointment from the appropriate eligible list for the position to which transfer is proposed. Such transfer shall remove from the eligible list the name of the person transferred; but no such transfer shall be allowed when there is in existence an appropriate list of persons eligible for promotion or reinstatement to the position proposed to be filled by transfer."

"A person holding a position in the Non-competitive Class may be transferred to a similar position in the same class."

"4. A person who, by transfer or promotion from a competitive position, is holding a position in another class or in another grade, and who has served continuously therein from the date of such transfer or promotion, may be retransferred, without the application of the foregoing restrictions, either to the position originally held by him, or to any position to which transfer could be made therefrom."

"5. Upon the written request of an appointing officer, stating the facts with reference to a proposed transfer, accompanied by the consent, also in writing, of the person to be transferred and of the appointing officer from whose jurisdiction the transfer is to be made, the Commission may, if such transfer be in accordance with law and the provisions of these rules, issue its certificate to that effect; but no such transfer shall be made or recognized until after the issuance of such certificate."

12. By changing subdivision 8d of Rule XV. (Promotion) to read as follows:

"(d) The Commission may extend eligibility for promotion to positions in Grade 2 of Part II. to persons who shall have served at least two years; and to Grade 3 of Part II. to persons who shall have served at least five years in positions in Part VI., The Attendance Service, where the Commission shall find that the duties of the positions held by such persons are such as naturally and properly fit them to perform the duties of the positions to which they seek promotion, as fully as the duties of persons otherwise eligible under this rule."

13. By changing subdivision 18 of Rule XV. to read as follows:

"18. For reasons to be stated in its minutes, and where permitted by law, the Commission may extend eligibility for promotion to positions appearing in Part I., The Ungraded Service; Part III., The Engineering Service; Part IV., The Inspection Service; Part V., The Legal Service; Part VI., The Attendance Service, and Part XII., The Medical Service, to persons who have served in positions appearing in another part of the classification where it shall find that the nature of the duties of the positions held by such persons is such as naturally and properly fit them to perform the duties of the positions to which they seek promotion, as fully as do the duties of persons who are eligible for examination, as otherwise provided by these rules."

"In determining eligibility for such promotion, the titles of positions in themselves, and the duties which are naturally and properly attached thereto shall be considered. Duties which have been performed not in accordance with the title of the position, or alleged personal qualifications, shall not be considered in determining such eligibility."

14. By substituting for subdivisions 24 and 25 of Rule XV. (Promotion) the following, to be known as subdivisions 24, 25 and 26:

"24. A person whose grade or compensation has at any time been reduced may, by order of the Commission, be restored to such grade or compensation without further examination, provided that such restoration does not involve a change in the duties of the person to be promoted."

"25. No recommendation for the promotion of any person in the classified service shall be considered by any officer concerned in making promotions unless it shall be made by an officer under whose supervision such person has served; such recommendation by any other person, if made with the knowledge and consent of the person to whom it relates, shall be sufficient cause for debarring such person from the promotion proposed, and a repetition of the offense shall be sufficient cause for his removal."

"26. Except as this rule otherwise provides, the conduct of an examination for promotion and the making of selections therefor from any eligible list formed as the result of such examination, shall be governed by the rules relating to original appointment."

15. By changing subdivision 2 of Rule XVI. (Removals) to read as follows:

"2. No person who is an honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine, having served as such in the Union Army or Navy during the War of the Rebellion, or in the Army or Navy of the United States during the Spanish War, or who is a veteran volunteer fireman, shall be removed from any position in the classified service except in the manner prescribed by section 21 of the Civil Service Law."

16. By striking subdivision 5 from Rule XVII. (Special Provisions Affecting the Police and Fire Services), as follows:

"5. In a competition for promotion in the police or fire service, the written examination shall cover: The writing of a report to a superior officer on some designated subject; knowledge of the administration, organization and discipline of the Police or the Fire Department; knowledge of the administrative relations of such department with other branches of the City government; knowledge of laws or ordinances relating to police or fire duty; knowledge and construction of departmental rules and regulations; knowledge of the simple rules of evidence (in the case of the Police Service), and such other pertinent subjects as the Chief Examiner, subject to the direction of the Commission, may prescribe."

"Such written examination shall be of higher and more exhaustive character as the grade examined for advances."

—and by changing subdivisions 4, 6, 7, 8 and 9 to read 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, as follows:

"3. A candidate to be eligible for appointment must obtain an average of not less than 70 per cent. on the mental tests and 70 per cent. on the physical development and strength. Candidates for the Fire Department who obtain an average of over 80 per cent. on the physical development and strength and a final average of 75 per cent. shall also be eligible for appointment."

"4. No candidate shall be eligible for promotion whose ascertained general average is less than 80 per cent."

"5. Whenever a position in either the Police or the Fire Service to which promotion is sought calls for qualifications of a special or technical character, the Chief Examiner may, subject to the direction of the Commission, fix such subjects

therefor as may be appropriate, in addition to those required for the promotion in grade; but such subjects shall conform as nearly as possible to those set for similar positions in other parts of the Competitive Class.

6. The positions of Engineer of Steamer and Pilot, in Grade 1 of the Fire Service, shall be filled by special competitive examination, open to all Firemen of the first grade as defined by section 740 of the City Charter.

7. In every particular not herein specified appointments or promotions in the Police or the Fire Service are subject to the general provisions of these rules."

17. By including in the Competitive Class, Part I., The Ungraded Service, Group 1, Laboratory Positions, the following: Assistant Director of Bacteriological Laboratories.

18. By including in the Competitive Class, Part I., The Ungraded Service, Group 3, Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character, the following: Cataloguer, Custodian, Automobile Engineman, Inspector on Aqueduct, Instructor in Carpentry and Woodworking, Instrument Maker, Patrolman on Aqueduct, Sergeant on Aqueduct.

19. By striking from Part II., The Clerical Service, Group 1, Clerks, the title Clerk or Copyist, and substituting therefor the following: Clerk; also by striking therefrom the title Tenement Department Clerk.

20. Including in the Competitive Class, Part II., The Clerical Service, Group 3, Stenographers, the following: Typewriter Accountant.

21. Striking from the Competitive Class, Part IV., The Inspection Service, Group 5, Inspectors, Miscellaneous, the title Superintendent of Incumbrances, and including therein the following titles: Inspector, Board of Water Supply; Inspector of Complaints.

22. Striking from the Competitive Class, under the heading "Part IV., The Inspection Service," after the clause:

"The positions in the Inspection Service are graded according to the amount of annual compensation, or to its hourly, daily or weekly equivalent, upon a basis of three hundred working days per annum, attaching to each, as follows:"

—the following grades:

Grade 1, \$900 annually; Grade 2, \$1,200 annually; Grade 3, \$1,500 annually; Grade 4, \$1,800 annually; Grade 5, \$2,400 annually; Grade 6, \$3,000 annually, or over.

—and substituting therefor the following:

Grade 1, \$900 annually; Grade 2, \$1,200 annually; Grade 3, \$1,800 annually; Grade 4, \$2,400 annually; Grade 5, \$3,000 annually, or over.

23. Including in the Competitive Class, Part V., The Legal Service, the following title: Deputy Court Clerk.

24. Including in the Competitive Class, Part VI., The Attendance Service, the following titles: Attendant, Gymnasium; Attendant, Playground; Attendant, School Farm; Janitor, Steam Heating.

25. Including in the Competitive Class, Part XII., The Medical Service, the following title: Resident Physician.

26. Striking from the Competitive Class, under the heading "Part XII., The Medical Service," after the clause:

"The positions under the above titles are graded according to the amount of the annual compensation, or its equivalent, attaching to each, as follows:"

—the following grades:

Grade 1, \$1,200 annually; Grade 2, \$1,500 annually; Grade 3, \$1,800 annually; Grade 4, \$2,400 annually; Grade 5, \$3,000 annually, or over.

—and substituting therefor the following:

Grade 1, \$600 annually; Grade 2, \$1,200 annually; Grade 3, \$1,800 annually; Grade 4, \$2,400 annually; Grade 5, \$3,000 annually, or over.

27. By changing the classification of positions in the Non-competitive Class to read as follows:

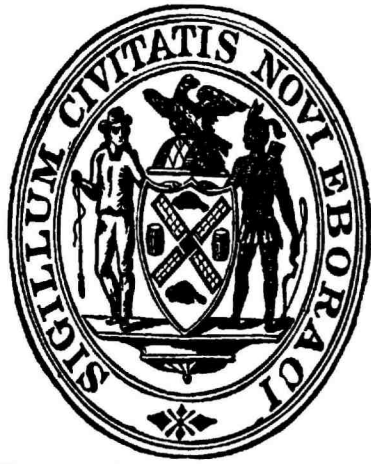

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
